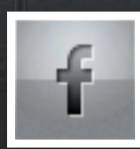

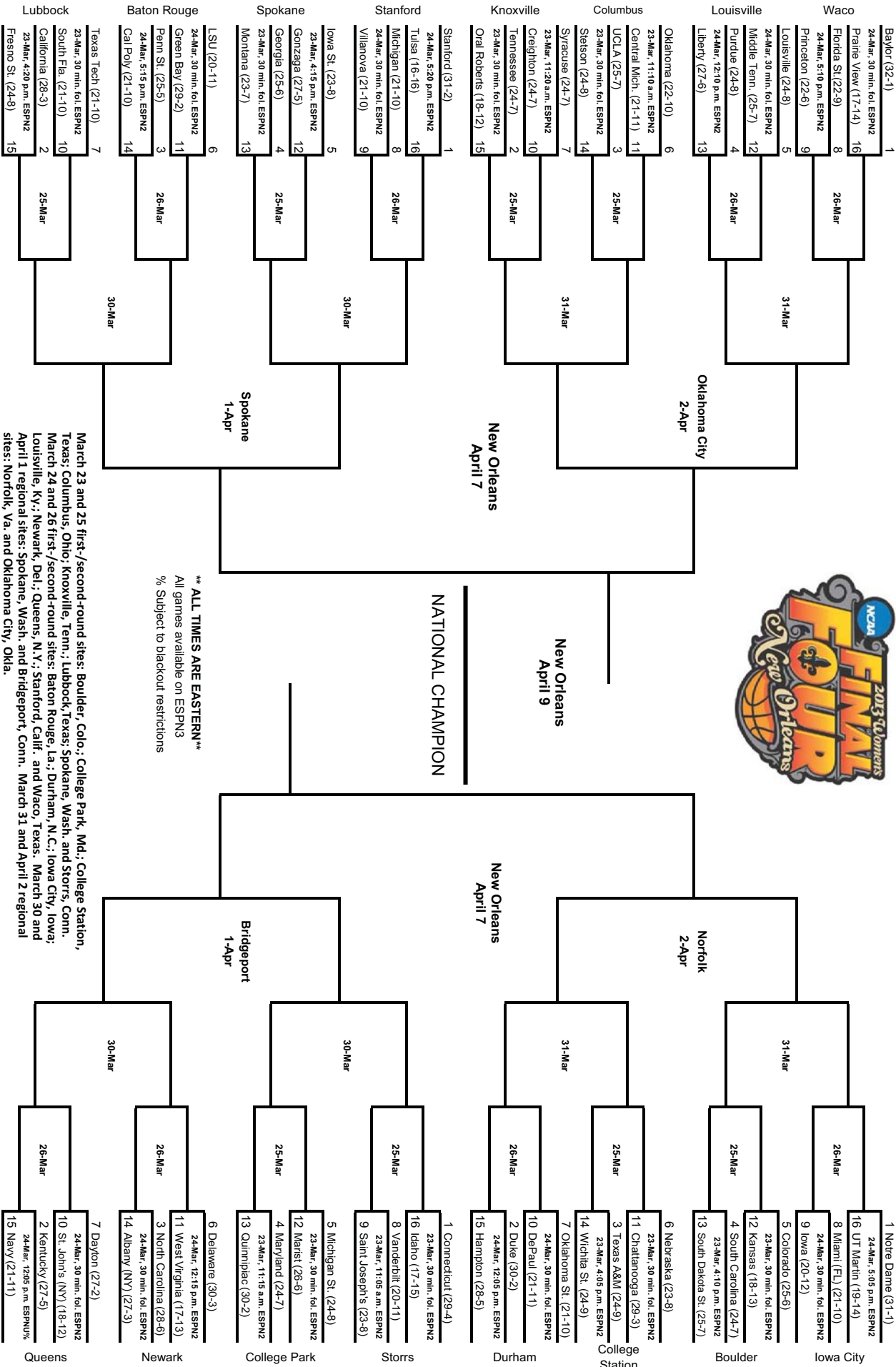

THE GAME: No. 19 (AP & USA Today Sports/Coaches) Colorado is the No. 5 seed in the Norfolk Region and will host No. 12 seed Kansas in a first-round NCAA Tournament game on Saturday, March 23, at 4:40 p.m. at the Coors Events Center. The Buffaloes also welcome No. 13 seed South Dakota State and No. 4 seed South Carolina to Boulder as those teams tip off tournament play at 2:10 p.m. Friday's winners will meet in a second round game on Monday, March 25, at 7:30 p.m.

BROADCAST: Saturday's games will be broadcast live on ESPN2 and also online via ESPN3. Mark Jones will have the call and Fran Fraschilla will provide the color commentary. Saturday's game will also air on KKZN AM 760. Mike Rice will have the play-by-play with Carol Callan of USA Basketball providing the color commentary.

NCAA FACTS: Colorado will make its 13th NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament appearance with an all-time record of 17-12. The Buffaloes have made the Sweet 16 six times (1993-95, '97, '02-03) and advanced to three Elite 8's (1993, '95, '02).

This will be Colorado's first trip since 2004 when the Buffaloes were a No. 6 seed and lost a first round game at No. 11 UC Santa Barbara (76-49).

Colorado is 8-2 in first round games (twice received a first round bye). Overall the Buffaloes are 9-3 in their opening game of an NCAA Championship.

Colorado serves as a first- and second-round host for the 10th time and first since 2003. The Buffaloes are 12-3 all-time at home in the NCAA Tournament and have won six straight.

ABOUT THE BUFFALOES: Colorado is 25-6 overall and completed the regular season in fourth place in the Pac-12 at 13-5. Colorado's 25 wins are its most since CU's 1995-96 team went 26-9. The 24 regular season wins are the most since the 1994-95 squad won 24 en route to a school-record 30-3 finish. Colorado's 13 conference wins are the third most in team history, trailing only the program's two undefeated Big Eight teams (14-0) in 1989 and 1995. The Buffaloes finished +7 in league wins from a year ago (6-12).

The Buffaloes were the No. 4 seed in the Pac-12 Tournament, defeating No. 5 Washington 70-59 in the quarterfinals on March 8 and falling to top-seed and eventual champion Stanford in the semifinals on March 9. Colorado's semifinal run was its deepest in a conference tournament since reaching the 2003 Big 12 semifinals.

Colorado had a 10-game win streak snapped in the Pac-12 semifinals. The Buffaloes won their final nine regular season contests, their longest win streak within conference games in one season since the 1994-95 team swept the Big Eight at 14-0.

All six of Colorado's losses have come to ranked teams, five against Stanford and California, ranked No. 7 or better at the time. The combined record of the three teams the Buffaloes have lost to this year is 84-12 with eight of those losses coming against each other.

Colorado averages 65.5 points per game on 40 percent shooting from the field. Defensively, CU allows 54.1 points and has held opponents to 34.6 percent shooting for the year. Colorado ranks second in the Pac-12 and 11th in the nation in rebounding margin at +9.1, and 20th in the nation in field-goal percentage defense.

All-Pac-12 guard **Chucky Jeffery** leads the team in scoring (13.9 ppg), assists (3.9 apg), rebounds (8.3 rpg) and steals (2.2 spg). She was named to the Pac-12 All-Tournament team after averaging 19

points, four rebounds and three assists in CU's two games. Jeffery has 10 double-doubles on the season, eight of which came during Pac-12 play. On the Pac-12 leaderboard Jeffery ranks fourth in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.3), fifth in steals and assists, sixth in overall rebounding and defensive rebounds (6.6 drpg), ninth in scoring and 13th free-throw percentage (.709).

Redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** is second on the team and ranks 17th in the Pac-12 in scoring at 12.1 points per game. The 2013 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and five-time Pac-12 Freshman of the Week, she is second on the team in rebounding at 6.0 per game. Roberson has increased her rebounding total to 8.0 per contest over the last six games including a pair of double-doubles. She ranks seventh in offensive boards (3.0 orpg) and 18th in overall rebounding the Pac-12 leaderboard.

Junior guard **Brittany Wilson** ranks second on the team in steals (1.4 spg) and assists (2.2 apg) while coming in fourth in scoring at 8.3 points per contest. A member of the Pac-12 All-Defensive team, she became the 10th player in team history to reach 100 career 3-pointers in the Pac-12 semifinal against Stanford. Wilson is second on the team in 3-pointers made (30) and has hit 76.8 percent from the free-throw line, ranking sixth in the Pac-12.

Sophomore forward **Jen Reese** has made a successful return from an eye injury that kept her out of the final nine games of 2011-12. She is third on the team in scoring (8.5 ppg) and rebounding (4.8 rpg) while hitting 43.3 percent from the field and a team-best 81.7 percent from the foul line. Reese earned honorable mention to the All-Pac-12 team.

Junior center **Rachel Hargis** is the only Buffalo to start all 31 games. She's been one of Colorado's best defenders all season and has picked up the pace since February. Hargis has a team-best 34 blocked shots and 15 of her season's 26 steals came during CU's late season 10-game win streak (1.5 spg). Hargis is 10th in the Pac-12 in blocked shots at 1.1 per outing.

Sophomore **Lexy Kresl** returned to the starting lineup for the Pac-12 Tournament after missing the previous three games with a separated shoulder. Kresl leads Colorado in 3-pointers with 33 and is averaging 6.0 points and 2.7 rebounds per game. She ranks 14th

in the Pac-12 in 3-point percentage (.311) and is 15th in 3-pointers made (1.2 3mpg).

Freshman forward **Jamee Swan** had a great Pac-12 Tournament averaging 10.5 points, 8.0 rebounds and 2.0 blocks over the two games. She recorded her first career double-double with a personal-best 15 points to go along with 10 rebounds in the quarterfinal win over Washington. Swan is second on the team in blocks with 24 and fourth in rebounding at 4.4 per game.

Colorado's balance has served them well this season. Aside from Roberson and Jeffery averaging in double figures, seven others average between three and nine points per game. All 11 Buffaloes that played in the Pac-12 quarterfinal against Washington scored at least one point. In the home win over Arizona, nine different Buffaloes scored between six and 12 points. At California, nine different Buffs also scored, with seven netting between five and 11 points. Six different players have led CU in scoring in a game this year.

ABOUT THE JAYHAWKS: Kansas is 18-13 overall and finished seventh in the Big 12 with a record of 8-10. The Jayhawks average 70.1 points per game on 43.8 percent from the field, the third best mark in the Big 12. KU gives up 67.3 points an outing which ranks last in the Big 12. The Jayhawks enter the NCAA Tournament having dropped seven of 11, with three of four wins coming against TCU.

Senior forward Carolyn Davis leads Kansas in scoring at 15.7 points per game while shooting 54.9 percent from the floor, the latter ranking third in the Big 12. All-Big 12 guard Angel Goodrich leads the Big 12 in steals (2.9 spg) and ranks second in assists (7.0 apg). She's KU's second leading scorer at 14.2 points per contest. Sophomore forward Chelsea Gardner paces Kansas and ranks second in the Big 12 in field-goal accuracy at 55.4 percent and is also tied with Davis for the team lead with 6.7 rebounds per game.

THE SERIES: This will be the 69th meeting between the long-time Big Eight/Big 12 Conference rivals with Kansas holding a slim 35-33 series lead. The Jayhawks have won the last five in the series, and 7-of-8, before Colorado moved on to the Pac-12. All but three of those prior meetings came as conference rivals, and even those three, played between 1979-81, were part of a mid-season Big Eight Tournament before the league began round robin play in 1983. CU has won 13 of 23 over the Jayhawks since 2001.

This will be the first NCAA meeting, but the storied programs a have rich tradition of postseason competition. Colorado and Kansas met six times in Big Eight Conference Tournament play from 1983-96, each team winning three times and accounting for seven tournament titles. The Buffaloes and Jayhawks met four times in the finals alone, Kansas winning the first one (1988) and Colorado claiming the final three (1992, 1995 & 1996). The last meeting between the two teams marked the only time the squads met in Big 12 Championship play, a 75-41 KU first round win in 2011.

The Buffaloes own an 18-11 advantage in Boulder. CU's last win over Kansas came at the Coors Events Center, a 69-62 decision on Feb. 18, 2009.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - Brittany Spears took over here Tuesday as Colorado's career scoring leader in women's basketball. But Kansas' takeover moments later upstaged her and made the Buffaloes' stay in the Big 12 Conference's postseason tournament a brief one.

After Spears broke Lisa Van Goor's career scoring record and pulled CU to within two points of KU early in the second half, the Jayhawks broke free with a 26-5 run and eliminated the Buffs, 71-45.

Spears finished with a game-high 21 points and surpassed Van Goor (2,067 points from 1980-85) on CU's all-time women's scoring list. Spears now has 2,075, but the record wasn't foremost in her thoughts after the Buffs endured a frigid shooting afternoon and were sent home.

"I would have rather got the 'W' and scored two points," she said. "That doesn't matter; I just wanted the win."

CU Coach **Linda Lappe** was more reflective, calling Spears' feat "a huge accomplishment. That record has been standing for a very, very long time, since the beginning of our program...what (Spears) has done in the last four years I think is pretty special."

The Buffs, suffering an 8-minute scoring drought in the second half, shot just 26.2 percent from the field (17-for-65) in their final Big 12 tournament. It was their worst shooting percentage in a conference game this season and their second-worst all season.

Spears was the only CU player in double figures, and three CU starters went a combined 2-of-23 from the field. Post player **Julie Seabrook** hit back-to-back three-pointers to open the scoring for CU, but they would be the Buffs' only treys in 13 attempts and her only field goals of the afternoon.

Seabrook's pair of opening treys gave the Buffs bolted to a 6-2 lead, which would be their largest advantage of the game. After a 14-14 tie forged on back-to-back baskets by Spears, the Jayhawks used a 13-0 run to go up 27-14.

