

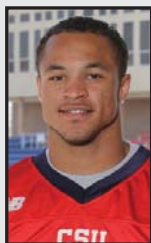

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (4-3, 2-3 RMAC)

Terjean Saffold (Senior, Running Back, 5-8, 200, Stockton, Calif./Laney JC/Weston Ranch HS)

Saffold ran for a pair of touchdowns within the first five minutes of Saturday's game against Western New Mexico. On the Grizzlies first drive, Saffold found the end zone on a 63 yard run, the Grizzlies longest offensive play of the year. He then added to that on ASC's next possession, finding the end zone from 13 yards out. His 7.3 yards per carry were the most in his career, and his two touchdowns raised his season total to six.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies tallied their first home win of the season on Saturday against Western New Mexico, coming back to score the final 14 points after grabbing an early lead to take a 44-40 victory. ASC led 30-14 at the intermission after putting up 304 yards of offense in the first half. Senior Delton Prescott also caught a 26-yard touchdown pass from junior Trevor Eggleston in the second quarter and junior Isam Pegues (Los Angeles, Calif.) ran for his first score of the season. But thanks to a second half in which the Mustangs gained 403 yards and scored 33 unanswered points, the Grizzlies were forced to come-from-behind for the second straight week. Senior Dustin Bolt, who had five passes for 119 yards, scored with 7:30 remaining in the game to cut the deficit to three points, before junior safety James Ackel rushed for his second game-winning touchdown in as many weeks from one-yard out with just 1:33 to play. Ackel also rushed for a pair of two-point conversions in the first half and has done so four times now this season. Junior David Van Voris averaged 70.0 yards on seven kickoffs, sending the ball into the WNMU end zone on each kickoff, and recorded six touchbacks. ASC returns to the road next weekend for the annual Musket Game against Fort Lewis in Durango.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (2-5, 1-4 RMAC)

Connor Wright (Senior, Defensive End, 240, Wheat Ridge, Colo./Wheat Ridge HS)

Wright was second on the team with 10 tackles against Colorado Mines (five solo). He had 1.0 sacks and 2.0 tackles for loss yardage, and one quarterback hurry and one fumble recovery. Wright's fumble recovery came with 1:19 remaining in regulation. The ball was recovered on the Mines' 49-yard line, with the Mavs trailing by eight points. He leads the team with 69 tackles, 10 sacks for 53 yards and 19.5 tackles for loss yardage (53). He has a team high 14 quarterback hurries, two forced fumbles, two pass breakups and one fumble recovery (Mines).

Team Notes: CMU recorded a team high in completions (27) and attempts (47) at home against Colorado Mines, both of which are also individual highs for Steven Romero. Caley Pavy's 42-yard field goal was a season long. Romero to Nathan Neville 86-yard touchdown pass is a season long pass and reception, respectively. Colorado Mines' quarterback Clay Garcia's 396 passing yards is an opponent high. The 189 yards receiving by Diamond Gillis is also an opponent high. CMU dropped its fourth game at home (0-4). Colorado Mines wins the Nyikos Cup for the second consecutive year. The 'Nyikos Cup' was established last year by the President of each institution. Dr. Mike Nyikos was a former vice president of Institutional Advancement for Colorado Mesa University (Mesa State) and served as president of the Mines Board of Trustees. CMU will travel to CSU-Pueblo next Saturday.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (5-2, 3-2 RMAC)

Team Notes: Taylor Accardi punted five times for 258 total yards averaging 51.6 yards per punt. Accardi had a long punt of 61 yards dropping two punts inside the 20 and two for touchbacks. Dan Palmer rushed for 94 yards on 19 carries and two touchdowns. He has now rushed for 731 yards with 12 rushing touchdowns. David Pawelek caught six passes for 84 yards. Clay Garcia was 26-of-42 for 396 yards and one touchdown. Tevin Champagne rushed for a touchdown in the win. Jarrad McKay recorded eight tackles (six solo) and a sack. Jake Utley recorded a sack in the win. Bunmi Adetutu had three tackles for a loss. Justin Neal had an interception.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-3, 1-1 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State lost 63-13 at home to Boise State on Saturday. They will play at Texas-El Paso this Saturday at 6 p.m.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY-PUEBLO (7-0, 5-0 RMAC)

Stephan Dickens (Sophomore, Cornerback, 5-8, 160, Aurora, Colo./Cherokee Trail HS)

Dickens was the top defensive back for the ThunderWolves that helped slow down the second-ranked total yardage gainer in the nation. He had two interceptions in the fourth quarter, including the game icing 44-yard interception return for a touchdown that gave the Pack its final 27-14 lead over Nebraska-Kearney. Dickens also contributed seven tackles (four solo).

Team Notes: The ThunderWolves earned a win over a top-five team for the first time in school history with its win over fourth-ranked Nebraska-Kearney. It was CSU-Pueblo's first ever win over the Lopers after getting outscored in three previous meetings 123-46. CSU-Pueblo handed the Lopers its first home loss since Kearney's 2010 season-opener vs. Wayne State (NE). The ThunderWolves also became the first team to beat UNK by double digits at home since Wayne State in the 2008 season opener. CSU-Pueblo ran its Division II-best winning streak to 11 games (including last season). The ThunderWolves are now 3-2 against nationally-ranked teams since resurrecting its program in 2008.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (2-5, 1-4 RMAC)

Tim Jenkins (Junior, Quarterback, 6-3, 220, Highlands Ranch, Colo./ThundeRidge HS)

Jenkins completed 18 of 30 passes for 245 yards (no interceptions) and three touchdowns in the Skyhawks road win at Western State Saturday afternoon. He also rushed the ball six times for 23 yards. The Skyhawks will play their last regular season road trip this weekend at Western State and at CSU-Pueblo.

