ON THE RANGE...

The **117th Annual NCAA Golf Championships** begin this week with 81 schools competing in six regionals around the country, with the **University of Colorado** one of 14 schools competing in the 26th Annual NCAA Regional Golf Championships (Southeast/Auburn) in Auburn, Ala. (Auburn University is the host school) ... This will be CU's first-ever competition in the state of Alabama and the Buffs first tournament in the southeast since the 2010 Louisiana Classics ... It's CU's second straight to the NCAA Championships, with the Buffaloes now having been invited in 18 of the 26 years of the regional format ... CU is one of eight Pac-12 Conference schools that earned a trip to the postseason ... The top five teams out of 14 competing will advance to the NCAA Finals, set for May 23-28 in Hutchinson, Kan. (Wichita State will host at Prairie Dunes Golf Club) ... Five teams will also advance to the finals out of five other regionals being held in Columbia, Mo., Eugene, Raleigh, San Antonio and Sugar Grove, Ill. ... the top two individuals not associated with the five teams that qualify will also advance ... CU is the No. 8 seed, matching its highest in any of its previous 18 regionals (2008-09), and will tee off at 7:50 a.m. (MDT) on Thursday off No. 1, with the Buffs paired with Kennesaw State (No. 7 seed) and Louisville (No. 9); the Cardinals are coached by CU alum Mark Crabtree '78) ... The field will be re-paired according to score after the first and second rounds, with all tee times between 8:00 and 10:20 a.m. for the second round (Friday) and between 7:30 and 9:50 a.m. for the final round (Saturday) ... The Buffs' practice round is set for 7:40 a.m. MDT Wednesday (off No. 1).



THE SITE

The **Auburn University Club** in Auburn is located in east central Alabama, approximately 20 miles from the Georgia border and is the host course for the NCAA Southeast/Auburn Regional. The Auburn Club has a 7,254-yard, par-72 layout and was designed by Bill Bergin in 1999; the course surrounds the 25-acre Yarbrough Lake and is partly bordered by Saughatchee Creek. The course features magnificent trees, wetlands, creek and streams as natural water features are prominent on the course. Course website: <http://www.augolfclub.com/golf/>.

THE EVENT & CU SUCCESS

This is the 26th year that the NCAA is holding regionals, the sixth where the format calls for six events from the previous three in order to stock the 30-team field at the NCAA Championship Finals. There are 13 or 14 teams at each site, with the top five to advance out of each. Out of the regional format, the Buffaloes have advanced to the NCAA Finals on four occasions, all four times with some style. In **1989**, the inaugural year for regional activity, CU finished third at Stonebridge Country Club outside of Dallas. Oklahoma and Oklahoma State tied for team honors with an 880 score, followed by the Buffs at 902. In **1994**, the Buffs placed second with an 853 score, just two strokes back of regional champion Texas, at Oklahoma City Golf & Country Club. In **1999**, at Ohio State University's Scarlet Course, the Buffs rallied from 18th place and eight shots back after 36 holes to force a playoff with Kent State, winning the battle on the first extra hole and thus advancing to the national finals; it remains the second largest comeback in regional history. In **2002** in Little Rock, CU was 11th after day one and 13th after day two, but rallied to post the seventh best score in a final round despite tough winds, finishing in the 10th and final spot with an 886 team score, edging two teams by one stroke—now former Big 12 rivals Kansas and Oklahoma.

THE SOUTHEAST/AUBURN REGIONAL FIELD

The field is comprised of 75 golfers, 14 five-man teams, plus five individuals; Colorado will be reunited with former Big 12 rival Texas and area rivals BYU and New Mexico; those three, CU and UC Davis are the only five west of the Mississippi River competing at Auburn. Here is the field listed by seed, with CU's record against team in parenthesis—the Buffs are **2-7-1** overall against teams competing, having seen just five of the other 13 programs in 2013-14:

THE RANKINGS

There are three men's collegiate golf rankings: one anonymous poll, conducted by the GCAA by select unknown head coaches (except those who participate), and two that are computer generated (*Golfweek* and *GolfStat*). The Southeast/Auburn Regional features five top 25 schools, nine top 50 teams, with just three outside the top 75; the SEC has two schools in the event, otherwise it's a potpourri of conferences (13 in all). A look at who ranks where in what:

THE COLORADO ROSTER

The quintet representing Colorado in the NCAA's have earned eight letters between them, and with three of the five true freshmen, this is the youngest CU team that has ever qualified for the NCAA's. This group has two players with NCAA experience (the '04 team had the fewest, with one). The last Colorado team to advance to the NCAA Finals, the 2002 squad, had a combined 17 letters with 12 previous NCAA regional or finals tournaments among them. The 2014 Buffalo five:

- Five CU players have played in four NCAA Championships: **Rick Cramer** (1979-82), **Bob Kalinowski** (1991-94), **Matt Zions** (1999-2002), **Kane Webber** (2000-04) and **Derek Tolan** (2006-09).
- The Buffs had previously taken two freshmen to the NCAA's three times, twice with two true frosh: **Shawn Wills** and **Matt Zions** (1999) and **Kevin Kring** and **Johnny Widmer** (2009). **Stephen Carroll**, a redshirt frosh, and **Kane Webber** (true) played in 2000.