Sophomore guard **Morica Engleman**, who led KU with 17 points, was the catalyst in that surge, hitting consecutive three-pointers and another pull-up jumper to account for eight of her 10 first-half points.

KU post Carolyn Davis scored seven points in the first 20 minutes - and CU might have considered that a small victory. Davis, who totaled 32 points in KU's pair of regular-season wins against the Buffs, finished with 16 and 11 rebounds.

The Buffs were hampered by a pair of early fouls picked up by sophomore guard **Chucky Jeffery**, whose academic suspension kept her in Boulder for CU's Feb. 2 trip to KU. Jeffery, her team's leading rebounder (8.1) and second-leading scorer (13.7), came off the bench about 3 minutes into the contest.

Less than 5 minutes later, she had her second foul and sat for a 6-minute stretch, during which KU began to pull away. When she returned, the benefit to the Buffs was obvious.

CU closed out the half with an 8-2 run - Jeffery scored half of those points - and trailed 29-22 at intermission. The Buffs made only nine of their 31 first-half field goal attempts (29.0 percent) and their only two free throw attempts.

Spears finished the half with eight points - six shy of the total needed to surpass Van Goor. After opening the second half with consecutive baskets, she converted a conventional three-point play with 17:04 to play, sending her past Van Goor and pulling CU to within 31-29.

The Buffs never got any closer.

Davis opened the huge run with a routine basket inside, then Keena Mays hit a trey from the right corner. Spears answered with a pair of free throws, Mays responded with a drive and a layup, Spears with a put-back.

Then it was all KU in a 14-0 run. CU didn't score for nearly 9 minutes and for the Buffs, this trip to KC was unofficially over with 7:01 remaining.

WINNING IN BUNCHES: Colorado had a 10-game winning streak snapped by No. 4/4 Stanford in the Pac-12 Tournament semifinals, ranking as the 10th longest run in team history. The Buffaloes also had an 11-game string to begin the season, marking the first time CU has put together two double-digit win streaks in the same campaign.

Colorado is a perfect 24-0 against unranked teams. All six of Colorado's losses have come to ranked teams, in fact five of its six losses have come to Stanford and California, ranked No. 7 or better at the time. The combined record of the three teams the Buffaloes have lost to this year is 84-12 with eight of those losses coming against each other.

Colorado's most recent win streak included nine straight within conference regular season games, its most in league contests since the 1994-95 team swept the Big Eight at 14-0. That 1994-95 run was actually part of a larger 23-game conference regular season win streak that included the final seven games of the 1993-94 season and first two of 1995-96.

ALL-PAC-12: Colorado is well represented in the 2013 Pac-12 Conference coaches' women's basketball postseason awards, highlighted by **Arielle Roberson** being named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year.

Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** earned All-Pac-12 honors for the second consecutive season while junior guard **Brittany Wilson** was named to the Pac-12 All-Defensive Team. Roberson was also named to the five-member All-Freshman team.

Sophomore forward **Jen Reese** and Roberson earned honorable mention to the All-Pac-12 team. Contributing to one of the top defenses in the Pac-12, Jeffery, Roberson and junior center **Rachel Hargis** all received honorable mention to the All-Defensive Team.

Roberson's Freshman of the Year honor is the first of its kind for the Buffaloes in any conference. However, CU had four Big Eight Conference Newcomer of the Year winners, two of which were upperclassmen and two freshmen (Bridget Turner, 1986; Shelley Sheetz, 1992).

Jeffery is the fifth Colorado player to win multiple all-conference first-team honors. Lisa Van Goor (Intermountain and Big Eight) and Shelley Sheetz (Big Eight) each won three while Tera Bjorklund and Jackie McFarland both won two (Big 12). She is also a two-time Media All-Pac-12 pick.

Wilson anchors one of the Pac-12's best defenses, which is on pace to smash team records for scoring and field-goal percentage defense. She consistently draws the other team's best back court player and has repeatedly held her opponent well below their season averages. Wilson has 42 steals on the season, helping a CU defense that averages 9.7 per game, ranking second in the Pac-12. The Buffaloes also rank second in the Pac-12 in scoring defense (54.1 ppg) and third in field-goal percentage defense (.346).

In the Pac-12 Media Awards, Jeffery earned All-Pac-12 for the second straight year and Roberson was named to the All-Freshman team.

JEFFERY'S DOUBLE-DOUBLES: Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** recorded her 10th double-double of the season and 30th of her career with 12 points and 10 rebounds at Oregon. Eight of her double-doubles came during Pac-12 regular season games, including six of the last nine. She is only the fourth different CU player to reach 10 double-doubles in one season; and she's the lone guard in the group:

ROBERSON PAC-12 HONORS: Arielle Roberson was named the Pac-12 Conference Women's Basketball Freshman of the Week for the week of Feb. 25-Mar. 3. It was the fifth Pac-12 Freshman of the Week honor for Roberson, and her second in a row.

Roberson scored her fifth Pac-12 Freshman of the week honor after averaging 13 points and 7.5 rebounds as the Buffaloes extended their winning streak to nine with road wins at the Oregon schools. She had a game-high 16 points on 6-of-11 from the field against Oregon, including a perfect 2-of-2 from 3-point range which gave her 9 on just 15 attempts over a four-game span. She also recorded four rebounds, one block and one steal.

Roberson recorded her second career double-double with 10 points and 11 rebounds in the come-from-behind win at Oregon State. Roberson had eight offensive rebounds alone, matching her personal best, and which ties for the eighth best single-game performance in team history. She hit 6-of-7 from the free throw line, including a pair of free throws with six seconds left in overtime that provided the final winning margin (66-63).

Roberson earned the Pac-12 Freshman of the Week award three times during the nonconference schedule, and was the inaugural recipient of that honor on Nov. 12 after scoring 16 points on 7-of-13 shooting with six rebounds, five steals, two assists and two blocks in her collegiate debut - a 70-65 win over Idaho on Nov. 11.

The Pac-12 added Freshman of the Week to its weekly honors for the first time this season, joining the standard Player of the Week hono. Roberson has won Freshman of the Week more than any other player (three others have three: Jillian Alleyne, Oregon; Lia Galdeira, Washington State; Talia Walton, Washington).

Roberson's honor is CU's eighth weekly award in the Pac-12 since the Buffaloes joined the conference in 2011, and seventh this season

alone. Jeffery has earned two Pac-12 Player of the Week honors this season. Roberson's five weekly conference awards in one season are the most by any Buffalo in the Big-12, Pac-12 era (since 1996-97).

ROBERSON ON THE OFFENSIVE GLASS: Freshman **Arielle Roberson** grabbed eight offensive rebounds for the second time in two weeks during her 10-point, 11-rebound performance at Oregon State. She also had eight offensive boards during her career-best 13-rebound performance against Washington State. Her eight offensive rebounds tie for eighth-best single-game performance in team history. Crystal Ford owns the school record with 10 against Eastern Illinois on March 16, 1988. CU players have had nine in a game six times, most recently by Randie Wirt vs. Colorado State on Dec. 6, 2000. Roberson's holds the 12th and 13th instances of eight offensive boards. She is the 14th different player to have eight or more offensive rebounds in one game.

MORE ON THE DEFENSE: Colorado ranks second in the Pac-12 in scoring defense, just behind Stanford in both overall (54.1 ppg) and conference games (53.1 ppg).

Colorado is on pace to set team records in scoring defense and opponent field goal percentage. CU's overall 54.1 points per game allowed average is nearly three below the school record of 56.8 set in 1996-97. The Buffaloes have held opponents to 34.6 percent from the field, a pace that would exceed the 35.8 percent allowed in 1980-81.

Colorado has held 12 teams under 50 points, the most in any one season in team history. The Buffaloes had held nine under 50 in five other seasons, most recently occurring in 2002-03, head coach **Linda Lappe's** senior season. Colorado held eight under 50 in Pac-12 play, including five during its current nine-game win streak.

Colorado has allowed just nine teams in the 60's all season and set a school-record by holding nine straight opponents under the 60-point mark:

Colorado has yet to allow 70 points in a game this year. This is the longest the Buffaloes have gone into any one season without allowing 70. The previous best was the 2011-12 team, that didn't allow 70 until game No. 13, a 75-67 loss at Washington.

CU held three straight conference opponents (Utah, Arizona State & Arizona) to 43 points or less, the first time the Buffaloes have held three straight opponents at 43 or under in conference play since 1980-81. It is also the eighth time in school history the Buffs have held their opponents under 50 in three consecutive outings.

Colorado had held its opponents to 24.6 percent shooting (49-of-199) over a 140 minute span (3 1/2 games) from the Utah game in Salt Lake City on Jan. 13 through the first half the game at California.

Colorado allowed just 36 points to Arizona, the fewest in a conference game since a 70-35 win at Kansas on Jan. 16, 2002. Arizona State was held to 17 points on 4-of-30 from the field in the second half of the Jan. 18 game. The four field goals were one shy of a school record (3 vs. Texas State 12/1/10 and Kansas State 3/7/92). The 13.3 percent allowed was just a fraction off the all-time opponent low for a half, 13.0 (3-of-23) vs. Kansas State on 3/7/92). That weekend Arizona State and Arizona combined for 79 points (39.2 ppg) and 24

percent from the field (26-of-107). The Buffaloes scored 79 points in their win over Arizona alone.

NATIONALLY RANKED: Colorado held its ground this week, coming in at No. 19 in both the Associated Press Women's Basketball Top 25 and the USA Today Sports Coaches poll. This week marks the final ranking of the AP poll while the coaches will submit one more ranking following the NCAA Tournament.

Colorado, 25-6 overall, received 299 points in the AP poll, up from 279 last week. The Buffaloes have resided in the AP poll for the last 14 weeks, their longest run since appearing in all 19 polls of the 2003-04 season. The Buffaloes have a long history of rankings in the AP poll, dating back to the 1980-81 season. This week's ranking marks the 172nd time Colorado has appeared in the AP poll, trailing only Stanford, USC and UCLA among Pac-12 schools.

In the coaches' poll, Colorado received 193 points, down just slightly from last week's total of 201. The Buffaloes have been in the coaches' poll for 10-straight weeks and 11 overall this season. This week's ranking marks the 162nd time Colorado has appeared in the coaches' poll dating back to the 1988-89 campaign.

All six of Colorado's losses have been to ranked teams, including five of six ranked No. 7 or better at the time. This week Stanford remained at No. 4, and California No. 6 in both polls. UCLA stayed at No. 11 in the AP poll and dropped one to No. 12 in the coaches poll. The Buffaloes do have one top 10 win on their resume, a 70-66 win over then-No. 8 Louisville on Dec. 14. The Cardinals are currently ranked No. 16 by the AP and No. 17 by the coaches.

LAPPE AND COLORADO IN THE POLLS: Head coach **Linda Lappe** joined some elite company when the Buffaloes received their first AP ranking in five years. She is only one of eight NCAA Division I women's head coaches to have played for an AP ranked team, and then return to lead that same program into the AP poll. Overall she is the 31st person to play for and coach an AP ranked program.

The Buffaloes were ranked for 29 weeks during Lappe's playing career (1998-03) including 27 straight from Jan. 22, 2001 through the end of her junior year (March 11, 2002). CU's highest AP ranking during that span was No. 10, on March 4, 2002.

SUCCESS ON THE ROAD: Colorado is 9-3 on the road, its most road wins since the 2002-03 team was also 9-3 on the opponent's home floor. The Buffaloes are 18-10 in their last 28 true road contests and have won their last five. Prior to the start of this run, The Buffaloes had just five wins in their previous 37 road games dating back to the 2008 Big 12 Conference schedule.

CU improved to 6-3 on the road in the Pac-12. The six road wins in conference are CU's most since winning all seven Big Eight road games in 1994-95.

Colorado's win at Illinois was its first road win against a major con-

ference opponent in a nonconference regular season game since defeating No. 20/17 ranked Vanderbilt, 62-51, on Dec. 9, 2007.

In other road highlights this season, Colorado held Utah to 43 points in Salt Lake City on Jan. 13, its fewest allowed in a true road game since a 45-42 win at Pacific on Dec. 18, 2004

Colorado scored 83 points at Denver, the most in a true road contest since scoring 83 in a 3-point loss at Colorado State on Nov. 30, 2005. CU's 10-point halftime lead was its largest on the road since leading Colorado State 38-22 on Nov. 20, 2011.

Colorado's 23-point win at UMKC, was its biggest on the road since an 82-47 win at Colorado State on Dec. 1, 2007.

JEFFERY PAC-12 AWARD: On the heels of consecutive double-double performances, senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** was named the Pac-12 Conference Women's Basketball Player of the Week for the week of Feb. 3-10. She averaged 18.5 points, 13.0 rebounds, 2.0 assists, 1.5 blocks and 1.5 steals in leading CU to home wins over Oregon State and Oregon.

She had 22 points, 11 rebounds and a season-high three blocked shots against Oregon State. Jeffery's scoring total put her over the 1,500 point milestone and also moved her into 10th on CU's all-time scoring list. Friday's double-double marked the 10th 20-10 double of her career and third this season. Jeffery hit 8-of-12 free throw attempts and drained 2-of-3 from 3-point range.

Against Oregon, Jeffery scored 15 points, grabbed a game-high 15 rebounds and dished out three assists in 29 minutes. She hit a

The comeback at Arizona State was CU's largest halftime deficit overcome since defeating Nebraska 75-73 at home on Jan. 31, 2009 after trailing by eight at the half (42-34). It was CU's largest comeback on the road since a 56-51 win at Missouri on Jan. 18, 2004 after trailing by eight at the break (28-20). Colorado's comeback from an 18-point first half deficit is thought to be one of the best in team history and most since the Buffaloes erased a 19-point halftime deficit to beat Washington on Dec. 20, 1982 in Portland, Ore.

season-high three 3-pointers, finishing at 62.5 percent from long range on the week (5-of-8). It was Jeffery's fourth career double-double with at least 15 points and 15 rebounds. Her three assists also moved her into fourth place on CU's all-time list with 445.

