**BUFFALO GAME DAY**

**"GREEN GAME NOTES"** Instead of running up to 60 pages of notes and statistics, Colorado has gone "green" to conserve paper. All seats in the press box receive the CU "short stack," four pages plus stats; we do have a few sets of full in-depth game notes for those who would like them. Also, due to NCAA regulations and limitations, we no longer print a bound media guide; we do have all that information available in a supplement, but we are not allowed to bind; you'll have to punch holes in it or take to Kinko's to have it wire bound (not our choice, it's actually against NCAA rules to do so). Just ask for either or both at the Colorado SID area of the press box!

**THE QUICK OF IT** The Colorado Buffaloes (2-1, 0-1 Pac-12) return home for the annual Family Weekend activities, hosting the No. 2 (AP/Coaches) Oregon Ducks (4-0, 1-0 Pac-12) in a 4:07 p.m. kickoff this Saturday, October 5, at Folsom Field ... The itself stadium suffered no flood damage from the record rainfall Boulder endured three weeks ago (Sept. 10-13; Boulder received 21 inches or the week), though some buildings in and around it did suffer minor damage from water accumulation ... At halftime today, the Buffs will honor their all-time winningest coach, as in December, **Bill McCartney** will become the seventh Buffalo to be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Over 100 of his former players have gathered today to honor their coach, who compiled a **93-55-5** record in Boulder from 1982 through 1984 (*see pages 5 & 6 for more info*) ... This will be the 18th meeting between the Buffaloes and the Ducks, as Oregon is original Pac-8/10 school that Colorado has played the most; the series started in 1949-50 with a home-and-home (Eugene then Boulder), each defending their home turf ... Colorado is **4-16** all-time versus teams ranked No. 2; its last win over a No. 2 came on Nov. 23, 2001: 62-36 over Nebraska in Boulder ... CU does own a **16-5** record in games played as part of Family Weekend ... Colorado is dressing **74** players for today's game: all 11 of the team's healthy seniors, 22 juniors, 22 sophomores and 19 freshmen (13 true, 6 redshirt); included are nine players who have yet to see the field for a single play in a CU uniform ... A crowd of around 47,000 is expected for today's game.

**LATE WORKERS** We'll provide sandwiches and sides for those working into the early evening to snack on about an hour after the game.

**THE WELCOME** To our guests from Oregon, including athletic director **Rob Mullens** and SID staffers **Dave Williford**, **Andy McNamara**, **Rob Moseley** and **Craig Pintens** (Oregon SID seats: row 1, 18-21). Other notables present tonight seated in or dropping by the **Fred Casotti Press Box** include the **Dave Hirsch**, the Pac-12's vice president of communications; **Tom Woodard**, CU golf alum and member of the Colorado Golf Hall of Fame; and scouts from the Denver Broncos (**Brian Stark**, **Darren Mougey**), Miami Dolphins and Minnesota Vikings.

**IN CASE YOU MISSED IT** Perhaps the football team can take a page from what CU's volleyball team accomplished last night: coach **Liz Kritza's** Buffaloes defeated No. 1 Washington, 3 games to 1 (25-17, 26-24, 15-25, 25-19) at the Coors Events Center. Colorado is now 10-3 on the year, with a 2-1 mark in Pac-12 play.

**IN CASE YOU MISSED IT, NO. 2** The rain and flooding that forced the cancellation of the Sept. 14 Fresno State game had CU searching to find a 12th game; it was announced Monday that CU will host Charleston Southern on Oct. 19. Your media season credential will obviously work for that game, but for parking, please use your passes for that game that are marked GAME 2 (disregard the date and opponent).

**NUMBER CHANGE** Colorado **CB John Walker** will be wearing No. 5 for the remainder of the season, instead of No. 26; he will now be on some special team units with **TB Tony Jones**, who dons No. 26 on offense. **CB Yuri Wright**, who also wears No. 5, is expected to redshirt unless injuries dictate otherwise.

**THE WEATHER** The temperature at kickoff should be around 53 degrees with clear skies and humidity around 25; no chance of precipitation, or so they say, but winds are expected to average around 15 miles per hour. By the end of the game, the temperature is expected to be 43.

