COURTNEY FEDOR, DEFENDER

5-5, Bellevue, Wash. (Interlake)
Club: Crossfire Premier ECNL

COACH SANCHEZ ON FEDOR: “Courtney plays for a great club in the Crossfire Premier and coach Justi Baumgardt that also produced current Buff Brie Hooks. She is a versatile back who can play anywhere along the backline.”

HIGH SCHOOL: A three-year letter-winner at Interlake, Fedor helped lead the team to the 2011 2a Washington State Championship, where she and the Saint Bernard defense allowed zero goals throughout the entire state tournament. As a sophomore, Fedor contributed four assists, helped Interlake to a 17-3-1 record and earned second-team All-King County honors. As a junior she was a first-team All-King County selection and an All-State honorable mention. That year, she scored two goals as the Saint Bernards posted an 11-4-3 record. Though an injury sidelined her most of her senior season, Fedor was named All-King County honorable

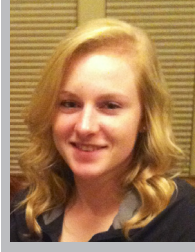


mention. While she was injured, she volunteered to help run the summer high school soccer trainings. Fedor also stood out as a member of the Crossfire Elite Clubs National League team. The club won state championships in 2008 and '11 and Northwest Champions League Championships in 2011 and '12. The squad also advanced to the 2011 Region IV semi-finals and took home third place in the 2012 ECNL Flight

A Finals. Fedor was also a member of the Washington ODP team, earning an invitation to the 2011 Regional Camp and a spot on the Phoenix All-Tournament Team in 2011.

PERSONAL: Courtney Anne Fedor was born on August 18, 1996. Her parents are Chris, a baseball coach, and Kathy Fedor, a Microsoft employee. Club: SC del Sol

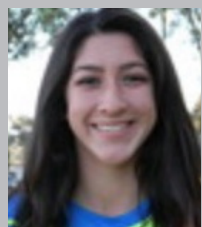

HIGH SCHOOL: A Rookie of the Year at Cactus Shadows, Best helped the Falcons to a runner-up finish at the state championships. As a member of SC del Sol, Best helped lead the club to a Surf Cup Championship in 2012. Under head coach Les Armstrong, SC del Sol finished the 2012-13 season ranked second in the ECNL Champions League.

COACH SANCHEZ ON OREJEL: "Joss has great international experience playing with Mexico. Her club coach Randy Dodge is also a college coach and does a great job preparing his players for the next level. Joss is another So Cal Blues SC product (along with Jenna Reeves and Buffs Tori Cooper and Madi Krauser) that can play as a left back or centrally in the back."

HIGH SCHOOL: Orejel's focus on club play during her prep career helped her gain major attention. Under coach Randy Dodge, Orejel and the So Cal Blues were three-time league champions and won back-to-back Surf College Cup Championships and the 2011 State Championship. Orejel was named to the state Olympic Development Program team in 2011. As a member of the Under-17 Mexican Women's National Team, she played in the 2012 World Cup. Orejel has a four-star rating on Top Drawer Soccer, coming in as her region's 27th ranked player.



IN THE CLASSROOM: Orejel plans to take the pre-medicine route at Colorado.

PERSONAL: Jocelyn Marie Orejel was born on November 14, 1996 to parents Rudy and Rosie Orejel. She has two younger siblings, Justin and Gisselle. Her nickname is Joss. She's bilingual and traveled all around the world before the age of 16. After graduation, Orejel wants to start her own business. She is the first of her family to attend college and chose Colorado because this is a place she could see herself being for the next four years and beyond.

COACH SANCHEZ ON REEVES: "Jenna is capable of making an impact anywhere along the backline or as a holding central midfielder. She plays for So Cal Blues SC (along with Jocelyn Orejel and current Buffs Madi Krauser and Tori Cooper). Her club coach Larry Draluck is well respected across the country and has produced numerous college players."