Remarkably, Jeffery's overall Player of the Week award is Colorado's first during a conference schedule since Reagan Scott earned Big 12 Conference honors on Feb. 24, 1997. The Buffaloes had several Rookie of the Week winners over the years during Big 12 league play, including Jeffery in 2010, and current head coach Linda Lappe in 1999.

The Pac-12 Player of the Week honor is Jeffery's second of the season and third of her career. She was also recognized on Dec. 17, 2012, after guiding the Buffaloes to wins over Denver and then-No. 8 ranked Louisville, and as a junior on Dec. 5, 2011.

The Dec. 17 honor came with some national recognition as well. Jeffery was named the espnW National Player of the Week. The U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) named Jeffery its Ann Meyers Drysdale Women's National Player of the Week and she also received national and Pac-12 Player of the Week honors from collegesportsmadness.com.

Jeffery averaged 18 points, 9.0 rebounds and 4.5 assists while shooting 46 percent from the field and 80 percent from the free-throw line in wins over Denver and No. 8 ranked Louisville. Against Louisville she had a game-high 22 points along with seven rebounds, four assists and one steal as the Buffaloes claimed their first win over a top-10 opponent since defeating No. 5 Stanford in the 2002 NCAA Sweet 16. Jeffery had 14 points, 11 rebounds, five assists and two steals in the road win over Denver.

AGAINST RANKED TEAMS: The Buffaloes are 1-6 against ranked teams this season, six of seven coming against the top 10. CU is 62-148 all-time against ranked opponents and 3-10 under Linda Lappe.

CU's series' with Cal and Stanford this season have marked just the first and second times the Buffaloes have faced top-10 opponents in consecutive games during the regular season. Colorado has faced that twice in postseason play; the 1993 and 2002 NCAA Sweet 16 and Elite Eight.

After playing at Cal and Stanford, Jan. 25-27, the Buffaloes returned to California for a game at No. 18 (AP)/19 (USAT) UCLA, marking the first time in team history that CU faced three consecutive games against ranked opponents on the road.

BENCH PRODUCTION: Colorado is getting good production from

its bench to the tune of 21.7 points (33 percent) and 20.2 rebounds (46 percent) per game. Sophomore forward **Jen Reese** has headed the bench effort averaging 8.5 points and 4.8 rebounds, ranking third on the team in both categories.

All 11 Buffaloes that played scored in the Pac-12 quarterfinal game against Washington. CU also had 11 score against New Mexico on Dec. 29, with 12 players seeing action.

Colorado scored a season-high 42 bench points in the win over UMKC. The bulk of those came from freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** who scored 23 points in 19 minutes on 9-of-12 from the field in her lone game off the bench this season. Her 23 bench points are tied for the second most in the past 10 years and her nine field goals are the most. Only Bianca Smith, with 25 points off the bench against San Jose State on Dec. 22, 1999, had a bigger bench game in the last 10 years.

MORE ON THE BOARDS: Colorado ranks 11th in NCAA Division I in rebounding margin through games of March 17 at +9.1. The Buffaloes have either tied or led the rebounding battle in 26 of 31 games this season and have enjoyed double-digit margins in 15 games.

Colorado's 25 offensive rebounds against Washington in the Pac-12 quarterfinals were its most in a game since also grabbing 25 against Montana State on Dec. 21, 1994. It was the most in postseason play since recording 27 against Marquette in the first round of the 1994 NCAA Tournament. CU's 58 total rebounds are the most in a postseason contest since totalling 60 in that '94 Marquette game.

The Buffaloes grabbed a season-high 59 rebounds in the win over Colorado State, their most since also recording 59 against Bowling Green on Nov. 23, 2001. CU had 24 offensive rebounds, nearly matching Colorado State's overall total (26). Colorado's 24 offensive rebounds were its most since it had 24 at Iowa State on Feb. 18, 1996.

Colorado's +33 advantage against the Rams tied for the ninth largest single-game margin in team history, most recently achieved against San Francisco on Nov. 30, 2011 (53-20).

Colorado had 50 rebounds against Denver, hitting the 50 mark for the second straight game for the first time since grabbing 50 against UC Irvine and 52 against Illinois-Chicago in the first two games of the 2009-10 season.

CU's 109 rebounds over a two-game span are its most since hitting the same number during the 2001 Coors Classic (59 vs. Bowling Green, 50 vs. Houston). The Buffaloes 46 offensive rebounds during

that stretch are their most since grabbing 48 in back-to-back games in December 1994 (25 vs. Montana State, 23 vs. Notre Dame).

BIG WIN: The 43-point win over Arizona was CU's largest in a Pac-12 game, smashing the old mark of 14 set just two days earlier against Arizona State (57-43). It was the eighth largest margin of victory in a conference game in CU history (all conferences) and the largest since an 83-38 win over Iowa State on Feb. 19, 1995.

Colorado's 28-point lead at halftime (43-15) is its largest lead at the break against a Pac-12 opponent and the most in a conference game since Colorado led Kansas 42-14 at halftime on Feb. 5, 2003.

BUFFS EXPERIENCED FROM DEEP: Colorado has four players with at least 50 career 3-point field goals, and all four rank among CU's career Top 20. Junior Brittany Wilson tops the Buffaloes' effort with 100, 10th on CU's all-time list. Sophomore Lexy Kresl, who a freshman record last year with 63, is 11th with 96. Senior **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** is 13th at 87 and **Chucky Jeffery** rounds out the current Buffs at 15th with 72.

JEFFERY MOVING UP CAREER LADDERS: Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** is sixth in career scoring at 1,636 and is the only player in team history with 1,600 points, 900 rebounds and 400 assists.

She also ranks fourth in assists (476) and steals (281), fifth in rebounds (916) and minutes (3,930), sixth in field-goals made (601), 10th in starts (107) and games played (124), 11th in free-throws made (327), 13th in blocks (71) and 15th in 3-point field goals (75).

In other miscellaneous categories Jeffery is also fifth in double-doubles (30), fourth in double-figure rebounding games (33) and sixth in double-figure scoring games (91).

FAST OUT OF THE GATE: Colorado finished the nonconference regular season at 11-0, the Buffs' second consecutive perfect non-conference season, and third in school history (1992-93). Colorado will continue a string of 24 nonconference regular season wins into next season. The Buffaloes are 31-4 in the nonconference season under head coach **Linda Lappe**.

SEEING DOUBLE: Colorado is used to getting double takes from fans and opponents, as the Buffaloes once again sport two pairs of identical twins on its roster.

Brenna and Meagan Malcolm-Peck are senior wing players while **Ashley and Brittany Wilson** are junior guards. Brenna is the older of the two Malcolm-Pecks by 27 minutes. Ashley is the older of the Wilson twins, by only five minutes.

COLORADO BASKETBALL'S SOLID START: Colorado's men's and women's basketball teams each began the 2012-13 season at 6-0, before the men suffered their first loss of the season on Dec. 1 at Wyoming. It is the first time the men's and women's programs have both started with six or more wins since 1982-83 when both teams started 7-0.

OMNI HOTELS CLASSIC CHAMPS: Colorado improved to 42-10 all-time in its home holiday classic and has won four straight and 16 of the 25 tournament titles contested. The Buffaloes won this year's classic by defeating Texas A&M-Corpus Christi and San Diego State. Freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** was named the MVP after averaging 16.5 points and 7.5 rebounds over the two-game tournament. She is the first CU freshman to win that honor in the 26-year history of the tournament. Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** was named to the Omni Classic All-Tournament team after averaging 13 points, 7.5 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 3.0 steals over the two games. She is the first four-time Omni All-Tournament team honoree, earning MVP honors in 2010 and '11.

BUFFS SIGN FOUR TO NLI's: **Zoe Beard-Fails, Desiree Harris, Haley Smith** and **Briana Watts** have signed National Letters of Intent to play basketball and continue their education at the University of Colorado in 2013-14 head coach Linda Lappe announced on Wednesday, the first day of the NCAA's early signing period.

Beard-Fails is a 6-2 forward from Herndon, Va., and attends Georgetown Day School in Washington D.C. She missed all but five games of her junior year with an ACL and meniscus tear, but is nearing full strength as her senior season commences. The 51st rated forward

in the nation according to ESPN.com's HoopGurlz, Beard-Fails averaged 27 points and nearly 18 rebounds as a sophomore for Georgetown Day in 2010-11, earning fourth team All-Met honors from the Washington Post.

Harris is a 5-8 guard from Oakland, Calif., who attends St. Joseph Notre Dame High school in Alameda. She averaged 23.5 points, 7.0 rebounds, 2.9 steals and 2.7 assists as a junior, helping the Pilots to the North Coast Section championship. Harris was a CIF All-State Division V second team selection as well as a Bay Shore Athletic League second team pick.

Smith, a 6-0 wing from Sammamish, Wash., is getting ready for her senior season at Skyline High School. A do-it-all player for the Spartans, she averaged around seven points, five rebounds and just under two assists and steals per game as a junior. Smith is in her fourth varsity season with the Spartans and also has had a successful club career playing with the Tree of Hope program. ESPN.com's HoopGurlz has her as the top prospect in the state of Washington and the 20th ranked wing in the nation.

Watts, a 6-4 center from Fresno, Calif., will make her debut with Clovis West High School this winter after playing her first three years at rival Buchanan. She was the first commit of the 2013 class. Watts averaged nearly six points and just over six rebounds per game for Buchanan as a junior, contributing to the Bears' 18-9 record and a spot in the CIF Central Section Division I semifinals.

BUFFS IN OPENERS: With its win over Idaho, Colorado improved to 34-5 (.872) all-time in season openers and 37-2 (.949) in all-time home openers. The Buffs opened the season with a home game for the 27th time in 39 seasons, and moved to a perfect 27-0 in those instances.

BUFFS IN EXHIBITION: Colorado improved to a perfect 23-0 in exhibition games with its 87-38 win over Western State University Colorado. The Buffaloes have outscored their exhibition opponents by just over 31 points per game (86.0 to 54.7).

Colorado's 38 points allowed against WSCU were its fewest in an exhibition since the Buffaloes beat Colorado Mines 58-31 in 2007. The 49-point margin was the most in an exhibition since the Buffaloes defeated Spartak Moscow 115-55 in 2002.

The Buffaloes have played at least one exhibition game in all but one year (2009) since 1997. CU's exhibition games have featured a mix of NCAA II schools, foreign teams and traveling all-star teams.

BUFFS PICKED NINTH: Coming off its first 20-win season in eight years, Colorado was picked to finish ninth in the Pac-12 in 2013, according to the league's annual Preseason Coaches Poll and Media Poll.

In the Coaches Poll, 2012 NCAA Women's Final Four participant Stanford was picked to win the Pac-12, compiling the maximum amount of points (121) and first place votes (11) possible. 2012 Pac-12 runner-up and NCAA participant California claimed the other first place vote and was second in the poll (109). UCLA was third with 100 points followed by USC (91), Arizona State and Oregon State (67), Utah (56), Washington (54), Colorado (49), Washington State (40), Oregon (20) and Arizona (18).

Colorado's ninth place preseason rating is its highest in the last nine years since Buffaloes were picked to finish seventh in the 2004-05 Big 12 Coaches Poll.

The Media Poll was nearly identical in order. Stanford was picked to win with 12 first place votes and 166 total. California was second with 155 points and two first place votes. UCLA was third (136) followed by USC (123), Oregon State (106), Arizona State (100), Washington (80), Utah (72), Colorado (57), Washington State (47), Oregon (25) and Arizona (22).

MEDIA TABS JEFFERY: Along with picking the order of Pac-12 finish, the media selected a preseason All-Pac-12 team. Senior guard Chucky Jeffery was one of six individuals selected, along with California's Layshia Clarendon, Washington's Jazmine Davis, Stanford's Chiney Ogwumike, UCLA's Markel Walker and Arizona's Davellyn Whyte.

HOME AT THE CECC: Colorado is traditionally tough at home with a 382-128 all-time record at the Coors Events Center (.749). The Buffaloes have won 10 or more games in a season at the CEC in 24 of 35 years. The Buffaloes have enjoyed five undefeated seasons (1980-83, 1992-94) at the CEC.

BUFFS ON TV: Colorado's regular season schedule featured 10 regionally or nationally televised games. CU played nine regular season games on the Pac-12 Networks, and added a 10th on ROOT Sports Rocky Mountain at Denver on Dec. 11.

A program-best seven regular season games were televised nationally while two others aired on regional networks. CU's two Pac-12 Tournament games were also televised nationally, on the Pac-12 Network. All of CU's NCAA Tournament games will be on the ESPN family of networks.

The Buffaloes made their Pac-12 Network debut on Jan. 4 against defending league champion Stanford; their first of four straight televised games on the network. Colorado had five straight road games televised beginning with Utah on Jan. 13, through a Super Bowl Sunday matchup at USC on Feb. 3.

CU has appeared on 111 regional or national telecasts since 2001.

BOULDER – Brittany Wilson's clutch free throw shooting and Arielle Roberson's overall play pushed Colorado past Idaho 70-65 on Sunday in the Buffaloes' season-opener at the Coors Events Center.

Wilson, a junior guard, finished with a game-best 18 points, including four free throws in the final 18 seconds, while Roberson added 16 points. Idaho (0-2) had three players in double figures, led by Alyssa Charlton's 16.

Roberson, a 6-1 forward, redshirted her freshman season due to rehabilitation from hip surgery. CU coaches believed her return would boost the Buffs inside play as well as their overall defense - and they were correct. In addition to her 16 points, Roberson collected six rebounds and added five steals and two blocked shots in her CU debut.

Senior point guard **Chucky Jeffery** missed the opener, serving a suspension because of a violation of team rules. Had she not been in the lineup last season against Idaho, the Buffs would have been in trouble.

