ON THE RANGE...

The 11th Annual NCAA Golf Championships begin this week with 81 schools competing in three regionals around the country, with the University of Colorado one of 27 schools competing in the 20th Annual NCAA Central Regional Golf Championships in Columbus, Ohio (Ohio State University is the host school)... It's the eighth trip in the last 10 seasons to the NCAA's as a team for Colorado and the third in a row; the Buffs have now been invited in 15 of the 20 years of the regional format... The top 10 teams out of 27 competing in the Central Regional will advance to the NCAA Finals, set for May 28-June 31in West Lafayette, Ind. (Purdue will host)... Ten out of 27 teams will also advance to the finals out the East and West regionals, taking place at the same time; the top two individuals from teams that do not qualify also will be invited... Colorado will be without the services of its No. 1 golfer, Michael Baird, who was diagnosed with double pneumonia Monday (May 12) upon CU's return from The Maxwell, where he led CU overall (214, +4) and finished 13th overall... CU is the No. 21 seed and will tee off at 7:00 a.m. (CDT) on Thursday off No. 10 and at 12:12 p.m. Friday on No. 1, with the Buffs paired with Ohio State (No. 19 seed) and Baylor (No. 20 seed)... On Saturday, the first through 15th teams will tee off between 7:00 and 9:12 a.m.; the remainder between 12:12 and 1:37 p.m... The Buffs' practice round is set for 11:10 a.m. MDT Wednesday.

THE SITE

This is the fourth time that Ohio State's **Scarlet Course** (Columbus, Ohio) will be hosting the NCAA Central Regional, as the course covers up to 7,455 yards in a par-71 configuration for championship play. That was the layout last month when Colorado won OSU's Robert Kepler Intercollegiate on April 13. It's the fifth straight year the Central Regional will be in this part of the nation, as West Lafayette, Ind., was the site in 2004, followed by South Bend, Ind. (2005), Chardon, Ohio (2006) and Sugar Grove, Ill., last year; the string ends next year when Texas will host in Austin. Additional information can be found at www.ohiostatebuckeyes.com.

THE EVENT

This is the 20th year that the NCAA is holding regionals (east, central, west) in order to stock the 30-team field at the NCAA Championship Finals. There are 27 teams at each site, with the top 10 to advance out of each. Out of the regional format, the Buffaloes have advanced to the NCAA Finals on four occasions, all four times with some style. In 1989, the inaugural year for regional activity, CU finished third at Stonebridge Country Club outside of Dallas. Oklahoma and Oklahoma State tied for team honors with an 880 score, followed by the Buffs at 902. In 1994, the Buffs placed second with an 853 score, just two strokes back of regional champion Texas, at Oklahoma City Golf & Country Club. In 1999, at Ohio State University's Scarlet Course, the Buffs rallied from 18th place and eight shots back after 36 holes to force a playoff with Kent State, winning the battle on the first extra hole and thus advancing to the national finals. It remains the second largest comeback in regional history. In 2002 in Little Rock, Colorado was 11th after day one and in 13th after day two, but rallied to post the seventh best score in a final round hampered by tough winds, finishing in the 10th and final spot with an 886 team score. The Buffs edged two teams by one stroke—Big 12 rivals Kansas and Oklahoma.

THE REGIONAL FIELD

The field is comprised of 141 golfers, 27 five-man teams, plus six individuals. The Central Regional is again as tough as ever, with nine top 25 teams (11 top 27), including four in the top 10: No. 3 Alabama, No. 6 Oklahoma State, No. 8 Georgia Tech and No. 10 Florida, and 16 top 50 teams in the field. Here are the competing teams in the region, listed by seed, with CU's record against team in parenthesis—the Buffs are 8-17 overall against teams competing:

THE COLORADO ROSTER

The quintet representing Colorado in the NCAA's have earned 12 letters between them, one more than the fivesome that represented CU a year ago and one less than the two groups that qualified for CU in 2004 and 2006. However, this group has just two players with NCAA experience compared to four last year, the fewest since just one player in '04 had the experience. The last Colorado team to advance to the NCAA Finals, the 2002 squad, had a combined 17 letters with 12 previous NCAA regional or finals tournaments among them. The 2008 Buffalo five:

Tolan has played the last two events in Chardon, Ohio (2006) and Sugar Grove, Ill. (2007); Symons joined him last year. If Tolan qualifies in 2009 either with the team or individually, he would join the short list of four CU players who have qualified to play in four NCAA Championships: **Rick Cramer** (1979-82), **Bob Kalinowski** (1991-94), **Matt Zions** (1999-2002) and **Kane Webber** (2000-04).

HEAD COACH ROY EDWARDS

Roy Edwards, now in his second season, was named just the third full-time men's golf coach in University of Colorado history on July 14, 2006, following in the footsteps of the only two coaches the program had ever known over a span of six decades.

Edwards, 31, came to CU with an impressive pedigree, joining the Buffaloes from his alma mater, the University of Kansas, where he has served as the assistant for both the men's and women's programs for the previous four years. He held the same position at Vanderbilt University for a year prior to returning to KU.

Edwards replaced the late Mark Simpson, who passed away from complications due to lung cancer in December 2005. Simpson had held the post since 1977, when he followed in the footsteps of his college head coach, Les Fowler. Fowler took over as player-coach in 1948 and remained on board until Simpson, his assistant, replaced him. Thus, Edwards is just CU's third full-time head coach since 1948.

His first CU team had moderate success, and finished 11th in the Big 12 Championships; while that was disappointing, his team did something that neither Fowler's or Simpson's did, qualify for the NCAA Championships (though in fairness, more teams are invited today than when they coached, but it still was an impressive accomplishment). The team placed 20th in the NCAA Central Regional.

His second team, in 2007-08, became just the third in school history to win two major tournaments in the same season, as the Buffs won the Louisiana Classics and the Ohio State Kepler Intercollegiate. He also founded Colorado Partners this season, a donor group which directly offsets team expenses.

At Kansas, he was heavily involved in recruiting and the day-to-day functions for both the men's and women's teams, managed the Jayhawks' Birdie Club and was the main contact for both golf camps. A KU graduate, he returned to his alma mater in August 2002 as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs and further developed all the skills necessary to one day become a head coach.

He coordinated and managed a \$1 million-plus fundraising campaign for KU's golf practice facility, founded and coordinated the annual booster club program, oversaw program communications, budgeting, alumni-parent relations and condition programs, and cording all aspects of official and unofficial visits for the recruiting process, including prospect evaluation and communication. He also was designated as the head coach on numerous occasions, including for 2003 and 2004 NCAA regional play.

He was one of three finalists for the 2004 Golf Coaches Association of America Assistant Coach of the Year, named for Jan Strickland. The award is given to the NCAA Division I, II, III or NAIA assistant coach who has excelled in working with their student-athletes both on the course and in the classroom.

At Kansas, he helped coach six first-team All-Big 12 players (five men, one woman) and four Academic All-Americans. He started his coaching career as a volunteer/graduate assistant in 1998, working three years in that capacity before moving on to Vanderbilt for his first full-time assistant coaching position. During this time, he was also the Junior Golf Director for the Kansas Golf Association, running all activities for over 600 junior members of the KGA.

He was the assistant for both the men's and women's teams at Vanderbilt from May 2001 until returning to his alma mater the following year. At Vandy, he headed the Commodore Golf Day and the Mason Rudolph Intercollegiate Golf Championships, and was involved in Commodore recruiting as well as the day-to-day practice and traveling schedules. He was a part of history as both teams experienced two of the best seasons in the programs' existence the 2001-02 academic year, and had a hand in coaching a pair of first-team All-Southeastern Conference players, including Brandt Snedeker, a first-team All-American and the runner-up in the 2007 Masters.

