PATRICK WALKER

NORTHERN COLORADO

SENIOR, WIDE RECEIVER, 5-8, 181,

LONG BEACH, COLO./LONG BEACH POLY

Walker broke the Northern Colorado and Big Sky Conference single-game receiving yards record with 315 on Saturday against North Dakota (L, 27-25). He breaks the NC record of 265 yards held by Barry West against Colorado School of Mines in 1970. He also breaks the Big Sky record of 299 yards by Treamell Taylor from Nevada in 1989. His 315 yards are also the most in a FCS game this season and just 61 yards shy of the all-time mark of 376 by Kassim Osgood, Cal Poly vs Northern Iowa on Nov. 4, 2000. Of Walker's 10 receptions, four were for 36 yards or longer, including two for 80 or more yards. His 88-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter is tied for the second-longest reception in school history and his 80-yard touchdown catch also ties for sixth on the list.

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (5-4, 3-4 RMAC)

Scott Kellogg (Junior, Wide Receiver/Kick Returner, 5-9, 175, Littleton, Colo./Chatfield HS)

Kellogg's 79-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter of Saturday's game was the Grizzlies' longest play of the season from scrimmage. He also added 23 punt return and 148 kick return yards, including a return of 70 yards, to accumulate 286 all-purpose yards in the game, the third most by a player in the RMAC this season and a new ASC Division II-era record. Kellogg returned five kickoffs for 148 yards, including a long of 70 yards, the second longest for ASC this season. He also returned three punts for 23 yards and caught four passes for 115 yards and a 79-yard touchdown. His 286 all-purpose yards are the third most by a player in the RMAC this season and is a new ASC Division II-era record (1992-present).

Team Notes: The Grizzlies played their third ranked team in four home games this season, falling to No. 25 Colorado Mines 27-16 at Rex Stadium. The loss ended a three-game winning streak for the Grizzlies, and gave them a 1-3 record at home this season. The Grizzlies outgained the Orediggers 417-345 in the game, and led early after long touchdown scores from 78 and 41 yards, as well as 50-yard field goal from David Van Voris, the second longest of his career just one yard short of his career long of 51 yards which he made against Mines last season. That field goal gave ASC a 16-13 lead at the half, but Mines scored 14 unanswered after the break to claim the victory. The Grizzlies will be back on the road next weekend against Colorado Mesa, who they defeated in a double overtime game last season, 41-34.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (3-6, 2-5 RMAC)

Trent deBraga (Junior, Defensive Back, 6-0, 200, Fallon, Nev./Sioux Falls/Churchill County)

deBraga led the team with 10 tackles, including a game high seven solo tackles. He registered a half tackle for a loss of two yards. The Mavs defense held the Mountaineers to 96 total rushing yards. In the first offensive series of the second half, deBraga rushed for a first down on a fake punt, on fourth-and-10 at the WSC 36. He carried the ball 17-yards to the WSC 19-yard line. CMU scored a touchdown on the drive. He had one kick return for 30 yards and three punt returns for 17 yards. He has tallied double-digit tackles in four games this year, his seven solo tackles against WSC is a season high.

Team Notes: CMU's three victories this season have all come on the road. Their win at WSC snaps a two game losing streak. CMU rushed for 294 yards, the second highest rushing total this season. Their 54 carries is the second highest attempt total. The CMU defense held the Mountaineers to 96 rushing yards, fourth time this season CMU has held an opponent to under 100 yards rushing. The CMU defense tallied a season high 10 pass breakups. The Mavericks have out-rushed their opponents 1685 yards to 1123 while averaging 187.2 yards per game. CMU will close out the regular season home schedule Saturday against Adams State.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (7-2, 5-2 RMAC)

Defense: Alex Vigil (Senior, Linebacker, 6-1, 215, Arvada, Colo./Faith Christian HS)

Vigil led the way for Mines was 16 total tackles, six solo tackles, 10 assisted tackles and 0.5 tackles for a loss in the game. He also had two pass breakups. Vigil and the Oredigger defense held Adams State scoreless in the second half.