- **Last Time Rain at Folsom:** light rain fell in the second half on Oct. 14, 2006 vs. Texas Tech.
- **Last Heavy Rain at Folsom:** fourth quarter on Sept. 14, 1996 vs. Michigan (most/all of game: Sept. 11, 1982 vs. California).
- **Last Snow at Folsom:** throughout the game on Nov. 11, 2000 vs. Iowa State (snow has fallen during a game at Folsom just six times since 1949).
- **Last Significant Winds at Folsom:** first half on Sept. 18, 2008 vs. West Virginia (18-35 mile per hour gusts).
- **Last "Game Affecting" Winds at Folsom:** all game long on Nov. 12, 2011 vs. Arizona (wind gusts of 32 to 62 miles per hour); *first time since 1995.*

**THE LOOKOUT** Here are some things to look for in today's game from the Colorado perspective:

- ☒ **PK Will Oliver** has 134 career points (27th on CU's all-time list/9th kick scorer); he needs 4 points to move into the top 25 overall.
- ☒ **WR Paul Richardson (99-1,556, 16 TD receiving).** He needs one catch to become the 12th player at Colorado to have 100 career receptions; six catches will move him into 10th all-time in receptions (he is 12th: Dusty Sprague, 103, 2004-07; Patrick Williams, 104, 2005-08, are ahead of him). He is eighth in yards, but seventh is some 475 away. He has caught a touchdown pass in three consecutive games (school record is five by Rae Carruth in 1996).
- ☒ **DE Chidera Uzo-Diribe** has 17 career quarterback sacks, 11th all-time at CU; he needs two to tie three others for eighth.
- ☒ **QB Connor Wood** has 887 passing yards; he needs 113 for 1,000 on the year, which would be the third quickest to 1,000 yards in a season at CU.

**LOCKERROOM POLICY...** Colorado's locker room is closed; **Mike MacIntyre** and 3-4 players will speak to the media in the defensive meeting room on the sub-basement level (B-2) of the Dal Ward Athletic Center; additional players will be available in the hallway outside CU's locker room. Associate SID **Curtis Snyder** will coordinate the conference; assistant SID **Andrew Green**, graduate assistant **Josh Casey** and student assistant **Anthony Lepine** will coordinate player interviews (no deadline to submit requests). **David Plati** coordinates notes and the injury report.

**PAC-12 NETWORKS / COMMERCIAL FORMAT**

**2013**

The Pac-12 Networks operate under a basic 3-4-3-4 commercial format for television broadcasts (three each in the first and third quarters and four in the second and fourth quarters). The below are all guaranteed and are the only breaks; here are the actual lengths of each, including the 10 seconds of both lead-in and get-out time:

P12N may take floater breaks (4 x :30) at its own risk without the game being stopped by the TV liaison. As always, the intent is to not call a media timeout that will interrupt the flow of the game, e.g., each team having one possession at the start of each half if the team that gets the ball first commits a turnover. In those rare instances where there are not three natural breaks in a quarter, timeouts not taken will be made up later in the game (at an appropriate time). All team timeouts not utilized as part of the media commercial format will be 35-seconds in length; the 25-second clock will start at the end of these 35 seconds, so timeouts taken by the media are at their own risk.

**INSTANT REPLAYS:** TV has the option of going to a commercial break (2:30) in any quarter when there is a booth review; it cannot ask the redhat (TV liaison) for a break if it has already used all four breaks in a quarter, so throwing it to a commercial by either TV or radio is at their own risk.

**Break between 1st & 2nd Quarters:** 205 seconds (3:25).

**Break between 3rd & 4th Quarters:** 190 seconds (3:10).

**Overtime:** If there is overtime, television will not break away and will remain live through the coin toss for the overtime period. Following the toss, there will be a 180-second break (3:00) taken prior to the start of the first overtime period; there will be an 80-second break (1:20) after each overtime period. If a team takes its one allotted timeout during an overtime period, the maximum length is 90 seconds (1:30) and will NOT be extended for television (it's a 60-second timeout, official waits 5 seconds, then declares the ball ready for play and starts the 25-second clock. Remember, coaches have the option of making it a 30-second timeout, and that the team that called the timeout may request that play be resumed at any time, and, if the opponent is prepared, the ball will be declared ready for play (thus there is no assurance how long these breaks could be).

**REMINDER-NCAA RULE:** The play clock will start upon return from the commercial break at the redhat signal; it will be 25 seconds in length, NOT the 40 between plays. Team Timeouts not utilized as media timeouts will be 35-second breaks (the 25-second play clock starts at end of 35 seconds).

**PAC-12 NETWORK GAME REPLAYS** The CU-Central Arkansas game will be replayed in its entirety at 1:30 a.m. MDT Sunday (Sept. 8); it will also be featured as a part of the Pac-12 Network's acclaimed "Football in 60" series on Monday at 7 p.m. MDT (Pac-12 National); both will air several more times on Pac-12 Mountain.

