CU vs. KANSAS STATE... Kansas State has won the last three games against CU at Bramlage Coliseum and holds a 7-5 edge in Manhattan in Big 12 play. Overall, the Wildcats lead the all-time series, 94-43 and have won the last six straight games in the series dating back to 2006. CU's last win came Jan. 28, 2006 in Boulder (79-75).

SINGLE-DIGITS... CU has dropped 11 single-digit losses this season, including eight in the Big 12 (an average of 5.2 points), including a pair in overtime. Last year, the Buffaloes dropped 10 games by single-digits (seven against Big 12 schools). The 11 games lost in single digits is an average of 4.5 points.

LAST GAME vs. K-STATE (Jan. 24)... Junior guard Dwight Thorne II scored 20 of his career-high 30 points in the second half rallying Colorado from an 11-point deficit with 10 minutes remaining, however fell short in overtime as K-State escaped with a 77-75 victory. Jacob Pullen scored five of his team-high 17 points for Kansas State in overtime leading three other K-State players in double figures. Denis Clemente scored all of his 15 points after halftime.

LOOK AT THE WILDCATS... Kansas State has won two of its last five after winning six straight. K-State is the No. 4 seed if they beat CU; Kansas beats Texas and Oklahoma beats OSU... K-State holds the tiebreakers over Texas and Texas A&M. However, if Texas beats Kansas and/or K-State loses to CU on Saturday, the Wildcats would play CU again in the first round in Oklahoma City.

BUFF TIDBITS (team)... CU has lost 10-straight games, a first since the 1985-86 season when they lost their last 17 games of the season ... The Buffs also own the Big 12 record for consecutive road losses (28).

Previous mark was Baylor, 25, set from 2004-07 ... The Buffs have played three OT games this season, the most since playing three in the 2000-01 season (1-2). The last time they played four OTs in season happened in 1959-60 ... In the 108-year history of CU basketball, the Buffs have lost 20 games in three-straight seasons CU has made a three-pointer in 224-consecutive games (7th in the Big 12) ... CU scored 29 bench points against Texas A&M, the second time in three games the bench has scored over 29+ points ... The CU bench scored 38 points compared to only 17 points by CU starters versus the Cowboys (Feb. 25) ... Against OSU, CU committed only eight turnovers, the sixth time the Buffs committed single-digit turnovers this season

BUFF TIDBITS (individual)... Cory Higgins has 11 games this season over 20 or more points (a pair over 30 pts.) ... In Big 12 play, Cory Higgins has led the team in scoring eight times and Dwight Thorne, four times. Austin Dufault, Ryan Kelley, and Levi Knutson have led the team once ... Higgins has led his team in scoring and in rebound-

ing in the same game 10 times this season ... Dufault, Higgins, Thorne II have started all 29 games; Tomlinson has started every game he has played in (26) and has missed three games due to injury (TCU, OSU, BU).

MORE TEAM NOTES... CU's 46-41 loss at Nebraska was the lowest point total (87 pts.) since March 5, 1960 (CU 41, Oklahoma State 39 in Stillwater) ... CU made five 3-pointers in the first half at Nebraska, that's a team-high in 12 conference games for three-pointers in the first half, second most behind six treys made against Arkansas-Pine Bluff ... The Buffs out-rebounded the Cornhuskers 35-25 (Feb. 18) and for the first time all conference season out-rebounded a Big 12 opponent and by double-digits ... CU's 76 points scored against Texas (Feb. 14) was the most points scored by a CU team since netting 80 against Coppin State at the Rainbow Classic ... The Buffs were 14-of-14 from the free throw line in the second half against the Longhorns and finished 25-of-29 (.862). It was the ninth time in 12 league outings that CU has hit at 70 percent or better.

FT RECORD HOLDER... Cory Higgins reigns as the CU and the Big 12 free throw record holder with 45-straight made free throws over eight games. Since then, he rattled off another 23-straight over three games ending at Texas Tech. On the season, he's .836 (153-of-183, 42nd nationally as of Feb. 16).

40+MINUTES... Cory Higgins, Dwight Thorne, Nate Tomlinson and Austin Dufault are the only players to have played 40-plus minutes in a game this season. Higgins has done it five times this season, followed by once by Thorne II, Tomlinson and Dufault, all in overtime games.

35+MINUTE MEN... More impressively the same four players have recorded 35-plus minutes a number of times. Cory Higgins in 23 games; Dwight Thorne 15 games; Nate Tomlinson 11 times, and Austin Dufault six games.

CU IN THE PRO WORLD... There is a number of CU basketball members with ties to the professional ranks. From head coach Jeff Bzdelik to the three student-athletes.

Coach Bzdelik: Head Coach of the Denver Nuggets (2002-05);

Casey Crawford: father, Steve played with the Boston Red Sox;

Austin Dufault: cousin-in-law, Fred Hoiberg played with the Indiana Pacers, Chicago Bulls, and Minnesota Timberwolves. Currently the Assistant General Manager of the Minnesota Timberwolves.

Dwight Thorne II: cousin, Acie Law IV played for the Texas A&M Aggies and great uncle, Ernie Banks played with the Cubs.

WORK IN PROGRESS... Although Coach Bzdelik and his team have had their ups and downs in his second year and with the tough conference season ahead, let's take a look at three of the school's all-time winningest coaches in football, men's and women's basketball in their second season.

Football: Bill McCartney, 13 seasons (1982-1994), 93-55-5 (.624): 4-7 in second year.

Men's BB: Sox Walseth, 20 seasons (1957-76), 261-245 (.516): 8-15 in second year.

Women's BB: Ceal Barry, 22 seasons (1983-2005), 427-242 (.638), 6-22 in second year.

FALL 2008 SEMESTER... The team G.P.A. for the spring semester was 2.713 ranking as the second highest GPA for the men's basketball team since the Spring of 1999 (Spring 2001 was the highest at 2.74). The CU men had nine student-athletes with a 2.9 grade point average or higher. The team also has four student-athletes with a 3.0 or better G.P.A. (Trent Beckley, Austin Dufault, Trey Eckloff, Levi Knutson).

FG%... During non-conference play, the Buffs shot above 50 percent from the floor eight out of 14 games, going 6-2. That is the most .500 shooting games since the 2000-01 season when the Buffs recorded eight games of .500 or better shooting. The last time CU recorded more than eight games of shooting .500 or better from the floor in non-conference play was the 1985-86 season when they went 8-2 in 10 games. Ironically, the Buffs were also 8-6 after non-conference play in the 1985-86 season, Tom Miller's first as Colorado's head coach, unfortunately the Buffs finished the season on a 17-game losing streak going 0-15 in

YOUTH MOVEMENT... A combination of 10 underclassmen (five freshmen and five sophomores) highlight the roster matching one of the youngest CU teams in history. Back in 2006-07, CU had 10 underclassmen (eight freshmen), in addition to the 1992-93 season (four freshmen, six sophomores).

CU SINCE 1996-97... In the 13-year history of the Big 12 Conference, CU is shooting a team-best from the free throw line so far this season.

Sophomore guard Cory Higgins was the first CU student-athlete to lead the team in rebounds AND assists the first two games of any season since 1973-74. It's a Coors Events Conference Center mark (building opened in 1979). The research was stopped at the 1972-73 season because assists were not kept. So, in the last 35 years, no CU player has led his team in rebounding AND assists in the first two games of the season.

20012-13 CLASS... On Nov. 12, the CU mbb team announced that **Alec Burks**, **Keegan Hornbuckle**, and **Shane Harris-Tunks** officially signed National Letters of Intent.

"With the signing of these three young men, once again we have taken a major step toward creating the vision for this program," Bzdelik said. "All three are highly skilled, highly intelligent and play with a competitive spirit."