With the Vandals up 59-58 with just over 2 minutes remaining in last season's meeting, Jeffery went on a tear, scoring seven of her career-best 30 points to rescue the Buffs, 68-59.

But CU would have to do without Jeffery this time around - and her teammates coped pretty well.

Idaho's Ali Forde scored the game's first points, but the Vandals' 2-0 lead was erased by a Meagan Malcolm-Peck 3-pointer. Roberson took over from there, scoring CU's next six points. Malcolm-Peck and Brittany Wilson combined for 10 of the next 15 points as the Buffs built an 11-point (25-14) cushion.

The Vandals wouldn't go away; an 11-2 run over the first half's final 6 minutes brought them to within two (27-25) on a layup by Charlton. But the Buffs righted themselves and got field goals by Jasmine Sborov and Rachel Hargis to lead 31-26 at intermission.

CU shot 46 percent from the field (12-of-26) in the first half to Idaho's 34 percent (9-of-26). The Buffs held an 18-16 edge on the boards, but also turned the ball over one more time than the Vandals (11-10).

Behind the three-point shooting of Lexy Kresl and Roberson's inside work, the Buffs built a pair of eight-point leads in the first 6 minutes of the second half. Kresl drained a pair of treys during that span, marking her 19th career game with two or more three-pointers.

The Vandals weren't lacking for long-distance shooters. They got treys from Connie Ballestero, Christina Salvatore and Stacey Barr to creep to within four (43-39) with 14 minutes to play.

Thanks to Roberson, CU was able to pull away before Idaho could fashion its next run. She scored consecutive baskets to restore a double-digit Buffs lead (54-44), but the Vandals weren't folding.

They closed to 56-50 on a conventional three-point play by Charlton and a trey by Krissy Karr, then to 56-52 on another basket by Charlton with just over 5:30 remaining. Another three-pointer by Karr less than 2 minutes later pulled Idaho to three back (58-55), but CU answered with one of two free throws by Roberson and an Ashley Wilson layup to go ahead 61-55.

The Vandals answered on three of four free throws by Charlton to cut their deficit to 61-60 with 3:04 remaining. Ashley Wilson responded to those with another layup for a 63-60 CU lead. After an Idaho miss and a CU rebound, Jen Reese hit a pair of foul shots to put the Buffs up 65-60 with 51.6 seconds to play, and Roberson followed by hitting one of two free throws 11 seconds later for a 66-60 CU advantage.

Idaho called timeout with 37.2 seconds remaining, then another with 22.5 showing after the Vandals couldn't get off a shot. When they did, they missed, but a pair of flagrant fouls was called. Brittany Wilson and Charlton each their free throws (68-62), then Barr hit a long trey to draw the Vandals to within 68-65.

With 13.8 seconds left, Brittany Wilson's pair of foul shots gave the Buffs their final five-point advantage.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - One freshman forward started, one finished. No matter the order of appearance the recipe provided a winning combination for Colorado.

Arielle Roberson and **Jamee Swan** combined for 37 points on 71 percent shooting as Colorado defeated Missouri-Kansas City, 78-55, Sunday afternoon at the Swinney Recreation Center on the UMKC campus.

Colorado improved to 2-0, claiming its 15th straight win over nonconference regular season opponents dating back to 2010. UMKC drops to 2-2.

Swan, making her first career start, scored 10 of her 14 points in the first half to give the Buffaloes a good start. After picking up her third foul early in the second half, Roberson stepped in scoring 19 of her game-high 23 points in the last 20 minutes.

Roberson was 9-of-12 from the field, hit all five free throw attempts and grabbed six rebounds. Swan was 6-of-9 from the floor had three rebounds and an assist.

The freshman front court duo helped the Buffaloes dominate in the paint, outscoring the Kangaroos 42-14 inside.

"I give all the credit to my teammates," Roberson said. "We knew coming out of the locker room we needed to push the ball and run more, really turn it up in the second half."

Roberson and Swan were the beneficiaries of a Colorado offense that picked apart the UMKC zone; putting on a passing clinic from all five positions. The Buffaloes had 17 assists on 32 made shots and overall shot 47 percent for the game.

That offense ran through forward **Jen Reese** and center **Rachel Hargis**. Playing in the high post, Reese and Hargis continually made the right pass, either finding Roberson and Swan on the low block or dishing out to continue through the guards.

Officially the two combined for six assists, but their initial reads led to plenty of good looks for the Buffaloes all afternoon.

Reese also had 10 points on 5-of-8 shooting with eight rebounds. Hargis made 3-of-4 field goals finishing with eight points.

"Our four post players, Arielle, Rachel, Jamee and Jen really dominated the game," CU head coach Linda Lappe said. "They really understood what we were trying to do in our zone offense. I thought they did a fantastic job of being a presence on the inside."

After Lauren Dudding put UMKC up with a 3-pointer on its initial possession, Colorado scored nine straight including two buckets from Swan.

UMKC briefly took the lead with a 7-0 run of its own for a 10-9 advantage six minutes in. Roberson and Swan had back-to-back scores to put CU up for good.

The Kangaroos kept CU close early. Eilise O'Connor scored eight of her 10 points in the first half as UMKC pulled to within two at 18-16, but then the Buffaloes went to work. Colorado scored on five of its next six possessions during an 11-0 run to take a 29-16 lead. Hargis had a three point play and Roberson and Reese each scored on put-backs off CU misses.

Offensive rebounding was key for the Buffaloes, grabbing 19 which led to 22 second chance points. Overall Colorado enjoyed a 44-29 advantage on the boards.

Colorado led by nine at the half (36-27). UMKC's Kim Neziyanya quickly converted conventional 3-point play to cut the CU lead to six, and also gave Swan her third foul. From there Roberson shined.

The San Antonio native scored 14 points in the first six minutes of the half as the Buffaloes began to pull away. She scored six in a row as CU rebuilt a double-digit lead at 46-35. After a pair of Hailey Housee free throws, CU put the game away with a 13-0 run. Following a Reese jumper and a transition layup from **Lexy Kresl**, Roberson scored the next seven as the Buffaloes won their fifth straight nonconference regular season game away from Boulder.

Neziyanya led UMKC with 17 points and eight rebounds.

BOULDER - What started as a bit of a struggle ended in an impressive stroll Saturday night for the University of Colorado women's basketball team.

The unbeaten Buffaloes (4-0) found their groove midway through the first half and stayed with it the rest of the way, overrunning San Diego State 67-53 to win the Omni Classic at the Coors Events Center.

CU has won 16 of its 26 in-season tournaments, which for 22 years was called the Coors Classic.

Three CU players reached double figures, topped by redshirt freshman **Arielle Roberson's** 17 points. Sophomore **Jen Reese** added 14 and senior Chucky Jeffery 12. Reese also grabbed a game-best nine rebounds, while Roberson added seven.

Roberson was named the tournament's MVP, an award Jeffery had claimed the past two years. Joining both of the all-tournament team were Auburn's Tyrese Tanner, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi's Janae Blount and San Diego State's Courtney Clements, who led her team Saturday night with 19 points.

Defeating the talented Aztecs, an NCAA Tournament last season, was a benchmark November win for the Buffs and third-year coach **Linda Lappe**. She acknowledged that it was her best non-conference win at CU, primarily because her team dealt with and overcame adversity against a physical opponent.

Said Lappe: "It was a great game throughout, two good teams and a lot of great players on that court. What we were able to do in the second half...it was not for the faint of heart. I enjoyed seeing our team step up to that level to win."

As Lappe has done after the Buffs' previous three wins, she pointed to her team's balance and depth in the post as keys in overtaking the Aztecs, who led by nine points in the early going. Along with the frontline productivity of Roberson and Reese, CU got eight points and three rebounds from Rachel Hargis and five points and three rebounds from **Meagan Malcolm-Peck**.

Lappe said she and her staff had challenged her frontline players to match San Diego State's physical play. "We challenged them before the game and they took it on...they were the difference makers."

The Buffs led 28-23 at halftime, but getting that five-point lead was difficult. When the Aztecs raced ahead 6-0, it doubled the largest deficit the Buffs had faced in their three previous games. And San Diego State wasn't content with that.

Over the next 5 minutes, the Aztecs built a 14-5 advantage and were limiting the Buffs' looks at the basket. But at the 13:19 mark, CU began to click - mainly because it thumped up its defensive intensity and matched San Diego State's physicality.

"We were trying to force things," Roberson said. "I don't know if it was nerves or whatever, but we needed to get on the same page." Once that happened and the season's first test of adversity was passed, "It showed us who we really are. . . we're a tough team, they're a tough team."

At about the 6 minute mark, the Aztecs were 5-of-17 from the field - and that made field goal number included San Diego State hitting its first two baskets of the game.

The Buffs began creeping back into it and fashioned a 13-2 run. They finally caught the Aztecs at 16-16 on a Roberson follow of her own miss, then passed the visitors at 18-16 on a short Reese jumper.

In the half's final 2:15, CU outscored San Diego State 7-1 to take its five-point lead to the locker room. During that span, CU got its only two treys of the first 20 minutes, courtesy of Roberson and Malcolm-Peck.

A 5-0 run to open the second half gave the Buffs their largest lead of the game (33-23) - and they kept the pedal down. After the Aztecs closed to within six, a 7-2 CU spurt opened an 11-point advantage (42-31) with 13:02 to play. Reese was responsible for four of those points, with Jeffery converting a conventional three-point play for the others.

In the final 7 minutes, the Buffs led by as many as 15 - 67-52 in the final half minute - and the Aztecs never got closer than eight points.

BOULDER - Non-conference basketball schedules are all about preparing for the real thing - conference play. If a team can improve game-by-game, that's good. If it can remain unbeaten while improving, all the better.

The University of Colorado women's basketball team is doing both. The Buffs used a 9-0 run midway through the second half to pull away from Wyoming and win 68-59 on Wednesday night at the Coors Events Center.

"When you're not in your conference schedule, you want as many different scenarios as you can get," said CU coach **Linda Lappe**, whose team went to 5-0 and 3-0 at home this season. "We're starting to get that with this year's schedule. . . I feel we'll be prepared for whatever we see down the road."

What the Buffs saw from the previously unbeaten Cowgirls (4-1) was an opponent that runs its offense efficiently, was strong on the boards, goes to the rim often and still was shooting just over 40 percent from beyond the arc.

"We've seen a lot of good things from good teams," said CU senior guard **Chucky Jeffery**. "It's good because in the Pac-12 we'll be seeing a lot of different things from different things... (Wyoming) has some good three-point shooters. They ran a lot of pick-and-pops, which we haven't seen a lot, but we adjusted."

Jeffery's contributions were major; she recorded her 21st career double-double with 21 points and 10 rebounds in what Lappe called "kind of her breakout game so far...she's eased her way back in. It was good to see her play and get into her flow. She was more aggressive and we needed her to be."

The Buffs also got double-figure scoring performances from **Arielle Roberson** (14) and **Jen Reese** (10), with **Lexy Kresl** adding eight.

With the exception of a 39-39 draw on the boards, CU held a statistical advantage in every other category. The Buffs outscored the Cowgirls 34-20 in the paint, 27-9 off of turnovers, 13-6 in second-chance points, 8-0 on fast breaks and 22-12 in bench productivity.

Lappe was particularly pleased with her team committing just 12 turnovers and converting the visitors' 18 errors into 27 points. "We made their turnovers count," Lappe said, adding that her team regained its composure in the second half and turned the ball over only five times.

Although far from perfect, the Buffs led most of the first half and were up 31-26 at intermission. They didn't shoot exceptionally well (40.6 percent) from the field, but their defense on the Cowgirls compensated for that.

"We came out a little slow," Jeffery said. "We were just not hitting our shots, not recognizing to get the ball inside. After we figured it out, we got it going."

Wyoming went almost 5 minutes between field goals to open the game and at the 5-minute mark, the Cowgirls had hit only two field goals and trailed 10-4. But the Buffs encountered their own cold spell shortly thereafter and the visitors quickly caught up.

The Cowgirls tied the score at 15-15 on a three-pointer by Kaitlyn Mileto, who scored a team-high 16 points, then went up 18-15 - their first lead since 2-0 - on another trey by Ashley Sickles. But a 9-4 run to close out the half gave the Buffs their five-point advantage at intermission.

The Cowgirls took a pair of three-point leads early in the second half before the Buffs settled down and took control with their 9-0 run. Trailing 43-42, CU got a three-pointer from Kresl, a conventional three-point play from Roberson and a three-ball from Brittany Wilson to go up 51-43 with 11:55 to play.

When that 9-0 spurt extended to 15-4, the Buffs were in command. Wyoming pulled as close as four points a couple of minutes later, but never threatened again. CU increased its lead to as many as 14 points in the final 7 minutes.

Teams' identities change yearly, and Lappe said this CU team's second-half focus is much better than last. "We've come out with the right focus in the second half and we have some confidence in us. I think that is where your experience comes into play. We have experienced players on the floor that have been in those situations, and they've been able to provide whatever the needs, at whatever point. I think you definitely saw that tonight."

BOULDER - More challenging times are ahead for the Colorado women's basketball team, but the Buffaloes appear to be steeling themselves for whatever comes their way.

Unbeaten CU (7-0) rolled past Colorado State 72-46 on Wednesday night in the first game of a women's/men's doubleheader at the Coors Events Center.

All things considered, it was a night for fun and frolic - but next week promises to bring the degree of difficulty to a higher level. The Buffs are off until Tuesday (7 p.m.) when they travel to the University of Denver (3-3), then host No. 8 Louisville (8-1) on Friday (7 p.m.) in their most significant challenge to date.

CU took command Wednesday night with an 18-4 first half run, led 37-17 at halftime and cruised past CSU (2-5) in the final 20 minutes. Buffs coach Linda Lappe used 12 players and nine of them scored, topped by Brittany Wilson's 13. Jen Reese and Jamee Swan contributed 11 each and Arielle Roberson added 10. CU's bench outscored CSU's 33-5.

