CU vs. BAYLOR: Colorado leads the series, 16-10 and have played Baylor each of the last three years. Baylor defeated CU in Big 12 play, 70-66 in Waco (2011) and in Albuquerque, 80-63 (2012) in the NCAA Tournament. The Buffs edged the Bears, 60-58 in the Charleston Classic semifinals last year. CU would go on to win the Classic defeating Murray State in the finals (81-74). CU also holds a 5-2 advantage on neutral courts against the Bears.

SEASON OPENER: The Buffaloes begin the season on a neutral court for the first time in 17 years (1996-97 season) • Under Boyle, the Buffs are 13-6 in November games (8-0 at home; 4-2 on the road; 1-4 neutral) • CU won all of its November games a year ago (6-0), a first since 1989-90 • CU last played a ranked opponent this early in the season was Nov. 25, 2001 and a 81-75 loss at #19 St. Joseph's.

NATIONAL RANKINGS: In both pre-season polls, CU is receiving votes. In the Coaches' poll, the Buffs are 27th (Baylor is 26th) and in the AP poll, CU is tied for 29th (Baylor 25th). The last time the Buffs were ranked in a preseason poll was the 1969-70 season at No. 10.

LEAVING CU: Redshirt-freshman Chris Jenkins has left the men's basketball program, head coach Tad Boyle announced Monday. Jenkins a 6'7", 185-pound guard/forward from Detroit, Mich., sat out last season after being redshirted. Jenkins was a member of the Athletes In Action basketball team that traveled to Lithuania this past summer. He played in four of five games averaging 7.8 points, 3.3 rebounds and 17.8 minutes, helping Team USA to 4-1 record.

NON-CONFERENCE SLATE: The CU non-conference slate is the most competitive in its history where nine of the 13 opponents won 18 or more games a year ago. Eight made one of the four post-season tournaments, including four to the NCAA Tournament. Overall, CU's opponent's record a year ago achieved a 248-176 mark (.585).

SOLD OUT: For the first time ever, men's basketball tickets at the Coors Events Center are sold out for the 2013-2014 season (all 18 home games). There will be a limited number of single game tickets based on availability (ranging from \$20-\$65). Individual game tickets for all games are available, except for Kansas, Arizona, UCLA and Oregon, which are sold out. Of the 11,064 seating capacity of the Events Center 7,160 seats are used for season tickets.

Pac-12 MEDIA VOTE: The Buffaloes were selected third in the preseason media vote. It's the highest pre-season placing for CU since 2003-04 when the Big 12 media predicted CU sixth. The Buffs finished one vote behind UCLA for second place with Arizona at the top. The predicted winner has not won the league the past three years and four of the past five years.

CU & NEUTRAL COURT: Head Coach Tad Boyle teams are 13-8 (.619) on neutral courts during his three years. The 13 wins trails Sox Walseth (1956-76, 33 wins) and Ricardo Patton (1995-2006, 18 wins) in school history.

In the three seasons under coach Tad Boyle, the Buffaloes are 13-8 (.619) in a tournament neutral court setting.

2011-12: 6-3: 1-2 in Puerto Rico; 4-0 Pac-12 Tournament; 1-1 NCAA.

LAST SEASON REVIEW: A few notes to refresh your memory of the 2012-2013 season: CU made back-to-back NCAA Tournaments appearances (2011-12 & 2012-13) for the first time since 1961-62 & 1962-63 (50 years) • Tad Boyle is the first CU head coach since Sox Walseth to lead the Buffs to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances • The 2012-13 NCAA Appearance is CU's first at-large invite since 2002-03 • In 12 NCAA Tournament appearances, the Buffs are now 10-14 (.417) with two Final Fours (1942 & 1955) • For the first time in 112 years of CU basketball, three consecutive post-season appearances was a school-first in post-season play (2010-11 NIT semifinal, 2011-12 NCAA 3rd Round, 2012-13 NCAA 2nd Round).