Burks is a 6-foot-5 shooting guard from Grandview, Mo., is a skilled left-handed player who is capable of playing point-guard and will fit CU's system because of his ability to shoot from distance and slash to the basket. He committed to CU over Kansas State.

Hornbuckle is a 6-foot-6 small forward from Los Angeles, Calif., is a smooth shooter with deep three-point range and the ability to finish above the rim in transition. Hornbuckle helped Campbell Hall High to a 31-5 record as a junior in 2007. He is rated as the No. 34 small forward/shooting guard by Scout.com. Hornbuckle selected CU over Arizona and Arizona State.

Harris-Tunks is a 6-foot-11 center/forward from Sydney, Australia, will join current CU freshman guard Nate Tomlinson, who also hails from Sydney. Harris-Tunks is the third recruit to sign with the Buffaloes, selected CU over Vanderbilt and Gonzaga.

Harris-Tunks spent the last year and a half at the Australian Institute of Sport, a prestigious academy that has college like demands both athletically and academically.

JEFF BZDELIK - HEAD COACH

Jeff Bzdelik begins his second year as the University of Colorado men's basketball head coach continuing to build the Buffaloes to greater heights in one of the best basketball conferences nationally.

Bzdelik (buzz-DEL-ik), 56, a man synonymous with success on both the professional and college levels in the state of Colorado, was named the 17th men's basketball head coach on April 4, 2007.

During his first season on the Boulder campus, Bzdelik and his staff saw a mix of positives and negatives in their 12-20 campaign. CU remained competitive despite its lack of depth losing nine games by an average of 4.8 points. The defense allowed opponents an average of 64.4 points per game, its lowest in 46 years, while committing 13.4 turnovers a game – another school-low in 28 years.

Entering the 2008-09 season, CU will again be one of the youngest and most inexperienced team in the Big 12 with five freshmen on the roster, in addition to five sophomores, two juniors and one senior.

Bzdelik came to Colorado from the United States Air Force Academy, where he guided the Falcons to a 50-16 record (a 75.8 winning percentage) in two seasons from 2005-07. During those two seasons he led the Falcons to a 2005-06 NCAA Tournament and a 2006-07 NIT Final Four appearance.

Bzdelik brings 30 years of coaching experience to the Boulder campus from the collegiate to the professional ranks. He returned to the college game in 2005-06 after 15 seasons as both a coach and scout in the NBA, including two-and-a-half seasons as head coach of the Denver Nuggets.

His two-year win total of 50 victories at the Academy was a school-best in any two-year span of the 51-year history of Air Force basketball, while his 26 victories in 2006-07 was also a school high. He's the only coach to have won at least 24 games in back-to-back seasons. Bzdelik guided the Falcons to a 31-1 home record, including a 15-0 mark in 2005-06 and 16-1 in 2006-07.

In 2005-06, Bzdelik led the Falcons to a 24-7 record and the school's fourth appearance ever in the NCAA Tournament. He also led the Falcons to a 12-4 record and second place finish in the Mountain West Conference. Air Force also capped the season leading the nation for the fourth consecutive season in scoring defense.

"Jeff symbolizes all the essential leadership qualities that are important to successfully direct the Buff basketball program and represent the University of Colorado with class and distinction," Bohn said. "His high level of professionalism, competitive spirit, work ethic and integrity makes him the perfect choice for our world class institution."

"With the hiring of Jeff Bzdelik, the University of Colorado at Boulder has made a strong statement about our values as well as our athletic aspirations," said CU Chancellor Bud Peterson. "Coach Bzdelik's experience, commitment to excellence, concern for his players as scholar-athletes, along with his intensity and attention to detail, are a perfect fit for the type of environment we are creating here at CU."

Prior to returning to the college ranks with the Air Force Academy, Bzdelik was the Denver Nuggets head coach for two-and-a-half seasons (2002-2005). He was named head coach in August of 2002 after spending one year as a scout for the Nuggets. Bzdelik engineered one of the biggest turnarounds in NBA history during his second season in 2003-04, leading the Nuggets to the playoffs for the first time since 1994-95 while posting a 43-39 record. The 26-game improvement over the previous year was the sixth-best in NBA history.

Bzdelik also became the first coach in league history (since the adoption of an 82-game schedule) to guide a team to the playoffs the year after winning less than 20 games. In his first season, Bzdelik earned NBA-wide praise for Denver's competitiveness, work ethic and never-give-up attitude. Despite having the youngest team in franchise history, Bzdelik's team shattered the franchise record for scoring defense by more than five points per game, giving up only 92.4 per outing. In addition, the Nuggets led the league in turnovers forced (17.1 per game) and had six of the top 12 marks for single-season scoring defense.

Surprisingly to many, he was let go by the Nuggets after just 28 games into the 2004-05 season, with the team off to a 13-15 start. But that decision would eventually become Air Force's and now Colorado's gain.

From 1995-2001, Bzdelik was an assistant coach under Pat Riley in Miami, holding the title of Assistant Coach/Director of Scouting during the final two years. With the Heat, he was responsible for the preparation of all game plans, video coordination and statistical data as well as player development.

In 2000, he was recognized by *The USA Today* as one of the NBA's top five assistant coaches. In the 1998 Pro Basketball issue of *Sports Illustrated*, he was voted as the NBA's best advance scout by league general managers.

Prior to his tenure with the Heat, Bzdelik spent the 1994-95 season as the lead scout for Riley and the New York Knicks. He also served as an assistant coach with the Washington Bullets from 1988-94 and was Wes Unseld's first assistant in 1993-94. In addition, he coached the Bullets summer league team in 1988 and 1994.

The Illinois native began his coaching career in 1978 at Davidson (N.C.) College. In 1980, he was named an assistant coach at Northwestern University where he spent six seasons and was instrumental in the Wildcats' first NIT appearance in school history.

He then accepted his first head coaching position at the University of Maryland-Baltimore County, one he would handle for two years before moving on to the NBA.

During the 1986-87 season at UMBC, his squad was cited by *The Sporting News* as having "One of College's Biggest Turnarounds," in the school's inaugural season in Division I. After going just 11-44 the previous two seasons as a Division II program before Bzdelik's arrival, UMBC went 12-16 in his first year and 13-15 in 1987-88 in Division I. His teams excelled in the classroom as well, posting a 2.86 grade point average during his tenure.

Bzdelik is a 1976 graduate of the University of Illinois-Chicago, where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education. He earned four varsity letters in basketball at UIC and was named team MVP as a senior in 1975-76. He still holds the school record for the best free-throw percentage in one season, shooting 88.1 percent (59-for-67) from the line in 1975-76 and still ranks among UIC's all-time leading scorers.

Bzdelik also spent six years in the Army National Guard during the early to mid 1970s.

In June 2008, Bzdelik was one of six coaches invited by the USO (United Service Organizations) to visit and experience the Persian Gulf called "Operation Hoop Talk: Talking Hoops with the Troops."

During the tour, Bzdelik and the coaches visited Bethesda and Walter Reed Hospitals in Washington, D.C., visiting wounded military personnel and toured multiple military posts in Kuwait City and Iraq. The coaches also posed for photos, signed autographs and spent quality time talking with military about the game of basketball, in addition helping boost troop morale bringing a touch of home to those in uniform.

"It keeps things in perspective," said Bzdelik on how the experience affected him. "As a coach you are in awe of the collective will, of sacrificing the individual for the collective good, of unselfishness, and dedication. And the military is the best example of this. I want to rally this message to my team, and hopefully that will help them grow. I would go back tomorrow. There is special spirit there that engulfs one, and you just feel it, and want to be around it."

