NCAA Central Regional Notes & Quotes

QUICKLY The 107th Annual NCAA Golf Championships begin this week with 81 schools competing in three regionals around the country, with the **University of Colorado** one of 27 schools competing in the 16th Annual NCAA Central Region Golf Championships in Little Rock, Ark. ... It's the fifth trip in six seasons to the NCAA's for Colorado; the Buffs have now been invited in 12 of the 16 years of the regional format... The top 10 teams out of 27 competing in the Central Regional will advance to the NCAA Finals, set for June 1-4 in Hot Springs, Va. (Virginia Tech is the host)... Ten out of 27 teams will also advance to the finals out the East and West regionals, taking place at the same time; the top two individuals from teams that do not qualify also will be invited... CU is the No. 5 seed in this meet out of the NCAA's District 5 (or Central District) and is the No. 10 seed overall... It is the 15th time in Coach **Mark Simpson's** 28-year tenure that the Buffaloes have qualified for the NCAA Championships (CU has reached the finals seven times during his era)... CU tees off at 12:10 p.m. (EST) on Thursday off No. 10 and at 8:10 a.m. Friday on No. 1, as the Buffs will be paired with SMU (No. 11 seed) and Texas Tech (No. 12).

THE EVENT This is the 16th year that the NCAA is holding regionals (east, central, west) in order to stock the 30-team field at the NCAA Championship Finals. There are 27 teams at each site, with the top 10 to advance out of each; it's just the fourth time all three regional sites have the same number of teams (with the same number advancing). Out of the regional format, the Buffaloes have advanced to the NCAA Finals on four occasions, all four times with some style. In **1989**, the inaugural year for regional activity, CU finished third at Stonebridge Country Club outside of Dallas. Oklahoma and Oklahoma State tied for team honors with an 880 score, followed by the Buffs at 902. In **1994**, the Buffs placed second with an 853 score, just two strokes back of regional champion Texas, at Oklahoma City Golf & Country Club. In **1999**, at Ohio State University's Scarlet Course, the Buffs rallied from 18th place and eight shots back after 36 holes to force a playoff with Kent State, winning the battle on the first extra hole and thus advancing to the national finals. It remains the second largest comeback in regional history. In **2002** in Little Rock, Colorado was 11th after day one and in 13th after day two, but rallied to post the seventh best score in a final round hampered by tough winds, finishing in the 10th and final spot with an 886 team score. The Buffs edged two teams by one stroke—Big 12 rivals Kansas and Oklahoma.

Here's a look at Colorado's history in the NCAA regionals; all 11 previous trips by Colorado were to the Central Regional as is the case this year (*—beat Kent State on first playoff hole to earn 10th and final qualifying position):

THE SITE This is the first time that the **Kampen Course** at the **Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex** will be hosting the NCAA Central Regional (it opened in June 1998). The course plays to 7,259 yards and par-72; it has hosted both a women's regional and national championship (the latter last May), as well as several other prestigious college and amateur events. Purdue University is the official host.

THE FIELD The field is comprised of 141 golfers, 27 five-man teams, plus six individuals; the NCAA tries to keep schools within 500 miles of their campus if possible. Here's the field (listed in seeding order out of each regional district, with CU's record against team in tourney play in parenthesis—the Buffs are 23-23-3 against those teams competing):

THE COACH **Mark Simpson** (Colorado '83) in his 28th season as head coach of the Buffaloes. The 53-year old native of Durango, Colo., lettered three years as a Buff golfer, playing from 1970-73, and became as assistant coach right after his playing days. His college career highlight was winning the Weber State Invitational in 1971, with his coaching career highlight coming in 1981, when he was named the Big Eight and District Five Coach-of-the-Year. He was also named co-coach of the year in the Big 12 for 1999-2000. The program has enjoyed great success under Simpson's tutelage, now with 15 trips to the NCAA Championships along with seven All-Americans and several all-league selections. This is the 12th time in his tenure CU will participate in the NCAA Regionals, with CU advancing to the Finals four times. His team's best finish in the NCAA's was an 11th place showing in 1981, and then the 14th place effort two years ago. He is the immediate past-president of the Golf Coaches Association of America, as he has been heavily involved in collegiate administration throughout his career. In his tenure, 94 of his 104 players have graduated (90 percent).



THE ROSTER The last time coach **Mark Simpson** took the Buffaloes to the NCAA Finals in 2002, he had a fairly experienced team with a combined 17 letters with 12 previous NCAA regional or finals tournaments among them. This time, the five have gathered 13 letters among them, but only one player has seen action in an NCAA meet. The Buffalo five:

Kane Webber is competing in his fourth NCAA Championship, but no one else as seen action in the NCAA's, as the three sophomores observed from a distance as freshmen a year ago. Webber becomes only the fourth player in Colorado history to play in four NCAA Championships, as he joins **Rick Cramer** (1979-82), **Bob Kalinowski** (1991-94) and **Matt Zions** (1999-2002) as the only Buffaloes to qualify for four NCAA's.