"Sometimes these games are a little bit tough to play but I felt like we got better in that game at some different things and that's what I like about our team," Lappe said. "For us, it's all about us right now and us continuing to get better. It's about us continuing to get better at some things or multiple things. I thought our players played hard and rebounded very, very well in this game."

Momentum gained from the Buffs' 69-62 comeback weekend win at Illinois obviously carried into mid-week. CU outscored CSU 59-26, outscored the visitors 30-18 in the paint and had 20 second-chance points to CSU's two.

The Buffs, who won 64-55 last season in Fort Collins, trailed once in the first half (2-0), but thereafter took control and led by 20 (37-17) at intermission. Following that two-point deficit, CU surged past CSU the 18-4 over the next 7 minutes to take a 16-point advantage (22-6) and never slowed down.

"We felt like we had to come out early, it's CSU, it's our rivalry game," Wilson said. "If we didn't punch them in the mouth we knew they would try to punch us first. Who doesn't get up for their rivalry game? We knew we had to come out strong in the beginning."

During that spurt, Brittany Wilson scored eight of her 10 first-half points, while Reese added five. At the 11:45 mark, the Buffs were shooting 53.3 percent (8-for-15) from the field while holding the Rams to 21.4 percent (3-for-14).

"Going in we knew we had to have an inside presence," Reese said. "No matter if they were sagging in, double-teaming and stuff like that we had kick-outs, I think everyone in the post did a great job on either making the shot or seeing the open player."

After CU's opening run to go ahead by 16, CSU never got closer than 11 points for the rest of the half. And the Buffs kept pouring it on, leading by 20 twice before the halftime buzzer.

Roberson, a three-time recipient of the Pac-12 Conference freshman of the week award in the season's first four weeks, added eight points to the Buffs' half-time total. She entered the game with an 18.5 average.

CU's second-half goal likely was to not lose interest and allow a CSU run. Mission accomplished. A "B-Wif" three-pointer and a Rachel Hargis layup on a nice fast break assist from Chucky Jeffery fashioned a 25-point lead (42-17) before the second half was 2 minutes old.

Less than 8 minutes later, after trays on consecutive possessions by freshman Lauren Huggins, senior Meagan Malcolm-Peck and another by Huggins, the Buffs had pushed ahead by 30 (61-31).

The second half was only half done, but it was time for the Rams to say goodnight.

DENVER - The unbeaten University of Colorado women's basketball team shook off a lethargic start, took control with an 8-0 run and never looked back in dispatching the University of Denver 83-63 here Tuesday night.

Now the Buffaloes can look ahead. Finally, they can focus on their biggest non-conference game - a Friday night date with No. 8 Louisville at the Coors Events Center. The Cardinals are 9-1, with their lone loss by one point (48-47) to archrival Kentucky.

"We feel really good with where we're at," CU coach Linda Lappe said of her team's 8-0 start. "We've seen a little of everything. Obviously Louisville will present a few different things we haven't seen and a different level of talent. But we're excited for it; it should be a really fun game. Hopefully we can get a crowd there. Our players have really been looking forward to this for a long time."

In winning for the only second time in Denver against the Pioneers, the Buffs got a season-high 19 points from Brittany Wilson and 14 points and 11 rebounds from Chucky Jeffery. Leading scorer Arielle Roberson, who entered the game with a 17.3-point average, added 11.

Morgan Van Riper-Rose kept the Pioneers close with 13 first-half points. She finished with a career-high 28.

DU defeated CU 70-69 in their most recent Magness Arena matchup on Nov. 16, 2010. The Buffs lead the series 6-2 and won for the third time this season against a Front Range opponent. Before making the trip down I-25 South, CU had beaten Wyoming (68-59) and Colorado State (72-46) in Boulder.

Tuesday's first half produced 11 lead changes, but they all occurred in the first 10 minutes. DU (4-5) took advantage of CU's sluggish start to go ahead by as many as five points (13-8) before the visitors roused themselves.

"It shouldn't have been like that, because it shows that we weren't ready," Jeffery said. "It should be flipped because (Louisville) was on our minds. We have to be prepared."

If it took a little longer for the Buffs to focus, once they got there they took command and made an 18-17 deficit their last of the game. They went on an 8-0 run, getting baskets from Jamee Swan, Roberson (her first of the game), Jeffery and Brittany Wilson on a fast-break assist from Jeffery to go up 25-18 at 6:22 before intermission.

From there until the halftime buzzer, CU increased its lead to 10 on two occasions and led 37-27 at the break. CU outscored DU 9-1 to open the second half and surge ahead 46-28. The Buffs didn't allow the Pioneers their first field goal of the last 20 minutes until the 14:07 mark.

A minute later, CU went up by 23 and wouldn't allow DU within 15 points the rest of the night. The Buffs led by as many as 26 points in the final 4 minutes.

Lappe said the surge to open the final 20 minutes was "the key to the game... we got kick started toward the end of the first half and I really enjoyed how we came out of halftime."

She also enjoyed her team getting 50 rebounds for a second consecutive game. The Buffs out-boarded the Pioneers 50-28.

"That's probably the best thing I can say about our team tonight," Lappe noted. "We don't take that lightly. Rebounding takes a lot of heart, character and effort. I really liked how our posts crashed the offensive glass and we were constantly trying to get second- and third-chance points. And we were doing a great job keeping them off the glass. We're extremely happy with our rebounding."

CU outscored DU 32-12 in the paint and got 13 second-chance points to the Pioneers' three. The Buffs committed 13 turnovers and scored 19 points off of the home team's 19 errors. And CU's bench outscored DU's 30-12.

When the Buffs finally got engaged, the night turned easy. But Lappe and her players know a slow start on Friday night doom them. The ante goes up against Louisville.

BOULDER – Competing as a member of the Top 25 is a relatively new experience for the Colorado women's basketball team – and that inexperience might have showed early on Saturday afternoon.

But by the end of the first half, the No. 25 Buffaloes had settled in and were playing the part of a nationally ranked team. Using a 23-3 run to close the first 20 minutes, CU took full control and crushed Utah Valley 81-45 at the Coors Events Center.

The win was the 700th in the women's program's history and kept the Buffs unbeaten (10-0) this season. It was their 23rd straight victory in regular-season non-conference games and gave them a 30-3 non-conference record under third-year coach **Linda Lappe**.

"It's exciting to know where we are at this point," Lappe said. "It's good to go into a break without a loss...there haven't been a lot of upsets in the last week or so; we wanted to make sure that wasn't us."

The Buffs, she said, finally "got a feel for the game" after their shaky start and eventually "did nice things in spurts" – such as hitting the open player on offense and showing intensity on defense.

The gnarly defense was particularly apparent in the first half; Sammie Jensen, Utah Valley's leading scorer (17.7 average) and the Great West Conference player of the year in 2011-12, was held scoreless in the first 20 minutes and finished the game with nine points.

Benefiting from finding open spots and getting crisp passes from her teammates, CU's **Jen Reese** led all scorers with a career-high 16 points. She got help from **Chucky Jeffery** (12), **Brittany Wilson** (11) and **Arielle Roberson** (10).

The Buffs never trailed, but despite jumping to a 7-0 lead they didn't open like a Top 25 team. Jeffery said the Buffs were so intent on not letting their first national ranking since 2008 affect their play that it probably did to start the game.

"We have little distractions here and there and we were able to pull through," she said. "So that was a good thing."

The Wolverines caused some difficulties with their matchup zone defense and switching man-to-man. "Going in, we were ready but we were a little frantic in the beginning," said Reese, who hit six of her 10 field goal attempts and was four-of-five from the free throw line. "We just had to calm down. We knew they would switch (defensively), so it was more of us just hurting ourselves."

But the Buffs' defense also presented big problems for the Wolverines. Lappe said her team's "D" kept us in the game...we were very solid. We wanted to hold them to 45 points and we did that. It just took a little time for our offense to catch fire and we did that with transition baskets."

Four consecutive free throws by Reese with 8:03 left before intermission opened a seven-point lead (18-11). And with that, the Buffs were off and running. Finishing the half with its 23-3 run, CU led 37-14 at intermission.

The Buffs didn't ease off in the second half, going up by 31 (59-28) on a three-pointer by Wilson with 12:55 remaining, then getting a layup by **Rachel Hargis** (nine points, seven rebounds) to extend the lead to 33 (61-28) about 40 seconds later. They led by as many as 36 twice in the final 4:30.

Tina Doughty led Utah Valley (4-10) with 13 points and was the only Wolverines player in double figures. Utah Valley shot only 16.7 percent (4-for-24) from the field in the first half and finished the game at 30.6 percent (15-of-49).

Meanwhile, once the Buffs got untracked, they hit 15 of their 34 first-half field goal attempts (44.1 percent) and were at 47.9 percent (34-of-71) for the afternoon. CU outscored Utah Valley 48-20 in the paint and 16-4 on fast breaks. The Buffs converted 16 Wolverines turnovers into 20 points, committed a season-low six turnovers themselves, and outbounded the visitors 47-30.

BOULDER – Non-conference play is in the rearview mirror, perennial power Stanford is in the headlines. The Colorado women's basketball team contends it is primed and pumped to open work next week in the Pac-12 Conference, and CU sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl** says the Pac-12 had best be primed and pumped for the Buffaloes.

On Saturday, Kresl was that and more - the more being looser, more confident on offense and devilish on defense. She tied a career-high with 20 points, hitting all five of her three-point attempts and tying a school record as No. 23 CU rolled past New Mexico 84-39 at the Coors Events Center.

The victory pushed the Buffs to 11-0 in non-conference play for the second consecutive season and gave third-year coach **Linda Lappe** her 100th career win. Lappe is 100-66 overall and 50-30 at CU.

Never mind the possible implications for the Buffs; Lappe says her team is "as prepared as we can be" to begin conference play. "I can't think of many things we're not prepared for...we haven't faced a ton adversity, but we have veteran players who have. We've been tested at home, on the road. We feel confident in any venue. But it's all about us and what we do, executing what we do...if we play with the intensity and composure we did tonight then I feel confident we're ready for the conference season."

UNM coach **Yvonne Sanchez**, who saw her team drop to 8-5, said CU "took everything away from us and I credit them immensely. They're well-coached and they had a great game plan. We didn't execute well, but a lot of that has to do with what (CU) did to us."

And that damage was considerable. With Kresl primarily holding Lobos leading scorer **Caroline Dublin** (12.9 ppg) to five first-half points (seven total), the Buffs raced to a 39-21 halftime lead and never looked back.

CU's pace or intensity didn't slow in the second 20 minutes either. The Buffs opened the last half with a 17-2 run - Kresl scored eight in that spurt - and pushed ahead 56-23. Keeping the pedal firmly down, CU led by as many as 47.

Also in double figures were redshirt freshman **Arielle Roberson** (18), senior **Chucky Jeffery** (11) and sophomore **Jen Reese** (10). Jeffery flirted with the third triple-double of her career. In 27 minutes she finished with eight assists and eight rebounds to go with her 11 points.

The Buffs shot 50.8 percent for the game (32-of-63) and held the Lobos to 30.2 percent (16-of-53). CU outbounded the visitors 42-31, owned a 40-16 advantage in the paint and converted 23 UNM turnovers into 28 points. The Buffs committed 13 turnovers, but the Lobos got only nine points from those errors. And off-setting CU's miscues were a season-high 18 steals.

Kresl, who had totaled 20 points in her previous three games, had 12 at half-time Saturday for a season high. She followed with eight in the Buffs' early second-half run, missing only one of her eight attempts from the field and hitting her only free throw attempt.

"I don't exactly feel like my role this year is to be the leading scorer," she said. "I am more than happy to see my other teammates score and I love passing them the ball. (Saturday) I think I just felt comfortable with my shot. It felt more natural and in rhythm."

Roberson called participating in Lappe's 100th win "definitely positive for us. We got to see we helped her get there. It was a great landmark for all of us... I was just proud to see her get recognized."

Earning her 100th career "W" was "nice," said Lappe. "It's not something you focus on as a coach; you don't ever say, 'I can't wait until I get to 100 wins.'"

Nonetheless, she added, reaching 100 is a tribute to the players, assistant coaches and staff members who have had hands in the milestone. "I obviously hope there are a lot more hundreds after this one, but it is good and I'm happy that our team can experience success...we're going in the right direction, I think."

BOULDER - The No. 20 Colorado women's basketball team rallied but couldn't catch California Sunday afternoon at the Coors Events Center, falling 53-49 to the No. 7 Bears.

Coming off a 57-40 loss on Friday night to No. 4 Stanford, CU dropped to 11-2 overall and 0-2 in the Pac-12 Conference. Cal improved to 12-1 and 2-0.

Chucky Jeffery (13) and **Arielle Roberson** (11) were the only two Buffs players in double figures. The Bears were led by Brittany Boyd's 15 points.

Sunday's first half immediately took on a defensive flavor and didn't change; the score was tied 24-24 at intermission. But for the Buffs, that was an improvement over their first-half production (14) against Stanford on Friday night.

On Sunday afternoon, neither CU nor California could manage more than a four-point advantage in the first 20 minutes. Both teams survived frigid stretches - the Buffs' covering 7:31 and producing just three points, while the Bears' dry spell went for 8:52 and yielded four points.

Not surprisingly, neither team had a player in double figures for the half, with **Lexy Kresl's** six points pacing the Buffs and Boyd's nine topping the Bears. Three of Cal's four leading scorers - seniors Layshia Clarendon and Talia Caldwell and junior Jennifer Brandon - were held scoreless in the first half. CU shot only 32 percent (8-for-25) while Cal checked in at 42.3 percent (11-for-26).

The Buffs got six consecutive points from Jeffery to start the second half. But as in the first half, creating any separation was a problem for both teams until Cal opened a pair of four-point leads.

