Means recorded a season-high-tying 10 tackles, including five unassisted in a home win against New

Mexico. He had a sack for 10 yards and 1.5 tackles for loss for 12 yards. Means recorded his second interception of the season and returned it a career-best 65 yards for his first-career touchdown. His touchdown gave Air Force a 14-10 lead, which was their first lead of the game. Means also had a pass breakup. He recorded a tackle for loss on fourth-and-four on the Air Force 12-yard line in the final minutes of the game and the score 28-23 Air Force. His 10-tackle game was his second this season.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (5-3, 3-3 RMAC)

Justin Juda (Sophomore, Quarterback, 5-11, 185, Lancaster, N.Y./Lancaster HS)

Juda, a reserve quarterback, matched an Adams State Division II-era (1992-Present) record by scoring five rushing touchdowns en-route to a 49-28 win at Western New Mexico. His five touchdowns matched the era record set by Bucky Logan in 1996 and was just one away from the all-time school and RMAC (tie) record of 6 rushing touchdowns in a game set by Ray Overstret in 1975 and then matched by New Mexico Highlands' Thelbert Winters in 1992. Juda, who came in mostly in red-zone situations, ran 14 times for 65 yards overall and had a long rush of 17 yards. His five touchdowns scored were the most of any RMAC player (rushing & receiving combined) this season and quickly moved him into a tie for third in the RMAC for rushing touchdowns this season (6). He now has twice as many touchdowns as any other Grizzly this season and has 36 points (30 of which were scored on Saturday), second on the team only to Pre-season All-RMAC kicker David Van Voris.

Team Notes: After being held without an offensive touchdown in the week prior, the Grizzly offense scored seven in Saturday's win at Western New Mexico. The Grizzlies have now won five straight games over the Mustangs and have scored 93 points in the last two alone. Marty Heaton, whose win against the Mustangs in 2008 was his first of 26 total career victories, is now 5-0 against WNMU. The Grizzlies racked up 340 net rushing yards and averaged 7.4 per attempt. Both totals were season-highs. The 340 rushing yards were the most for a Grizzly squad since Nov. 4, 2006, when ASU rushed for 358 against Oklahoma Panhandle State. The Grizzlies also rushed for six scores as a team, the most for an ASU team since 1997. The Grizzlies also scored touchdowns on six trips into the red zone. They had scored just two touchdowns in the previous 13 trips into the red-zone over four games prior to Saturday. Senior quarterback Trevor Eggleston (Tucson, Ariz.) made his second start of the season on Saturday and had a career-long 84-yard run setting up ASU's first score. That effort helped him record his first career 100-yard day as he ran 13 times for 150 net yards, an average of 11.5 per attempt. Eggleston also completed 16 of 26 passes for 163 yards and caught a 13-yard touchdown pass from JB Hall (Boulder, Colo.). He has now completed 621 passes in his career, just two shy of ASU's all-time record of 623, held by ASU Hall of Famer Bobby Saiz. The Grizzlies can clinch their second straight winning season as soon as Saturday when they host Fort Lewis in the annual Musket Game. Adams State has held it in all but five years since 1987 and had two 8-year winning streaks (1987-94 and 1998-2005) in that stretch. The Grizzlies are now 4-1 in road games this season and are 9-3 in their last 12 contests away from home dating back to 2010.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (3-5, 3-3 RMAC)

Team Notes: Colorado Mesa's two game win streak was snapped Saturday with a 34-7 loss at Colorado Mines. CMU's seven points at Mines is the second lowest point total. CMU was held to 35 total rushing yards. Jake Edmiston and Trent deBraga led all players with 11 tackles each. CMU recorded three sacks, tying their season high for sacks in a game. Jake Cimolino leads the team rushing with 1057 yards on 180 attempts for a 5.9 per carry average. Three Mav receivers are tied for a team high 20 receptions; Alex Zemezozak, DJ Hubbard and Cimolino. Jordan Price's two interceptions in the game is an individual season high. CMU will host No. 1 ranked CSU-Pueblo on Saturday.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (5-3, 3-3 RMAC)