CARDIAC BUFFS: Under Tad Boyle (107 games), the Buffs have had more than their fair share of close games: try one-fifth of them. In games decided by three points or less in the Boyle Era, CU is 13-7 (4-3 in one-point games, 7-1 in two-point games and 2-3 in three-point games ... and 10-4 against league opponents, 6-3 vs. Pac-12, 4-1 vs. Big

ATTENDANCE: CU's season finale crowd of 10,105 was the 12th crowd over 10,000 this year and 14th over 9,000, both school bests. The total for the 15 home games was 155,884, the highest gross total in school history; the 10,392 average works to 94 percent of capacity (11,064) of the Coors Events Center this season and finishes second in the Pac-12 this season to Arizona (14,131). Under Tad Boyle, the Buffs have now enjoyed the best three consecutive years in attendance numbers ever (421,028, an 8,255 average for 51 games; no previous coach averaged over 6,500 for a three-year run). 12). And there were three overtime games that were decided by four or more points, so that means 23 games ended after regulation with the margin between 0 and 3 points.

MORE COACH BOYLE: Is the first CU men's coach to guide the team to three straight 20+ winning seasons • The 69 victories over the last three years, most wins in any three-year span in school history • The 21 wins last year was the fifth time a CU team has won that many games in a season (24 games won in each of the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 seasons.

2012-2013 TEAM NOTES: No. 1 in Pac-12 Conference-only defense (62.2 ppg.) • No. 1 in Pac-12 Conference Team (all games) 3-Point Defense (32.0) • Defeated four ranked opponents, a first since 2002-03 • Won three-straight road conference games for the first time since 2000-01 • Charleston Classic Champions • CU was No. 19 AP/USA Today Coaches' Poll (Nov. 26); AP No. 23 ranked (Nov. 19) – a school-first being nationally ranked since the 2005-06 season • A Tad Boyle-coached team in 9-4 when committing seven or less turnovers in a game • CU has made at least one 3-pointer in 364-straight games since Jan. 19, 2002 •

5TH PLACE OR BETTER: The third straight year CU finished the conference season in fifth place in the final standings (twice: Pac-12, once: Big 12). The three conference placings of fifth place or better is the first time since the 1968-71 seasons (Cliff Meely years), CU finished that consistent among the top-five in three-consecutive seasons (1968-69: 1st; 1969-70: t-3rd; 1970-71: t-5th).

CU RADIO: Joining 10-year KOA sports director and play-by-play caller Mark Johnson on CU men's basketball broadcasts during the 2013-14 season will be former CU great Scott Wilke. Wilke played for the Buffaloes from 1984-88 and is one of 30 players in school history to score over 1,000 points (he's 11th overall with 1,366). He still ranks in a number of categories in the CU record book. Entering the 2013-2014 season, Wilke is ninth in field goals made (527) and field goal percentage (.536); 18th in minutes played (2,564); 20th in rebounding (576); t-24th in career games started (65); 24th in games played (110); and 38th in assists (153). He's also one of a few very players in school history to lead the Buffs in all five categories in a single game. In fact, Wilke is one of five players to either tie or lead the team in scoring, rebounding, steals, assists, and blocks in a game, and he did it twice. Wilke enters his 14th year of teaching and 10th at Horizon High School in Thornton, where he is a business/marketing teacher.

AGAINST RANKED OPPONENTS

- The Buffs have defeated two or more ranked teams eight times in the history of the AP poll, and three of those eight streaks have come under Tad Boyle. The longest streak is three games, accomplished twice, first spanning two seasons from December 12, 1960 to January 6, 1962; and then again in the 1991-92 season from February 5-19.
- Only four times have the Buffs defeated three or more ranked teams in the same season, with two of those four seasons coming under Tad Boyle in the last three years. The Buffs defeated four ranked teams in 2012-13, 2010-11, and 2002-03, and have three such wins in 1991-92.
- The Buffs have defeated 53 ranked teams (AP poll) in its history dating back to 1949-50. Tad Boyle now has nine wins over ranked teams.
- In the history of the Coors Events Center (1979-80), the Buffs have defeated nine top 10 ranked teams (AP poll) in the building's history. With the Buffs 71-58 win over No. 9 Arizona, three of those nine wins have been come under Tad Boyle. The Buffs defeated No. 5 Texas and No. 8 Missouri in 2010-11.