**WIRELESS & ETHERNET INFO** The Fred Casotti Press Box has its own wireless network (or SSID) to help battle problems from electronic use in the stands. Media should select the wireless network **PBNET**, read the agreement and regulations (yeah, we know) and press "I agree." Additionally, there are several Ethernet connections along the first row, with a connection box complete with cords every three or four seats. There is one thing all should be aware of: you will be going through the CU system to access the Internet, so you will need to have the latest virus protection software and all windows updates should be installed to protect both our system and your laptops (otherwise, you may not attain access).

Should **PBNET** be down or not functioning properly, **UCB WIRELESS** is our backup service. Instructions are provided below and we also have ITS personnel on hand; the access codes **UCBWIRELESS** for this season (2012-13) are: **Login**—confatha / **Password**—NVgERcFS\_1

**NOTE:** Injuries are reported in conjunction with the HIPAA laws. CU releases player name, body part (but no right or left ID's), the general nature and playing status when it comes to reporting injuries. Status is listed as either OUT, DOUBTFUL, QUESTIONABLE, DAY-TO-DAY, PROBABLE or DEFINITE. Injuries will be updated in-game, postgame and the Monday after the game.

### IN COLORADO BUFFALO HISTORY: OCTOBER 5

Colorado is **9-1** all-time on **October 5**, having last played in 2002 on the date (on which, 51 years ago in 1962 saw the release of the first James Bond movie, *Dr. No*; 50 years ago, Don Drysdale threw a 3-hit shutout to lead the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 1-0 win and a 3-0 lead in the World Series over the New York Yankees (so yes, the World Series was almost over in 1963 and in 2013, the playoffs just began this week). The Buffaloes are 5-1 at home and 3-0 on the road, the only loss a narrow defeat (35-34) to Kansas in 1957; CU has reeled off four straight October 5 wins since that date but has only played once on it since 1974. Here's a brief look: **1907**—The Silver & Gold send the University of Denver back home with a 29-4 thrashing in Boulder. The next three games on the date all preceded World War II and were in Boulder: a 16-3 win over Utah State in **1912**; a 27-13 win over Regis in **1929**; and a 7-6 verdict over Kansas State in **1940**. **1946**—Rex Wagner's end-around from 11 yards out in the second quarter, which capped an 80-yard drive, was the game's only score as Colorado defeated Utah State, 7-0 in Boulder. **1957**—Colorado rallied from 14-0 and 28-14 deficits, and took its only lead at 34-28 with 4:04 remaining on an 11-yard pass from Boyd Dowler to Gary Nady and an ensuing PAT kick from Bob Stransky (CU had missed the kick when it pulled to within 28-27 some eight minutes earlier). But KU fought back for the winning score on a five-play, 64-yard drive, 58 coming on one pass play, with 1:13 left, and Kansas led, 35-34. Why didn't CU go for two to guarantee at least a tie? The two-point conversion wasn't added to the game until 1958. **1963**—Bill Harris scored all three CU touchdowns on runs of 2, 3 and 46 yards as the Buffaloes defeated Kansas State in Manhattan, 21-7, giving first-year head coach Eddie Crowder his first win at the reins of the program. Harris rushed for 103 yards on the day and Larry Portis added 101, as CU outgained KSU, 441-199. **1968**—Colorado built a 21-0 lead on two Ward Walsh 1-yard runs and a Bobby Anderson 7-yard scamper and then held on in the rain to defeat Iowa State in Ames, 28-18. Iowa State's first score was on an 85-yard kickoff return by Sammy Davis, who was a Cyclone sophomore and not the great entertainer. Anderson rushed for 86 yards and passed for 161 and a touchdown, which was CU's last score of the game, a 15-yard pass to Mike Pruett. **1974**—Everyone knew it at the time, but to this day, this remains the last time CU and Air Force would meet on the gridiron; the Buffs came away with a 28-27 win in Colorado Springs, taking a 12-4 lead in the series which began in 1958 (the two played every year except 1969). CU took a 21-3 first quarter leads on three long TD runs from David Williams (44 and 23 yards) and Billy Waddy (67); Air Force's points came on a then-record 60-yard field goal by Dave Lawson. Waddy's second score from 11 yards out made it 28-10 to open the third quarter, and then the Buffs held off a fierce Falcon rally; Lawson barely missed a 50-yard field goal to win it at the final gun. Waddy rushed for 171 yards and Williams 79. **2002**—Robert Hodge had the sixth-best day by a quarterback in school history, leading Colorado to a 35-31 win over No. 13 Kansas State in a game that featured five scoring plays of 71 yards or longer. Three of those were by Buffaloes, as Hodge connected with WR Jeremy Bloom on a school-record 94-yard pass play and with TB Brian Calhoun on a 71-yard TD throw; TB Chris Brown scored on an 85-yard scamper and rushed for 167 yards in all. KSU's Darren Sproles scored on an 80-yard run, but with the Wildcats rallying from a 35-14 deficit and knocking on the door to tie the game with a 4th-and-goal from the CU 2 midway in the fourth quarter, Sproles was crushed by CB Donald Strickland to end any thoughts of a KSU comeback.

