Mathews became the first ThunderWolf to rush and receive for 100-plus yards in the same game since the football program was resurrected in 2008. His 226 all-purpose yards were enough to make him the top freshman all-purpose runner in CSU-Pueblo history. Mathews caught 10 passes for 116 yards and two scores against Colorado Mines, and rushed three times for 110 yards and another touchdown. He is only the second ThunderWolf to score three touchdowns in one game (Jesse Lewis, six times).

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE COLLEGE (3-3, 1-3 RMAC)

Dustin Bolt (Senior, Wide Receiver, 6-2, 215, Alamosa, Colo./Alamosa HS)

Bolt accounted for 21 of the Grizzlies points in Saturday's win over New Mexico Highlands, catching three touchdowns of 6, 24 and 30 yards, while also kicking a field goal in the fourth quarter to trim the Cowboys' lead to eight points (24-16). Bolt also recorded his first two rushes of the season, gaining 24 yards.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies came back from an early 14-0 deficit on Saturday night in Las Vegas, N.M. to claim a 30-24 overtime win against New Mexico Highlands. Senior Dustin Bolt caught three touchdown passes and kicked a field goal, all in regulation to help send the game to overtime. Junior linebacker James Ackel rushed for a two-point conversion following the Grizzlies' final score of regulation to tie the game up, and rushed for the game-winning touchdown on the Grizzlies second offensive play of overtime from nine yards out. The win was the Grizzlies first in RMAC play this season and ended a three-game skid. ASC put up a season-best 453 yards of offense, including a season-best 301 through the air, while the Grizzly defense held the league's second leading offense to just 266 yards of offense, and allowed just 29 yards in the second half (minus-eight in the third quarter). Bolt caught nine passes for an ASC season-best 149 yards through the air. ASC ran 94 offensive plays, gaining 4.8 yards per play and limited the Cowboys to just 3.7 per play. The Grizzlies will return to Rex Stadium next weekend to face Western New Mexico (4-2 overall, 3-1 RMAC). ASC has won the last three games in the series, and topped the Mustangs 69-42 in the last meeting in Alamosa during the 2009 season, a game in which then freshman quarterback Trevor Eggleston threw for six touchdowns during his first game as the Grizzlies' starting quarterback.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (2-4, 1-3 RMAC)

Caleb Pavy (Junior, Kicker, 5-9, 195, Denver, Colo./J.K. Jullen HS)

Pavy kicked a career high five field goals at Fort Lewis and scored 16 of the Mavs' 22 points (one PAT). His 5-for-5 day included field goals of 39, 30, 36, 25, 35. His 39-yarder is the longest this season. On the year Pavy is 9 of 13 and has kicked at least one field goal in five of the six games. He is 17-of-17 on point-after-touchdowns. Pavy's 16 points is a career high in a game. He has tallied 31 kicks for 1918 yards and a 61.9 average per kick.

Team Notes: Colorado Mesa won its first RMAC league game this season and improved to 2-1 on the road. CMU rushed for a season high 356 yards and racked up a season high 512 total offensive yards. The Mavericks had two players rush for over 130 yards; Will Halboth (28 carries for 138 yards, one touchdown) and Jake Cimolino (24 carries for 133 yards). Caleb Pavy kicked a season high five field goals including a season long 39-yarder. CMU set numerous season highs at FLC; rushes (70), yards rushing (356), yards per rush (5.1), total plays (98), and total offense (512). CMU will host Colorado Mines Saturday at Stocker Stadium. The two teams will play for the 'Nyikos Cup' established last year by the President of each institution. Dr. Mike Nyikos was a former vice president of Institutional Advancement for Mesa State and served as president of the Mines Board of Trustees.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (4-2, 2-2 RMAC)

Team Notes: Clay Garcia passed for at least 300 yards for the fourth time this season. He completed a season high 32 passes but did not throw a touchdown pass. Matt Brown caught a game-high 10 passes for 120 yards. David Pawelek finished with 84 yards on nine catches. Dan Palmer rushed for just 48 yards but did score a touchdown. In extremely windy conditions, punter Taylor Accardi averaged 47.4 yards per punt on seven punts. His longest punt was 57 yards and he dropped four punts inside the 20-yard line. Ryan Wood and Henry Kaetzer had 10 tackles a piece in the loss. Kaetzer also recovered a fumble. Tyler Denson recorded nine tackles including one for a five yard loss. Sam Frazier had six tackles and half a sack. Kelly Zimmerman and Tyler Palmer both recorded sacks in the game. Justin Neal also had half a sack.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (3-2, 1-0 MWC)

Team Notes: Colorado State did not compete last week. They will face Boise State at home on Oct. 15.