BUFFS IN THE NBA: For the second time in as many years, CU has four former basketball players on opening day NBA rosters in 2013 (Chauncey Billups, Pistons; Alec Burks, Jazz; Chris Copeland, Pacers; Andre Roberson, Thunder).

CONFERENCE ROAD WARRIORS ... Colorado has won three straight conference games on the road, a first since 2000-01; while not the loftiest of achievements, it hasn't been common at CU. Tad Boyle's teams have won two straight Pac-12 road games twice, something the Buffaloes managed only four times in the 15 years as a member of the Big 12. And in the 49 seasons Colorado was in the Big 7/Big 8 (1948-96), it won two straight league road games a grand total of 13 times.

Three Straight: Colorado last won three straight conference road games (Feb. 7-27, 2013 (at Oregon, at Oregon State, at Stanford); and from Jan. 20-Feb. 10 2001 (at Texas Tech, Nebraska and Kansas State).

- 16 sellouts (2012-13: 7; 2010-11: 5; 2011-12: 4). CU is 13-3 in those games.

- 12 of 15 home games exceeded 10,000 fans (school record) last season.

- CU was second behind Arizona in all games attendance (avg.: 10,392) & third in conference games (avg.: 10,486) behind Arizona & UCLA.

- CU sold out the home/season opener with 10,611 in attendance. It was also the largest non-conference home crowd (essentially in school history) to see a season/home opener.

- 11,708 against Colorado State Dec. 5, 2012) was the most attended game - men's or women's at the CEC.

- CU's home win over California (70-57) on Senior Day (Feb. 26, 2012) was the 500th game at the Coors Events Center.

- School record for conference-only attendance in 2012-13 (10,486) and first time ever conference home games average over 10,000. Previous two seasons: 9,809 (2010-11) and 9,160 (2011-12), first time 9k in back-to-back-to-back seasons.

The Buffs won three straight twice in the Big 12 and six times in the Big 7/Big 8.

Three of Four: CU has won three of its last four Pac-12 road games, the fourth time it has done that under Boyle. It did it twice in the Big 12.

Four Straight: Colorado last won four straight conference road games in 1996-97 (at Missouri, Texas Tech, Baylor and Kansas State). It won four straight twice in the Big 7/Big 8 (1961-62, the last time it won as many as five in a row, and in 1963-64).

Four of Five: CU has won as many as four of five league road games just four times: 1996-97, 1963-64, 1961-62 (five in a row with a loss on either end) and 1954-55.

Five of Six: CU has done this just twice: in 1954-55 and 1961-62.

ROAD LOSS = HOME WIN: In three years as CU's head coach, Tad Boyle and the Buffs are 10-2 in games with a road loss then following the next game with a home victory. CU was 5-2 (2010-11); 3-0 (2011-12), 3-0 (2012-13).

NATIONALLY RANKED: 2 WEEKS: The Buffs were ranked nationally for two weeks coming in at No. 23 in the Associated Press poll (Nov. 19-25) and No. 19 in both polls (Nov. 26-Dec. 2). The No. 23 ranking was the first time the program has been ranked in a major poll since earning back-to-back No. 25 rankings in the Coaches Poll during the 2005-06 season. In the AP poll, it is the first ranking since appearing at No. 24 in the final poll of the 1996-97 season, when Chauncey Billups led the Buffs to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

