Mathews set a personal best for both rushing yardage (227) and all-purpose yards (293) at Western New Mexico Saturday afternoon. He carried the ball 34 times for 227 yards (6.7 yards per carry) and four scores. His longest rush of the game was a 25-yard scamper. Mathew's four rushing touchdowns equals CSU-Pueblo records for most rushing touchdowns and most total touchdowns scored. He also caught three passes for 66 yards (22.0 yards per catch), with a long of 44 yards. Mathews first touchdown came in the first quarter to put CSU-Pueblo up 14-6. He then found the touchdown again in the second quarter to help the Pack to a 21-13 lead. Mathews crossed the goal line two more times in the third quarter, first to put CSUP up by eight points (28-20), and then again to put the Pack up by 15 points (35-20).

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY (3-0, 1-0 RMAC)

Connor Stevens (Sophomore, Outside Linebacker, 5-10, 220 Colorado Springs, Colo./Pine Creek HS)

Stevens recorded eight tackles, including four solos, and 2.0 tackles for a loss while returning an interception 40 yards for a touchdown as the Grizzlies improved to 3-0 for the first time since 1996 with a 43-14 win at Western State. The Grizzly defense, which is allowing just 10.0 points per game thus far, recorded four turnovers in the game.

Team Notes: The Grizzlies are off to their first 3-0 start since 1996. The Grizzlies won their RMAC opener for the first time since 2006 on Saturday, defeating Western State, 43-14, in Gunnison. The victory was ASU's 11th straight over the Mountaineers and allows them to maintain the Colorado Classic trophy for another year. That trophy, first given in 2006, lists the scores of all the games in the rivalry that dates back to 1934. The two teams have played every year since 1950. The Grizzlies' win on Saturday matched the series record for consecutive wins. Western State had won 11 straight from 1991-2001 until the Grizzlies' current streak. Western State leads the overall series 37-29. The Grizzlies have yet to throw an interception this year and have a RMAC-high eight picks of their own. The Grizzlies have a +12 (15-3) turnover margin through three games, an average of +4.0. They are now ranked second in the national statistics, up one spot from last week. The Grizzly defense also paces the RMAC in scoring defense as they are allowing just 10.0 points per game, tied for fifth fewest in the nation. The Grizzlies also pace the RMAC with 10 sacks. The Grizzlies are an impressive 14-for-15 (93.3 percent) in the red-zone thus far in 2012. They have eight touchdowns and six field goals. Defensively, the Grizzlies lead the RMAC in red-zone defense allowing just two scores (one touchdown, one field goal) in six opportunities. Sophomore Drew Edwards (Longmont, Colo.), caught a career-high nine balls for 92 yards and a touchdown, his second of the season. The Grizzlies, 2-0 on the road thus far, will play their third straight road game next Saturday evening at Colorado State-Pueblo, also 3-0.

COLORADO MESA UNIVERSITY (0-3, 0-1 RMAC)

Mike Brady (Junior, Defensive Back, 5-11, 185, Highlands Ranch, Colo./Highlands Ranch HS)

Brady recorded six tackles in the Mavs' loss to Chadron State. He recorded two solo tackles and four assisted. Brady intercepted a tipped pass (Trent deBraga) and returned it 75 yards for a touchdown with 1:20 remaining in the first half to pull the Mavericks to within eight points (28-20) at halftime. It was fourth-and-six when the Eagles decided against a field goal attempt with the play resulting in Brady's 75-yard interception return for a touchdown. He had one pass breakup. Early in the third quarter with CMU trailing 27-28, Brady recovered a blocked (DJ Hubbard) field goal attempt by the Eagles. Brady is fifth on the team with 16 tackles, including nine solo and has the Mavs' only interception on the year.

Team Notes: Colorado Mesa's home opener was on Saturday against Chadron State. CMU trailed 14-0 and tied the game in the first quarter. CMU took its first lead of the game (30-28) on an Alex Zemezouak 17-yard field goal at the 11:15 mark of the fourth quarter. CMU was then outscored 14-0 the remainder of the game, falling to the Eagles 41-30. CMU defense did not allow a sack. Austin Rodriguez had just one catch in the game, a 69-yard touchdown reception to tie the game at 14-14 late in the first quarter. CMU will travel to Black Hills State, the newest RMAC member on Saturday.

COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES (3-0, 1-0 RMAC)

Cody Renken (Senior, Wide Receiver, 5-8, 160, Smithson Valley, Texas)

Renken led the No. 23 Orediggers in their 42-19 win over Black Hills State with 14 receptions for 163 yards and a touchdown. His 14 receptions was one shy of his school record of 15 receptions set in a 39-13 win over Western State on October 23, 2010. The 2010 All-American added 59 yards on returns for 228 all-purpose yards in the game.

Team Notes: The No. 23 Colorado School of Mines Orediggers defeated Black Hills State in the RMAC opener for both squads on Saturday by a 42-19 final at Campbell Field in Golden. Mines (3-0, 1-0 RMAC) amassed 517 yards of offense on nearly 100 plays, including 426 yards by sophomore quarterback Matt Brown. Brown finished 37-of-63 for 407 passing yards while adding 19 yards and two touchdowns on the ground. Senior wideout Cody Renken added 163 receiving yards on 14 receptions, which was one shy of his school record of 15 catches set in a 39-13 win over Western State on October 23, 2010. Renken added 59 yards on returns for 228 yards of total offense in the win. Senior tight end David Pawelek added 74 yards on eight receptions with two touchdowns, while senior punter Taylor Accardi posted a 54.7 average on seven punts, including five that were downed inside the BHSU 20-yard line. Tyler Denson led the defense with 12 tackles (seven solo) and two tackles for a loss, while Henry Kaetzer added an interception and seven tackles. Mines will head back out on the road for a matchup with New Mexico Highlands on Saturday in Las Vegas, N.M.

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY (1-2, 0-1 MWC)

Team Notes: In their first true road game of the year, the Colorado State Rams lost to the San Jose State Spartans 40-20 on Saturday night at Spartan Stadium. Coming off of a big victory over UC Davis, the Spartans continued their offensive momentum from the opening drive. San Jose State took the game's opening kickoff and went 83 yards in eight plays, finishing the drive with a 25-yard touchdown pass from David Fales to Jabari Carr. Fales finished the first quarter 8-8 for 119 yards and helped lead the Spartans to a quick 14-0 lead. The Rams would fight back in the second quarter. With 13:50 left in the second quarter, sophomore quarterback Garrett Grayson rushed up the left side for a 15-yard touchdown run to cap a four-play 74-yard drive that took just 58 seconds. On the very next drive, the Rams again sped up the offense and finished an eight-play 80-yard drive with a 28-yard touchdown pass from Grayson to tight end Kivon Cartwright. The drive took less than two minutes off the clock and brought CSU to within one of San Jose State after a failed two-point conversion. The Spartans were able to make a field goal late in the second quarter to give them a 17-13 lead heading into the half. Unable to convert on their opening drive of the second half, CSU was able to pin San Jose State on its own two-yard line thanks to a 72-yard punt from Pete Kontodiakos, the second-longest of his career and tied for ninth-longest in CSU history. The Spartans responded by driving the ball 98 yards for a touchdown and added a field goal to increase their lead to 27-13. The Rams took advantage of a San Jose State fumble several minutes later and struck back with a 38-yard touchdown pass from Grayson to Charles Lovett to narrow the gap to 27-20. San Jose State's offense was just too potent, however, as the Spartans had two 40-plus yard touchdowns in the second half, and Fales finished the game with 370 yards passing and three touchdowns. Grayson responded to the quarterback challenge throwing for 297 yards and two touchdowns as well as leading the Rams with 57 yards rushing and a touchdown.

FORT LEWIS COLLEGE (0-2, 0-1 RMAC)

Team Notes: Coming off two road games against NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision teams, Northern Arizona was eager to have its home opener Saturday night. Before the first quarter had ended, NAU had built a 27-0 lead en route to a 69-0 victory. On the first play from scrimmage, NAU's Zach Bauman sprinted for a 75-yard touchdown. He amassed for 136 yards and a pair of touchdowns on five carries. Chase Cartwright took over in the second quarter, connecting on touchdown passes of 30 yards to Ify Umodu and four yards to Covaughn DeBoskie-Johnson. His backup, Jordan Perry was 7-of-9 for 74 yards. Perry completed touchdowns of 31 yards and three-yards. Fort Lewis sophomore Cougar Beaubien was forced into starting duty after FLC's four-year starting quarterback Tim Jenkins was injured late in last week's season-opening loss to New Mexico Highlands. Jenkins is expected to return next Saturday's for the Skyhawks' Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference tilt at Western New Mexico. Beaubien went 5-of-12 passing for 25 yards and was FLC's leading rusher with 21 yards on nine carries, including a long of 14. True freshman Jason Fitzpatrick split time with Beaubien at quarterback, completing 6-of-12 passes for 19 yards and one interception. Defensive back Terry Begaye led the Skyhawk defense with seven tackles (three solo). Steven Garcia had seven tackles (five solo) for the Lumberjacks. Northern Arizona amassed 557 yards of total offense, averaging 8.7 yards per play. Fort Lewis was limited to just 122 yards (1.9 yards per play). Fort Lewis travels to Silver City, N.M., to face Western New Mexico (1-2, 0-1).