Bzdelik was born December 1, 1952 and graduated from Prospect High School in Mount Prospect, Ill. He is married to the former Nina Bernardzik, who was a standout volleyball player at UIC from 1974-76 and is a member of the Flames' Athletic Hall of Fame. They are the parents of two children, Brett (19) and Courtney (17).

Bzdelik Quotes - Game-by-Game**Nov. 14, 2008 vs. Arkansas-Pine Bluff (W 76-56)**

"It was what I hoped would happen. This team is unselfish; you just have to look at the box score and see that four players were in double digits. They are not afraid to pass the ball to one another; we had 18 assists on 27 baskets. They care, they are passionate and they are coachable."

Nov. 18, 2008 vs. Montana State (L 85-82)

"Give Montana State credit. I think we were soft on defense, and soft rebounding the ball. And that was what we talked about all week when game planning. I think that the team learned a lesson about the intensity level that needs to be exhibited all the time on defense and on the boards. I am proud of the fact that our players did not quit and battled back and that is a testimony to their character. We fell short because we dug such a deep hole. We were just not very sharp tonight."

Nov. 22, 2008 vs. Harvard (W 70-57)

"I want to teach them, motivate them, encourage them, and have them get better. Winning is a byproduct of getting better. I'm not worried about winning or losing right now because the results will be there as we continue to get better. I tell them to be fearless. I'm not going to get mad if you miss a shot or try to do the right thing with effort. I want them to be fearless. They are a very unselfish team."

Nov. 25, 2008 vs. Lafayette (W 73-59)

"There was a lot of good. We shot 51% from the field, we got to the free throw line 30 times, and we had four players in double digits, so that means that we are unselfish and share the ball. Those are all great things. But I think that we need to improve our defensive rebounding and turnovers. They affect the game in a big way. We defended well. When you play teams like Lafayette and Harvard, they make you cut hard. You have to be rock solid to be in the proper position. We have to culminate the defense with rebounding and get out and run, because we are a good team when we get out and run."

Nov. 29, 2008 at Stanford (L 76-62)

"We've got to defend better and rebound the ball better. There is a lot of youth out there. I'm really proud of our basketball team, I thought they competed hard. We just need to keep getting better and to learn. I think they are starting to realize they can compete. I think we did a little better on the boards than we normally have done."

Dec. 3, 2008 vs. TCU (L 62-46)

"The worst feeling for a coach is when your team doesn't play with emotion, discipline, or passion, and appears to just be disorganized. That's on me and it's a rotten feeling. We had a great crowd, great student body turn-out and it's really a shame we couldn't at least give any kind of effort. Obviously I have to do a much better job than I have been doing."

Dec. 10, 2008 vs. Colorado State (W 75-56)

"I was really proud of the effort. It was a wire-to-wire effort. We just kept battling and staying within our offense. We had 16 assists on 28 baskets, we had four guys in double-digits, we drew charges, and we battled on the boards. We made a couple adjustments defensively. That was the first time we have run a 1-3-1 [zone defense]. We have been working on that in practice the last five or six days. It's something I have never run as a coach and tried to catch Colorado State off-guard."

Dec. 19, 2008 vs. Prairie View A&M (W 72-47)

"Coming off a nine-day layoff with finals and spotty practice time and location, with players coming in and out of practice because of study sessions and tutors, I am very happy with how we came out of the gate. I thought we were pretty active for the most part. We turned the ball over too much. What we get out of it is all of these guys are getting as much court time as they can. All of these guys need experience and getting out there in front of people and playing is how you gain experience period."

Dec. 23, 2008 vs. Louisiana-Monroe (W 65-62)

"The lesson to be learned from this is we got to block people out with great force. They had 15 points on the offensive glass, probably should have had more. We need to rebound, take charges, get our nose dirty, get bloodied up, and skin our knees for all 40 minutes from everybody. We made the right plays at the right time and that is a positive to build on."

Dec. 28, 2008 vs. Coppin State (at Rainbow Classic) (W 80-63)

"There were a lot of good things tonight, we shot 55 percent from the floor, 50 percent of our three-point shots and 88 percent from the line, we outrebounded somebody and we have four players in double figures. But 18 turnovers, that's not so good. Buffalo is a very good basketball team and they gave Connecticut all they could handle. They are very strong and physical. We'll have to do a much better job of taking care of the basketball and hitting the boards."

Dec. 29, 2008 vs. Buffalo (at Rainbow Classic) (L 62-60)

"We dug ourselves such a deep hole in the beginning. Buffalo had more energy than we did and they had a will and a want-to. I can't dive on the floor, or take a charge, I would if I could. But I can't do those things and we drill and show them those things. We got beat on the boards and we turned the ball over too much in the beginning."

Dec. 30, 2008 vs. Vermont (at Rainbow Classic) (L 84-59)

"As freshman they're learning hard lessons. With a young team, three games in three days runs a whole gamut of emotions and the preparations are different. It is all part of the process and if you're going to build this team right you have to start at the ground level and there are hard lessons."

Jan. 5, 2009 at SMU (L 70-67)

"We're just not deep enough. I wish I had confidence in our bench, but people don't see what I see in practice. They need to step up and help because we run out of gas and get a step slow in parts of the game and that hurts us. You can't expedite experience, it just has to happen."

Jan. 7, 2009 vs. Western State (W 65-52)

"It was all over the map. There are signs that are very encouraging, and there are things that are very disappointing. We have a good field goal percentage. Our free throw percentage has moved up there. So we are shooting the ball pretty well. However, our rebounding is not very good. And we will continue to work on that. I have been patient, it is about handling them right. At half time, I didn't panic and I didn't raise my voice. We just talked about the adjustments we needed to make. I played a lot of players in the first half to give them some time."

Jan. 14, 2009 at Missouri (L 107-62)

"That's all we practiced and emphasized was to in-bound the ball, advance the ball and get a good shot and yet we turned the ball over 26 times to yield 30 points. The combination of missing layups, turning the ball over and breakdowns defensively, it snowballed quickly."

Jan. 17, 2009 vs. Kansas (L 73-56)

"Obviously, in order to have chance for success in basketball, the first two criteria are to value the possession of the basketball, and yield nothing easy for the opponents. Those are the two areas that our young basketball team has not quite done yet. Kansas scored 37 of their 73 points off of bad turnovers and second chance points. Those are areas that constantly kill us. Hopefully all this experience they are gaining now will pay off in the future. I am not discouraged, and I am excited about the future of this program."

Jan. 20, 2009 at Texas Tech (L 63-55)

"Our guys really tried to play to win and they battled their butt off. But we can't lose our spirit and we didn't. We played really hard and just came up a little short in a lot of areas. A little bit here and a little bit there makes a difference. We just have to be a little bit more efficient. It's just a case where we just need to keep battling more and keep improving."

Jan. 24, 2009 vs. Kansas State (L 77-75 OT)

"Every possession has to matter. To start the game we were down 20-10 and already had seven turnovers. Why did we lose? If we have two or three less turnovers and two or three defensive rebounds, a little better execution on the timeout plays would have been better too. We have progressively gotten better, but we're not into that, we're into winning. The winning and losing will take care of itself if we get better in those areas. We need to be down to 12 or less turnovers and we can't allow teams to get 13 offensive rebounds."

Jan. 27, 2009 vs. Iowa State (W 55-49)

"We made some timely stops and we made some timely shots. We only turned the ball over three times in the second half. We started the second half only 3-of-15 shooting the basketball. We had some really good looks, we got the ball in the post and we drove the ball well. The fact we didn't turn the ball over allowed us to continue to get good shots and not give them easy points. The fact we held them even on the boards, and they only had three offensive rebounds. We were solid and we defended well. [Craig] Brackins did get 24 but nobody else scored in double-digits, in fact their next leading scorer was six points from [Lucca] Staiger and [Bryan] Petersen."