Tyler Denson (Junior, Linebacker, 6-1, 225, New Braunfels, Texas)

Denson led the Oredigger defensive unit in the squad's 34-7 win over Colorado Mesa on Saturday with 10 tackles (four solo). He added one interception, a sack for a loss of nine yards and 3.5 tackles for loss in helping the Orediggers hold the RMAC's second-ranked rushing offense to 35 rushing yards on 34 carries, which was 89 yards under the team's lowest rushing output prior to Saturday. The squad forced six turnovers and held CMU's Jake Cimolino, the RMAC's leading rusher in terms of yards, yards per carry and touchdowns entering Saturday, to 24 yards on 14 carries. He is now seventh in the RMAC in tackles (76) and tackles for loss (9.0) while also sitting fifth in solo stops (34).

Team Notes: Mines claimed the Nyikos Cup for the third straight season with a 34-7 win over Colorado Mesa on Saturday in Golden, Colo. The Orediggers held the RMAC's second-ranked rushing offense to 35 yards on 34 carries, including 24 yards on 14 carries by RMAC-leading rusher Jake Cimolino. The defense forced six turnovers on the afternoon including four fumble recoveries and a pair of interceptions. Billy Sprague followed leading tackler Tyler Denson with seven tackles, while Chad McGraw and Jarrad McKay added six stops apiece. McGraw added 2 tackles for loss, and he padded a team lead by forcing two fumbles, bringing his total to seven. In all, nine different players recorded at least 0.5 tackle for loss. Sophomore Matt Brown finished 32-of-49 for 304 yards and a touchdown through the air with a pair of interceptions. Brown eclipsed the 3,000-yard passing plateau for the season and upped his number of total touchdowns on the season to 29. David Pawelek led the receiving corps with nine grabs for 107 yards, including a long of 44. Jimmy Ellis and Jerrod Doucet each added six receptions for a combined 100 yards, while Doucet added a one-yard touchdown in the first quarter. Zack Newnam carried nine times for 33 yards and put Mines up 17-0 with a three-yard touchdown run in the second quarter and Brown added 26 yards on the ground for 330 yards of total offense. Avery Llewellyn finished 2-for-2 on field goal attempts and 4-for-4 on PAT's while booting three of his seven kickoffs into the end zone for a touchback. Taylor Accardi boosted his NCAA-leading punting average with an average of 55.0 yards on four punts on Saturday, including a long of 59. The Orediggers will face Western State on Saturday in Gunnison.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (1-6, 0-3 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State did not play last week. The Rams return to the field this Saturday to host Hawaii.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY - PUEBLO (8-0, 6-0 RMAC)

Ross Dausin (Senior, Quarterback, 6-5, 230, San Antonio, Texas/Warren HS)

Dausin set numerous school records in the No. 1 ThunderWolves' 45-13 win over Black Hills State. He set a school mark in passing yardage with 390, breaking the previous best that he set earlier this season against Northwestern Oklahoma State. He also set the school record for most completions in a game with 26, going 26-for-32 (81.2%) in just three quarters of action. Dausin led a passing attack that eclipsed a school record 400 yards. His 398 yards of total offense in the game was also a new school record. Dausin entered the game leading the RMAC in passer rating and ranked 5th in the nation.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-7, 0-6 RMAC)

Phil Odell (Senior, Linebacker, 6-1, 215, Show Low, Ariz.)

O'dells first quarter sack against Western State resulted in a fumble recovery that led to an FLC field goal. His 10 tackles against the Mountaineers moved him into third place for career tackles at FLC (322), ahead of Louis Salazar (314, 1994-97).