The second of those disappeared on a free throw by Rachel Hargis at the 11:26 mark and a conventional three-point play by Roberson just under a minute later that tied the score at 38-38.

Three free throws by Boyd and Clarendon sent the Bears ahead 41-38 with 9:03 to play, and during the previous 9 minutes the Buffs were suffering through another frigid shooting spell (2-for-15).

Cal increased its lead to five (43-38) on a baseline jumper by Eliza Pierre with 7:35 to play. And when Caldwell hit one of two free throws with 6:59 remaining, the Buffs faced a six-point deficit (44-38).

A short jumper in the lane by Clarendon put Cal up 46-38, and with 6 minutes left Lappe called a timeout as her team's offensive malaise (2-for-17 over an 11:46 span) continued.

Jen Reese finally snapped the dry spell with a turnaround jumper from the right baseline (46-40) and Roberson followed with her second trey of the game to cut Cal's lead to 46-43 at the 4:41 mark.

But one of two foul shots by Boyd and a put-back by Reshanda Gray on Boyd's second miss sent the Bears back ahead by six (49-43), and one of two free throws by Clarendon made the Buffs' deficit seven (50-43).

Cal's eight-point lead (51-43) returned when Caldwell hit the first of two foul shots at the 2:53 mark - and time was slipping away for CU. A Jeffery basket with 1:59 left brought the Buffs to 51-45. Laysups by Jeffery and Brittany Wilson pulled them to 51-49 with 16.7 remaining.

Clarendon was fouled by "B-Wif" on the inbounds pass, and with 15.6 seconds showing Clarendon missed both shots. Jeffery and Caldwell battled for the second miss rebound and a tie ball was called. With 13.2 seconds left, the possession arrow favored Cal.

When inbounds pass was made, Clarendon was fouled again - this time by Hargis - and this time she made one of two to give the Bears a 52-49 edge with 10.3 seconds to play.

Lappe called time out, drew up a play - but a shot was never taken. Jeffery turned it over a drive to the basket and Cal got possession. Fouled with 4.5 seconds showing, Boyd missed both free throws but Afure Jemerigbe controlled the rebound.

She hit one of two free throws, giving the Bears a four-point lead and the win.

BOULDER - Linda Lappe's third Colorado women's basketball team is more balanced than her first two, but after a pair of Pac-12 Conference losses she wisely recognized that a stronger dose of **Chucky Jeffery** might be just as beneficial as balance.

After dropping consecutive home games to No. 4 Stanford and No. 7 California, Lappe and Jeffery talked - and on Tuesday night Jeffery responded. The senior point guard scored a season-high 28 points and collected 12 rebounds to lead No. 23 CU to its first Pac-12 win of the season, 67-57 over Utah at the Coors Events Center.

"Chucky came out a lot more aggressive," Lappe said. "She was tentative against Cal and Stanford...we needed more from her."

More is what Jeffery delivered, helping key a 20-3 second-half run as the Buffaloes (12-2, 1-2) finally pulled away from the uncooperative Utes (9-5, 0-3).

CU also was lights out from the free throw line, hitting 22 of 26 in the second half and 23 of 28 for the game. The Buffs' final nine points came from the foul line, and they sealed the win by sinking five of six free throws in the final 33 seconds.

Registering her 23rd career double-double (third this season), it was the type of trademark performance expected of Jeffery in her first three CU seasons. "And we still need that from her," Lappe said. "She knew when we needed to score...there are times when we need her to step up; she understands big possessions."

It wasn't as if Jeffery was completely unproductive against Stanford (17 points) and Cal (13). But she agreed with her coach about playing tentative to open Pac-12 play: "After the past two games, I watched film with coach...and I was tentative and wasn't looking to score. She just wanted me to be more aggressive. She told me when I'm more aggressive I make smarter and better decisions to create and help my teammates score as well."

The Buffs only led once in Tuesday's first half, and it took them 19 minutes to finally catch the Utes. They did it by closing the half on a 10-1 run, with eight of the points scored by Jeffery as CU took a 32-31 lead at intermission.

Behind Plouffe's 11 first-half points, Utah led by eight points on two occasions before CU shook itself awake. The Utes' last eight-point advantage (30-22) came on a pair of Wicijowski free throws with 4:42 remaining before the break.

That's when Jeffery went to work, getting eight of her 14 first-half points in the final 41.2 minutes. The Buffs' other basket was scored by freshman Jamee Swan, who finished with a career-high 11 boards and eight points in 22 minutes and was a catalyst in CU catching up in the first half, said Lappe: "She kept us in the game for a lot of the first half."

The Buffs' 32 first-half points gave them a nice start toward finally reaching 50 in their third conference home game. They managed only 40 and 49 in the two previous losses. But that wasn't a second-half focal point for the Buffs: scoring 49 and getting a one-point win would have been fine. They opened the second half with a basket by Swan, taking their largest lead (34-31) of the night to that point.

Plouffe answered for Utah (34-33), then got a trey by Rachel Messer to go up 36-34. Meagan Malcolm-Peck's layup tied the score at 36-36 before a 9-2 Utes run opened a 45-38 advantage for the visitors with just under 13 minutes to play.

It was the Buffs' turn to respond, and they did with an 11-1 run, with seven of the points made at the free throw line. The final pair by Brittany Wilson put CU up 49-46 with 8:49 left.

Jeffery took it from there. After hitting a short jumper, she got a steal at the other end, was fouled and hit two free throws for a 55-48 Buffs lead. And when the Utes misfired on their next possession, Jeffery made them pay with a three-pointer from the top of the key that completed CU's 20-3 surge and opened a 10-point lead (58-48) with 5:58 remaining.

The Utes pulled to within five points (62-57) when Plouffe made one of three free throws with 36.1 seconds to play. But the Buffs pulled away at the free throw line, hitting five of six free throws to pocket their first Pac-12 win.

BOULDER - Thanks to a strong second-half surge, the Colorado women's basketball team secured a 57-43 Pac-12 Conference win over Arizona State Friday night at the Coors Events Center.

Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** earned her 24th career double-double and her fourth of the season with 19 points and 16 rebounds. Her rebound total was also a team season-high.

Redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** earned a career-high 11 rebounds and contributed seven points of her own. Overall, Colorado out-rebounded Arizona State 47-31.

"Like any Pac-12 game, it was very physical down there," Roberson said. "It's always a war, it's always a battle ... But we knew we had to box out and then go get the rebounds, not just let them try to come to us."

Forward **Jen Reese** and guard **Lexy Kresl**, both sophomores, added eight points each.

Strong defense from both teams kept the score and shooting percentages low, as Colorado shot just 37.8 percent from the field but held the Sun Devils to 23.6 percent.

One of the goals for Colorado was to keep ASU players from scoring around the rim. The Buffs executed that game plan well, forcing the Sun Devils to shoot 8-for-26 from beyond the arc.

"It was a very solid night defensively for us," said Colorado head coach **Linda Lappe**. "Knowing how Arizona State likes to score, they score a lot of baskets and layups at the rim, so one of our goals was to give up less than 10 layups. I think we gave them only a couple of wide-open layups."

The Buffs and the Sun Devils looked evenly matched in the first half as the lead changed seven lead times, but two three-pointers by Arizona State's Jada Blackwell and Haley Videckis put the Sun Devils up 26-22 at the half. Neither team shot particularly well in the first half, as CU was 32.1 percent from the field and ASU was 36.0.

After intermission, though, the Buffs found the energy they had been lacking. With 14:30 remaining, Colorado went on a 13-0 run capped by a Kresl three-pointer to go up 12 (44-32).

"We have to start fast and finish strong, that's our motto. We say that before every game," Jeffery said. "We just kept going. Once you attack them, you keep them on their heels a little bit."

The Buffs held onto the momentum from that point on, gaining their largest lead of the game, 17, on a Jeffery free throw with less than a minute remaining.

"Even when they started hitting some outside shots, we stayed steady," Lappe said. "We didn't panic, and I thought that allowed us to pull away in the second half."

Jeffery said part of what allowed the Buffs to pull away in the second half was recognizing ASU's key scorers and guarding them with more intensity. Videckis, who was the Sun Devils' leading scorer in the first half with 11 points, was shut out in the second half.

"I thought we did a much better job on (Videckis) in the second half, she hurt us a lot in the first half," Lappe said. "We barred down and knew where she was. Arielle (Roberson) got the assignment on her for a large part. Jen (Reese) guarded her for a little while, and our guards understood where she was in the second half as well."

The Buffs also showed their strength off the bench once again, as three non-starters — Reese, sophomore **Jasmine Sborov** and junior **Ashley Wilson** — scored a combined 14 points on the night.

With the win, Colorado improves to 14-2 overall and 3-2 in the Pac-12. The Sun Devils fall to 10-7 overall and 2-3 in conference play.

BOULDER - The Colorado women's basketball team executed its game plan in every category Sunday afternoon to earn a decisive 79-36 win over Arizona at the Coors Events Center.

It was the Buffs' fourth straight Pac-12 Conference win, with the 43-point margin of victory the eighth-largest in CU history in conference play.

"Obviously I'm really happy with how that game turned out," said CU head coach **Linda Lappe**. "We had very few mental or physical errors, which was fun to see. It's very rare that you see both of those things happen on the same night."

Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery**'s performance (11 points, five rebounds and six assists) made her the first player in school history to earn 1,400 points, 800 rebounds and 400 assists in her career.

The Buffs started strong over the Wildcats, going on a 7-0 run to start the game and building that lead for the rest of the half. CU shot 56.7 percent from the field and 66.7 percent from beyond the arc in the first half and held Arizona to 23.3 from the field and 14.3 from three-point range.

By intermission, Colorado was up 43-15, its largest halftime lead in conference play since leading Kansas 42-14 in February 2003. Hitting a jumper with nine seconds remaining in the half, freshman guard **Kylesha Weston** became the ninth player to score for CU in the first 20 minutes.

CU held onto that momentum for the rest of the game, going up by 46, the largest lead of the game, on a Weston basket with four minutes to go.

But even with such a decisive lead, the Buffs never lost energy or focus.

"When you're on a roll, you just continue staying on a roll," said redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson**, who scored a game-high 12 points on her 20th birthday. "You've got to continue to stay focused. In the timeouts, coach would say, 'Stay focused, stay solid,' and I think that helped."

By the final buzzer, CU had a 43-point lead over the Wildcats and had played nearly its entire bench, including walk-on guard **Alexus Atchley** in the final minutes. Weston, who was recruited to the team as a true point guard, gained a valuable 17 minutes of playing time at that position.

Four CU players — Roberson, Jeffery, sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl** and freshman forward **Jamee Swan** — scored in double figures, while five other CU players added at least six points.

"We have a lot of players that can score, and you could see that (Sunday)," Lappe said. "I thought our bench played great. From the very first second when the first one came in, we didn't slow down at all. In fact, we pushed the tempo. . . . I think everybody that came off the bench was ready, brought a lot of energy, and there was no disruption of flow, so you have to credit our players for that."

All-conference guard Davellyn Whyte led the Wildcats in scoring with 11, nine of which were in the first half. Lappe said junior guard **Brittany Wilson** stepped up her defense on Whyte to shut her down in the second half.

"I thought Brittany did a really good job on her, staying down on her face," Lappe said. "Davellyn Whyte is a very talented player, has some great offensive skills, and I thought Brittany stepped up to the challenge."

Overall, CU shot 50 percent from the field and held Arizona to just 25 percent. The Buffs also out-rebounded the visitors 51-26, with Swan and junior guard **Ashley Wilson** recording eight boards each.

And while the Buffs' combined 51 rebounds, 21 assists and 79 points are something to be proud of, Kresl said Sunday afternoon wasn't about the stats.

"We all played together," Kresl said. "It was definitely a team effort and not one person was trying to get their points or steals or anything. It wasn't about statistics, it was all about the win and trying to play together."

Colorado improves to 15-2 overall and 4-2 in Pac-12 play; its best start since the 2003-04 NCAA Tournament team began its season 18-2. With the loss, Arizona falls to 11-6, 3-3.

STANFORD, Calif. - The Colorado women's basketball team encountered another in-game lapse on Sunday against Stanford, rallied from it, but couldn't finish its comeback and fell 69-56 to the No. 6 Cardinal at Maples Pavilion.

The No. 20 Buffaloes held their own for most of the first half, staying within single digits of the Cardinal by halftime (35-26). That gap could've been smaller, however, had the Buffs not given up 10 first-half turnovers and allowed the Cardinal to go on a 9-3 run to cap the first half.

Colorado didn't regain its momentum until midway through the second half, and with 14:25 remaining, Stanford had already built a 21-point lead from which CU could not recover. That slow second-half start, CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said, was reminiscent of another scoring drought the Buffs had the last time they played Stanford - a 57-40 loss on Jan. 4.

"In both games that we've played these guys, we've had a stretch where we have not played very well, and we've just given them way too many opportunities," Lappe said. "We weren't making them work to get that 21-point lead, and that's probably the most disappointing thing, in both games. Last time it was at the beginning of the game, this time it was right before half into the second half."

With the loss, the Buffaloes drop to 15-4 overall and 4-4 in Pac-12 Conference play, while Stanford improves to 18-2 and 7-1 in the Pac-12.

The two teams were ranked No. 1 and 2 in the conference in scoring defense entering the game, with the Buffs holding opponents to 52.7 points per game and the Cardinal 52.9. On Sunday, though, Stanford's defense prevailed, forcing 18 Colorado turnovers.

Despite its ineffective opening to the second half, CU had nearly 15 minutes to play and wasn't about to give up. The Buffs brought themselves back into contention with a 12-0 run, trimming the score to 51-42 with 10:45 remaining. The Cardinal's lead eventually shrunk to just seven (53-46) as **Brittany Wilson** hit a three with eight minutes on the clock.

But every time Colorado brought the energy, Stanford responded. With 6:10 remaining, Stanford made what turned out to be a five-point play: forward Joslyn Tinkle hit a three-pointer, and missed her "and-1" shot, which forward Chiney Ogwumike rebounded for a layup.