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (3-3, 0-3 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force has now scored in 226 consecutive games, dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl (13-0 loss to Mississippi). AFA's streak is the fourth longest active streak in the country and the 13th longest in the history of the NCAA. Air Force has now scored a rushing touchdown in 27 straight games, dating back to Navy in 2009. With his two touchdown passes on Thursday, Tim Jefferson moves into third place on the career touchdown pass list. Jefferson now has 28 career touchdown passes, moving past Dave Ziebart who had 27 (1976-79). With his two touchdown receptions, Jonathan Warzeka tied his career high set in 2010 vs. Army. Warzeka now has accounted for 18 career touchdowns, seven rushing, seven receiving, two kickoff returns and two passing. Devin Durdin's reception in the second quarter was the first catch of his career. David Baska's four-yard touchdown run in the second quarter is the first touchdown of his career. Asher Clark became just the third player in Air Force history to rush for 3,000 career yards. He stands in third place on the career rushing list with 3,040 career rushing yards. Parker Herrington has made two field goals in a game three times this season (San Diego State, Navy and Tennessee State). Tim Jefferson's 22 completions, 36 attempts and 224 passing yards are all career highs. His previous highs were 13 completions and 30 attempts vs. SDSU in 2010. His previous high for yards was 201 vs. Utah in 2010. Mikel Hunter's three catches are a career high. Jonathan Warzeka's seven catches are a career high. Asher Clark's four catches are a career high. Tight end Daniel Pickett had the first reception of his career, a 20-yard catch in the fourth quarter. Josh Hall's eight tackles are a career high. Jamil Cooks' blocked field goal in the fourth quarter is the fourth block by a Falcon this season and the 15th block in five seasons under coach Troy Calhoun. The block is the fourth career block for Cooks. He had three last season with a field goal and punt vs. Navy and a PAT vs. CSU.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-6, 0-3 Pac 12)

Team Notes: Washington now leads the series 6-5-1 (3-3-1 in Seattle; the teams have traded three straight wins and UW has pulled ahead for the first time since 1985). CU wound up selling 1,750 tickets to the game and counting the player comps, moved 2,000 overall (this time a year ago, and with a 3-1 team off a 29-27 win over Georgia, CU moved under 300 for a game at Missouri). Colorado won the coin toss for the sixth time in seven games (deferring all six times; lost the toss only at Ohio State). The Buffs scored on their first possession for the first time in 2011 (last doing so with a field goal versus Iowa State last November, nine games ago). The opponent has scored on the third of seven opening possessions including today. CU has scored on four of seven second half starting drives (all touchdowns). Washington's 209 yards in the first quarter was an opponent season-high for any quarter. UW's 38 points in the first half were the most in a half against CU since last Nov. 6, when KU scored 45 in the second half in a 52-45 win; it was the most points against CU in the first half since the 2005 Big 12 Championship game when Texas led 42-3. This was the highest scoring game in the series (76 points), eclipsing the 1989 game here (a 45-28 CU win; UW's 52 points were the most by either team, topping the Husky total in a 46-0 win here in 1915). Of the 63 healthy players on the trip, 53 saw action. Injuries taking their toll is showing up on defense: Washington had 562 yards, Stanford 553 last week; the last time CU surrendered 500-plus yards in back-to-back games was in 1983 (three straight: 609 by Nebraska, 524 by Oklahoma State, 531 by Kansas). Colorado ran 65 plays in the game, the sixth time in seven the Buffs have had 66 or fewer (exception: 82 vs. Cal). CU is averaging just 63.6 offensive plays per game for the season. Colorado has now lost 21 straight road games (22 straight out-of-state including one neutral site—the '07 Independence Bowl).

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-6, 0-4 BSC)

Patrick Walker (Senior, Wide Receiver, 5-8, 181, Long Beach, Calif. (Long Beach Poly))

Walker's 14 receptions are a Northern Colorado single-game record at Division I and second all-time. He also had six kickoff returns for 99 yards giving him 265 all-purpose yards in the game, a new school single-game record at Division I (eighth all-time).

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (1-6, 1-4 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State fell 27-10 last Saturday against Fort Lewis in the annual Hall of Fame contest. The Mountaineers held an advantage in passing yards for the second game this season in the best total offense performance of the year. Germaine Daniels recorded 17 rushes before leaving the game early in the third quarter due to injury. He improved his career total to 459 and stands three carries short of Damon Lockhart (1986-88) and Dave Howell (1979-82) for fifth in program records. He is leading the RMAC in rushing attempts per game and is seventh in rushing yards per game. L.A. McGee and Curtis Prock were the top targets for quarterback Jamie Jensen with seven receptions each, with McGee leading the two with 110 yards. He became the first 100-yard receiver of the season. Prock made his fourth touchdown reception of the season in the second quarter to move to fourth in the conference statistics. He needs two more to tie for seventh in program season records. Jaden Terry continues to lead Western State in tackles after recording six tackles last Saturday, with 1.5 for loss, and ranks fourth in the conference with 8.4 per game. He has the third-best tackle performance in Division II this season with 20 from the Chadron State game Sept. 17. Adam Turner led the team with three tackles for loss last Saturday as the team posted a season-high 10 for loss. The Mountaineers travel this weekend to face Colorado Mines at 12 p.m. at Campbell Field. Western State leads the all-time series 51-33-2 in the second-longest rivalry in the state of Colorado behind the Western State-Adams State series.