Jan. 31, 2009 at Kansas (L 66-61)

"I thought we came out very tentative. We gave up offensive rebounds in the first half and had a lot of open shots that we didn't make. I thought we grew as a basketball team considerably. We got in our stance defensively, we attacked and played aggressively. We're getting better; we just have to keep growing as a team. I'm proud of this team because they battled back."

Feb. 4, 2009 vs. Nebraska (L 55-53)

"We are not tough enough or strong enough to finish around the rim. We had open shots that we have to make. We shot 46% and had 13 turnovers and about four of those were unforced, where we are trying to make a pass where we shouldn't or travelling in the open floor. We have guys who are strong, but we are not strong enough or tough enough. You can blame it on youth if you want, but I am not going to do that. I am not into moral victories, and I know some people around here are, but I am not. Every possession is critical for a team that has little margin for error."

Feb. 7, 2009 at Oklahoma (L 77-72)

"There was a two and a half minute segment in there where we turned the ball over three times. We only had nine turnovers in the game but one was a real bad turnover. We had a chance to take a charge on [Blake] Griffin and we didn't. Then we didn't box out on the free throw and [Tony] Crocker made the three. They're not getting rewarded with W's," Bzdelik said of his young team. "But they keep battling and that shows you what type of young people they are and the type of program we want to build."

Feb. 11, 2009 at Iowa State (L 70-42)

"It was a very disappointing beginning for us. I was concerned about the approach our team had mentally. I thought at Kansas and Oklahoma we knew we had to play so hard to compete and we did and we found ourselves in the ball game. Against Iowa State, I sensed we were comfortable knowing we beat them once. That's not good enough."

Feb. 14, 2009 vs. Texas (L 85-76, ot)

"First of all I am very proud of my basketball team, with the exception of one half versus Iowa State. They are working hard to improve, their competitive spirit is great. Gaining wisdom and experience are coming at the high cost of tough losses. They need to keep believing. I thought that our fans were awesome. We are just going to continue to work hard to turn this thing around. We are not quite physically strong enough, and we are not there mentally in certain aspects of the game."

Feb. 18, 2009 at Iowa State (L 46-41)

"We had every opportunity to seize the lead but we couldn't finish. We put ourselves in position for the win and we need to not waiver with our competitive spirit. We had some empty possessions; it wasn't anything they did, it was what we didn't do. A lot of those turnovers we just lost the ball. That's getting back to being mature and a little stronger and again, time will heal that."

Feb. 21, 2009 vs. 11/10 Missouri (L 66-53)

"We don't play well all the time but they are trying and competing which is testimony to how they are as people and how they're wired. I'm going to keep challenging and keep pushing them. They're growing up the hard way but that's a good thing."

Feb. 25, 2009 vs. Oklahoma State (L 76-55)

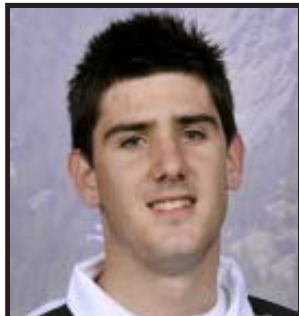
"The lack of passion and effort from a great majority of our team was embarrassing. Even though we haven't won a lot of games we have played with a lot of effort and passion and a commitment to play the game the right way. Tonight that was absent from a great majority of the team. I know I am embarrassed, I would hope our team is embarrassed because I am. No excuses, we got our butt beat. Defensively we were chasing people instead of guarding people. Early on, we got sucked in on flat drives and didn't locate shooters. Everybody has to be collectively engaged with a commitment to playing hard and right for all 40 minutes for us to have a chance to win."

Feb. 28, 2009 at Baylor (L 75-57)

"Give Baylor credit, they make shots and we don't make shots. It's a combination of us not being able to defend combined with the fact that we turned the ball over. We had some open shots and couldn't make them and we missed some free throws. It's just the school of hard knocks. We're just not good enough to finish plays whether it's on the offensive or defensive end."

March 4, 2009 vs. Texas A&M (L 72-66)

"They had an 11-2 run in the first four minutes of the second half. We can't do that, but we fought back. We had some open looks, couldn't make them, and we went 8-of-15 from the foul line. We've put ourselves in positions to win ball games 11 times this year. We don't finish at the rim. We're losing to teams that are going to be in the NCAA Tournament, so what's the difference? You need to lift every other day to get stronger so we can finish plays around the rim and contest position defensively. There were a lot of good things we did; ten turnovers, 17 assists, and 10 steals, but we missed foul shots and took possessions off defensively. We lost [B.J.] Holmes and [Josh] Carter three or four times. It all adds up over the course of a game. We take possessions off mentally and we have very little margin for error."

Game #1, Nov. 14 vs. ARK.-PINE BLUFF BOULDER - Sophomore Casey Crawford and freshman Austin Dufault scored 14 and 13 points, respectively leading the Colorado men's basketball team to a 76-56 season opening victory over Arkansas-Pine Bluff.

With 10 underclassmen on its roster — five freshmen and five sophomores — Colorado headed into the season with one of the youngest teams in school history, and youth figured prominently in the Buffaloes strong start.

Nate Tomlinson, part of a starting lineup that included two freshmen, two sophomores and a junior, added 12 points in his first college game. Cory Higgins also had 12 points and a team-high six assists for CU, which opened a 40-20 halftime lead.

Colorado outscored the Golden Lions 19-5 over the final 7:07 of the first session with Tomlinson, Higgins and Crawford all hitting 3's during the run.

Lebaron Weathers led Arkansas-Pine Bluff with game-high 22 points. Tavaris Washington added 18 points despite fouling out with 4:27 remaining.

CU shot 50% from the field in both halves (51.9% for the game). The Buffaloes made 10 three-pointers from the new NCAA 3-point line of 20'9", one of the new NCAA rule changes instituted for the 2008-09 season.

The 10 three-pointers are the most for the CU team since making ten against Oklahoma State Feb. 3, 2007. CU also added 18 assists to their 27 field goals made for the game

Game #2, Nov. 18 vs. MONTANA STATE BOULDER - Senior Dwight Thorne II and sophomore Cory Higgins each scored 21 points, however CU's rally fell short in overtime as the visiting Montana State Bobcats escaped with an 85-82 overtime win in Boulder.

Levi Knutson added 12 points and Austin Dufault tallied 11 points for the Buffs. Higgins also had a game-high five assists, four steals and grabbed a team-high seven rebounds.

Jermyl Jackson-Wilson and Nate Tomlinson each added five rebounds for CU (1-1).

Marquis Navarre's runner in the lane with 52.7 seconds remaining in the extra period broke a tie at 80, sending the Bobcats to their sixth straight win over the Buffaloes.

MSU (1-1) has won the last six meetings in the series dating back to 1924. CU won the first meeting in 1924, however the Bobcats won three times in the 1930's, once in Boulder (1994) and the most recent, 1998 played in Billings.

The Buffaloes trailed by as many as 15 points in the second half, before rallying to tie it late in regulation on a Knutson drive with 15 seconds remaining. In the extra session, Thorne opened up the scoring for CU with a three-pointer, however MSU's Bobby Howard (24 points) hit a three-pointer - their 11th of the game, to tie it at 78.

After the teams traded points, making it 80-80, Montana State finally pushed ahead on a pair of free throws by Danny Piepoli (19 points) giving MSU the lead they would not relinquish.

Game #3, Nov. 22 VS. HARVARD BOULDER - Redshirt-sophomore Casey Crawford came off the bench to score a career-high 18 points leading Colorado to a 70-57 win over the Harvard Crimson.

This is the first time in 60 years that the two teams have played one another. CU now owns a 2-0 record against the Crimson (1-1).