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY-PUEBLO (6-0, 4-0 RMAC)

J.B. Mathews (Freshman, Running Back, 6-0, 188, Aurora, Colo./Rangeview HS)

Mathews became the first ThunderWolf to rush and receive for 100-plus yards in the same game since the football program was resurrected in 2008. His 226 all-purpose yards were enough to make him the top freshman all-purpose runner in CSU-Pueblo history. Mathews caught 10 passes for 116 yards and two scores against Colorado Mines, and rushed three times for 110 yards and another touchdown. He is only the second ThunderWolf to score three touchdowns in one game (Jesse Lewis, six times).

Team Notes: CSU-Pueblo ran its Division II-best winning streak to ten games (including last season). CSU-Pueblo defeated Colorado Mines for the first time since resurrecting its program in 2008. The ThunderWolves' win was its first ever on national television (Thursday's game was aired on the CBS College Sports Network). The touchdown it gave to Mines marked the first home points surrendered since Oct. 24, 2010 (CSU-Pueblo had posted three consecutive home shutouts, dating back to last season).

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (1-5, 0-4 RMAC)

Frank Atherton (Senior, Putner, 6-3, 170, Kamuela, Hawaii/Hawaii Prep)

Atherton pinned Colorado Mesa inside their own 20 on two occasions. He had a pair of 60-yard punts in the game, was outstanding in directional punting by allowing just three punts returns for 13 yards (Atherton punted 10 times). His best punt of the game went only for four yards, but came after the snap went 20 yards over his head. He grabbed the ball, eluded the CMU defenders, and punted the ball nearly 30 yards while running sideways to avert turning the ball over on downs deep in FLC territory.

2011-2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE ACADEMY (3-2, 0-2 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force has scored in a school-record 225 consecutive games dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl. The streak is the fourth longest active streak in the nation and 13th longest streak in NCAA history. Air Force has scored a rushing touchdown in 26 consecutive games dating back to Navy on Oct. 3, 2009. Tim Jefferson's two-yard TD in the first quarter extended the streak in this game. Air Force's 42 points allowed in the first half is the most in a half by an opponent since BYU scored 42 points in the first half in 2001. Air Force lost for just the fifth time in the Troy Calhoun era (2007-present) with a 100-yard rusher (Asher Clark). Air Force is now 22-5 overall and 1-1 this season under Troy Calhoun, when having a 100-yard rusher. Air Force failed to force a turnover for the first time in 15 games, snapping a 14-game streak dating back to last season. Freshman DL Nick Fitzgerald made the first start of his career. He is the first freshman to start a game for the Falcons this season. Senior QB Tim Jefferson has now scored a rushing touchdown in consecutive games and in three of five this season. Jefferson's second-quarter rushing touchdown is his team-leading fifth of the season. Sophomore WR Ty MacArthur recorded his second straight game with a receiving touchdown with a six-yard catch in the second quarter. Senior WR Jonathan Warzeka's six catches is a new career high breaking the mark of five he set last season against San Diego State. Warzeka extended his consecutive games with a reception streak to seven games. Senior WR Zack Kauth extended his consecutive games with a reception streak to eight games. Senior RB Asher Clark recorded his second 100-yard rushing performance of the season and ninth of his career with his effort vs. Notre Dame. Clark finished the game with ---- yards on ---- carries. Senior DB Jon Davis recorded 12 tackles vs. Notre Dame to mark the second time this season and seventh time in his career with 10 or more tackles in a game. His 12 tackles tied a single game career-high. Junior SPC Parker Herrington kicked two field goals against Notre Dame to mark the second time this season he's kicked two in a game. He also did it against TCU. Junior QB Tucker Tipton tossed his first-career touchdown pass.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (1-5, 0-2 Pac 12)