**OCTOBER 5 COLORADO MVP:** QB Robert Hodge. In the 35-31 win over Kansas State in 2002, he completed 13-of-20 passes for 289 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions—a quarterback rating of 235.9—at the time and remains the sixth-best single game rating in CU history.

## —4 Buffalo Game Day 4—

### HEAD COACH MIKE MACINTYRE

**Mike MacIntyre** is in his first season as head coach of the University of Colorado football program, his second as a head coach on any level of football. He has a **2-1** record at Colorado and is **18-22** as a head coach in NCAA Division I (FBS). The 25th full-time head coach in CU history (27th overall) brought an impressive pedigree with him to Boulder, resuscitating a San Jose State Spartan team from a 1-12 record in 2010 to one that finished 11-2 in 2012 and was nationally ranked. A veteran coach of 22 seasons, MacIntyre arrived at San Jose State after two years as the defensive coordinator at Duke University, where he was reunited with head coach **David Cutcliffe** from earlier in his coaching days. Those Blue Devil defenses were among Duke's best statistically over a 20-year span, and in 2009, Duke's five wins were the most in a season by the Blue Devils since 1994. The American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) named him its 2009 FBS Assistant Coach of the Year. Another one of his mentors was the legendary and now Pro Football Hall of Fame coach **Bill Parcells**, and of course, his father, **George MacIntyre**, coached at Vanderbilt (the 1982 national coach of the year).

- ◆ MacIntyre, 48, has coached in a total of **296** football games in his career (**40** as a head coach): **137** in NCAA Division I (and another **23** as a grad assistant at Georgia); **82** as a full-time assistant coach in the National Football League; **54** in NCAA Division I-AA (at the time).
- ◆ MacIntyre is an '89 graduate of Georgia Tech and is the first Atlantic Coast Conference alum to take over the reins of the CU football program.

**MCCARTNEY TO BECOME SEVENTH BUFFALO TO BE ENshrINED IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S HALL OF FAME**



**Bill McCartney** first set foot on the University of Colorado campus in Boulder in June 1982; little did he know at the time that just over a dozen years later he would retire as the winningest coach in CU football history.

And now the turnaround “Mac” orchestrated in Boulder with a program that won just 14 games over a six-year span to one that claimed three Big 8 Conference titles and the 1990 consensus national championship is being rewarded on college football’s biggest stage.

McCartney has been selected by the National Football Foundation for induction into the

College Football Hall of Fame this December 10 in New York City. He will join 12 players and two coaches in the Class of 2013.

He will become the seventh Buffalo enshrined in the Hall, joining **Byron White** (inducted in 1952), **Joe Romig** (1984), **Dick Anderson** (1993), **Bobby Anderson** (2006), **Alfred Williams** (2010) and **John Wooten** (2012). He is the school’s first coach to be so-honored.

“It’s a surprise and it is very humbling when you look at the men that have been recognized with this honor over the years,” McCartney said. “It’s very gratifying and rewarding. Keep in mind I’ve been out of coaching almost 20 years, so to be remembered after such a long absence was a complete surprise to me.”

McCartney was 93-55-5 in 13 seasons at the reins of the Buffaloes, guiding the program to its first and only national championship in football in 1990, doing so by playing the nation’s toughest schedule, just the second time that feat was ever accomplished. He coached CU in more bowl games, nine, than anyone before or after him, as well as to three consecutive Big 8 titles in 1989-90-91 during a run of 10 consecutive winning seasons in league competition. After a 4-16-1 start in conference games, the Buffs finished 58-29-4 against Big 8 competition, going an impressive 54-13-3 over his last 10 seasons.

In the six-year span from 1989-94, Mac’s last six seasons, Colorado was 58-11-4, the fifth-best record in the nation behind Miami, Fla. (63-9), Florida State (64-9-1), Nebraska (61-11-1) and Alabama (62-12-1). CU’s 36-3-3 record in the conference games in the same period was the nation’s best. CU finished in the nation’s top 20 each of those six years, including a No. 3 ranking his final season.