Crawford scored 14 of his team-high 18 points in the second half and added a personal-best four three-pointers. Cory Higgins added 14 points and grabbed nine rebounds (the third straight game he has led the team in rebounds) for the home team that saw balanced scoring sending four players in double digits for the third straight game.

Dwight Thorne II and Austin Dufault each added 11 for the Buffs (2-1).

Colorado made a season best 52.5 percent (21-of-40) from the field and hit 77.8 percent (21-of-27) from the free throw line. CU also out-rebounded Harvard, 28-25, a season-first out-rebounding their opponent.

Harvard led at the break holding a 34-29 edge on 52 percent from the field (14-of-25) led by Linn's seven points and career-best three steals. Linn had five for the game.

CU mounted its comeback with under 12 minutes to play when Dufault scored five of his 11 points cutting CU's deficit to 47-45.

With 6:57 remaining, a three-point play by Levi Knutson tied it at 49. A three-pointer by Thorne 26 seconds later, then a three-point play by Higgins on CU's next possession pushed the advantage to six points and a 55-49 lead. CU out-scored Harvard, 41-23 in the second half.

Harvard lived-and-died with the 3-pointer, making 4-of-9 in the first half, helping the Crimson shoot 56 percent from the field (14-of-25). In the second half, Harvard only shot 1-of-8 from the arc ending up with 29.4 percent for the game.

BOULDER - Sophomore guard Cory Higgins scored a career-high 24 points, and junior Dwight Thorne II added 14 points leading Colorado to a 73-59 victory over Lafayette College (Pa.).

The Leopards, who never led, have lost three in a row falling to 2-3. CU's win was their first-ever victory against Lafayette and the Patriot League.

For the fourth straight game, CU (3-1) received balanced scoring in addition to Higgins and Thorne II. Freshman Austin Dufault added 11 points and point-guard Nate Tomlinson added 10 points, four rebounds and three assists.

Jermyl Jackson-Wilson grabbed a career-high 11 defensive rebounds.

The Buffs used balanced scoring throughout the opening 20 minutes to remain in front by a 34-27 margin at the break.

In the second half, the Leopards rallied in the opening stages of the game on a 7-3 run cutting its deficit to 37-33, however CU remained ahead on a brilliant Tomlinson alley-oop pass to Higgins for a 39-33. A three-point play by Thorne increased CU's lead to 48-40 with 11 minutes remaining.

The Buffs kept up the momentum, going on a seven-point run with Dufault and Higgins each making two free throws, and then Tomlinson added a trey at the top of the key giving the Buffs their largest margin of the night, a 19-point cushion at 64-45.

CU shot 22-of-43 (51.2 percent) from the field and hit 23-of-30 (76.7 percent) from the free throw line, while Lafayette only managed 35.1 percent from the field (20-of-57). The Buffs also capitalized on their quickness racking up a season-high 11 steals compared to Lafayette's four.

PALO ALTO, Calif. - Dwight Thorne II and Nate Tomlinson each scored 18 points, however the Stanford Cardinal ran to a 76-62 victory in the second year matchup of the two schools in the Big 12/Pac-10 Hardwood Series.

Thorne also added six rebounds and two steals, tying his career-high in both. Freshman Austin Dufault netted 10 points, his fifth consecutive game in double figures. Sophomore Cory Higgins scored nine points and added four rebounds for the Buffs in their first visit to Stanford in 17 years.

Colorado drops to 3-2 while Stanford remains undefeated (4-0). CU is 3-7 all-time against Stanford.

"We've got to defend better and rebound the ball better," said CU head coach Jeff Bzdelik. "There is a lot of youth out there. I'm really proud of our basketball team, I thought they competed hard."

For the fourth time this season, Colorado shot at least 50 percent from the floor as they hit 25-of-50 while Stanford hit 27-of-56 (48.2 percent). During the second half, CU improved to 59 percent (13-of-22) from the field. The Cardinal finished with a 33-30 rebounding advantage.

Josh Owens led Stanford with 21 points and Lawrence Hill added 16. Stanford led a balanced attack with four players in double figures.

Thorne hit a pair of 3-pointers in the final two minutes as Colorado went on a 7-1 run to draw within 42-32 at halftime. The Buffs managed to get within single digits when a layup by Thorne early in the second half brought the score to 44-37, the closest CU would come. Tomlinson scored 12 of his season-high 18 points in the second half.

Game #6, Dec. 3 vs. TCU

BOULDER - The Texas Christian University Horned Frogs raced out to a 12-0 lead in the opening six minutes and defeated Colorado, 62-46 at the Coors Events Center.

CU shot 28 percent in the first half (6-of-21), while the Horned Frogs countered with only 9-of-25 (36 percent), however capitalized on CU's 13 first half turnovers.

Cory Higgins led the Buffs scoring with 16 points and eight rebounds. Austin Dufault added eight points, while Dwight Thorne II and Ryan Kelley each added six points.

CU played without freshman starting point-guard Nate Tomlinson, who suffered a foot injury during the Arkansas-Pine Bluff game back on Nov. 14.

TCU kept the Buffaloes at bay in the first half holding the home team to only 14 points and a 10-point intermission advantage.

The Buffs' 14 points in the first half mirrored the 14 scored in the first half last season at Nebraska (Mar. 9, 2008; CU lost 68-49).

TCU came out strong in the second half as Ronnie Moss hit six unanswered points increasing the visitors lead to 36-19. Colorado came within 10 points on a layup by Levi Knutson, but the Horned Frogs went on a 8-0 run with six minutes remaining capped by a Kevin Butler layup. A three-pointer by Edvinas Ruzgas one minute later gave TCU their biggest lead at 60-36 with 3:15 remaining.

In the second half, TCU hit 14-of-25 (56 percent) while Colorado improved to 52.4 percent (11-of-21). Both teams committed seven turnovers in the second half.

BOULDER – Sophomore Cory Higgins scored 28 of his career-high 33 points in the second half, leading Colorado to a 75-56 victory over Colorado State.

CU (4-3) breaks a two-game losing streak, while the Rams (3-6) suffer their fourth straight loss.

The Buffs placed four players in double-digits for the fifth time this season. Austin Dufault scored 12 points, Nate Tomlinson and Dwight Thorne II added 11 and 10 points, respectively.

CU shot 58.3 percent (28-of-48) from the field, including 66.7 percent (16-of-24) in the second half, while Colorado State hit 22-of-53 (41.5 percent) for the game.

The game was tied 28-28 at the break, then CSU opened up their biggest lead of the game led by forward Dan Vandervieren's 10-consecutive points pushing the visitors advantage to 40-32.

CU answered with its own run led by Higgins and Dufault's five points each, in addition to a jumper by Tomlinson, pushing CU ahead 43-42 with just under 13 minutes remaining.

From there, both teams traded baskets and remained tied at 48-all with 9:35 to go. The home team finally pushed ahead to stay, led by Higgins, who scored 19 of the team's final 32 points, cruising to the 19-point victory. CU outscored the Rams 27-to-10 the final 9:35 of the game.

CSU was led by Dan Vandervieren's career-high 16 points on 8-of-11 shooting from the field. Vandervieren's points were all scored in the second half.

Higgins' 33 points matches the most points scored at the Events Center since Michel Morandais netted 33 against Missouri on February 23, 2002. Higgins also added a team-best six rebounds, the fifth time he has led the team on the boards in a game.

BOULDER – Sophomore Cory Higgins scored a game-high 17 points and grabbed eight rebounds, and junior Dwight Thorne II added 12 points leading Colorado to a 72-47 victory over Prairie View A&M.

The Buffaloes (5-3) idle for nine days have won two-straight, while the Panthers lost their fourth consecutive falling to 3-8.

The Buffs also improved to 5-0 all-time against the SWAC and defeated the Panthers for the first time in their lone meeting.