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (4-3, 3-1 MWC)

Alex Means (Senior, Outside Linebacker, 6-5, 240, Mankato, Minn./Mankato East)

National Football Foundation - Colorado Chapter Player of the Week

Team Notes: Air Force improves to 4-3 overall and 3-1 in Mountain West play. The Falcons have won back-to-back games for the first time this season. Air Force also improves to 3-1 in Falcon Stadium with the win. The Falcons improve to 20-10 all-time vs. New Mexico, including a 16-8 mark in conference games. The Falcons are now 11-3 at home vs. the Lobos and have won six straight in Falcon Stadium dating back to 2000. Air Force has won five straight and eight of the last nine overall in the series. Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun improves to 45-27 in his career, including a 27-16 mark in conference games. Calhoun is now 26-9 in his career at Falcon Stadium and has guided the program to three or more wins at home in each of his six seasons. The coach improved to 5-1 in his career vs. New Mexico. Air Force improves to 1-0 this season and 23-10 under head coach Troy Calhoun during the second half of the season (last six games). Prior to Calhoun's arrival in 2007, Air Force was 12-24 over the last six games of the season from 2001-06. Air Force is playing its first game this season without a first-time starter. The Falcons have had 20 players make the first start of their careers in a game this season, including at least one in each of the first six games, which ranks second nationally. Only Hawai'i with 24 has had more. Air Force extended its school record consecutive games scoring streak to 240 which is the fourth longest active streak in the nation. The streak is the 11th longest in NCAA history. Air Force was last shutout in the 1992 Liberty Bowl vs. Mississippi, 13-0. Air Force extended its streak of consecutive games with at least one rushing touchdown to 41 straight games dating back to Navy Oct. 3, 2009. Alex Means returned an interception for a touchdown to mark the first non-offensive touchdown by Air Force this season. The non-offensive score is the first since Jordan Waiwaiolo scored on a 52-yard fumble return vs. Army in 2010.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-6, 1-3 PAC12)

Team Notes: USC now leads the series by a 7-0 count (4-0 in Los Angeles; the seven games is the longest current losing streak CU has against any school (next is five against Missouri and Texas). CU has lost nine in row against ranked teams (last win: 34-30 over Kansas in 2009) and have lost 19 straight road games against ranked opponents (last win coming in the Los Angeles area, a 31-17 over UCLA at the Rose Bowl in 2002). Colorado's modest two Pac-12 road game winning streak came to an end (had won the finale at Utah last year and the opener this year at Washington State). The 83,274 in attendance was the 16th largest a Colorado team has played before (largest in the Mountain or Pacific time zones). The last time CU allowed 50 or more points in back-to-back games was in 1962 (Nov. 3-10: 62-0 loss to Oklahoma in Boulder and a 57-0 loss at Missouri). USC was only the third team to score on its first possession against Colorado this year (Fresno State and Washington State also scored touchdowns); USC also was just the second to score on the second half opening possession (CSU was the other in the season opener). First down was again an issue for the Buff defense: USC ran 16 first down plays in the first half for 203 yards (12.7 per). Quarterback Matt Barkley became the first quarterback to have two games with five or more touchdown passes against Colorado (he also had 6 in the 2012 game). USC's seven passing touchdowns were the most ever against Colorado (it had set the record of six in last year's game). USC turned CU's six turnovers into 29 points. The USC defense held CU to 108 yards on 45 plays in plus territory, and really buckled down in the red zone: in five trips inside-the-20, the Buffs came away with two field goals and ran 14 plays for minus-14 yards. CU last ran 85 plays in 2010 (85 vs. Texas Tech). CU's first field goal drive marked highs in both plays (15) and time (6:52) for any scoring drive, touchdown or field goal, in 2012. CU played 58 of 67 healthy players on the trip. Opponents are 10-of-12 in field goals (102 of 131 since 2006, including 70-of-81 inside 40 yards (USC's came from 37 yards).