All 93 wins came against Division I-A/FBS competition, with just nine against so-called non-BCS schools (though five of those versus in-state rival Colorado State). He coached the most games ever (153) at Colorado, with his 13 seasons are second to only the legendary Fred Folsom (15) in the number of seasons working on the “hilltop.”

“This is one of our strongest classes of Hall of Famers,” said **Steve Hatchell**, the president and CEO of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame. “Mac had tremendous support and received a strong vote from the Honors Court. We’re very proud to have someone like Bill McCartney make it into the Hall, and he will be part of the first class to be enshrined in the new Hall of Fame in Atlanta in the summer of 2014.”

Mac was quick to credit two specific groups for his election to the Hall.

“It all started with my first recruiting class, that winter of ‘83,” he recalled. “I asked all the in-state players not to make a decision until they visited CU, and we wanted them to come in the last weekend before signing day. They gave their word and most of them held to it. They stuck together, and they helped recruit our great class in ‘87 that made up the core of the national championship team.

“That’s how I am in the Hall of Fame,” he said boldly. “This means something to the state of Colorado, it’s part of our history. What led us to the national championship is that seven years earlier, the in-state kids stayed home.”

He also had great assistant coaches through the years, coaches he only hired because they could recruit; he would pass on coaches they were great with X’s and O’s if they couldn’t recruit.

And those who worked under him formed a pool that eventually would produce 13 future collegiate head coaches: **Gary Barnett, Jim Caldwell, Ron Dickerson, Jon Embree, Gerry DiNardo, Karl Dorrell, Steve Logan, Les Miles, Rick Neuheisel, Bob Simmons, Lou Tepper, Ron Vanderlinden** and **John Wristen**.

McCartney, 73, had coaching in his blood almost from the get-go.

“When I was 7 years old, I knew I was going to be a coach,” he said. “My friends, other kids at that age were going to president, businessmen, attorneys, firemen. Ever since I was a little kid, I imitated my coaches, critiqued them, always followed and studied them. I was a student of the great coaches. I was a disciple of Bobby Knight’s when I was (high school) basketball coach.”

McCartney attended the University of Missouri on a football scholarship and lettered three times as a center-linebacker for the Tigers. He played in two Orange Bowl games and was named second-team All-Big 8 as a senior.

He graduated from Missouri in 1962 with a degree in education and immediately turned his attention to coaching. His first job was as an assistant at Joplin (Mo.) High in 1963 and 1964. He then returned to Michigan to coach the basketball team at Holy Redeemer High School in Detroit. He coached there from 1964 to 1968.

The next stop for Mac was at Divine Child High in Dearborn, where he was the head basketball coach from 1969 to 1973 and the head football coach from 1971 to 1973. His ‘69 hoops team won the Detroit Catholic League title, and his ‘73 team won the state class B crown. His three Divine Child football teams compiled a 30-5 record, winning the DCL title all three years and the state championship in ‘71 and ‘73.

His feats of winning state title in football and basketball in 1973 made him the first coach ever in Michigan high school history to win both the same season, and it would serve as his entry into the college ranks.

“After we won the state championship in both sports, (the University of Michigan’s) Bo Schembechler and Johnny Orr both offered me an assistant’s job within one week of each other,” McCartney said. “I played college football but wasn’t good enough to play college basketball, so that settled that,” he jested. “My first love really was football, and being a Michigan native (born and raised in Riverview), to become a part of Schembechler’s staff was the opportunity of a lifetime.”

He joined the Michigan coaching staff as a defensive aide in 1974, coaching outside linebackers for the next three seasons. In 1977, he took over the chores as Michigan’s defensive coordinator, a position he held until he departed for CU. One publication had Mac rated as one of the top five defensive coordinators in the nation in 1981, and he was considered one of the finest recruiters in the country.

McCartney gained national recognition at Michigan in 1980 when he devised a scheme to stop Purdue quarterback Mark Herrmann (using six defensive backs to neutralize Herrmann and his receivers). He was named the Big Ten’s “player” of the week for his plan.

He points to Schembechler as the coach he owes the most for his successful coaching career. Mac had started entertaining thoughts about becoming a head coach, so it was a matter of time before someone called.

**MCCARTNEY TO BECOME SEVENTH BUFFALO TO BE ENshrINED IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S HALL OF FAME, CONTINUED**

That call came the first week of June in 1982. The late **Chuck Fairbanks** abruptly resigned on June 1 to become president and head coach of the New Jersey Generals in the fledgling United States Football League. (The late) athletic director **Eddie Crowder** was faced with hiring a new coaching staff with the season opener just 102 days away.