THE STATS Colorado has six players averaging 74.21 strokes per round or better; that by far is an all-time team best. The lowest average in CU history by the No. 5 man came in 2001-02, when Stephen Carroll owned a 74.14 average; the fifth man this year through last Sunday, **Derek O'Neill**, is averaging 73.96. O'Neill's not participating at the regional, **Jeff Hanson** is; Hanson is actually sixth in stroke average at 74.21; that's just about a full stroke ahead of the best in Buff annals, as in 1999-2000, Ben Fiala and Tobias Forsgren tied for fifth at 75.17. On the other end, Kane Webber is obliterating the season record as his average is 71.11; but Edward McGlasson's 73.44 norm stands to be the second best by a Buff who did not win the scoring average title (only Matt Zions' 73.38 in 1999-2000 bests it as of now). Team stroke averages are falling as well; the overall record of 74.19 set in 2001-02 should fall, as the Buffs are in at 73.31 entering regional play. The spring average of 73.02 is better than a full stroke better, topping the 74.14 averaged during that '01-02 spring. *Full statistics attached later in these notes.*

THE MAN Senior captain **Kane Webber** won three tournaments in a 54-day span between March 23 and May 16, and is now one of five players in college golf to win at least three tournaments during the 2003-04 season (*chart at right*). Webber has had quite the senior year to date and is in position to rewrite the Colorado record book; no less than a dozen records will probably fall in his honor. He currently leads CU in 23 statistical categories and is tied for the lead in the 24th and last.

Career-wise, he is the top five on seven major lists: wins (3, 3rd); top five finishes (10, t-4th); top 10 finishes (15, 4th); top 20 finishes (27, 1st); rounds played (141, t-5th); rounds counting toward team scoring (94.3%, 133-of-141, 2nd) and stroke average (72.84, 1st). He will likely all set records for both season and spring stroke average.

His last time out, he set a CU record for the lowest 54-hole score on a par-70 course when he turned in a 5-under 205 en route to winning the Perry Maxwell Intercollegiate in a playoff. That win tied him for the most in a single season at Colorado, matching the three Hale Irwin won his senior year in 1966-67.

THE QUOTES / HEAD COACH MARK SIMPSON

ON HOW THE TEAM IS PLAYING AT PRESENT: “Overall, I think we’re playing pretty well. If you take a look at what we’ve done in the last five tournaments, with top five finishes each time out in some tough fields, is certainly an indicator that we’re got a solid team. We have had some guys play well and some play poorly, at times, so the biggest challenge is to get all five guys to fire on all cylinders at the same time. As I look back, the last two tournaments we haven’t played like we wanted to. We’ve had some guys play well, and some have struggled, but we hung in there. Our focus all season has been to get to and do well in the national championships, so there is no reason that things won’t fall into place. That’s been our plan all along, and part of the preparation was why we went to the Maxwell.”

ON THE EXPERIENCE OF HIS TEAM: “Kane (Webber) is the only one who’s been to an NCAA Championship, so the fact that this is the first time for four guys will likely be an obstacle we need to overcome. That’s the bad news; the good news is that we’ve been under pressure to win three or four times, and this certainly won’t be much different than that as they’ve had a taste of what is needed to win.”

ON TEAM STRENGTH... “We’ve got a tremendous team captain and team leader in Kane Webber, not only from a performance standpoint from a character standpoint. The chemistry of the team is excellent, they all support each other and that will carry a team a long way. Technically, they’re all good players; they have good swings, quality short games and good putting forms.”

ON TEAM WEAKNESS... “Probably just the inexperience at nationals. It can inspire some awe at first, so the unknown factor is how long, if not right from the start, it will take to settle down and get into a rhythm.”

ON GOALS OR TEAM EXPECTATIONS IN THE REGIONALS... “We certainly expect to advance to Virginia for the finals. We’d be surprised at anything less. We feel like we’ve played well enough. Seeds don’t mean much, but we feel like we’re better than the No. 10 seed we got. But the good thing is we have a chance to go out and prove the contrary.”

ON KANE WEBBER... “He definitely, in my mind, deserves to be a first-team All-American and should be in the running for player of the year. He’s one of the hottest golfers going right now, and he has set out to finish with a bang. He got off to a good start with his playoff win at The Maxwell.”

ON JEFF HANSON... “He’s improved himself significantly to the point where no question that he’s a quality player, and in my estimation, the strongest fifth man in the field (at the regional).”

ON EDWARD McGLASSON... “Edward is struggling with his game right now, but he’s a tremendous competitor. I expect him to start shining when the pressure is on, and he expects that of himself. He’ll rise to the challenge.”

