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CU HOSTS BAYLOR, AT TEXAS TECH IN MUST WIN MATCHES FOR BUFFS

THE MATCH: The University of Colorado volleyball team will host Baylor University on Wednesday, Nov. 5, at 7 p.m. at the Coors Events Conference Center. The Buffs will travel to face Texas Tech University on Saturday, Nov. 8, at 6 p.m. MST in Lubbock, Texas.

ABOUT THE BUFFS: CU is 15-8 overall and in sole possession of fifth place in the Big 12 at 7-6. With their 3-2 win over Iowa State University on Oct. 29, the Buffs nailed down season win No. 15, matching their total for the 2002 season when they finished 15-15.

The Buffs have enjoyed home cooking this season to the tune of a 7-1 record. It has been a different story on the road. The Buffs are 4-6 on the opponents home court, and just 2-5 in the Big 12. It should be pointed out that four of their five league road losses have come against teams ranked in the Top 25. Six of CU's eight losses overall have come against teams ranked in the Top 25.

Senior middle blocker **Monique Gerlach** leads the Buffs in hitting percentage (.320) and kills (3.41 kpg).

Junior setter **Allison Barnes** averages 11.57 assists per game, fifth in the Big 12. In recent matches the Buffs have also looked to freshman **Ashley Nu'u** who has played in 11 of the past 12 matches, averaging 6.34 assists per game. Nu'u missed eight matches during the preseason, and early in the Big 12 season, with a lower back problem.

The Buffs sport four players averaging at least 2.8 kills per game. Following Gerlach, outside hitter **Maragda Santillana** is second (3.39 kpg), middle blocker **Allie Griffin** is third (3.24 kpg) and outside hitter **Nicole Carr** is fourth (2.89 kpg).

Defensively, Carr leads the Buffs in digs (3.41 dpg) while Griffin tops the club in blocking (0.85 bpg).

home match of the season as No. 7 ranked Kansas State University defeated the Buffs 30-24, 20-30, 30-26, 30-22 on Nov. 1 at the CECC.

Trailing 1-0 in games, CU took advantage of six Kansas State hitting errors in the first 10 points of game two to build a 9-1 lead. The Buffs never looked back in game two, leading by as many as 15 (23-

8) before finishing the game out at 30-20. CU held the Wildcats to a .000 hitting percentage in game two (14 kills-14 errors-46 attacks) while the Buffs hit .139 (10k-5e-36att).

Colorado blocked well in the match, finishing with team season-high 15 team blocks. Freshman **Austin Zimmerman**, **Allie Griffin** and **Monique Gerlach** each had

five.

The difference in the final two games was that KSU improved its hitting while the Buffs fell off. The Wildcats hit .287 (37k-12e-87att) for the remainder of the match compared to just .138 for CU (31k-19e-87att).

Griffin and **Maragda Santillana** each had 16 kills to lead the Buffs. Three players recorded double digits in digs. **Allison Barnes** and Zimmerman each had 11 while freshman **Amber Nu'u** had 10.

For the second time five days Colorado was stretched to the limit but came away with a five-game Big 12 victory over Iowa State on Oct. 29 at Hilton Coliseum. Game scores were 29-31, 30-18, 18-30, 30-27, 15-10. Colorado also needed five games to put away the University of Kansas, on Oct. 24, in Boulder.

Down 2-1 in the match, CU fought back from a 24-18 deficit in game four to force the fifth and deciding game. CU trailed 7-6 in game five, but scored seven of the next eight points to go up 13-8. A **Maragda Santillana** kill and an **Ashley Nu'u** block closed the match.

Much like the KU match, Santillana was the offensive star for CU. Santillana led all players in kills with 20, hit .432 (20 kills-four errors-37 attempts) and recorded the double-double by notching 11 digs. Against KU, Santillana netted a career-best 24 kills. **Nicole Carr** and **Allie Griffin** each had double-doubles. Carr, who notched her team high 12th double-double, had 13 kills and a team-high 13 digs. Griffin had 11 kills and 10 digs.

Austin Zimmerman tied a career-high with seven blocks, which she ironically recorded against Iowa State in Boulder on Sept. 27.

HEAD COACH PI'I AIU: Colorado head coach **Pi'i Aiu** is in his seventh season with a career record of 129-74. The 1997 Big 12 and District V Coach of the Year, Aiu has led the Buffs to five NCAA Tournaments in six seasons, including a Sweet 16 appearance in 1997. Under his guidance, the Buffs have sported two All-Americans, six All-Region, and 15 All-Big 12 performers. Aiu has been involved in the Colorado volleyball program in some capacity since its inception in 1986.