Between KU and Vanderbilt, he coached five players who attained some level of All-American status, ranging from first-team to honorable mention.

A three-year member of the Jayhawk golf team, he lettered as a senior under legendary and long-time coach Ross Randall and earned his bachelor's of science degree in business administration from Kansas in 2000. Simultaneously while finishing his degree, he worked as a volunteer assistant coach for the men's team. His career playing highlights include being named the PGA Midwest Section Player of the Year in 1995 and the Heart of America Four-Ball champion in 1997. As a student, he was also heavily involved on KU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and held several leadership roles on campus.

Simpson and Randall were good friends, and their teams would cross paths during the regular season four or five on the average before the league championships. Not including his year at Vanderbilt, Edwards was with the Jayhawks for 56 tournaments as a player or assistant coach since 1996 that the two schools were in the same field, aiding his familiarity with the CU program.

Born October 14, 1976 in Kansas City, Mo., but truly a native of Hutchinson, Kan., he was a four-year letterman in golf at Hutchinson (Kan.) High School and was an Eagle Scout. His hobbies include playing golf, cooking and traveling. He is married to the former Shelly Bonfantine, a former golfer at the University of New Mexico.

SEASON CAPSULE

The 2007-08 **University of Colorado** men's golf team completed one of its best regular seasons in recent memory and earned a third straight invitation to the NCAA Championships.

The Buffaloes finished 10th in the Big 12 Championships last month, never recovering from a tough start; Colorado showed what kind of team it was the last 36 holes, posting the fourth best combined score for Saturday and Sunday play; but alas, the first two rounds always count.

Aside from the disappointing finish in the conference meet, CU had been on a hot streak. Ranked as the No. 65 team in the nation (and likely one of the top 40 this spring), the Buffs won two major tournaments in the same year for just the second time in their history, joining the 1991-92 team. Both wins came in the spring, with the Buffs capturing the Louisiana Classics and the Ohio State Kepler Intercollegiate.

The overall team stroke average is 75.02, the lowest since 73.92 in 2003-04, with the spring figure of 74.47 also a team best since a 73.71 figure that same season.

Coach **Roy Edwards** travel squad has largely been the same five players all season, and are a good blend of veterans (two seniors, one junior) and undergrads (a sophomore and a freshman). This quintet has led Colorado to five top five finishes, the most since seven in the 2003-04 season and tied for the second most in the last decade, with Buff golfers posting 24 top 20 individual efforts to date.

Senior **Michael Baird** leads the team in stroke average (74.3), just ahead of sophomore **Luke Symons** (74.4) and junior **Derek Tolan** (74.8). Symons and Tolan both placed in the top 20 in four straight tournaments during the spring. That trio, plus senior **Jim Grady** (a team-high five rounds in the 60s) and freshman **Michael Imperato**, have played 179 of the 199 rounds by CU golfers this season, the first time any CU team has had five golfers playing 34 or more rounds.

Unfortunately, the day following The Maxwell (May 12), Baird was diagnosed with double pneumonia and he will miss the regional, and likely the finals should CU advance.

ASSAULT ON THE FRESHMAN RECORD BOOK

True freshman Michael Imperato is making some history this season. His 37 rounds played to date are tied for the second most in school history by a freshman, trailing the 41 played by **Terry Kahl** in 1976-77 and matching **Matt Zions**' total in 1998-99; both Kahl and Zions were also true frosh. His stroke average of 75.46 currently ranks eighth all-time among CU freshmen, the sixth best by a first-year college player. **Kane Webber** owns the all-time frosh mark of 73.03 set in 1999-2000.

FIFTH MAN IMPROVEMENT

Colorado had been singing the blue the last two seasons when it came to the score for the fifth player each round, likely the direct cause of CU's inconsistency in its tournament finishes. In 37 rounds in 2006-07, the average score that the Buffaloes had to throw out was an **80.27**, and only four times did Colorado have a fifth score that was lower than 77 (two 72s and two 74s). Fast-forward to 2007-08, and for the same number of rounds, the number is almost two strokes lower at **78.46**, with 12 scores lower than a 77 (including one 70).