ON BLAKE MOORE... “Blake had been up-and-down throughout the course of the year until six or seven weeks ago. Since that time, he’s become a solid college golfer because he shored up a couple weaknesses. He has really worked hard in those areas and it’s made him a better player.”

ON KENNY COAKLEY... “Kenny certainly played well in the early spring, got a little complacent in the middle but is back on his game. He’s worked hard to become a quality player, has a very, very good short game and is also great competitor. The kind of player you like when the pressure’s on.”

THE U.S. OPEN The first stage of U.S. Open Qualifying was held Monday (May 15) on the local level, with two Colorado players advancing to sectional qualifying (June 6 at Littleton’s Columbine Country Club). Sophomores **Kenny Coakley** (36-31) and **Blake Moore** (34-33) both made it out of local qualifying with 5-under par 67s at Buffalo Run Golf Course in Commerce City to lead the pack of 84 players (former Buff Matt Call also shot a 67). Sophomore **Derek O’Neill** and senior **Kane Webber** are the third and fourth alternates, respectively, as both recorded 37-33—70 efforts.

THIS-N-THAT

- With the two seniors graduating, **94** of the **104** players that Coach Mark Simpson has brought into the program have now graduated (90.4%; numbers do not count undergrads on the current team).
- Colorado enters the NCAA Central Regional with **five** consecutive **top five** finishes, the first time the Buffs have ever done that in their history; the last time CU placed in the top five in four straight meets had been the spring of 1989.
- Six Colorado players have recorded a round in the **60s** this season, matching the accomplishment previously done by the 1979-80 and 1999-2000 teams (both also had six).
- As a team, the Buffaloes have the **second best short game** in the country according to statistics tracked by GolfStat; the Buffs have a short game percentage of .573, trailing only Middle Tennessee State’s .599. “Total short game” is a combination of sand saves and pars made when greens are missed in regulation.

THE SCHEDULE The Buffs played one of the nation’s toughest schedules in 2003-04, as 10 of Colorado’s 12 tournaments were rated in the top 50 according to *Golfweek* (actually the top 43). The toughest was the PING-Arizona Intercollegiate to open the spring season, which came in at No. 21, followed by the Pepperdine Club Glove (No. 23) and the Big 12 Championships (No. 24). *Golfweek*, which has used a computer to rank all 268 tournaments to date, had CU playing the nation’s 38th toughest schedule this year. The Big12 sent nine teams advanced to the NCAA regionals, tied with the SEC for the most from a single conference.

THE RANKINGS Colorado enters the regional ranked No. 29 in the nation in the *GolfStat* rankings, and No. 32 in both the *Golfweek/Sagarin* rankings and the GCAA Coaches poll. CU peaked at No. 28 two weeks ago and has been a mainstay in the top 40 the entire spring and the top 50 all season. Here’s a look at the latest polls, with those schools listed in *italics with an asterisk* competing in one of three regionals:

THE SEASON Two seniors plus four sophomores can equal many things, but in the case of the 2003-04 University of Colorado golf team, it’s added up to perhaps the most successful season in school history other than those years the Buffs won a conference title.

There’s no doubt that the team leader has been senior captain **Kane Webber**; he’s had a record setting season and the accolades are just beginning to roll in. But the success Colorado has achieved as a team can be traced to the play and leadership of CU’s other senior, **Jeff Hanson**, as well as all four sophomores stepping up at one time or another.

Coach **Mark Simpson** had a simple explanation on why CU improved to become a Top 30 team. “One of the things is we have six solid guys competing for five spots. So the competition has been tremendous, no one gets complacent, everyone wants to keep their spot, and that’s been a very key component to this team. Each of the sophomores has developed in different ways, and that’s very gratifying from a coaching staff to see them get better. We have good chemistry, the guys support each other, and another important factor has been the leadership by our two seniors. That might very well be the biggest reason for our success, as Kane and Jeff have set quality examples both on and off the course. You can’t underestimate what they’ve meant to the development of this team, both as freshmen last year and this season.”

Webber leads the team in practically every major statistical category, and his 71.11 stroke average for the year, along with his 70.75 mark in the spring, are both well ahead of the school’s established records. Webber and **Edward McGlasson** are the only Buffs to have played in all 12 tournaments, and McGlasson is flirting with the CU season stroke mark by a sophomore. His 73.44 is just a shade off the record of 73.29—set by Webber in 2000.

Hanson and **Kenny Coakley** have seen action in 11 meets, as both have proved to be steady and reliable. Coakley led the Buffs at the Big 12, while Hanson has had the second most rounds count toward team scoring. The fifth spot on the team came down to a battle all season between two sophomores, with **Blake Moore** edging **Derek O’Neill** for the last spot on the travel team. Moore went to the Big 12’s, but both were vital to CU’s victory at the Western Intercollegiate, the Buffs first tournament win since the fall of 2000. In fact, Colorado won that competition with four sophomores in the lineup.