Higgins, named the Phillips 66 Big 12 Player of the Week (Dec. 8-14) after his career-best 33-points against Colorado State back on Dec. 10, remained red-hot in the scoring column, netting 15 first half points on a trio of three-pointers.

Thorne also chipped-in with nine of his 12 points in the first half.

The Buffs pushed their first half lead to 31-14 on an 11-0 run over a 4:04 minute span led by Higgins' seven points.

Coming into the game, CU brought the nation's 12th best shooting percentage from the field (.505) with a blistering 54.8 percent (17-of-31) in the opening half. CU also dominated in the paint, holding a 20-8 edge and another 20 points off 13 Prairie A&M turnovers.

CU received balanced play from senior Jermyl Jackson-Wilson (eight points, seven rebounds). Thorne and freshman Austin Dufault added five assists apiece helping CU to a season-best 21 hand-overs.

The Panthers were led by Christopher Jones and Dorian McDaniel with nine and eight points, respectively. It's the first time since Dec. 27, 1999 where the Buffs did not allow a double-digit scorer holding Villanova to that feat at the Rainbow Classic.

HONOLULU - Sophomore Cory Higgins led an underclassmen assault here Sunday night with his first career double-double to lead Colorado to an 80-63 victory over the Coppin State in the first round of the 45th Annual Outrigger Hotels Rainbow Classic.

Higgins scored 21 points and collected a career-high 10 rebounds, doing much of his damage from the foul line where he converted all 12 of his attempts, the third best performance from the stripe in school history. It was the fifth time this year he led CU in both scoring and rebounding and he ran his consecutive streak of free throws made to 28.

Sophomore transfer Casey Crawford added 12 points, junior Dwight Thorne 11 and senior Jermyl Jackson-Wilson 10, while freshman Nate Tomlinson scored nine points on three long-range three-pointers and dished out a season and career high six assists.

Colorado (7-3) won its fourth straight game, its longest winning streak in nearly three years.

Coppin State (1-9) dropped its ninth straight game, though the Eagles came in playing one of the nation's toughest schedules including losses to three ranked teams while playing just once at home.

"There were a lot of good things tonight, we shot 55 percent from the floor, 50 percent of our three-point shots and 88 percent from the line, we outrebounded somebody and we have four players in double figures," CU head coach Jeff Bzdelik said. "But 18 turnovers, that's not so good. In fact, I think Coppin State got 36 of their 63 points off second chance points and off turnovers. Turnovers continue to be a concern, especially tomorrow against a very good team."

UB guard Calvin Betts runner with .05 tenths of a second remaining was the difference as the Bulls almost squandered a 13-point first half lead.

Higgins led the team in scoring for the eighth time this season and for the third consecutive time. He also hit all four of his free throws Monday night, improving his career free throw streak to 32-straight spanning over five games.

The Bulls (7-4) built an early lead in the first half and led by as much as 13 points with 3:48 in the first half.

Trailing 38-29 at the break and despite shooting a season first-half best 60.0 percent from the field, the Buffs stormed by scoring the game's first six points cutting their deficit to 38-35. The first half also saw the second most CU turnovers with 11.

Although they never led in the second half, Colorado tied it at 56 on Tomlinson's layup with 5:15 to play. Buffalo scored the next four points on offensive putbacks by Betts and Vadim Fedotov. Tomlinson made a pair of free throws to pull the Buffaloes to within a basket at the 1:41 mark.

Dwight Thorne II tied it at 60 (the game's third tie) with his driving layup with 11 seconds remaining before Betts hit his game-winner.

The Buffs hit 23-of-41 from the field (51.1 percent), while the Bulls shot 50 percent (27-of-64). CU is 6-2 this season when shooting 50 percent or better from the field.

Game #12 Dec. 30 vs. VERMONT

HONOLULU - Cory Higgins scored a team-high 18 points and Nate Tomlinson hit 11, but a strong second half powered the Vermont Catamounts to an 84-59 victory in the third place game of the 45th annual Outrigger Hotels Rainbow Classic, Tuesday afternoon.

Vermont (8-4) has now won four of its last five games, while the Buffaloes have lost two straight falling to 7-5.

The Catamounts made 29-of-51 (56.9 percent) and dominated from the three-point line, shooting 63.6 percent (7-of-11). The Buffs, who shot over 50 percent from the field against Coppin State and Buffalo, fell to 42.1 percent from the floor (24-of-57).

Vermont kept its intensity thereafter over the next seven minutes with a 25-9 run for a commanding 67-46 advantage with 9:24 remaining.

CU only managed 41.2 percent in the second half, while Vermont shot 56 percent (14-of-25). The Catamounts shot a season second-best 56.9 percent from the field.

Mike Trimboli scored a game-high 24 points and Marqus Blakely added 16 points and six rebounds for Vermont.

DALLAS - Dwight Thorne II scored 18 points and freshman Austin Dufault added 13, however the SMU Mustangs ran to a 70-67 victory.

"We're just not deep enough," said CU head coach Jeff Bzdelik on the AM 760 post-game radio show. "I wish I had confidence in our bench, but people don't see what I see in practice. They need to step up and help because we run out of gas and get a step slow in parts of the game and that hurts us."

Higgins broke the Big 12 and school record with 40-consecutive free throws over the last seven games. Tonight he made all four his free throws. Ironically, Higgins' free throws were the 39th and 40th CU points scored.

The previous Big 12 record for consecutive free throws made was 39 (Joey Graham, OSU, 2004-05). The CU record was 39, Rob Gonzalez, Jan. 10-Feb. 26, 1983 (13 games).

CU (7-6) received balanced scoring as five players hit double-digits. In addition to Thorne, who also hit a career-high four three-pointers, Cory Higgins recorded 11, Nate Tomlinson and Jermyl Jackson-Wilson added 10 apiece.

The Mustangs (5-7) jumped out to an early lead in the second half but Colorado closed in on SMU's lead. At 2:01, a Jackson-Wilson layup pushed the Buffs to within four points at 64-60. With under one minute remaining, Higgins hit a three-pointer but with 00:17 to play, SMU's Bamba Fall hit two free throw shots.

A Tomlinson jumper with 0:08 remaining closed the gap to 69-67, but a free throw shot by Fall ended the game. Tomlinson attempted a three-pointer at the buzzer to tie, but hit the side of the iron.

LUBBOCK, Texas - Cory Higgins scored a game-high 21 points and Dwight Thorne II added 13, but Texas Tech ended the game with a 12-6 run to score a 63-55 victory over Colorado.

The Buffs fall to 8-9 overall and 0-3 in the Big 12 while the Red Raiders snapped a three-game losing streak and improved to 11-7, 1-2.

Higgins also grabbed seven rebounds and also recorded his seventh game this season with over 20 points scored. In addition, to leading the team in scoring and rebounding 11 times this season, Higgins netted his third 20-point effort over his last four games. Freshman Nate Tomlinson chipped-in with nine points (three, three-pointers) and a career-best four steals.

Colorado trailed 27-23 at halftime, but the Buffs came back as Tomlinson hit a three-pointer with 15:53 remaining to tie the game at 34. A Thorne layup gave CU a 36-34 advantage, however one minute later the Red Raiders came back quickly as John Roberson scored a layup and a jumper, pushing Texas Tech ahead to stay.

Tech had a 51-49 lead with 3:28 remaining before Mike Singletary outscored Colorado 12-6 the rest of the way. He hit four field goals, including two fastbreak dunks, and four free throws.

Colorado shot 40.8 percent (20-of-49) from the field for the game and Texas Tech hit 23-of-53 (43.4 percent).

The Buffs tallied a season-high nine first half steals, finished with 14 steals the most since posting 19 versus Savannah State on Jan. 3, 2006 and most in a league game since Feb. 17, 2001 (14 vs. Nebraska).