"I went in to talk to Bo, and I told him that if the right opportunity came along, I'd be interested. He said, 'Okay, when the right job comes along, come see me.' The Michigan State job opened shortly after that, and I went in to see him and he said, 'You do not want to go there and I am not considering helping you get there. Get that out of your mind.' And I did. So that was the first one that came along I was interested in and I didn't pursue it.

"When the Colorado job opened, it was the perfect time for me," McCartney recalled. "Because of the timing, there was really no head coach in America who could have applied for the job, because if you didn't get it, you would have been run out of town because you were willing to abandon your team. Chuck Shelton interviewed from Drake, which had just beat CU twice, but I didn't have to fight several head coaches who would have been interested had the job opened at a more opportune time. When I saw that Chuck resigned, I was immediately interested, I went in and saw Bo. At the appropriate time, Bo called Eddie Crowder. He was instrumental in my getting strong consideration.

"It was my good fortune, the timing was such that I was in position to be a candidate because of the success Michigan had had and the fact that I worked for Bo."

"Colorado was one of the premier jobs in the country," he continued. "It was in a prestigious conference, the location, the history, and there was something about raising your family in a college town. All the opportunities you can ask for in a dynamic collegiate environment. Boulder is just the right size, not too big, not too small and has access to a major city in Denver. The populace and all that goes with that, the professional teams, the arts, a major airport providing access to wherever you'd want to go. The aesthetic beauty of Boulder, Colorado is that it has no parallel, and offers what I call the 'maximum experience.'

"You look at its extraordinary beauty, when every day you wake and say, 'All right, let's get up and get it on.' When you look at the academic experience, there's none better. But when you look around at everything, raising your family, tell me there's a safer place than Boulder. We have more winter sunshine than Phoenix, Miami or L.A. You look at the whole experience and not just focus on football and say, 'What do you want out of life?' When you add all those things up, Boulder and CU can't be matched. I've been looking around all these years, and nobody else can match what Colorado can offer—the premier college experience in America. And I say that not trying to recruit anybody—I'm done."

"You look at its extraordinary beauty, when every day you wake and say, 'All right, let's get up and get it on.' When you look at the academic experience, there's none better. But when you look around at everything, raising your family, tell me there's a safer place than Boulder. We have more winter sunshine than Phoenix, Miami or L.A. You look at the whole experience and not just focus on football and say, 'What do you want out of life?' When you add all those things up, Boulder and CU can't be matched. I've been looking around all these years, and nobody else can match what Colorado can offer—the premier college experience in America. And I say that not trying to recruit anybody—I'm done."

On a roll, he continued on: "When I was recruiting, I would say there are other schools that have won more games, others that have better academics, others that might have a better campus. But not all three in a package like the University of Colorado. I personally believed I had the greatest product to sell, and I truly believed what I was saying. I never had a kid say to me even once, 'Coach, you oversold me on Boulder.'"

It wasn't a slam dunk that Crowder was going to hire him, though. In fact, he was the longshot. He wasn't even contacted until six days into the search. He told the story best to CUBuffs.com back in 2007:

*"What happened was that Eddie Crowder called me on a Sunday night (June 6) and asked if would I be interested; I said absolutely. He said 'When can you be here?' And I said the next morning. So I took the first flight out of Detroit and got to Colorado pretty early in the day, but I got here so fast that they weren't ready to interview me. It took him until Tuesday morning to put together an interview panel. That gave me a day here where nothing was happening and I was able to get acquainted. I had been here before as an assistant with Michigan and as a player with Missouri, so I had a little familiarity with the place. Eddie assigned me to (the late associate AD) **Fred Casotti**; when the interview took place Tuesday morning, there were about 15 people representing all kind of factions on campus and the alumni. About 15 minutes before I was going to go before them for the interview, I said to Fred, 'What do you think my chances are?' He said, 'Coach, it's third and long. You'd better make a big play.'*

*"That was the best thing he could have told me, otherwise I might have tiptoed into the interview. But after Fred told me that, I threw caution to the wind, decided to get aggressive and put my best foot forward. The format was for them to ask me questions, or that's what they had in mind. But I stood up, and I said before I take any questions, I want to make a statement. I spoke for about 20 minutes and told them who I was, my background, what I had done at the University of Michigan, my philosophies and values, and what I would bring to the University of Colorado if I was to get the job. I was the only one talking, and after I was done speaking, nobody asked me a question.*