Aiu has led the Buffs to an 83-50 record in Big 12 Conference play. He is 11-2 lifetime against both Baylor and Texas Tech.

ABOUT THE BEARS: Baylor is 11-15 overall and tied for eighth in the Big 12 with Iowa State at 3-10. The Bears have lost five straight overall, and the last two, at Oklahoma and home against Texas Tech, have gone five games with the Bears losing the deciding frame 15-13 each time. Senior Tisha Schwartz is Baylor's top offensive threat averaging 4.23 kills, ranking fifth in the Big 12. Freshman Desiree Guilliard-

CU VOLLEYBALL "QUICK SETS"

1 Lynsey Mann, 6-3, So., MB -- Has not seen match action in 2003. Transfer from Western State (Colo.) College. Was the runner up for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year in 2002.

2 Ashley Nu'u, 5-10, Fr., S -- Has played in 11 of the last 12 matches after missing eight early in the season with lower back pain. Has 203 kill assists, which ranks 13th on CU's all-time list. Has totalled 39 digs, 22 kills and 16 blocks. Had a career best 39 kill assists against No. 11 Penn State. Notched a personal best five kills in the home loss to Kansas State.

3 Amber Nu'u, 5-11, Fr., OH/L -- Assumed a new role, playing libero for the first time in her career against Baylor recording four digs. Has double-digit digs in three of the last four matches, averaging 2.4 digs per game over that span. Sported career-highs with 13 kills and 19 digs in the loss to Texas A&M. Had seven kills on just eight attacks with no errors for an outstanding .875 average against Oregon.

4 Maragda Santillana, 6-4, So., OH -- Has led the Buffs in kills in six of the last seven matches. Recorded a career-high 24 kills in CU's five-game win over Kansas. Has double digit kills in the last eight matches, averaging 4.3 kills per game over that span. Ranks eighth in the Big 12 during league matches with 3.86 kills per game. Second on the team in overall kills (3.39 kpg), fourth in hitting percentage (.228) and fifth in digs (1.90 dpg). Hit .500 (7k-1e-12att) during the Colorado Invitational. Matched a career high with 15 digs against Illinois State.

5 Allison Barnes, 6-0, Jr., S -- Sixth in the Big 12 in assists (11.57 apg). Named to the Colorado Invitational All-Tournament team, hitting a team-high .583 (8k-1e-12att) with 14.33 kill assists per game. Earned a career high with 63 assists in the loss to Texas A&M. Her 51 assists against Texas are the most in a three-game match in the Big 12 Conference this season. Moved into fifth place on CU's all-time assists list with 1,203.

6 Kelly Masumiya, 5-3, So., DS/L -- Played at the libero spot in eight matches. Has played in 34 games, logging 0.74 digs per game. Recorded an ace on her first serve attempt of the season, coming against No. 11 Penn State.

7 Austin Zimmerman, 6-0, Fr., OH/MB -- The lone freshman to have started every match and played in every game this season. Ranks third on the team with a .282 hitting percentage (154k-52e-355att). Matched a career-high with seven blocks at Iowa State and is averaging 1.3 blocks per game over last two matches. Named to the Denver Invitational All-Tournament Team. Hit .309 (34k-10e-67att) and averaged 2.27 digs and one block per game at the tournament. Led the Buffs over Texas Tech with a career-high 19 kills.

9 Allie Griffin, 6-0, So., MB -- Had a personal-best and team season-high 27 kills against Texas A&M. Leads the Buffs in blocking (0.85 bpg) and is third in kills (3.24 kpg). Averaging just over one block per game the last three matches. Has started every match and game this season. Named to the Colorado Invitational All-Tournament team. Had a personal best seven blocks in CU's win over Illinois State. Notched a personal-best nine digs against Maine.

10 Nicole Carr, 6-0, So., OH -- Recorded 20 digs against Texas A&M, a team season high and the second-best dig performance of her career. Has recorded double-doubles (kills and digs) in 12 of 23 matches, second among Big 12 players. Notched double digit digs in all but five matches. Ranks eighth in digs (3.41) in the Big 12. Earned MVP honors at the Denver Invitational, compiling 44 kills and 35 digs in the tournament.