Team Notes: Dan Palmer rushed for 86 yards and a touchdown bringing his season total to 16 rushing touchdowns. Palmer has now rushed for at least one touchdown in four straight games and done so in all but one game this season. He has 888 yards on the season and needs just 112 yards in his final two games to reach 1,000 yards. Palmer would become just the third running back at Mines to complete that feat. Clay Garcia was 21-for-36 with 296 yards passing. He threw a 42-yard touchdown to Jerrod Doucet and also had a one-yard rushing touchdown. Diamond Gillis caught eight passes for 84 yards. Doucet finished with four catches for 85 yards. Mines blocked two field goals and Josh Ruff and Bunmi Adedotutu blocked the attempts. The CSM defense also had three picks on the day: one by Justin Neal, another by Ian McFadden and a third by Tyler Denson.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-5, 1-2 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State lost 38-35 at Nevada-Las Vegas. They will return to the field Nov. 12 for a 4 p.m. home game against San Diego State.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY-PUEBLO (9-0, 7-0 RMAC)

J. B. Mathews (Freshman, Running Back, 6-0, 185, Aurora, Colo./Rangeview HS)

Mathews set career highs with 173 rushing yards and three touchdowns. It is the second time during his short collegiate career that he has scored three touchdowns in one game. He carried the ball 19 times, averaging 9.1 yards per carry in a 37-0 shutout win at New Mexico Highlands. He also caught one pass for 11 yards to bring his all-purpose yardage total to 184.

Team Notes: CSU-Pueblo earned its third shutout of the season with its 37-0 win at New Mexico Highlands. It was the Pack's second straight shutout over the Cowboys (CSUP beat NMHU 66-0 in 2010). The ThunderWolves ran its NCAA Division II-best win streak to 13 games with the win, equaling a school record. The ThunderWolves are off to a 9-0 start for the first time in school history. The Pack's defensive shutout helped the team build upon its NCAA Division II-best scoring defense total, now at 10.0 points per game.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (2-7, 1-6 RMAC)

Team Notes: For three quarters, Fort Lewis gave Chadron State all it could handle, trailing 28-21 entering the final stanza, but 17 unanswered points in the fourth gave Chadron State (5-4, 5-2) a 45-21 victory Saturday at Don Beebe Stadium.

2011-2012 NFFCC NEWS & NOTES

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (4-4, 1-3 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force has scored in a school-record 228 consecutive games dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the nation and 13th longest streak in NCAA history. Air Force recorded its first shutout since Oct. 17, 2009 vs. Wyoming (10-0). It was Air Force's first road shutout since 1997 vs. Colorado State (24-0). Air Force has scored a rushing touchdown in 29 consecutive games dating back to Navy on Oct. 3, 2009. Air Force held New Mexico scoreless in the first quarter to make the first time since the season opener vs. South Dakota the Falcons held an opponent scoreless in the opening quarter. The scoreless period is the first since the first overall since the second quarter at Navy Oct. 1. The span covers 15 quarters. Air Force has scored off the last five turnovers by opponents. The Falcons have scored four touchdowns and kicked a field goal for 31 points off turnovers. The streak covers the last two games. Air Force's first-half shutout is its first this season and first since holding Wyoming scoreless in 2009. Air Force finished the game with a +2 turnover margin to mark the first time this season the team has won in turnover margin. Air Force improves to 4-4 overall and 1-3 in the Mountain West. The Falcons snapped a three-game losing streak and picked up their first win since beating Navy, 35-34, in overtime Oct. 1. The victory is the second on the road this season for Air Force (Navy). The Falcons conclude a difficult five-game October with a 2-3 record. Air Force improves to 19-10 overall vs. New Mexico, including a 9-7 mark in Albuquerque. The Falcons have won four straight and seven of the last eight meetings vs. the Lobos. Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun improves to 38-22 overall. The coach is now 22-14 in MW games, 13-12 in road games and 10-7 in conference road games. Air Force improves to 19-9 under head coach Troy Calhoun in the second half of the season (last six games), including a 1-1 mark this season. Air Force is 12-24 over the last six games of the season since 2001 before his arrival. Air Force improves to 1-2 this season and 10-8 overall in conference games in October under Troy Calhoun. Air Force scored first for the fourth time this season and improved to 4-0 in those games.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-8, 0-5 PAC 12)

Tony Clemons (Senior, Wide Receiver, 6-2, 210, New Kensington, Pa./Valley)

In Colorado's 48-14 loss at Arizona State, Clemons matched his career-high with eight receptions, which went for 97 yards (one off his high) and a touchdown. That latter was an acrobatic 21-yard grab that was CU's first offensive points in seven quarters and was such in nature that it was the No. 1 highlight for all the day's games on ESPN's College Football Final program.

