



2008 COLORADO FOOTBALL / SPRING GAME NOTES

April 19, 2008 (Folsom Field, 1:00 p.m.)

Quickly Today marks the third and final major scrimmage of the spring, as CU scrimmaged the last two Saturdays (April 5 & 12)... The Buffs have also scrimmaged regularly at times during most of the practices, especially dealing with the red zone and situational scrimmages... Spring ball was again divided around spring break for the third straight year, with three practices before break (March 17-20) and the remaining 11 afterwards (April 2-17); the only other time CU had done that were the five years between 1999 and 2003... CU coach **Dan Hawkins** will likely consider having all of spring ball done before break in 2009, as was the plan in 2008 until the Gridiron Bash was awarded to Colorado along with 14 other schools; it would be possible as CU now has an indoor bubble for practice... There are about 200 football alumni in town rekindling friendships and taking part in the annual favorite events (Friday golf and "chicken/catfish" feed, Saturday breakfast and postgame barbecue). **Eric Bieniemy** was the featured alumni speaker at this morning's breakfast.

Format The coaches aren't yet comfortable splitting the team into two squads, so the format will again be basically the standard offense versus defense scrimmage. The "BLACK" team will be the No. 1 offense against the No. 2 defense, while the "GOLD" team will be the No. 2 offense versus the No. 1 defense. There will be 10 minute quarters with the new 40-second play clock, and standard three time outs per team per half. The scrimmage actually starts at 1:10.

Ralphie V Colorado's latest live mascot, **Ralphie V**, is scheduled to make her first runs with the team today. As with Ralphie IV, she was donated to CU from a Ted Turner ranch, Vermejo Park Ranch in Northern New Mexico. She was born in October 2006 and was named "Blackout" by CU's Ralphie Handlers as she was the darkest calf in the herd. Now a year-and-a-half old, she weighs in the 700-750 pound range and is lightning fast (she should grow to 1,300). Ralphie program directors **Ben Frei** and **Kevin Priola** worked with **Barney Coppedge** the Bison Manager at Vermejo to bring Ralphie V to Colorado. They continue to supervise the housing and training of both Ralphie IV and Ralphie V. **Gail Pedersen**, assistant to athletic director **Mike Bohn**, coordinates the entire Ralphie program for the athletic department. **Ralphie IV** is not officially retired by any means; she will make some special appearances which could include returning to lead the team on the field for a special game or two.

Quick 2007 Review Colorado had some memorable moments in 2007, though finishing with a 6-7 record, ending a run of 22 years where the Buffaloes did not suffer back-to-back losing seasons. That's the bad news; the good news is that it is obvious to all that the team made tremendous strides under second-year head coach Dan Hawkins. The season opener was a thriller, as it took overtime to knock out in-state rival Colorado State, 31-28. The Buffs then dropped tough non-league games at Arizona State and then at home to Florida State, before prepping for conference play with a 42-0 win over Miami, Ohio. The Buffs finished third in the Big 12 North, going 4-4 in league play, and that included a 3-0 mark against the Big 12 South, as the North schools ended years of domination by the South in the season series. Two of CU's most impressive outings of the season came against those rivals, none bigger than a 27-24 win over No. 3 Oklahoma in Boulder; the Buffs fell behind 24-7, but clawed their way back and won on a Kevin Eberhart 45-yard field goal as time ran out. A month later, CU ventured into Lubbock where it had never won in four outings but would leave with a 31-26 win over Texas Tech. CU wrapped the regular season with a 65-51 win over Nebraska, earning an Independence Bowl bid in the process against Alabama. The Crimson Tide stormed to a 27-0 lead, but once CU collected itself, it outscored 'Bama 24-3 over the last two-and-a-half quarters (limiting Alabama to 115 yards in that stretch), but fell just short in losing, 30-24. Senior inside linebacker Jordon Dizon was a consensus All-American, and finished as the runner-up for the Butkus Award, while cornerback Terrence Wheatley and defensive tackle George Hypolite joined Dizon as first-team All-Big 12 performers.

The Wounded The injury list is fairly small for the second straight year as spring ball wraps (six injuries, one illness); four were on the list in 2007. Great strides have been made in this area, as by comparison, 25 missed the 2002 game, 23 the 2003 affair, 16 did so in 2004, 11 in 2005 and 12 in 2006. Head trainer **Miguel Rueda** expects most of the below to be healthy come the start of fall drills with the exception of **CB Benjamin Burney**, who is planning to redshirt this fall (he may also need additional surgery), and **S Bret Smith**. Spring Game Attendance As most know, former head coach **Bill McCartney** challenged the 1,500-plus in attendance at CU's annual recruiting luncheon in Denver (Feb. 7) to help fill Folsom Field for the spring game. He asked for everyone to stand up who would work hard to bring 50 people with them, and CU has been promoting the game for a month and timed advertising on radio and TV to heat up in the 10 days prior to the game. But with admittance to the game being free and thus no hard ticket, CU officials have no idea what to expect today. In Hawk's first two years, the spring game has attracted 6,400 (2006, cloudy skies, temperature in the low 50s, very windy) and **5,800** last year (perfect weather, 60 degrees, clear skies, just a bit windy at times).

Hawkins May State Tour New NCAA rules, believed passed at the behest of several head coaches who didn't want to be on the road every April and/or May, prohibit the head coach from visiting high school coaches in spring recruiting. So, **Dan Hawkins** will instead canvass the state a few cities and towns, starting with Pueblo on April 30. The full itinerary is being finalized, but will include both public and private stops.

McCartney, Stewart To Represent CU Former coach **Bill McCartney** has always liked golf, former quarterback **Kordell Stewart** picked it up a few years ago. Now the pair will reunite to represent the Buffaloes in the Chick-fil-A Bowl Alma Mater at Reynolds Plantation, a golf tournament that will award \$375,000 in scholarships to the top finishers' schools, including \$100,000 for the winners.

The event will be played April 29 and features pairings that include a university head coach and a celebrity alumnus from the same school competing in a scramble format against other university teams from around the country. The celebrity round will be taped for broadcast and aired nationally by CBS at 2 p.m. (ET) on Christmas Day. In addition to the \$375,000 scholarship purse, another \$50,000 of the proceeds will be donated to the Reynolds Foundation.