With the Buffaloes placing in the top five in their last five meets, the season has built to a crescendo. CU has finished in the top nine 11 times in 12 meets, including nine top seven efforts; Simpson hopes his team is peaking at the right time.

He opened the spring strong as well, tying for 18th in the PING-Arizona Intercollegiate (212, -1) and for 22nd at the John Burns Intercollegiate (212, -4); in fact, he flirted with school records when he posted three straight rounds in the 60s and four straight subpar rounds. But he struggled a bit the next four meets, scoring a pair of 222s and 229s, though he did tie for 29th at CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational and a second round 68 was key in CU's win at the Western Intercollegiate. He bounced back to lead Colorado at the Big 12 Championships, as he recorded three straight 74s for a 222 total to tie for 16th place. He played in three of the four fall tournaments, with a pair of top 20 finishes: he tied for 18th at Stanford's "The Nelson" (212, -1), and tied for 20th at The Prestige At PGA West (219, +3). His 71.67 first-round stroke average was a team best, which included his low round of the fall (69) in The Nelson.

At Oregon State—2002-03 (Fr.): In lettering, he finished third on the team in stroke average as a true freshman, as he posted a 74.02 average for 34 rounds. He played in 11 of OSU's 12 tournaments (all but the NCAA West Regional), with five top 30 efforts including his best, an eighth-place tie, in the Rocky Mountain Invitational (74-69-74—217). He averaged 74.63 in the first round, but owned second and final round averages of 73.36, the latter being the second best on the team. He had three rounds in the 60s, nine subpar efforts with three even-par rounds.

High School—He earned all-state honors from the *Rocky Mountain News* as a junior, when he was also the Jefferson County MVP as he placed fourth in the state meet (74-74—148, +6; Hillcrest Golf Club in Durango). As a senior, he was fifth in he state when he recorded a 71-69—140 (-4; Patty Jewett Golf Course in Colorado Springs). He lettered four times for coach Roger Martenson at Green Mountain, owing a stroke average of 70 as a senior (down fro 74 as a freshman), and claiming the league championship three times during his prep career.

Other—2004: He was one of three players to shoot a qualifying-round best 67 in the local U.S. Open Qualifying, enabling him to advance to the sectional level. **2003:** He tied for 16th in the CGA State Publinks, with a 76-70-68—214 effort at Fox Hollow Golf Course. He placed 33rd in the Colorado Stroke Play Championship, turning in a 76-74-76-80—306 effort at Carbondale's River Valley Ranch G.C. **2002:** He won the CJGA Tournament of Champions with a 4-under par 140 score, and also placed high in to AJGA meets, placing second in Aspen (213, -3) and fourth in Albuquerque (214, -2). He was also 18th in the Scratch Players Championships with a 215 total. **2001:** He was the Colorado Golf Association's Junior Player of the Year in the state.

Best Career Round In Competition—65 (2002, Colorado High School Regional at Legacy Ridge in Westminster)

Academics—He is majoring in journalism at Colorado. He was a member of the President's Honor Roll in high school, when he owned a 3.38 grade point average.

Personal—Born April 26, 1984 in Billings, Mont. Hobbies include playing most sports. Father (Bill) played golf collegiately at Loras College.

#5 JEFF HANSON

5-10, 160, Sr., 4L, Longmont, Colo. (Longmont)

College—This Year (Sr.): He has played in all but one tournament, as he worked out some minor problems with his putting midway through the spring but got it back on track when he tied for 17th at CU's Stevinson-Ranch Invitational (218, +2). He followed that up by tying for 18th at the Purdue Boilermaker Invitational with the same exact score. His final round 73 was the best by a Buff in the Big12 Championships, and his 224 total tied him for 20th overall. He is having his best season of his career, as his 74.21 stroke average is almost a full shot better than his previous best, with his spring number of 73.86 almost a stroke-and-a-half better. He recorded his collegiate career best, a 5-under 67 in the second round of the John Burns Intercollegiate, where he tied for 48th with an even-par 216. He struggled out of the gate in the first two fall meets but closed strong with a pair of top 20 finishes. After shooting 37-over par combined in the UNM Tucker and the Pepperdine Club Glove, he played Stanford's The Nelson and The Prestige At PGA West even par. He tied for 18th at The Nelson, carding a 1-under 212, and tied for 14th at The Prestige with a 1-over 217. Included in his opening 70 at The Prestige was the seventh hole-in-one in CU history, as he aced the 172-yard, par-3 16th hole.