It was the spark the Cardinal needed to bring the game home. "We didn't close out with our high hands, we run into the shooter and then we don't box out on the free throw, and that was a huge deal at that point in the game," Lappe said. "It gave them a lot of momentum."

Though the Buffs kept fighting, they would never get closer than 10 points. Lappe said that while Stanford brought a high level of play to the game, many of the Buffs' mistakes were of their own creation.

"We didn't do nearly enough that it was going to take to win tonight," Lappe said, "and I felt like we controlled a lot of that."

But junior guard **Ashley Wilson**, who scored five of her seven points during CU's second-half comeback attempt, said her team had to feel that a win was still possible until the final buzzer.

"It's just never giving up. No matter what position we're in, we have to fight, fight 'till when the horn goes off," Wilson said. "We've just got to be ready to bounce back. That's all we can do every single time is bounce back and not let it defeat us."

Freshman forward **Jamee Swan** led Colorado in scoring with 14 points off the bench, while senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** added 13. Jeffery and redshirt freshman forward Arielle Roberson grabbed a team-high seven boards each, helping CU to out-rebound the Cardinal 39-33.

Stanford's Ogwumike led all scorers with 20, adding 12 rebounds to earn her 15th double-double of the season. Three other Stanford players - Tinkle, guard Toni Kokenis and guard Amber Orange - also scored in double figures, as the Cardinal hit 49.1 percent from the field compared to CU's 36.1 percent.

LOS ANGELES - The No. 22 Colorado women's basketball team had an opportunity on Friday night to gain a win over a ranked Pac-12 Conference opponent for the first time this season - but the Buffs couldn't capitalize.

Shooting just 20 percent in the first half and 28.6 percent overall, CU fell to No. 18 UCLA 62-46 at Pauley Pavilion.

It was the Buffs' third straight road game against a ranked opponent, having fallen to then-No. 7 California and then-No. 4 Stanford last weekend. Now 4-5 in the Pac-12 and 15-5 overall, CU has just one day to regroup before taking on Southern California Sunday at 10 a.m. MST.

Colorado was No. 1 in the conference in scoring defense going into Friday's matchup, holding opponents to an average of 52.1 points per game - but UCLA's forceful offense was too much for the Buffs to handle.

The Bruins (16-4, 7-2) shot 55.5 percent from the field, improving from 44 percent in the first half to 70 in the second. Senior guard/forward Markel Walker led the Bruins with 17 points, and senior forward Alyssia Brewer added 10.

Junior guard **Brittany Wilson** and senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** led CU in scoring with 12 and 11, respectively. The Buffs, however, didn't show their usual scoring depth, with all non-starters combined scoring just nine points.

Rebounding, though, was perhaps Colorado's biggest struggle. The Buffs were outrebounded 25-16 at the half and 44-29 on the night. Four Bruins recorded at least six rebounds, while only one CU player had more than four.

The Buffs did force 29 turnovers while only committing 17. CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said that while that may have been the only positive on the stat sheet for her team, the inability to capitalize off of those turnovers was costly for the Buffs.

"They gave us plenty of opportunities," Lappe said. "Obviously they weren't really ever threatened by us, and so perhaps they gave away some passes that they wouldn't have if the game had been closer."
 Lappe said her team was capable of much more than it showed Friday night, especially on the defensive end.

"We didn't have any mental toughness tonight," Lappe said. "I mean, we were really a shell of ourselves. We didn't rebound, we didn't really play defense, we didn't play together."
 CU started with a bang in the first half, going up six on a **Lexy Kresl** bucket with 16:32 remaining. When UCLA's Walker responded with a 6-0 run of her own, though, the Buffs were unable to recover. In the 10 minutes following Walker's run, Colorado scored just three points, allowing the Bruin's lead to grow to 14 with five minutes left in the half.

By intermission, CU had recorded only 15 points to UCLA's 29. The Buffs found some energy with a 6-2 run at the start of the second half, even closing the Bruins' lead to 11 with 14:43 remaining.

Ultimately, though, an inconsistent CU offense paired with UCLA's dominance on the boards prevented the Buffs from a successful comeback.
 With 6:41 on the clock, UCLA's lead had grown to 19 - and while Colorado would not stop fighting, the shots simply didn't fall.

"We were off the entire night," Lappe said. "We couldn't make layups. We weren't necessarily turning the ball over a ton, but we just couldn't get stops. We were on our heels the entire night. When we did get a stop, they'd get an offensive rebound put-back, or they'd get to the free throw line because we'd bail them out. There are so many things to point to that I can't even name just one."
 "We've just got to get back to the drawing board, we've got to figure out how to get ready for the next game," Lappe said. "Play like we can play, play with a sense of confidence, understand what we're trying to do. We've got to play together. We just have to get back to doing the things that we were doing to win so many games that we seemed to not want to do tonight."

BOULDER - Colorado senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** recorded her 1,500th career point and 26th career double-double on Friday night to lead the CU women to a 61-47 win over Oregon State.

Jeffery, moving into 10th place on the school's career scoring list, led the Buffs with 22 points, added 11 rebounds and a season-high three blocks. CU sophomore forward **Jen Reese** also scored in double figures with 10 points, while redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** added nine.

With the win, CU improves to 17-5 overall, 6-5 in the Pac-12 Conference, while OSU falls to 9-14 and 3-8 in conference play.

It was a long-awaited return to the Coors Events Center for the Buffs, who dropped three of four games in California over the past two weeks. CU lost to Top 25 opponents Stanford, Cal and UCLA but defeated Southern California.

The Buffs wore pink-accented uniforms on Friday night in honor of the annual "Play 4 Kay" game to support breast cancer awareness. Breast cancer survivors were recognized at halftime, and fans were invited to donate to the Boulder Community Hospital Auxiliary's Breast Cancer Fund to aid local cancer patients.

"It was breast cancer week, and coach talked about attacking because that's what the women with breast cancer have to do," said junior guard **Brittany Wilson**, who had a game-high five steals. "They have to attack, they have to fight. So we came down, we attacked, we came after loose balls, and I think that's what forced them into those (24) turnovers."

CU put the heat on the visitors early on, going on a 9-0 run before OSU scored its first basket of the game with 14:09 left in the half.

Wilson said that solid start was crucial for the Buffs, as they were battling a strong defensive team ranked sixth in the nation in blocks at 6.1 per game.

"We knew we had to come out and set a statement if they were going keep coming at us," Wilson said, "and you can't give a team like that confidence."

The Beavers answered with four three-pointers in five minutes to make it 21-16 with six minutes remaining in the first half. But CU was opportunistic at the free throw line (78.6 percent) and maintained its five-point lead (28-23) at the break.

"Oregon State is a good team, they hustle and they scrap the entire game," Jeffery said. "They weren't going away, so we knew we had to go on a run and we had to get it up a little bit ... that was huge for us to get this win."

The second half began in a similar fashion to the first as the Buffs went on a 7-0 run with five straight points by Jeffery and two made free throws by Roberson. This time, though, the momentum stuck.

Colorado built its largest lead of the game - 15 points - with eight minutes to play. From there, the Beavers would not pull closer than eight.

Shooting 7-of-10 free throws to end the game, the Buffs widened the gap back to 14 and closed out the visitors, who were led by freshman guard Jamie Weisner with 22 points and seven rebounds. She was the only OSU player with more than seven points.

"Weisner's tough," said CU head coach **Linda Lappe**. "She plays so hard, she's physical, she never quits. She's a tough matchup for anybody in the league, so you've got to give her a lot of credit. She kept them in the game."

Colorado returns to the Coors Events Center Sunday at 1:30 p.m. to take on Oregon. After falling to Utah 67-47 Friday night, the Ducks are ranked last in the Pac-12 at 1-10.

In fact, the Buffs have just one opponent remaining (Washington) in the regular season that is currently ranked higher in the conference standings.

Wilson, however, said her team won't get comfortable just yet.

"Being in the Pac-12, you never know what team is going to come out," Wilson said. "You have to play every team and respect them. This is a bottom-to-top hard conference to play, and if you give a team confidence, they'll keep shooting and keep coming back at you. You don't want to relax too much."

BOULDER - Four players scored in double figures Sunday afternoon to lead the No. 21/25 Colorado women's basketball team to an 84-59 Pac-12 Conference romp past Oregon at the Coors Events Center.

With the win, Colorado improves to 18-5 overall and 7-5 in the Pac-12. CU's seven conference wins to date are more than the team recorded in total last season (6-12). The Buffs had not won seven or more conference matchups in a season since finishing the 2004 Big 12 schedule at 11-5.

Junior guard **Brittany Wilson** led CU with 16 points, while senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** added 15 points and 15 rebounds. Jeffery's totals marked her 27th career double-double and just the fourth time she has recorded 15 of each.

"To be able to score just as much as you rebound, that's pretty amazing," sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl** said of Jeffery's performance. Kresl and junior center **Rachel Hargis** added 12 points and 10, respectively, while four other players scored at least six.

Hargis said her team prepared specifically to face Oregon's zone defense, something the Buffs haven't seen much from opponents this season.

"Coach talked to us about moving the ball well, just keeping it moving and not holding the ball as much," Hargis said. "Playing a zone you don't really expect to score that much inside, but coach kept talking to us about attacking and cutting to open areas, and that's what I focused on."

Colorado started the first half slow, allowing Oregon to go on a 10-3 run in the first 3:15 and record three blocks in the first five minutes.

"I didn't think we were being very aggressive, we were letting them score however they wanted to score with not very many passes," said CU head coach **Linda Lappe**. "We didn't look like we were ready for what they were bringing, so we just needed to take a deep breath and get back out there."

Once the Buffs had regrouped and gotten a chance to assess Oregon's top scorers, they made the necessary adjustments on defense to stop the Ducks' streak.

"We recognized who was going to be scoring and who was going to be shooting," Kresl said. "We definitely tried to pick up the pressure on them more and play them a little bit closer."

And with a more efficient defense came a ramped-up offense, as Jeffery and Wilson hit three consecutive three-pointers to regain a four-point lead with 13:40 left in the half.

Oregon didn't give in easily and even briefly took the lead again with 7:45 on the clock. CU's offense responded with force, though, outscoring Oregon 20-6 in the final 7:20 to enter intermission with a 43-31 advantage.

That momentum more than carried through halftime, as the Buffs went on an immediate 10-0 run to go up 20 (53-33). The Ducks were unable to recover, and with three minutes remaining a Hargis basket put the Buffs up 27 (80-53).

Colorado would maintain that energy until the final buzzer.

"It was a good game, we shared the ball a lot as a team, had 17 assists," Wilson said. "We hit open shots, played great defense, so I think it was a team effort ... I don't think you could ask for anything more."

Eleven Colorado players saw time on the court as some point Sunday, including freshman guard **Kyleesha Weston** and walk-on freshman guard **Alexus Atchley**. Atchley scored her first two career points in the last minute of the game.

"Anytime you can get player experience is important, especially young players," Lappe said. "Especially when you play that tempo, you have to play ten players to stay fresh. We knew it was going to be a fast-paced game today, and everybody who came in just kept that pace going."

CU shot 44.9 percent from the field, recording 17 assists and just 12 turnovers. Meanwhile, the Ducks were held to 38.6 percent from the field and recorded 21 turnovers.

TEMPE, Ariz. - The No. 21 Colorado women's basketball team turned an eight-point first half deficit into an eight-point victory here Sunday afternoon, earning a 71-63 win over Arizona State.

Having won at Arizona 55-42 on Friday, CU celebrated its first road sweep in its brief Pac-12 Conference history.

"That was our goal this weekend, to win two road games in a row," said Colorado head coach **Linda Lappe**. "Good teams are able to win on the road, and we've shown that we can do that."

Sophomore forward **Jen Reese** led the Buffs with a career-high 22 points, six more than her previous high.

The victory was the fifth straight for CU and its 20th this season, pushing the Buffs to 20-5 overall and 9-5 in conference play. The Sun Devils fall to 11-15, 3-11 and are now on a seven-game losing streak.

Both teams scored in surges in the first half, but the Sun Devils had momentum on their side. After ASU scored the first two baskets of the game, CU scored seven straight. But the Sun Devils responded with a 10-0 run of their own, building an eight-point lead with 13:26 left in the half.

Though the Buffs would add another 6-0 run to close the gap to three (23-20) with six minutes remaining, the Sun Devils' offense surged from there. ASU would eventually gain its largest lead of the half - 12 - at the 2:05 mark and enter intermission up 35-27.

CU outrebounded ASU 26-16 in the first half but struggled from the field, shooting less than 30 percent while the Sun Devils shot close to 50. The Buffs also committed eight first-half turnovers which led to 15 Sun Devil points.

Reese said that while the Buffs consider themselves a strong second-half team, they realized they hadn't played their best basketball in the first half and needed to refocus.

"We just had to get more focused," Reese said. "We're always a second-half team, but we've got to be a first-half team as well and play a full 40 minutes. We just had to get our heads in the game, and we did that, we came out and we took it to them."

The Sun Devils still had their momentum for the start of the second half, but with 16:22 on the clock, the Buffs - led by Reese and redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** - turned up the energy.

Roberson hit a career-high three treys in nine minutes as part of an 18-6 run, and the Buffs built a lead (54-49) they wouldn't lose on Roberson's third three-pointer with seven minutes remaining.

After going scoreless in the first half, Roberson surged to finish the game with 16 total points and eight rebounds. In the absence of sophomore guard **Lexy Kresl**, who left the game with a shoulder injury early in the half, Lappe said Roberson stepped up from beyond the arc in surprising fashion.

"You've got to give Arielle a lot of credit because she doesn't work on her three a whole lot in practice," Lappe said. "When Lexy was down, we needed another scoring threat on the outside...she did what our team needed. If that meant changing positions, she was ready to step up and show us her competitive spirit."