WHY CU AND NOT UC? A question often asked of many former Big Eight schools: Why is it the University of Colorado, but the moniker is CU and not UC? (The same applies at Kansas—KU, Missouri—MU, Nebraska—NU and Oklahoma—OU). "Mid-western casualness," said CU historian, the late Fred Casotti. It has always been this way at Colorado, for whatever reason, and at the other four—but seemingly nowhere else in the USA (except for Tulsa, but its midwest, too). In the 1950s, there was a concerted effort to eliminate the use of "CU" on the Boulder campus, both as a symbol and in speech, but Casotti said that no one would buy into it. "Nobody would change," he said. "It's easier to say than U of C, UC sounds like slang or something (as in 'you see'), and it was traditional. By trying to eliminate it, they reinforced it.

OPENING STATEMENT – “I really like this year’s team. I think we’ve got a lot of talent, we’ve got a lot of athleticism. It’s almost like coaching two teams at this point because we’ve got four starters returning and some veterans that have played a lot of games for us, but we’ve also got six freshman, four true freshmen, and those five-freshmen haven’t played a minute of college basketball. I know early we are going to miss guys like Sabatino Chen, Jeremy Adams, and Shane Harris-Tunks. We brought in a lot of experience off of the bench last year and this year we are going to be playing a lot of guys who don’t know what Division I basketball is all about. But they’re going to find out quick, we are going to throw them into the fire. We are going to need our veterans and returning players to play well, especially early for us to be successful.”

“I love our team, but then I look at our non-conference schedule. It’s why I get bags under my eyes and I lose sleep at night. I

may have over-scheduled, time will tell and we will find out. But I know our players are excited about opening up with Baylor on November 8th and then all of the other quality programs that we have in our non-conference schedule, which I think will serve us well, but there will be some bumps along the road and we’ve got to be ready to handle those, be resilient, and get better every day. The core values of our program haven’t changed and they won’t change as long as our coaching staff is here.”

ON MANAGING HIGH EXPECTATIONS AROUND THE TEAM

– “Number one is we want to stay humble and we want to stay hungry, that is what it’s all about. We try not to talk about expectations. Obviously our players are involved in social media and they know what is going on outside of our program, but what we try to do is hold ourselves accountable to our internal standards of our program. What I worry about day-to-day is not handling the outside expectations, but handling the internal expectations, which is coming to practice every day ready to hook it up and compete, not making excuses, staying humble and staying hungry, challenging each other every day, and just trying to get better every single day. If we do that, with the talent we have on this team, success will take care of itself. I’m not into managing expectations, but I am into trying to hold our players and our staff, and everybody involved in our program accountable to our internal standards.”

IF THERE ARE SIGNS PLAYERS HAVE BOUGHT INTO THE HYPE

– “Yes (there are signs). That’s why we had an open scrimmage here last Saturday (Oct. 19), and that is why one team got smacked. The other team felt pretty good about themselves when they walked out of this arena. As a coach this time of year, you are always mad at somebody. We’ve got a black team and we’ve got a gold team and somebody is going to win at practice and somebody is going to lose at practice. Every rule we have is competition-based. There is a time, there is a score, there is a winner and there is a loser and we want to have our guys hungry to win and hate to lose. It’s my job as a coach to hold them accountable. We try to do that day-in and day-out.”

“There are people blowing smoke up these guys’ rear ends every day: on campus, every time they pick up a paper, listen to the radio, or get on Twitter. It’s my job to make sure they don’t buy into that hype and I feel like I am the bad guy right now, but that’s okay. We’ve watched more film of practices early in the season this year than any team we’ve had since we’ve been here because I want to show them they’re not running the floor. We have freshman that we are trying to teach

and they're trying to learn. I'm not saying it's been all bad, because it hasn't. They know what's ahead of them. But it's my job as a coach this year to keep these guys a little bit on edge."