2012 NFFCC News & Notes

UNITED STATE AIR FORCE ACADEMY (1-1, 0-0 MWC)

Team Notes: Air Force did not compete this past week. The Falcons return to the field Saturday for a 7 p.m. kickoff at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas for the first Mountain West Conference game of the season.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO (0-3, 0-0 PAC12)

Team Notes: Saturday's 102 degree temperature at kickoff at Fresno State matched the warmest in CU football history (2007 at Arizona State). Colorado played 57 of the 62 players on the trip who could have seen action (two were injured); no seniors were in on defense in the fourth quarter. The 69-14 loss marked the Buffs' worst setback since losing 58-0 at Missouri in 2008. The 69 points were the most allowed by Colorado since dropping a 70-3 decision to Texas in the 2005 Big 12 Championship game. The 665 yards were the most by either team in the six-game CU-Fresno series, eclipsing the 526 the Bulldogs had in the '93 Aloha Bowl. The Buffs dropped to 0-3 for just the 12th time in 123 seasons of varsity football, the first time since 2006. With Fresno State recording 97-yard pass and 94-yard rush plays, it marked the first time the CU defense has ever allowed two plays from scrimmage 80 yards or longer in the same game. Fresno also set CU opponent records for most points allowed in the first quarter (35), total yards in a quarter (322), total yards in a half (516), passing yards in a half (300) along with the longest rush (eclipsing the previous long of 90 by Kansas' Walter Mack in 1980). Brad Cotner made his first career start in what also was his first career action for the Buffs. Josh Ford rushed for 61 yards, 60 of those coming on CU's fourth quarter touchdown drive (on nine carries). Marques Mosley made his first career interception.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO (1-2, 0-0 BSC)

Dominic Gunn (Senior, Wide Receiver/Returner, 5-11, 170, Aurora, Colo./Rangeview)

Gunn scored his first career touchdown on a punt return, going a career-long 74 yards to give the Bears a 10-7 advantage with 12:52 to play in the second quarter at Sacramento State. He ended the game with 196 all-purpose yards (87 punt return, 77 kickoff return, 32 receiving), giving him 389 over the past two games. Those 196 yards give Gunn over 3,000 career all-purpose yards (3,094) which moves him past former teammate Patrick Walker (2008-11), who had 3,069, for ninth all-time. The last time the Bears had a punt returned for a touchdown was Oct. 27, 2001 when Vincent Jackson had a 79 yard return against North Dakota State.

Team Notes: Northern Colorado junior Jace Davis has now had two or more receptions in 17 consecutive games and it was the fourth time in his career he had over 100 receiving yards, catching 10 passes for 123 yards.

WESTERN STATE COLLEGE UNIVERSITY (0-3, 0-1 RMAC)

Team Notes: This past Saturday, Adams State and Western State squared off in the second longest collegiate rivalry in the state of Colorado. Dubbed the Colorado Classic, the game also doubled as Homecoming for the Mountaineers. Adams State (3-0, 1-0 RMAC) opened the scoring at the 8:17 mark in the first quarter. They wouldn't relinquish the lead as they finished the game 43-14. ASU forced three interceptions and managed to obtain two safeties from the Mountaineers. Despite the lack of scoring, the Mountaineer backs racked up 210 rushing yards compared to 48 from their counterparts. Germaine Daniels led the way for the Mountaineers compiling 121 yards on the ground. Bradey Gasaway supplemented the rushing game with 79 yards on eight carries. On the defensive side of the ball, lineman Levi Ostrom had a solid performance. Ostrom came up with three sacks and seven solo tackles. The Mountaineers will be on the road for their next matchup. They travel to Chadron, Neb. to take on the Chadron State Eagles. Kick-off is set for 12 p.m.