2002-03 (Jr.): He became a regular member of the traveling squad for the first time and finished third on the team in stroke average with a 75.03 mark. He averaged 75.2 for five spring meets, finishing in the top 48 in four of those with his best effort a 30th place tie in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational (223, including a final round 70, one of the best third rounds in the meet). He posted his two collegiate career best finishes in the fall, with a career best effort in placing seventh at Kansas State's Jim Colbert Invitational (thanks to a final round 72 for a 226 total), along with a 23rd place finish at Stanford's The Nelson (216, +3). His opening round 68 (3-under) in Cal-Berkeley's MacKenzie Invitational still stands as his best collegiate round to date. He ended the fall on an even a higher note, as he was one of just a handful of players to go undefeated (3-0-0) in the inaugural GCAA Match Play Championships.

2001-02 (Soph): He played in four meets on the year, three in the spring, never really getting untracked as all nine of his rounds were between 77 and 80. In his one fall tournament, when he tied for 51st in the Washington Husky Invitational, he was in the top 20 heading into the final round (75-74—149), but shot 85 the last day to finish with a 234 total.

2000-01 (Fr.-RS): He saw action in four tournaments, three in the fall, with his best effort a pair of 72s for a four-over par 144 total and 22nd place finish in the Colorado State Ram Invitational. He played as an individual in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational, and after an opening round 85, he settled in with scores of 76 and 73 to tie for 26th with a 234 total. He had a 76.82 average for 11 rounds overall, but owned an impressive 74.75 final round average.

1999-2000 (Fr.): He redshirted as a true freshman, though he did participate in team tournament qualifying.

High School—He tied for 18th in the Colorado State High School Championships as a senior, with a 77-74—151 scorecard at Hollydot Golf Course in Colorado City. As a junior, he was 26th in the state meet, carding a 76-80—156 at Collindale Golf Club in Fort Collins, leading Longmont to its first appearance in the state championships in 11 years. His high school coach was Keith Martin, a letterman of the CU golf team. He also was a member of the freshman basketball team.

Other—2003: Reached the finals of the Colorado State Amateur Match Play Championships, where he lost to a former CU teammate, Shawn Wills (5 and 4) in the 36-hole match. He also won Longmont's Harry Wheeler Match Play for the third time in four years, to go with his 2000 and 2001 titles, and was the runner-up in the Longmont City Championship. **2002:** He just missed qualifying for the U.S. Public Links Championship, as his 70-71—141 scorecard at Mira Vista Golf Course (Aurora) was two shots out of a playoff for the final two of three spots. He teamed with his brother to place third in the Colorado Two-Man Championship, tied for 21st in the Colorado Stroke Play championship (306) and tied for the second low amateur in the Colorado Open (74-72-72-76—294). **2001:** He captured his second straight Longmont City Championship, carding a 70-67-77—214 total at Ute Creek Golf Course, but needing a win on the first playoff hole over Nick Babl to claim the title. He was third in the Ute Creek Invitational (68-76—144), and placed ninth in the Colorado Public Links championship, shooting the second lowest score (2-under) in the final round to close with a 76-73-70—219 effort. A 75-74-74-73—296 scorecard at the Colorado State Stroke Play Championship tied him for 19th overall, the best finish by any Buff in the '01 event. He tied for the 11th low amateur at the Colorado Open, but his accomplishment there was coming back with a second round 67 after an opening 79 to make the cut; he had a 79-67-71-71—292 scorecard for the event. He had rounds of 73 and 80 in the local U.S. Amateur qualifying but missed advancing out of Colorado. **2000:** He finished third in the Colorado Public Links Championship, turning in a 73-70-65—208 performance at Hyland Hills Golf Course in Westminster (teammate Ben Portie won with a 200 total, but he was just one out of second). He was the eighth low amateur in the Colorado Open (73-76-73-74—296), tying for 57th overall at Saddle Rock G.C. He shot a 77-71—148 at Mira Vista in Denver in U.S. Public Links Qualifying, tying for 14th. He also won the Longmont City Championship (67-70-74—211), and finished third in the Fox Hill Invitational (71-74—145) and fourth in the Loveland Invitational (77-70—147). He also teamed with his brother Chad to finish fifth in the CGA Two-Man Championship. **1999:** He finished second in the CGA Public Links Championships at Lafayette's Indian Peaks Golf Course (70-72-70—212), winning the local qualifying for the U.S. Amateur Public Links in the process (the first two rounds counted). He went on to shoot 68-76—144 in the national meet to advance to the match play, where he lost his first match. He was seventh in the Colorado State Boys' Stroke Play Championships, carding a 72-76-73—221 at Mira Vista Golf Course in Aurora. **1998:** He finished second in the Colorado State Boys' Stroke Play, turning in a 72-67-74—213 at Flatirons Golf Course in Boulder. He won the local U.S. Junior Amateur qualifier with a 72-67—139 effort, and missed the cut by just one stroke in Chicago. He was a member of the 1998 Colorado Cup team, and finished eighth in the AJGA Southwestern Invitational.