HIGH SCHOOL: With her senior season still in progress, Reeves has already proven herself as one of the nation's elite defenders. A three-time Defensive Player of the Year, Scholar Athlete and Principle's Honor Roll recipient, Reeves has been key to Villa Park's transformation and steady growth. As a freshman, she scored two goals and contributed five assists as the Spartans posted a 4-15-3 record. The team quickly turned things around, more than tripling their win total in Reeves' sophomore season. That year, the Spartans went 17-6-4 and Reeves netted two goals and added seven assists. Her junior season, she had three goals and eight assists, helping Villa Park to a 19-6-5 record and earning first-team All-Orange County honors and an AP Scholar Award. Reeves was a first-team All-Century League selection as a sophomore and junior and has served as team captain during junior and senior seasons. In the IMG Academy 2014 Top 150 Rankings, Reeves is currently No. 101 overall, ranking No. 19 in Region IV and sitting as the 16th ranked defender. Reeves also helped the So Cal Blues to Blues Cup Championships in 2011 and '13 and LV Players Showcase and Schwan's USA Cup V Elite Puma Showcase Championships in 2012. Reeves also has extensive ODP experience, as a member of the Cal South ODP 1995 summer/winter pool from 2009-12 and the Region IV pool from 2009-11 (she received an invite in 2012). With the ODP team, Reeves won Region IV Championships three straight years, from 2010-12, and the National Championship in 2012. She was also invited to the National Development Camp in 2010 and '11 and was named Region IV All-Tournament Second Team in 2010 and First Team in 2011.



IN THE CLASSROOM: Reeves intends to major in business, with an emphasis in marketing.

PERSONAL: Virginia Noelle Reeves was born on December 12, 1996. Her parents are Christopher and Melissa Reeves, a Ford master technician and Dell clerk, respectively. She has two older sisters, Stephanie and Taylor, the latter of whom is a student at Cal State Fullerton and an Anaheim Ducks Power Player. After graduation, Reeves hopes to pursue a career in professional soccer or entrepreneurship. She enjoys drawing, shopping and sleeping. An interesting fact about her is that she can recite the alphabet backward. She has always wanted to play in the Pac-12 Conference and chose Colorado because of the beautiful campus and amazing coaching staff's style of soccer.



BRITTNEY STARK

COACH SANCHEZ ON STARK: “Brittney has been battling some injuries, but she is now working towards full fitness with her coaches at Colorado Rush (Andrew Kummer and Mike Gabb). We are excited to keep Britt home and feel that she can make an impact in our attack.”

HIGH SCHOOL: In two seasons, Stark, a two-time first-team All-Northern League selection, has helped the Broomfield Eagles to a 29-6-2 record. As a freshman, Stark scored 13 goals and contributed six assists while



being named first-team All-Boulder County and second-team All-State. Stark earned first-team All-State honors and was an NSCAA All-West Region selection as a junior, scoring 10 goals and adding four assists. Stark played club soccer with Colorado Rush, helping the team to the Youth World

Championship title at the 2010 Gothia Cup, where she was named the MVP of the championship game.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Stark intends to pursue a degree in the medical field. She is also interested in teaching.

PERSONAL: Brittney Alise Stark is the daughter of Roy and Denise Stark, a firefighter and a receptionist, respectively. She has a younger sister, Michaela, who also plays soccer. Stark says she chose Colorado because she couldn't imagine playing or living in any other state and because she hopes to strive in the strong Pac-12 Conference. COACH SANCHEZ ON WATSON: “With us graduating four year starter Annie Brunner in goal, we are excited to add Scout to the competition for next fall. She plays her club soccer with Huw Williams at Sporting Blue Valley that is of the top ECNL club teams in her age group.”

HIGH SCHOOL: Watson was a multi-sport star at Blue Valley Northwest. In soccer, she was a three-year letter-winner, helping the Huskies to a 24-9-4 record in her sophomore and junior seasons and the 2013 state and regional championships. She also played basketball (a three-year letter-winner as a guard), volleyball (helping the team to the 2013 runner-up title and sub-state championship as a right side hitter) and softball (playing shortstop and second base, for which she was an honorable mention selection as a freshman). Watson was the first female athlete at BVNW to play three sports all four years. With the Sporting Valley soccer club, Watson earned a fourth place finish at the 2012 ECNL Nationals and fifth at the 2013 Nationals. Watson was also named to the 2012-13 ECNL All-Event Team.

IN THE CLASSROOM: Watson hopes to major in broadcast journalism and communication at CU.