Reese's 22 points were both a game and career-high; the sophomore also added eight rebounds and was a perfect 8-of-8 from the free throw line.

"Jen played excellent," Lappe said. "She was good on both ends of the floor, both offense and defense. She was aggressive, scored in a lot of different ways, kept a lot of balls alive by tipping it out to teammates."

Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** was the third CU player in double figures, earning her 28th career double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds.

The Sun Devils had three players reach double figures: forward Janae Fulcher, guard Promise Amukamara and guard Adrianne Thomas scored 14 points apiece.

BOULDER - Early style points were scarce for a Top 25 team, but in late February for the No. 20 Colorado Buffaloes aesthetics don't matter as much as points on the scoreboard and final results.

That's the way Friday night unfolded and at times unraveled at the Coors Events Center. After an unsightly start, the Buffs stayed patient, regained their poise late and finally disposed of Washington State 59-45 for their sixth consecutive win.

Coach **Linda Lappe** said she and the Buffs "were happy to get that win. It was a hard-fought game and you have to give Washington State a lot of credit."

But after watching her team commit 19 of the game's 44 turnovers and shoot only 33.8 percent from the field while trying to solve WSU's match-up zone, Lappe added, "There was no rhythm in that game at all. When you watch basketball, when you coach basketball, when you play basketball, usually there is some rhythm within a game..."

"It was hard to get into a rhythm. Both teams never did, and I told our team after the game that's not a game where you're going to be able to play your best."

Offensively, who could argue? But defensively, the Buffs turned in another near air-tight performance, limiting the Cougars to below 20 percent from the field and forcing 25 turnovers that led to 25 CU points.

WSU was the 11th opponent CU (21-5) has held under 50 points this season, and the Cougars' 11 field goals and 19.6 field goal percentage were both seasonal lows for Buffs opponents. WSU coach June Daugherty recognized CU's 'D' for what it was and has been: "Credit to their defense," she said. "They have been pushing teams in that aspect all season."

Three CU players - **Arielle Roberson** with 17 and **Chucky Jeffery** and **Jen Reese** with 10 each - finished in double figures Friday night. WSU (10-16, 6-9) was led by Lia Galdeira with 12 and Mariah Cooks with 10. Roberson also collected a career-high 13 rebounds, accounting for her first career double-double.

Roberson and the Buffs opened aggressively but couldn't maintain it. Going ahead 21-8 on a conventional three-point play by Roberson, they appeared to have a comfortable first-half lead. Then they went frigid and forgetful, lapsing on the offensive end and allowing the Cougars back into the game.

WSU went on a 10-1 run and cut CU's 13-point lead to four (22-18). The Buffs had opened by hitting six of their first 12 shots, but they closed the half hitting just three of their last 20 attempts - and their final field goal of the half was by Roberson just seven seconds before the buzzer.

Still, despite shooting 28.1 percent from the field, committing 11 turnovers and getting just two points from Jeffery, CU led 26-19 at intermission. Mainly because WSU committed 14 of its turnovers and was limited to 21.9 percent shooting.

Lappe can be forgiven if she was leaning toward destroying the first-half tape. "We refocused at halftime," she said. "To beat that defense, you all have to be on the same page... we did a much better job in the second half."

With 13:30 remaining, the Buffs matched their largest lead of the game - 13 points at 40-27 - on a Jeffery basket. But the Cougars crept back to within six (48-42) with just under six minutes to play.

A Jeffery jumper with 4:48 to play pushed CU ahead 50-42, and a Roberson trey from the top of the key restored the Buffs' double-digit lead (53-42) with 3:30 left. When Roberson followed with a basket in the paint, CU's lead went to 15, and WSU was finished.

Although Roberson said the Buffs' performance "definitely wasn't our best," she added that she never felt CU had lost control of the game. "I can speak for myself; I'm not sure how everyone else felt. But I think the majority of us felt like we could control the game," she said.

"When the game was going downhill, it was our fault. And when we were doing good things, it was us as well. I think, knowing that, we weren't threatened at all. At least I wasn't."

EUGENE, Ore. - The No. 19 Colorado women's basketball team earned its eighth straight win and 23rd of the season with a 60-49 victory over the Oregon Ducks here Friday night.

With the win, the Buffs clinched a first-round bye for the Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament next weekend in Seattle. CU plays on Friday at Key Arena, meeting the winner of Thursday's game matching the No. 5 and No. 12 seeds.

"I think (the bye) gives us more confidence going in," said redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson**, who led CU in scoring Friday night with 16 points. "We'll be rested more than other players will, and we'll have more time to prepare, so it's definitely a great thing."

Colorado head coach **Linda Lappe** said the bye was well-earned, but that she's setting her sights on more than just that accomplishment.

"We've worked really hard for that bye, and eight in a row is something you don't see all the time," Lappe said. "It hasn't always been pretty, but we've come together when we've needed to, we've been tough when we've needed to be tough ... we have bigger goals than just the four-seed."

The last time CU won 23 games in a season, Lappe was a senior on the team (2002-03). That year, the Buffs went 24-8 and ended their season in the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament.

The 2012-12 Buffs may be headed for a similar destiny at 23-5 overall and 12-5 in the Pac-12. First, though, they're taking care of business in the final weekend of the regular season, starting with Friday's rout in Eugene.

It was a messy win for CU, but a win nonetheless. The Buffs forced 21 Oregon turnovers and committed seven, but shot just 34.8 percent from the field compared to the Ducks' 37.5.

"We never really got into a flow offensively," Lappe said. "We couldn't convert those turnovers into baskets very often, which hurt us, and we just didn't get the shot that we wanted to...when you shoot 34 percent that's not very good. So to be able to win, that's good."

While Colorado's defense came to play from the start, its offense occasionally struggled to capitalize off of Oregon turnovers. However, it did convert the Ducks' 21 errors into 20 points. Though the Buffs committed just five turnovers compared to the Ducks' 13 in the first half, CU only had a three-point advantage at intermission.

The game remained tight in the second half until the 12:25 mark, when freshman guard **Kyleesha Weston** lit the spark that would ignite CU's offense.

Weston hit a three-pointer, then grabbed a steal on the next possession. Roberson then continued the run with another three at 12:07 to put the Buffs up 36-29.

"It looked a little dead out there," Weston said. "I was told that I needed to pick up the energy. That's when I'm at my best, when I have a lot of energy, so I felt like I could spark the team."

Lappe said Weston's determination off the bench was a sign of maturity for such a young player.

"That stretch there was huge, and even for (Kyleesha) to come in and knock down that three when we hadn't hit that many, that shows a lot of guts and resiliency as a freshman," Lappe said. "For her to step up and knock down shots when nobody else was shows a lot of toughness. That fired everyone else up."

The Ducks would not pull closer than five for the remainder of the game, as the Buffs built their largest lead, 16, on a Jasmine Sborov three with 4:05 remaining.

In addition to her game-high 16 points, Roberson had four rebounds, a block and a steal. Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** recorded 12 points and 10 rebounds, earning her 30th career double-double.

Colorado also held an opponent to under 50 points for the 12th time in 28 games; the Buffs are undefeated in all 12 of those games.

CORVALLIS, Ore. - The No. 19 Colorado women's basketball team turned a slow start into a 66-63 overtime victory Sunday against Oregon State to finish the Pac-12 Conference season 13-5.

The Buffs' 13 league wins this season trail only the 1989 and '95 squads, both of which finished their seasons 14-0 and made it to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament.

CU shot just 33.8 percent from the field but outrebanded the Beavers 49-36. Senior guard **Chucky Jeffery** scored a game-high 25 points, while redshirt freshman forward **Arielle Roberson** earned her second career double-double Sunday with 10 points and a team-high 11 rebounds. Eight of those were on the offensive end, a number just two off from the program record.

"We knew how we wanted to end the regular season, but now it's one-and-done from here on out," said Jeffery, who also contributed seven rebounds. "We had a heck of a regular season, but now it's Pac-12 tournament time, and anybody can win."

With a win over Oregon on Friday, the Buffs secured a No. 4 seed and first-round bye at the Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament, set for March 7-10 at the KeyArena in Seattle.

But even with a first-round bye already locked down, the Buffs had no easy go of Sunday's matchup against the Beavers.

"Coach said this was probably how the game was probably going to go," Jeffery said of OSU's aggressiveness. "They weren't going to come out and give it to us, we were going to have to earn it, and that's what they did. I think it was a good game for us to end our regular season on, it was very competitive."

It was senior day for the Beavers at Gill Coliseum, and the strength of the OSU upperclassmen showed early. Four OSU seniors hit the court at some point in the first nine minutes of the game, helping the Beavers to a 22-9 lead with 11:05 left in the half.

OSU seniors Mollie Schwegler, Quortni Fambro and Patricia Bright put up a combined 15 points in the half, including two Schwegler three-pointers in the first four minutes. The Beavers built their largest lead, 18, at the 6:50 mark, but CU responded with a 14-2 run to head into the locker room trailing by just five (28-33).

"We don't give up," Jeffery said. "They were hitting shot after shot, and it was kind of draining us, but we just had to keep plugging . . . we started cutting the lead, and we started getting settled, getting stops on defense and making baskets."

Jeffery opened the second half with a layup and made two free throws to bring the Buffs back within one (33-32), but a strong OSU defense held CU to just four points over the next six minutes.

But then it was OSU's turn for a scoring drought, as CU turned up the energy on both ends of the court with a 15-4 run. Junior center **Rachel Hargis** gave the Buffs their first lead of the game with a jumper at the 7:09 mark, and while CU would build a five-point lead with 2:12 on the clock, the Beavers weren't done yet. With nine seconds remaining, OSU freshman guard Jamie Weisner hit a three-pointer to tie the score at 56-56 send the game into overtime.

The Buffs went on a 7-1 run to gain a six-point overtime lead, but OSU would fight to the finish as Weisner hit another three with 30 seconds on the clock. Jeffery then hit one of two free throws, but OSU guard All Gibson responded with a deep, nearly half-court try to close CU's lead to one (64-63) with 6.3 seconds remaining.

Roberson was fouled on the next possession and made two crucial free throws, and OSU missed its buzzer-beater shot to give the Buffs the 66-63 win.

"You can't ever think that it's not your day," CU head coach **Linda Lappe** said of the Buffs' comeback. "You've just got to find different ways to get things done . . . you've got to make sure that little things don't affect you. We could have even let that half-court shot affect us, but we didn't, and I really liked our resolve."

SEATTLE - For just over a half Saturday night Colorado showed it could stay with powerful Stanford. Staying with Chiney Ogumike and remaining in touch with their game proved to be much more difficult for the Buffs.

Behind Ogumike's 25 points and 19 rebounds, the top-seeded Cardinal finally pulled away from the fourth-seeded Buffs for a 61-47 win and advanced to Sunday's Pac-12 Conference Tournament championship game at KeyArena.

"I'm proud of how we played; we played hard the whole game," CU coach Linda Lappe said. "I liked how intense we were for about 30 minutes and then I thought our missed shots began to affect our demeanor."

The Buffs held a 28-27 halftime lead Saturday night, with their defense to thank. The Cardinal shot just 28.1 percent (9-for-32) in the first 20 minutes, and had it not been for Ogumike, Stanford would have been deep in the woods with no way out.

The 6-4 junior was scoreless for the game's first nine minutes, but once she got going, the Buffs had a hard time handling her.

"She's good...a tough load in there," Lappe said. "She plays a lot of minutes, she's fit, strong and has a good skill set. I thought we made her work for everything she got - that was one of our goals."

Lappe was right about the Buffs making Ogumike work for her points. In her 39 minutes, Ogumike hit just nine of her 24 field goal attempts but was 7-for-10 from the free throw line. The Cardinal attempted 29 free throws, making 22, while the Buffs only attempted four, making three of those.

Over the first half's last 11 minutes Ogumike scored 14 of the Cardinal's 31 points. And by halftime she had a double-double, collecting 10 rebounds.

CU junior post Rachel Hargis opened on Ogumike and was doing a credible job until picking up her second foul. The defensive chore then went to, among others, redshirt freshman Arielle Roberson and true freshman Jamee Swan.

During that time, the Buffs needed to be more efficient offensively, but couldn't. "Defensively we were outstanding," Lappe said. "Without the last few minutes there we held them to about 55 points (it was 55-42 with about six minutes remaining). And when you hold Stanford to 55 points you have to win. We missed a lot of good shots, we took good shots, but we didn't knock them down. You can only hold them for so long before they start to build that gap."

With a team-high 19 points, Chucky Jeffery moved into sixth place on the school's career scoring list. Roberson added 10 points and eight rebounds, and junior Brittany Wilson added contributed six points, three of them on the 100th three-pointer of her career.

If the Buffs were leading by only a point at halftime, they believed they were sending a larger message. At halftime of their first meeting in Boulder, CU trailed by 17. Three weeks later at Stanford, the Buffs trailed by nine at the break.

The Buffs went on to lose both games by double figures, so Saturday night they measured major progress at halftime with a single digit. Lappe liked her team's first-half effort, but added, "We're not into moral victories; we're not happy that we were ahead at halftime. We wanted to win the game."

CU got a three-pointer by Lexy Kresl to open the second half and took a 31-27 lead. But Stanford caught up quickly at 36-36 and just kept going. The Cardinal got a conventional three-point play from Amber Orrange, a Sara James trey and two free throws by Ogumike to take a 41-36 lead with 13:05 to play.

It was the largest lead of the night by either team and in a bump-and-grind game like this it looked even larger. And it grew.

After two empty Buffs possessions, a pair of baskets by Mikaela Ruef completed a 9-0 run and opened a nine-point (45-36) Stanford lead.

Stanford took its first double-figure lead (49-38) on a pair of Ogumike free throws, then she added two more points with a steal and layup with just over nine minutes to play. The Cardinal increased its advantage to as many as 15 in the final three minutes.