2012 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (2-5, 1-3 BSC)

Tromaine Dennis (Junior, Running Back, 5-11, 205, Jersey City, N.J./Butte College/Dickinson HS)

Dennis rushed for 178 yards, breaking the school's Division I record of 167 yards from Andre Harris at Portland state on Nov. 13, 2010. His total is also the fifth-highest total for a Northern Colorado player at Nottingham Field. He is just the sixth player since the Bears joined the Big Sky to rush for more than 100 yards in a game and the first since Quentin Hildreth had 117 at Colorado State on Sept. 10, 2011. Dennis now has seven rushing touchdowns on the year, tied for the second-most since 2006 when the Bears joined the Big Sky with Andre Harris (2009). His seven rushing touchdowns are also two more than the entire 2011 team. Dennis' 189 all-purpose yards (178 rush, 11 receiving) ties for the ninth-highest total in the Bears Division I history.

Team Notes: The 52 points scored by Northern Colorado are the most-ever in a Big Sky Conference game for the Bears. The previous scoring high was 47 at Weber State on Sept. 11, 2010 in quadruple overtime. The first catch of the game for junior Jace Davis was not only the tenth touchdown reception of his career, but also his 100th career catch. Junior RB Tromaine Dennis rushed for 178 yards, breaking the school's Division I record of 167 yards from Andre Harris at Portland state on Nov. 13, 2010. His total is also the fifth-highest total for a Northern Colorado player at Nottingham Field. Dennis is just the sixth player since the Bears joined the Big Sky to rush for more than 100 yards in a game and the first since Quentin Hildreth had 117 at Colorado State on Sept. 10, 2011. Senior TE Doug Steele tied for the longest reception of his career with a 70-yard touchdown in the third quarter. He also had a 70-yard catch against Northern Arizona in 2010. Senior Dominic Gunn caught two receiving touchdowns, bringing his receiving touchdown total to 10, tying Davis and six others for 13th all-time at Northern Colorado. Davis caught four passes in the game, bringing his streak of games with multiple receptions to 21, while Gunn has had at least one catch in each of the last 12 games. Sophomore DB James Davis had the first interception of his career, returning the pick five yards to help set up Dave Eden's 45-yard field goal. So LB Leilon Willingham tipped the ball that Jr. DB Timi Niweigha intercepted and returned 40 yards. It was also Niweigha's first interception in a Northern Colorado jersey and set up the touchdown pass from Jr QB Seth Lobato to So WR Dimitri Stimphil for three yards. Niweigha's 40 yard interception return is the sixth longest against a Big Sky opponent and the longest since VJ Holmes had a 58-yard pick six at Idaho State a year ago. Northern Colorado has now rushed for 696 yards in seven games, passing last year's total of 617 yards. Dennis now has seven rushing touchdowns on the year, tied for the second-most since 2006 when the Bears joined the Big Sky with Andre Harris (2009). Harris owns the single season record with 10 from 2010. Northern Colorado had three touchdown drives that took less than a minute off the clock. The Bears went 45 yards in six plays in 59 seconds at the end of the first half, then opened the second half with a two plays, 75 yard drive that ate just 41 seconds. The final touchdown of the game went six yards in two plays after Niweigha's interception in 36 seconds. Dennis' 189 all-purpose yards (178 rush, 11 receiving) ties for the ninth-highest total in the Bears Division I history. It is also the fourth-most in a game this year by a Bear. Dave Eden made seven PAT's in the game, breaking the Division I record of five, done five times previously. Eden's 45-yard field goal is the fifth-longest in the school's Division I history and the second-longest of the season for him, one yard shy of his 46-yarder at Sacramento State. Lobato became just the ninth quarterback in Northern Colorado history to surpass 4,000 career passing yards. The junior now has 4,223 yards in 21 games played. His 28 touchdown passes are also tied for the ninth-most in school history with George Kaplan (1969-70).

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE UNIVERSITY (1-7, 1-5 RMAC)

Team Notes: Western State earned their first win of the season Saturday afternoon. Limiting mistakes and playing well on both sides of the ball, the Mountaineers (1-7, 1-5 RMAC) defeated the Fort Lewis (0-7, 0-6 RMAC) by a score of 18-6. The Mountaineers next opponent will be Colorado Mines. The Mountaineers will face them at home on Oct. 27 at 1 p.m.