Team Notes: Colorado won the coin toss for the fifth time in six games (deferring all five times; lost the toss only at Ohio State). This was the fourth different time zone (in six games) the Buffs have played in this year (HST, MDT, EDT, PDT; in fact, for the first time since 1945, the Buffs will not play a game in the central time zone). Stanford's first six rushes of the game all were for two yards or less (2, 1, 2, 0, 1, 2). Stanford's missed on a 47-yard field goal attempt in the first quarter was the opponents first miss in 2011 and snapped a streak of 16 straight field goals made by the opponent dating back to last year's Baylor game. Stanford's conversion of a third-and-26 in the second quarter snapped an 0-of-11 run on third-and-20 or more by CU opponents, who are now just 5-of-102 in such situations dating back to 1993. Colorado had season lows in penalties (six) and penalty yards (47). Of the 62 healthy players on the trip, 55 saw action tonight. Stanford's 553 total yards are the most in the series, topping the 551 that Colorado amassed here in the 1993 game. Colorado ran 57 plays in the game, the fifth time in six the Buffs have had 66 or fewer (exception: 82 vs. Cal). CU is averaging just 63.3 offensive plays per game for the season. Colorado has now lost 20 straight road games (21 straight out-of-state including one neutral site—the '07 Independence Bowl). CU did not have a quarterback sack (no real surprise, Stanford has allowed two all year); the Buffs had at least one in 11 straight and in 36 of its last 37 games coming in.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (0-5, 0-3 BSC)

Clarence Bumpas (Sophomore, Linebacker, 6-2, 244, Colorado Springs, Colo. (Kansas State/Sierra HS))

Bumpas recorded his fourth straight week of double digit tackles when he posted 17 (six solo) against Sacramento State. He notched 1.5 tackles for a loss and recovered one fumble. He now ranks third in the FCS averaging 12.67 tackles per game.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE (1-5, 1-3 RMAC)

Jeremy Gibson (Senior, Outside Linebacker, 6-0, 215, Concord, Calif./Idaho State/Mount Diablo HS)

Gibson posted five solo tackles and four assists last Saturday against Western New Mexico. His 2.5 sacks for a loss of 18 yards ties him for No. 11 in program game records. He also finished with three tackles for a loss of 19 yards. Gibson added two quarterback hurries during the game. He ranked among the conference leaders this season in sacks and total tackles. Gibson matched his season-high in tackles and recorded his first sacks of the season last Saturday. He is leading the Mountaineers in sacks, quarterback hurries, is second in tackles for loss and fourth in total tackles this season.

Team Notes: Western State scored on its opening possession for the first time in more than two seasons but fell in a 31-10 contest with Western New Mexico last Saturday. The Mountaineers scored on both red zone appearances, with a two-yard run by Germaine Daniels and a 27-yard field goal by Lloyd Tucker. Western State is tied for the RMAC lead with CSU-Pueblo with scores on 91.7 percent of red zone trips this season. Tucker increased his field goal total this season to eight, and needs two field goals to tie for ninth in program season records. He became the second Mountaineer in the last two seasons to earn D2Football.com National Player of the Week honors, after he picked up the special team award with a program-record five field goals against New Mexico Highlands Oct. 1. He also earned RMAC/Rawlings Special Teams Player of the Week honors for that performance. The win against the Cowboys was the first for the Mountaineers against a nationally-recognized opponent since 2003, and the 14 points allowed was the lowest in a conference game since 2006. The Mountaineers are leading the RMAC in opponent penalties and gaining 112.8 yards per game off penalties. Jaden Terry continues to lead the team with 53 tackles this season after recording 10 last Saturday. His 20 tackles against Chadron State Sept. 17 remains tied for the best performance in Division II this season. Western State returns home this Saturday to face Fort Lewis in the annual Hall of Fame Game. The Mountaineers are looking for back-to-back home wins for the first time since 2009. Western State has won eight of the last 11 home games against the Skyhawks dating back to 1988.