*"I went from there to meet the president, **Arnold Weber**, and he had already gotten a phone call following the first interview. He was energized and anxious to see me, and was warm and welcoming. Later that night, they took me to meet the Board of Regents, as by chance they were having their monthly meeting in Denver. I was waiting with Casotti in the car, waiting for a break in their meeting to be introduced, and I asked Fred again, 'What do you think my chances are?' And Fred said, 'Coach, fourth and short. You just need to make a first down.' So I just needed to move the chains. That Tuesday night, Eddie offered me the job. Really it all happened so fast, we didn't have a lot of time because of the unusual circumstances."*

McCartney was hired as the 20th head coach in CU history on June 9, 1982, taking over a team which had just suffered through three of its worst seasons in an otherwise tradition-rich football program. And the rest, as they say, is history.

"All you have to is recruit, and if you recruit the right kids and get them, you'll find yourself playing in a lot of big games," he concluded. "So it's not about me, it's about the University, what a great place it is, it's about all the good assistants we had, and it's about that first recruiting class that got things going for us."

### SERIES HISTORY—CU vs. OREGON

Colorado and Oregon have met 17 times, with the Ducks winning the last three games to take a **9-8**, its first lead in the series since leading 1-0; the Buffs then won five of the next six. (Oregon caught CU at 12 games but the Buffs won the next two to go up 8-6.) The 17 games are the most involving the Buffs and a previous Pac-10 Conference school (CU has played Utah 58 times). The series is tied in Boulder, 4-4, as Oregon went 24 years between visits to Folsom since the 1987 season opener and 2011; the three meetings between the two schools in that period were all in the postseason ('96 Cotton, '98 Aloha, '02 Fiesta). That Sept. 12, 1987 game was the first career contest for several notable Buffaloes, including current assistant coaches **Eric Bieniemy** and **Kanavis McGhee**; future All-Americans **Alfred Williams** and **Joe Garten** saw their first action that day against the Ducks as well. Overall points in the series were as close as can be, with Oregon owning a slight 323-319 edge, until the last two years, when the Ducks have outscored the Buffs by 115-16 (45-2 and 70-14); those wins by the Ducks extended their edge to 438-335. Oregon owns the high-point game in the series with its 70 it put on the scoreboard in 2012; CU's high of 51 came in the '98 Aloha Bowl. UO has registered the lone shutout (35-0 in 1956). The two schools, based in very similar liberal-minded towns, formed a tremendous bond in 1984 when CU tight end Ed Reinhardt suffered a life-threatening brain injury and would spend a month in a coma in a Eugene hospital before he awoke and was able to return to Colorado; he continues rehab for the injury to this day.

**SERIES DID YOU KNOW?**—Perhaps the biggest play in the series for Colorado was a defensive one. In 1985, Colorado had switched to the wishbone offense and won its opener over Colorado State, 23-10; the Buffs were in search of their first 2-0 start since 1978. Oregon was up next, in Boulder, and that 2-0 goal would be in danger. The Buffs opened up a quick 14-0 lead on "Ed Reinhardt Day," honoring CU's tight end who suffered a brain injury the previous year against in Eugene. However, UO bounced back to go up 17-14, but a Mark Hatcher 22-yard run put CU back on top, 21-17, early in the fourth quarter. The Ducks mounted a final threat that had them in a first-and-goal at the CU 5. The Buffs squelched the first three tries, and on fourth-and-goal with seven ticks remaining, SS Mickey Pruitt sacked QB Chris Miller for a 14-yard loss, preserving the CU win and back-to-back victories to open a season in seven years.