11 Lara Bossow, 6-0, Fr., OH -- Has seen action in a total of 13 games this fall, with four kills four digs and six blocks.

12 Monica Vesanovic, 5-5, Sr., DS/L -- Has served as CU's libero in eight matches this season. Recorded a career-high with three aces and a season high eight digs in the win over Villanova. Has 15 aces and 34 digs on the season.

13 Krislen Morgado, 5-6, So., DS/L -- Made her collegiate debut in CU's 3-0 win over Villanova, recording one dig. Won a Hawai'i state volleyball title with Punahou High School as a senior, bettering its runner up mark from the previous season.

15 Monique Gerlach, 5-11, Sr., MB -- MVP of the Colorado Invitational. All-Tournament team at the Denver Invitational and the Maine Sea-Sun Invitational. Seven double-doubles in 2003. Has hit .400 or better in eight matches. Nearly recorded a triple-double against Denver, ending with 13 kills, 13 digs and nine blocks. Recorded a single-match personal best hitting percentage of .700 (15k-1e-20att) against Rhode Island, a mark that remains the best in the Big 12 this season. Maintains her hold on the school's career hitting percentage lead at .329 (1,331k-407e-2,809att). Currently ranks in CU's top 10 in kills, attacks and blocks.

Young is second in the Big 12 in blocking (1.24 bpg) and third in hitting percentage (.336).

ABOUT THE RED RAIDERS: Texas Tech is 10-12 overall and in last place in the Big 12 at 2-11. The Red Raiders, who began the season 8-1, lost their first nine Big 12 matches this season. TTU has won two of its last four, including the program's first ever win at Baylor, on Nov. 1. Junior Kelly Johnson leads the Big 12 and is eighth in NCAA Division I in kills at 5.57 per game. She has nearly 300 more kills this season than her closest teammate, sophomore Breanna Pursley, who averages 2.88 per game.

BUFFS VS THE COMPETITION: Colorado leads its all-time series with Baylor 14-2. The Buffaloes have won five straight over the Bears dating back to the 2000 season. Baylor's last win in Boulder came in three games on Oct. 4, 2000. CU holds a 13-2 series edge over Texas Tech. The Buffs have won 11 of the last 12 matches against the Red Raiders. CU has never lost to Texas Tech in Lubbock, a span of seven

matches.

CU NOTCHED FIRST BIG 12 ROAD WIN WITH SWEEP OF BEARS: Looking for its first Big 12 road win of 2003, Colorado played one of its most complete matches of the season in a 30-21, 30-25, 30-25 sweep over Baylor University on Oct. 11, in Waco, Texas.

The Buffs hit an even .300 for the match, finishing with 55 kills on 130 attacks with only 16 errors. **Monique Gerlach** hit .500 for the match, netting 13 kills on 26 attacks with no errors. Gerlach also recorded 13 digs and seven blocks.

Nicole Carr racked up her team-high 11th double-double, amassing 13 kills and 11 digs. **Maragda Santillana** had a team-high 15 kills to go along with seven digs and six blocks.

Defensively, as a team, the Buffs held Baylor to a .202 hitting percentage (44k-18e-129att), and just .138 through the first two games (25k-13e-87att). CU had 9.5 team blocks, out-blocking an opponent for just the fourth time this season.

CU played one of its best offensive games of the season in game one. The Buffs hit .429 amassing 20 kills on 42 attempts with just two errors.

ZIMMERMAN'S 19 KILLS SPARKS BUFFS OVER TECH: Austin Zimmerman had a career-high 19 kills to lead the Buffs to a 30-22, 28-30, 30-20, 30-22 victory over Texas Tech University in the Big 12 opener for both teams, on Sept. 17, in Boulder.

At the time it was CU's third straight win as the Buffs were off to their best start (9-2) since 1998 when they began the sea-

son winning 13 of their first 15.

Zimmerman hit .353 in the match (19 kills-7 errors-34 attacks) and also had seven digs and five blocks.

The second-year duo of outside hitter **Nicole Carr** and middle blocker **Allie Griffin** combined for 26 kills 14 digs and seven blocks. Defense was a key as the Buffs held Texas Tech to a .113 hitting percentage (48k-31e-151att) in the match, and just .020 (12k-11e-51) in the pivotal game three where CU took back momentum.

Seven different Buffs had at least five digs in the match led by senior Monique Gerlach who had 11 and Carr who had 10. Gerlach, who also had 15 kills, and Carr each had double-doubles.