#2 EDWARD McGLASSON

6-5, 190, Soph., 2L, Orange, Calif. (Elmodena)

College—This Year (Soph./Prior to Big 12's): No sophomore slump for McGlasson, who has more than picked up where he left off as a freshman and is having one of the finest soph seasons in CU history. He is second on the team in stroke average (73.44), a number that ranks him 21st in the Big 12 Conference is flirting with the school best by a sophomore (the record is 73.29), while his spring mark of 73.33 is currently the 10th best in the program's history. He has posted his two best career finishes this spring, ninth place efforts at the Western Intercollegiate and CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational, as well as a most respectable tie for 20th place at the Big 12 Championships with a 54-hole score of 224. Owns a strong second round average of 72.67, the second best on the team. He is one of two Buffs to have played in all 12 tournaments this year, and his opening round 67 in Stanford's The Nelson last fall is his collegiate best to date and paved the way for him to tie for 10th with a 209 (-4) total.

2002-03 (Fr.): He competed as a true freshman on CU's traveling squad and had quite a debut. His 33 rounds were the third most in school history for a true freshman (Terry Kahl had 39 in 1976-77 and Matthew Zions had 37 in 1998-99), and the fourth most by a freshman overall. He finished second on the team in stroke average (74.70), which was the fifth lowest number ever recorded by any CU true freshman, as 30 of his 33 rounds counted toward team scoring, second best by a frosh in Buff annals. He posted four top 20 finishes, second most on the team, and led the Buffs overall in three different meets including two in the spring: his 218 (+2) paced CU in its own Stevinson Ranch Invitational as he tied for 14th, and a 213 (-3) led all Buff golfers at Arizona State's Thunderbird Invitational (tie-36th). His other top 20 effort was a tie for 19th at the Big 12 Conference championships, only the eighth time a CU freshman placed in the top 20 of a conference meet (dating back to when CU joined the Big Seven in 1948). In the fall, he posted two top 20 finishes out of the gate in his collegiate career: he tied for 18th at the KSU Colbert, in tough conditions on a course set borderline ridiculous, and came back with a 1-under 212 at Stanford's "The Nelson" to tie for 14th three weeks later. At The Prestige, he recorded an opening round 87, but came right back with a 2-under 70, with the 17-shot improvement the second best in school history between rounds of the same tournament. He played in all five fall tournaments as well as in the inaugural GCAA Match Play Championships, where he posted a 1-2-0 record in matches against three top 100 golfers nationally.

High School—He lettered four times in the golf at Elmodena High School in Orange, Calif., where he was the school's No. 1 man since his freshman year. He was a four-time all-league selection, and earned first-team all-county honors as a junior and senior, when he captured back-to-back league championships, including a record low score as a senior (140). He set a school record as a senior for low stroke average (36.5 for nine holes).

Other—2003: He just missed advancing past of the first stage of U.S. Open sectional qualifying, as a 2-under par 70 at Denver's Buffalo Run Golf Course tied for 13th in being just one shot off the pace. He qualified for and played in the U.S. Amateur in Oakmont, Pa., where his 77-72—149 (+9) effort tied for 80th and just missed the cut for match play by two strokes. He also tied for 12th in the SCGA Southern Cal Amateur. **2002:** Qualified and played in the Western Amateur, where he made the cut and tied for 39th with a 71-70-75-74—290 scorecard at the Point O'Woods Golf & Country Club in Benton Harbor, Mich. He also tied for 15th in the AJGA Greensboro Chrysler Classic (71-72-70-72—285). **2001:** He claimed all the major awards for the Southern California PGA Junior Tour, including player of the year, Tournament of Champions medalist (73-69—142) and stroke average champion. He tied for 12th in the AJGA Mission Hills Championship (73-71-72—216), and placed 17th in the AJGA Rrobert Trent Jones Golf Trail Classic (75-72-76—223).

Best Career Round In Competition—62 (August 2001, as a member of the Tustin Ranch Junior Team at the par-71 Costa Mesa CC).

Academics—He is majoring in business at Colorado.

Personal—Born Aug. 28, 1983 in Orange County, Calif. (he is Edward McGlasson IV). Hobbies include photography and body boarding. Father (Ed) played college football at Youngstown State and professionally with both the Los Angeles Rams and New York Giants.

#4 BLAKE MOORE

6-2, 195, Soph., 2L, Monrovia, Calif. (La Salle)

College—This Year (Soph.): He's enjoyed a fine spring, as he owns the second best spring stroke average on the team (72.94). In six tournaments, he's just 35 strokes over par (compared to 17-over for one meet in the fall), and he recorded his first tournament under par in his collegiate career when he finished minus-2 (214) to tie for eighth in the Purdue Boilermaker Invitational. That followed a 13th-place tie in CU's Stevinson Invitational when he was 1-over (217). He's been the model of consistency, with 14 of 18 spring rounds between 70 and 74 (three of the other four were at Prairie Dunes in the Big 12). He broke through for his first round in the 60s in college play when he fired a 67 in the second round at The Maxwell; he tied for 15th overall there with a 211 score. He qualified and played in one fall tournament, tying for 48th at Pepperdine's Club Glove Intercollegiate (233).