The Red Raiders were led by Singletary, who finished with 20 points, followed by Roberson (13 points) and Nick Okorie (10 points).

Game #18 Jan. 24 vs. KANSAS STATE

BOULDER - Junior guard Dwight Thorne II scored 20 of his career-high 30 points in the second half rallying Colorado from an 11-point deficit with 10 minutes remaining, however fell short in overtime as Kansas State escaped with a 77-75 victory.

CU fell to 8-10 overall and dropped their fourth consecutive loss to open the Big 12 season matching the 2004-05 campaign.

Jacob Pullen scored five of his team-high 17 points for Kansas State (12-7, 1-4) in overtime leading three other K-State players in double figures. Denis Clemente scored all of his 15 points after halftime.

Thorne hit one of his five 3-pointers with 10 seconds left in regulation to send it into overtime tied at 67-all. He then hit a three-pointer with 6.3 seconds left in overtime to pull Colorado within 75-74, but Darren Kent's two free throws with 5.2 seconds left sealed the win.

CU made 23-of-42 (54.8 percent) from the field for the game, however in the second half, the Buffs shot an impressive 82.4 percent (14-of-17). It's the second-best shooting performance by a CU team in the second half since 1982.

Sophomore Cory Higgins scored 12 points, five rebounds and four steals. Senior Jermyl Jackson-Wilson hit 14 points and grabbed a team-high six rebounds.

After the teams were tied at 26 at halftime, K-State stormed out increasing its advantage to double-digits with under 10 minutes to play, 50-39.

CU rallied down the stretch, cutting its deficit to six points on a Nate Tomlinson layup with 2:43 to play. Austin Dufault (nine points, four rebounds) scored CU's next four points on jump shots and a Jackson-Wilson three-point play pushed the home team to a 65-64 deficit with 33 seconds remaining in regulation.

Game #19 Jan. 27 vs. IOWA STATE

BOULDER - The University of Colorado men's basketball team pulled ahead of Iowa State right when it mattered the most—at the end of the game—as the Buffaloes went on a late run to pick up their first conference win in a 55-49 decision.

The game was deadlocked until the last 2:47 of the second half when Colorado (9-10, 1-4 Big 12) went on a 10-3 run to close out the game. The Buffs' late run was the only big run of the game. Up until that point, the score had been tied 13 times and the lead had changed 15 times.

Sophomore Cory Higgins (19 points) started the run by hitting back-to-back free throws to put the Buffs up 47-46. Junior Dwight Thorne II followed with a three-point play after he was fouled by Cyclone Lucca Staiger on a driving layup, and netted both the layup and the ensuing free throw.

Higgins struck again with another driving layup, and Thorne and freshman Nate Tomlinson (nine points, six rebounds) sank three combined free throws to give the Buffaloes a comfortable nine-point lead (their biggest of the game) with 36 seconds remaining.

Iowa State's Staiger fired up a 3-pointer with just three seconds left, but it wasn't enough to rattle the Buffs who celebrated on their home court for the first time in Big 12 play this season.

With the win, the Buffs snap a four-game losing streak and hand the Cyclones (12-8, 1-4 Big 12) their fourth loss in the past five games. Colorado picks up its first Big 12 win since defeating Iowa State, 67-55 on March 1, 2008.

Tonight's win marks CU's fourth straight against ISU at home, making for the team's longest current home winning streak against any Big 12 team. The Buffaloes have now defeated the Cyclones 11 times in the past 13 meetings between the two teams in Boulder.

LAWRENCE, KAN. - Junior Dwight Thorne II scored 18 points and sophomore Cory Higgins added 15 points to help the Colorado men's basketball team nearly overcome a 21-point second half deficit in a 66-61 loss at Kansas.

Colorado falls to 9-11 overall and 1-5 in the Big 12 in their first single digit loss against the Jayhawks (17-4, 6-0) since Jan. 31, 1999 (77-74).

Higgins also grabbed five rebounds and five assists. Senior Jermyl Jackson-Wilson recorded 12 points and five rebounds, and freshmen Nate Tomlinson and Austin Dufault each scored seven points for the Buffs.

The Jayhawks led 45-21 at halftime and Kansas's Markieff Morris' 3-point play made it 46-25 less than a minute into the second half, however Higgins answered with five straight points.

A pair of free throws by Marcus Morris put Kansas on top 54-42, but Higgins made two straight steals and ignited an 8-0 run. Thorne's jumper off an inbounds play under the basket pulled the Buffaloes to 54-50 at the 8:18 mark.

At that point, the Buffs had hit 10 of 15 second-half shots from the field while the Jayhawks were going 5-for-17.

The lead shrank to 54-52 on Jackson-Wilson's bucket as Kansas was held without a field goal for more than 7 minutes. The Jayhawks, who had shot over 50 percent in 11 games, were only 21-for-51 (41 percent) from the floor.

Tomlinson's 3-pointer shaved the lead to 62-59 with 59 seconds left, Sherron Collins then put up two more points, making it 64-59. With seven seconds to go, Thorne's bucket made it 64-61.

In the second half, Colorado shot 65.2 percent on 15-of-23 shooting from the field. Kansas was held to 33.3 percent shooting, making 8-of-24 field goals. Colorado committed a season-low seven turnovers.

Crocker followed another defensive stop with his 3-pointer to help the Sooners start pulling away. The Sooners led 65-51 after Taylor Griffin's first 3-pointer of the season with 6:47 to play.

The Sooners seemed to shut it down after that, as Higgins hit a pair of baskets in the lane to start the Buffaloes' rally. Higgins had a reverse layup to cap a string of seven straight Colorado points that sliced the deficit to 70-64 with 1:03 left, and the Sooners missed five of six free throws at one point to let the Buffs get even closer.

The Buffaloes shot 28-for-55 (50.9 percent) from the field to become only the third team this season to clear 50 percent against Oklahoma's defense.

The Sooners hit 57.1 percent (28-of-49) and also held a 33-20 advantage on the boards.

Freshman Nate Tomlinson recorded four assists and led CU in assists for the ninth time this season. Tomlinson (11 points) hit all three of his three-point attempts. The Buffs turned the ball over nine turnovers while the Sooners recorded 17.

AMES, IOWA - Junior guard Dwight Thorne II scored a team-high 14 points and all of CU's nine first half points as Iowa State defeated Colorado, 70-42, Wednesday night.

ISU (13-11, 2-7) got off to a fast start by establishing Craig Brackins on the offensive end. Brackins recorded 12 of ISU's first 16 points to give ISU a 16-6 advantage with 11:43 left in the first half.

The lead expanded to 28 points (34-6) with just under four minutes remaining in the first half, as the Cyclones went on a 21-0 run while the Buffs were stuck in an 8:40-minute scoring drought.

Thorne ended the CU cold spell with a basket at the 3:20 mark, but ISU's Lucca Staiger answered on the other end with a three-pointer to give the Cyclones a 37-8 lead with under three minutes remaining before intermission.

ISU went into the break with a 37-9 lead, breaking the Big 12 mark in the modern era (since 1950) for lowest points allowed in a half. Colorado shot a season-low 17.4 percent (4-of-23) in the first half.

Both Colorado and Iowa State scored 33 points in the second half.

Sophomore Cory Higgins scored 11 points for the Buffs (9-14, 1-8). Freshman Austin Dufault added 10 points and a team-high seven rebounds. Freshman Toby Veal and Thorne each recorded five rebounds.

CU shot a season-low 31 percent (13-of-42) while the Cyclones hit 27-of-58 (46.6 percent).