Team Notes: Colorado committed a season-high five turnovers in the 48-14 loss to Arizona State (after having just seven in the first eight games this year). Two more players made their first career starts in the game, quarterback Nick Hirschman and defensive back Josh Moten; that's now 21 players making their first career starts for CU this season. With defensive back Justin Gorman and tailback Josh Ford returning kickoffs versus ASU, that brings the number of players to 13 who have done that this year (the most was 14 in 1956). Of the 61 healthy players on the trip, 55 saw game action. Colorado has now lost 22 straight road games (23 straight out-of-state including one neutral site—the '07 Independence Bowl). CU has lost seven straight against ranked teams (last win: 34-30 over Kansas in 2009); the Buffs have lost 18 straight road games against ranked opponents, with the last win a 31-17 over UCLA at the Rose Bowl in 2002. Opponents have now scored touchdowns on their first possession four straight games. CU's conversion on third-and-17 at the end of the first quarter (18 yard pass from Tyler Hansen to Keenan Canty) was the longest conversion made by CU in 2011 (coming in, CU was 1-of-17 on third-and-15 or longer). ASU gained 27 yards on its last possession to finish with 522 for the game, thus CU has now allowed 500-plus yards in four straight games for the first time in its history. CU has also allowed 30 or more points in six straight games, which last happened in 2003.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-9, 0-6 BSC)

Patrick Walker (Senior, Wide Receiver, 5-8, 181, Long Beach, Colo./Long Beach Poly)

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (1-8, 1-6 RMAC)

Jamie Jensen (Sophomore, Quarterback, 6-03, 195, San Martin, Calif./San Francisco City/Gilroy HS)

Jensen passed for 162 yards on 10 completions in the second half last Saturday against Colorado Mesa at home (he did not play the first half). Jensen completed the longest pass of the season for 75 yards to Lukas Adams for a touchdown with 2:31 remaining to pull the Mountaineers within four points at 23-19 before the point-after attempt. He ranks third in the RMAC for passing yards per completion (12.0), sixth in passing yards per game (202.8), seventh in total offense per game (189.8) and eighth in pass efficiency (97.1). Jensen is ranked eighth in Western State season records for passing attempts (301) and 10th in passing yards per game (202.8). He has 10 touchdown passes this season, and needs three more to tie for seventh in program records. He is in the Mountaineer record books already with 51 attempts against New Mexico Highlands Oct. 1 (second) and 46 attempts against Fort Lewis Oct. 15 (tied-eighth). His 26 completions against Fort Lewis Oct. 15 also tied him for seventh in single-game records.

Team Notes: Western State held Colorado Mesa to seven pass completions and more than doubled the Mavericks in passing yards in a 23-20 loss last Saturday at home. It was the third time this season the Mountaineers have finished with an advantage in passing yards. Nick Edwards made his first collegiate start in his final home game and passed for 103 yards in the first half with eight completions. The seven pass completions were the fewest by a Mountaineer opponent since six by Fort Hays State Aug. 25, 2007. Lukas Adams made his second touchdown reception of the season in the fourth quarter on a 75-yard play to bring the Mountaineers within four points of the Mavericks. Curtis Prock led the team with four receptions. He is tied for seventh in program records with six touchdown receptions this season, and one reception away from the best season performance for a Mountaineer since 1998. Prock is also tied for third in the conference in touchdown receptions this season. Germaine Daniels has missed the last two games due to an ankle injury, but is still ranked fourth in the conference with 155 rushing attempts this season. He is sixth in program records with 459 career rushing attempts, and needs three attempts to tie Damon Lockhart (1986-88) and Dave Howell (1979-82) for fifth in records. The Mountaineers, who went two-of-two on fourth-down conversions, lead the RMAC with a 65-percent success rate, and have done so with the third-most fourth down conversion attempts in the conference. Western State also leads the RMAC with an average of 105.7 opponent penalty yards per game. L.A. McGee is one of eight conference receivers this season with multiple 100-yard receiving games. He moved from kick return to punt return last weekend, with four returns against the Mavericks. McGee is still ranked fifth in the RMAC with 18 yards per kickoff return. Western State travels to Colorado State-Pueblo this Saturday for a 2 p.m. contest at the ThunderBowl. The Mountaineers and ThunderWolves are tied 9-9 in the overall series.