**SERIES SIGNATURE ANNIVERSARY GAME — 15th.** Ben Kelly set the tone for the day by returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown, as the Colorado Buffaloes built a 30-point third quarter lead and then held off the No. 21 Oregon Ducks, 51-43, in the 17th annual Aloha Bowl on Christmas Day, 1998. Kelly raced 93 yards for a score to start a busy day at Aloha Stadium, as 164 points would be tallied in college football's first-ever bowl doubleheader (Air Force beat Washington, 45-25, in the Oahu Bowl later that afternoon). Mike Moschetti set a CU bowl record by throwing four touchdown passes in the game, the first coming late in the first quarter after Jeremy Aldrich's 48-yard field goal had given CU a 10-0 lead. Javon Green caught the five-yard toss and the Buffs were up 17-0. Moschetti, CU's most valuable player in the game, threw scoring passes of 58 yards to Marcus Stiggers and 72 yards to Darrin Chiaverini in the second quarter, as the Buffaloes built a 37-14 halftime edge. Aldrich added a pair of field goals in the quarter, and his three in the game also established a new CU postseason best. Damen Wheeler gave CU its biggest lead of the day at 44-14 after he raced into the backfield and plucked off an Akili Smith pass and ran 52 yards for a touchdown; he actually swiped the ball while it was traveling backwards, so the play was classified an intercepted pitch. Oregon chipped away at the CU advantage and had cut it to 44-28 early in the fourth quarter, but a 57-yard drive ended by a 20-yard TD pass from Moschetti to Daniel Graham worked the lead back up to 51-28. The Ducks wouldn't give up, adding two more scores to pull to within the final score of 51-43, as the CU defense rose to the occasion the one time Oregon had the ball with a chance to tie the game. The Buff defense forced three incompletions and Hannibal Navies added a 13-yard sack to keep the Ducks at bay. Oregon outgained CU, 535-397, but the Buffs averaged more yards per play (6.7-6.6), basically scoring at will, and forced the Ducks into six turnovers that led to 23 Colorado points. The win was Colorado's fifth straight in the bowls, giving the Buffs the nation's longest active streak. It would also be the final game for CU head coach Rick Neuheisel, who resigned two weeks later to take over as head coach at Washington.

### CU-OREGON BY THE NUMBERS

Here's a look at some numbers-related trivia in the Colorado-Oregon series:

- 0** The number of times in the series that one team has gained at least 200 yards both rushing and passing (out of a maximum **32**);
- No. 2** The highest national ranking of either team (Oregon in the '02 Fiesta Bowl and in 2012) when the two have lined up across from each other;
- No. 3** The highest national ranking of Colorado (also in the '02 Fiesta Bowl) when the two have lined up across from each other;
- 6** The number of interceptions Colorado had in the 1967 game (**3** by All-American and future Hall of Fame inductee **Dick Anderson**);
- 7** The number of games in the series decided by one score or less (8 points; CU leads in those, **4-3**);
- 17** The number of games in the series between Colorado and Oregon;
- 19** The number of times in the series that one team did not gain at least 100 yards both rushing and passing (out of a maximum **34**);
- 26** The number of years between games in Eugene (1986, 2012);
- 123 11' W** The longitude of Eugene, Oregon, the furthest west any school can play a Division I-A/FBS game on the mainland;
- 94** The combined number of points by the schools in a the wild 1998 Aloha Bowl (a **51-43** Colorado win, though the Buffs led **44-14** at one point);
- 96** The number of receiving yards by **Darrin Chiaverini** in the 1998 game (Aloha Bowl), the most by a Buffalo in the series;
- 173** The number of rushing yards by **Mark Hatcher** in the 1986 game, the most by a Buffalo in the series and the fourth most in any game by a CU QB;
- 282** The number of passing yards by **Steve Vogel** in the 1984 game, the most by a Buffalo in the series;
- 958** The number of miles between Boulder, Colorado, and Eugene, Oregon;
- 4,915** The difference in elevation (feet) between Boulder (**5,345**) and Eugene (**430**; though some areas are **0**).

### THIS WEEK'S HISTORICAL NOTE / 1993

Twenty years ago, in the first week of October, 1993, Colorado technically fell to 2-3 on the season. You see, the Buffs were coming off real-life losses at Stanford (41-37) and to Miami, Fla. (35-29) and had the next Saturday off. Or did they? On the Monday after the alleged open date, those watching the ABC sitcom, *Coach*, found out that Craig T. Nelson's Minnesota State Screaming Eagles defeated what assistant coach **Michael Dybinski** ("Dauber", played by actor **Bill Fagerbakke**) called, "the bigger, stronger and faster" Colorado Buffaloes, 58-54. The show opened with the cast closing their press conference smoking victory cigars.

### COLORADO VS. THE NUMBER 2'S

CU is **2-16** in 18 games against No. 2 teams in the *Associated Press* poll, **4-16** when including two No. 2 teams that differed from the AP runner-up in the defunct UPI Coaches poll; the most games have come against Oklahoma (1-5) and Nebraska (3-3). Most of the games with Nebraska were thrillers, as CU won 27-21 in 1989 and 27-12 in 1990 (when NU was No. 2 in the coaches poll but No. 3 in the AP rankings) and 62-36 in 2001 (when the Huskers were the BCS No. 1-ranked team), and losing 38-10 in 1979, 44-21 in 1995 and 27-24 in 1997. CU's other win over a No. 2 came in 1972, a 20-14 win over Oklahoma in Boulder (where CU is 2-4 against No. 2's).