2002-03 (Fr.): He participated in six tournaments as a true freshman, one in the fall and the final five of the spring season after becoming a regular on the travel squad. He finished the year with a 76.83 stroke average, sixth on the team, with his 75.67 average for the final round the fourth best among those with six or more meets played. He closed strong in three straight spring tournaments: a final round 70 gave him a 221 total (+5) to tie for 27th at the Louisiana Classics; a 72 in the third round aided a 222 score (+6) to tie for 26th in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational; and a 71 the last time around gave him a 224 total at Arizona State's Thunderbird Invitational. He tied for 36th at the Big 12 Championships, one of three CU frosh in the meet (out of the eight who played in it overall). He struggled a bit his first time out of the gate with a 252 at The Prestige, as he was a candidate to redshirt until he made the travel team for the meet.

High School—He lettered four times in golf for coach Ed O'Conner at Pasadena's La Salle High School. He earned all-league honors four times (freshman through senior years), as he was a four-time league champion. His 35.1 stroke average (for nine holes) as a senior set both a school and league record. He also posted solid averages as a freshman (37), sophomore (36.4) and junior (36.1), and was his team's and the league MVP on three occasions. He also played basketball and soccer.

Other—2004: He was one of three players to shoot a qualifying-round best 67 in the local U.S. Open Qualifying, enabling him to advance to the sectional level. **2003:** He tied for 10th in the SCGA Southern California Amateur, and won the Santa Anita Club Championship by recording a 71-70-73-62—276 (8-under). **2001:** He was an honorable mention AJGA All-American, and won the Golden State Tour event at the SCGA Member's Club in windy conditions (73-68—141) as he ascended into the top 100 in the national rankings. He also won the AJGA Kroger Invitational in Batavia, Ohio (75-69-66—210, with the final round a course record) and the Toyota Tour Cup in Ontario, Calif. (75-66—141). **2000:** He placed second in the Toyota Tour Cup at PGA West (72-75—147), and took sixth in the AJGA Preseason at Diablo Grande (75-73—148).

6-2, 170, Sr., 4L, Lismore, Australia (Trinity Catholic College)

College—This Year (Sr.-5): A legitimate All-America candidate, as he has three wins, six top 10 finishes (11 top 20) and a conference-runner-up 71.11 average that is over a stroke better than the CU single-season school record. He was the Big 12 Conference's golfer of the month for November, the same month he was selected as Colorado's Player of the Year for all levels (pro and amateur). He was the national player of the week by Golfweek for March 22-28, thanks to his first collegiate win which came in the 58th Western Intercollegiate; he won with a 71-67-68—206 (-4) scorecard. Three weeks later, he won again, claiming the Purdue Boilermaker Invitational with a 71-69-66—206 (-10) effort; and a month after that, he won the Perry Maxwell Intercollegiate in a playoff for the hat trick. His 71.83 stroke average in the fall was the third best in school history, and his current spring mark of 70.75 is almost two strokes better than the spring record. For 36 rounds on the year, he is eight strokes under par, as he leads the team in 23 (of 24) statistical categories on the season. He has 141 competitive rounds, the fifth most in school history, and he ranks fourth in top five finishes (10), fourth in top 10 efforts (15) and first in top 20 finishes (27). He has posted 54-hole tournament scores of 220 or better 29 times in his career, a school best, and his career average, 72.84, stands to be the best in school history (the record is 73.47, set by Scott Petersen between 1991-93). Nationally, through May 10, he was ranked seventh in "total short game" with a .669 percentage. At the annual CUSPY's (CU Sports Performers of the Year Awards banquet), he was selected as the Male Career Athletic Achievement Award recipient, and was one of three finalists for CU's overall male athlete of the year.

2002-03 (Sr.): Redshirted; he did so to position himself to graduate by May 2004 as he fell behind his sophomore year due to family reasons (he practiced regularly with the team, however).

2001-02 (Jr.): He got his game going a bit in the spring, posting the spring's second best stroke average on the team (73.63), finishing third on the team for the year at 73.90. In playing in all 13 tournaments for the year, he posted his best two collegiate finishes to date in the spring, when he tied for second in Ohio State's Kepler (74-69—143) and placed third in the Charley Matlock Invitational in Florida (68-71-73—212, or 4-under). He uncharacteristically struggled in the fall season, owning a stroke average of 74.5 and placing between 37th and 48th in CU's four meets. He did end the fall on a better note, as a 70-76-72—218 scorecard, just two-over par, tied him for 38th at The Prestige.