Colorado's nine first half points are the lowest since Jan. 23, 1980, when CU trailed 29-4 at Missouri, setting the mark for the fewest points scored in either half since the shot clock came into use. In that game, Jo Jo Hunter scored all four of CU's points, setting the record for the highest percentage of the team's points scored (100 percent) in a half; Thorne matched the percentage but eclipsed the point total by scoring all nine of CU's first half points.

BOULDER - Sophomore guard Cory Higgins scored a career-high 34 points and grabbed nine rebounds, however Texas managed to outscore the Buffaloes by a 13-4 margin in overtime to escape with a 85-76 win over Colorado.

Senior Jermyl Jackson-Wilson and junior Dwight Thorne II each added 10 points, respectively as the Buffs dropped to 9-15 overall and 1-9 in the Big 12. The loss is CU's sixth in conference play out of 10 games were the deficit was single digits and the 1-9 mark is the worst start for a CU team in the 13-year history of the Big 12.

Freshman Austin Dufault played a season-high 42 minutes, scoring eight points with five rebounds.

Texas' Damion James had a chance to win the game in regulation, but missed two free throws with 1.6 seconds remaining, forcing the extra session.

The Buffaloes trailed by as many as 15 points, tied the game at 72 when Jackson-Wilson sank two free throws with 7.6 seconds left.

With 4:04 remaining in overtime, Thorne II tied the game at 74 with two free throws. The Longhorns started a 9-0 run capped by two Abrams free throws.

The Buffs made 12-of-20 (60 percent) of their shots from the field in the second half and 48.9 percent (23-of-47) for the game. CU was able to score a good portion of their 76 points from the free throw line, tying a season-best 25 from the charity stripe, a 14-of-14 performance all in the second half.

The Longhorns (17-7, 6-4) have won two straight games, shot 57.4 percent (31-of-54) from the field and hit 17-of-27 (63 percent) in second half including overtime.

Game #26 Feb. 21 vs. 11/10 MISSOURI BOULDER - The University of Colorado men's basketball team put up a valiant second half effort, but the Buffaloes just could not cut the deficit they suffered in the first half, losing to the No. 11 (AP)/10(ESPN) ranked Missouri Tigers, 66-53.

The Buffs have now lost seven straight games, their longest streak since losing eight in a row during the 1995-96 season.

The Buffs never gained the upper hand in the contest as the Tigers remained on top of the scoreboard the entire game, thanks in large part to points in the paint, help from the bench, and rebounding.

Mizzou netted 36 of its 60 points in the paint compared to Colorado's 18, and four Tigers came off the bench to contribute 28 points, led by Marcus Denmon with 11. CU only saw nine points from its bench, five of which came from sophomore Javon Coney.

Mizzou pulled down 35 rebounds, while the Buffs only snagged 21.

The Buffs played the Tigers evenly in the second half—they were only outscored 29-27—but they just could not catch MU after its late first half run. Colorado came within nine points of Mizzou (54-to-45) after freshman Trey Eckloff nailed a jumper at the 6:40 mark, but that is the closest the Buffs would come to catching the Tigers for the rest of the game. Freshman Austin Dufault led CU in scoring and rebounding for the first time this season with 15 points and five rebounds. He scored six of his points within the last two minutes of the game, including a dunk and four free throws.

Senior Leo Lyons led Mizzou with 13 points and 15 rebounds, racking up his third double-double of the season.

The Cowboys (18-9, 7-6) made a season Big 12 high nine first half treys to open a 43-31 advantage after the break, then cruising to the 21-point victory. OSU shot 49 percent (25-of-51) from the field, led by James Anderson's double-double of 30 points and 10 rebounds.

The Cowboys dominated CU on the boards with a 38-23 advantage as Marshall Moses and Byron Eaton each grabbed nine rebounds apiece.

Crawford and Knutson made all of CU's seven three-pointers, tallying four and three, respectively.

Sophomore Cory Higgins scored nine points and senior Jermyl Jackson-Wilson chipped in six points and four rebounds for the Buffs (9-18, 1-12).

Sophomore Javon Coney grabbed a career-high six rebounds and started his first career game in place of Nate Tomlinson, who sat out the entire game after sustaining a concussion in last Saturday's loss to nationally ranked Missouri.

For the first time this season, the CU bench out-scored the starters 38-17.

OSU took a 10-point lead at 21-11 midway through the first half. Colorado made a run of its own, cutting the lead to one on a Knutson jumper with 4:37 before halftime. However, the Cowboys took a 12-point advantage into the lockerroom.

With 5:54 remaining, OSU's Marshall Moses hit a layup to start an 11-0 run for the Cowboys, capped by two free throw shots from Byron Eaton.

The Buffs committed only eight turnovers, the sixth time this season they turned the ball over in single-digits. OSU's 13 three-pointers were the most by a Cowboys' team against CU since making the same number in Boulder on Jan. 30, 2005.

WACO, TEXAS - Sophomore Cory Higgins scored 20 points and junior Dwight Thorne II added 12 points, however the University of Colorado men's basketball team was unable to overcome a second half 17-0 run as the Baylor Bears pulled away for a 75-57 victory, Saturday afternoon.

After trailing 26-24 at halftime, the Buffs took their largest lead of the game at 42-38 when Thorne hit a three-pointer with 11:20 remaining. With 8:50 to play, Casey Crawford hit a trey to give the Buffs a 50-48 lead. Curtis Jerrells answered with another three-pointer at 8:14 to ignite a 17-0 run for the Bears (17-11, 5-9).

Sophomore Levi Knutson added seven points in his second career start for the Buffs (9-19, 1-13). Thorne and Higgins grabbed six and five rebounds, respectively. It was the third time this season Thorne led the Buffs in rebounds.

Higgins led in scoring for the 16th time this season and the 18th time in his career. Colorado made 18-of-42 (42.9 percent) from the field while Baylor shot 52.2 percent (24-of-46). The Buffs shot 38.5 percent (10-of-26) from the field in the first half, but improved in the second half as they made 50 percent (8-of-16).

Baylor was led in scoring by Jerrells, who scored 24 of his 29 points in the second half and recorded eight rebounds. LaceDarius Dunn also added 10 points for the Bears.

The Bears finished with a 32-22 rebounding advantage.

BOULDER - For the 11th time this season, it was another close call for Colorado and for the 11th time, the outcome was the same, another single digit loss, falling on Senior Night to Texas A&M, 72-66.

Cory Higgins led all scorers with 27 points on 10-for-18 shooting, including two 3-pointers

The Buffs (9-20, 1-14 Big 12) capitalized on 16 first-half Aggie turnovers, netting 24 of their 32 points in the first half off A&M giveaways. In the next 20 minutes, the Aggies only gave the ball away three times. CU, who had recorded nine steals in the first, only tallied one steal in the second half.

The Buffs remained on top of the scoreboard for most of the game, however the Aggies (22-8, 8-7) pulled ahead when it mattered most. It was the Aggies sixth win over CU since 2005.

CU jumped out to an early lead and held onto it throughout the entire first half. Less than six minutes into the game, the Buffs had pulled ahead to an 11-point lead and led 32-24 at the break.

The Buffs saw their lead dwindle as they were outscored 16-2 over the next 3:27. During this time, CU was also held scoreless over the 2:45 span. The Aggies' run included a rare 4-point play after redshirt sophomore Casey Crawford fouled A&M's B.J. Holmes on a 3-pointer; Holmes made the trey and the ensuing free throw.

The Aggies held the lead for the final 4:15 of the game.

CU's bench was also huge contributing 29 of Colorado's 66 points. Crawford led the bench with a Big 12 personal best 16 points, including three treys, in a season-high 30 minutes played. Toby Veal recorded a career-high 10 points and three steals in 14 minutes.

Texas A&M was led by four players in double digits, Josh Carter (18 points), B.J. Holmes (16), Donald Sloan (14), and Derrick Roland (12).