ON THE ATTENTION HE HAS GOTTEN – "There is a fine line between being appreciative of the attention and gracious and thankful for our season ticket holders for selling out before the season and being hesitant because this year's team hasn't won a game yet. It's new territory for us, it's new territory for me. I have always been a part of rebuilding projects. Now we are on the map, so how do we handle it? It's new territory for me, new territory for our team, and new territory for our program so it's important we handle it the right way.

ON SELLING OUT SEASON TICKETS BEFORE THE SEASON – "It's a testament to our fans, a testament to our students, to the C-Unit who come night-in and night-out. I want everybody to know that I am appreciative of that and we are not going to take that for granted. The history of Colorado Basketball shows that that can go away, and it will go away if we don't do what we are supposed to on the floor. It's not all about wins and losses, it's about how we compete every night and how we play the game. With this team, as young as we are, there might be some bumps along the road. It's how do we handle that, how do we bounce back from that, how resilient are we... that's going to be the test this year.

ON HOW THE COORS EVENTS CENTER COMPARES TO OTHER PLACES HE'S SEEN

– "It's right up there. It's as good as it gets. I point to the Colorado State game and the Arizona game last year. When this place is rockin' and our fans are engaged and our players are feeding off of that energy, this is as good a place as anywhere in the country. Our challenge now is to get it like that every night. Get it like that on November 10th at 4 o'clock on a Sunday afternoon when we are playing Tennessee Martin, and to have that kind of atmosphere and the

same kind of energy from our students and from our fans. I think there is always room for improvement: as a coach, as a player, as our fans, but we are very thankful for the support we've got and we want to make sure we play in a way that makes us worthy of that support. of those areas I don't have control over, but that's a challenge for our entire department.

ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF LEADERSHIP – “I think right now (the players) are sharing it. I believe leadership emerges. I have not been a guy that names captains early in the year. What I don't want to do is give a kid a label of captain (early) and feel like in January they aren't worthy of it and I have to take it away from them. If I name Spencer (Dinwiddie) and Askia (Booker), the two most experienced players, captains, I don't want Josh Scott or Xavier Johnson, any of our freshmen, or Ben Mills to feel that since they aren't captains they can't say anything. I want everybody to have ownership in our program and everybody to have leadership opportunities in our program. Sometimes I think as a coach, when you name captains, you stunt that and you automatically limit kids as leaders. Leaders are going to emerge as the season progresses. When things get tough, who is going to step up and take control and be vocal? That has to emerge. But I think early, Spencer and Askia are our most experienced guys and they are two very vocal guys right now, which is good.”

ON AREAS OF PLAY THAT NEED IMPROVEMENT FROM LAST YEAR – “I always start with defense. We are going to miss Andre (Roberson) defensively. We are going to miss his rebounding, we already have. So we are going to have to figure out a way, by committee, to become a better rebounding team. I hope we have the number two rebounder in the country that emerges from the group we have. But if that doesn't happen, we better do it as a group, which means Wesley Gordon needs to do his fair share, Josh Scott needs to get two or three more a game, Xavier Johnson needs to get two or three more a game, Spencer Dinwiddie needs to become a better rebounding guard at 6'6". All down the line, we all have to step it up in rebounding. We were number two in the conference last year in FG percentage defense. We always want to be in the top three, but we want to lead the league in that. So with Andre gone, we need to become a better team defensively. Offensively, we need to become more efficient. For us to take that next step, we need to be a more efficient offensive team. With the talent we have and the skill we have, our field goal percentage should be upwards of 48 and hopefully above 50 percent.

2012-13: Spencer Dinwiddie – Led CU in scoring with 15.3 points per game and a team-best 82.5 percent from the free throw line. He was also named a Pac-12 Conference first team selection and his 15.3 average was tied for the eighth in the conference (all games). Dinwiddie also led the Buffs with eight, 20+ point scoring games.

2011-12: Carlon Brown – Led the Buffs in scoring in his only year (12.6 ppg.). Brown earned the Pac-12 Tournament Most Outstanding Player award helping the Buffs win four games in four days en route to the conference championship.