2000-01 (Soph.): He led the Buffs and was seventh in the conference in stroke average (73.29) in earning first-team all-Big 12 honors for a second straight year. He was also the CU team leader in top 10 finishes (5), top 20 finishes (7), rounds in the 60s (4), subpar rounds (6) and percent of rounds counting toward team scoring (97.1, 33 of 34). He tied for seventh at the Big 12 championships to play his way on the all-tournament team, as he recorded an 80-73-74—227 on the tough Prairie Dunes layout. His best finish was in CU's Stevinson Ranch Invitational, where he placed second with a 74-72-68—214 (-2) effort; he came in under par for four tournaments in all. He led the team in stroke average for the fall with a 73.07 mark and was pretty consistent, as 12 of his rounds were between 71 and 75.

1999-2000 (Fr.): As a true freshman, he led the team in stroke average (73.03) and was named the Newcomer of the Year in the Big 12 by the league coaches. He was also named to the All-Big 12 team as well as the All-Big 12 Tournament team, the latter for tying for 11th place at the league championship meet. He posted two top five and five top 20 finishes on the year, and he led CU to a second place finish in its own meet, the CU-Stevinson Ranch Invitational, by tying for fifth with a 72-72-75—219 scorecard. He posted two rounds in the 60s, five sub-par rounds and five even par rounds in playing most consistent his first year in the United States. He participated in four fall tournaments and led the team with a 72.36 stroke average (only 14 strokes over par for 11 rounds). His tied for third in his first collegiate meet, the Colorado State Intercollegiate, carding a one-over par 69-72—141 in the snow-shortened meet. He was very steady, with all 11 rounds between 69 and 75.

High School—He won the Blue Award as a senior for school sporting excellence.

Other—2004: He scored a 70 in the local U.S. Open Qualifying (Buffalo Run G.C. in Commerce City) to place as the fourth alternate. **2003:** Selected as the Colorado Golf Association's Les Fowler Player of the Year for 2003, as he became the first golfer in 30 years to win back-to-back CGA State Stroke Play titles. His 68-72-69-68—277 (-11) scorecard was good for a whopping seven-stroke win at Carbondale's River Valley Ranch G.C. He also won the CGA Public Links Championship (Fox Hollow GC, Lakewood), putting a 63-70-70—203 (-10) into the books; he won in a playoff (on the first extra hole over CU recruit Derek Tolan). He advanced out of the first stage of U.S. Open sectional qualifying, as he tied for third with a 68 at Denver's Buffalo Run Golf Course, but did not qualify out of the regional at Columbine, where he shot 73-71—144, missing the Open by three shots. He finished second in the Colorado Golf Association's Two-Man Championship, teaming with former Buff Stephen Carroll (70-67—137); it was his third straight top three finish in the event. He finished third in the 88th Annual Southwestern Amateur, held at the ASU Karsten Golf Course (70-71-67-64—272; -16) and was just two strokes out of the lead. In September, he successfully defended his Boulder City Amateur title, cruising to an eight-stroke win with a 64-65—129 effort on the par-70 Flatirons Golf Course layout; his opening 64 tied the course record. The CGA selected him as its Player of the Month for June. **2002:** He was the Colorado State Stroke Play champion, as he posted a one shot victory at Saddle Rock Golf Course (Aurora) with a 74-71-72-70—287 effort. He won the Boulder City Amateur by two strokes, carding a 71-69—140 at Flatirons Golf Course, and also won the Highland Hills Amateur. He was also second in the Colorado Two-Man Team Championships and was the seventh low amateur at the Colorado Open (75-73-74-72—294). He just missed qualifying for the U.S. Amateur (72-73—145). **2001:** Finished third in the CGA's Two-Man Team Championship with teammate Joe Liley, as they posted a 65-70—135 score. He was the sixth low amateur, tying for 32nd overall, in the Colorado Open (75-70-74-70—289), and was second in the Ballina Summer Cup. He shot a 70-77—147 in the U.S. Amateur Qualifying at Murphy Creek Golf Club, but did not advance out of Colorado. **Other Years:** He won the 1997 Greg Norman Junior Masters in his native Australia, one of many top amateur accomplishments in his home country. Other top finishes include third in the 1999 Twin Towns Amateur, sixth in the 1998 New Zealand Boys Championships, seventh in the 1998 Australian Junior, second in the 1999 Moolyook Open and the 1999 Northern Rivers Championships. He was a two-time member of the Australian Junior and the New South Wales Junior championship teams, both in 1997 and 1998.

Best Career Round In Competition—59 (Feb. 8, 2001 in a family tournament the day after his father's funeral; by the time his round was over, a sizeable gallery had assembled watching him. Next lowest: 63, first round, 2003 Colorado Golf Association Public Links Championship (Fox Hollow Golf Course, Lakewood, Colo.)

Academics—He majored in communication at Colorado, graduating with his bachelor's degree on May 7 of this year. He was a second-team Academic All-Big 12 team member as a sophomore.