THIS-N-THAT

Three Buffs have played 37 rounds this season, and barring injury, two will hit the 40 round mark for the season once the regional is complete, senior **Jim Grady** and freshman **Michael Imperato**. The only player to finish with 40 since 1992-92 was Knut Ekjord with 40 in 1998-99... Grady played 41 in his first three seasons and will almost match it by the end of this weekend... CU has not advanced to the NCAA Championship Finals the last three times in qualified for regional play; CU went four straight regionals (1990-93) without accomplishing the same.

THE SCHEDULE

The NCAA Central Regional figures to be the toughest tournament that Colorado will play in to date in 2007-08. The Buffs have played in 12 tournaments so far, and have played the 62nd toughest schedule nationally according to *Golfweek* (the sixth toughest in the Big 12 and the hardest by the six North Division teams). The Prestige At PGA West currently ranks as CU's toughest meet of the year (ranked No. 32), with the Hawai'i-Hilo Intercollegiate (No. 36), the Pepperdine Club Glove (No. 38) and the Big 12 Championships (No. 39) the next three on the list.

U.S. OPEN LOCAL QUALIFYING

Several Buffaloes will participate in U.S. Open Local Qualifying upon their return to Colorado Monday. Two courses are hosting the 18-hole qualifiers, Collindale Golf Course in Fort Collins and Colorado Golf Club in Parker.

THE "DID YOU KNOW?" FACT

Colorado, Ohio State and Wake Forest have produced the most U.S. Open champions with four. CU's **Hale Irwin** has won three (1974, 1979, 1990) and **Steve Jones** one (1996). Ohio State's **Jack Nicklaus** claimed four by himself, while Wake Forest has had three players do it.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A STROKE MAKES

History has shown time and time again that a single stroke can mean the difference between advancing to the NCAA Finals and having a season end early. The last seven Central regionals have all come down to a playoff or one stroke separating the 10 teams that qualified and the 11th that was left on the outside looking in. Overall, on six occasions, there was a tie for the last qualifying spot, with one stroke the difference seven times and two strokes three times. Only three years has the margin between qualifying and going home been more than two shots, in 1992 (7), in 1998 (3) and in 2000 (4). A closer look:

QUOTING ROY EDWARDS

On The Maxwell, CU's Final Tune-Up For Regionals

"We wanted to play well, and I felt really good about how the guys approached the final round. They did a nice job overall, and we definitely had a better taste in our mouths (then after Saturday), that's for sure. This definitely will help us going into regionals. It's a great format, not necessarily the scoring part of it, but the playing all together factor. You can really learn a lot about everything, watching all three rounds and over 1,000 shots and strokes. Derek and Michael (Imperato) came back and finished very well, particularly Derek, coming back with a 66 after a 79."

On Losing Michael Baird To Illness

"It's unfortunate, especially finding out less than 24 hours before you're scheduled to leave. His college career is likely over, but his health is more important than anything else. We're all hoping he can recover quickly, but in the meantime, Justin Bargett played very well at The Maxwell and it proves that you always have to be mentally and physically ready to go when something like this happens."

On CU's Chances At Regionals

"I felt good about everything, and then we found out we would be without Michael Baird, but you have to approach it as an opportunity and not with a "woe are we" attitude. Everyone knows they have to step up. We had a little bit of a hiccup the first day of the Big 12's and at The Maxwell, but the rest of the spring has been really good. We just have to tweak a few things and we'll be ready to go. We know we need to minimize big errors, keep making good decisions, and believe in ourselves a little bit more. We've played well when we've stayed in the moment, and we have to take it upon ourselves to do just that. We have a chance to prove that we belong as one of the nation's top 30 programs, and the great thing about golf is that your fate is always in your hands."