SEASON CAPSULE

The 2013-14 **University of Colorado** men's golf team is shaping up to be one of the two best in the eight-year tenure of head coach **Roy Edwards**; it is his fifth team to advance to the NCAA Championships, and what could separate it from his other top squad, the 2008-09 team, is if this group can advance to the NCAA Championship Finals, something CU hasn't done since 2002.

The team has already set several school records and has a few more in its sights. Most notably, the '13-14 Buffaloes have a record eight top five finishes, which have all been top four efforts, including a current run of five in a row. If CU can extend that streak to six and the total to nine, it will earn a trip to Hutchinson, Kan., for the Finals. One of those solid efforts came at the Pac-12 Championships last month, where the Buffaloes were wallowing in 11th place late in the second round only to rally and finish fourth – posting the second best score over the last two rounds (and only two strokes shy of being the best).

The Buffaloes are on pace for record stroke averages for the season (currently 73.55) and the spring (72.94). In all 11 tournaments, CU's top finisher has been in the top 20, seven times in the top 10.

Four players have participated in the bulk of the tournaments, with junior **David Oraee** (73.0 stroke average), sophomore **Philip Juel-Berg** (72.9) and freshman **Jeremy Paul** (72.4) playing in all 11; **Yannik Paul** (72.9), the younger of the identical twins, has played in 10. The fifth-spot has rotated throughout the year, mainly occupied by sophomore **Drew Trujillo** (75.2) and freshmen **Andrew Bonner** (75.0) and now by frosh **Ethan Freeman** (74.6). Edwards has had three freshmen counting toward the team score in eight of the 11 tournaments to date, and had two in the other three meets. This is easily the youngest team in CU history that has been asked to perform over the course of an entire season.

CU's worst two performances came inexplicably at the New Mexico Tucker Invitational, a tie for 12th in a tough field but just four days after CU won its own Simpson Invitational, and then in the spring opener in its toughest tournament field of the year, the Amer Ari Invitational in Hilo, Hawai'i. The Buffs finished 13th, though did close the meet with a 10-under 278 team score. Otherwise, the only finish outside of the top four was a tie for sixth at the Alister Mackenzie, another solid field.

HEAD COACH ROY EDWARDS

Roy Edwards is completing his eighth season as head coach of the University of Colorado men's golf team, as he was named to the position on July 14, 2006, following in the footsteps of the only two coaches the program had ever known over a span of six decades.

Edwards, 37, is just the third full-time men's golf coach in Buffalo history. He came to CU with an impressive pedigree, joining the Buffaloes from his alma mater, the University of Kansas, where he had served as the assistant for both the men's and women's programs for the previous four years (2002-06). He held the same position at Vanderbilt University for a year prior to returning to KU.

Edwards replaced the late Mark Simpson, who passed away from complications due to lung cancer in December 2005. Simpson had held the post since 1977, when he followed in the footsteps of his college head coach, Les Fowler. Fowler took over as player-coach in 1948 and remained on board until Simpson, his assistant, replaced him. Thus, Edwards is only the program's third full-time head coach since 1948.

Edwards has embraced the most daunting task in CU golf history: when the Buffaloes joined the Pac-12 Conference on July 1, 2011, they became a member of the most prestigious men's golf conference in the nation. As many as seven schools have regularly occupied the top 30 over the last several seasons, but he has been up to the challenge and the program is poised to join the nation's elite.

It took less than three years for Edwards to put his stamp on the CU golf program, perhaps in no bigger way than completing the dream of his two predecessors. One of the few major golf programs in the nation without its own true home golf course and facilities, Edwards played an integral part in working with alum Steve Kerr in the latter's acquisition of Vista Ridge Golf Club in Erie in early 2009. The club was renamed Colorado National Golf Club and now serves as the official home for the university's men's and women's golf teams. In 2012, construction was completed on a state-of-the-art practice facility at the course that matches any in the nation.

He also initiated the Colorado Partners program, a group that quickly grew to over 100 members who contribute financially to augment the school's golf budget, and established the Colorado Golf Day which is an annual celebration and fundraiser for CU golf.

On the course, the team has enjoyed continued success. His 2012-13 team became the first in school history to win a tournament in both the fall and spring, had six top five finishes and returned to the NCAA Championships after a four-year absence, finishing eighth in the Central Regional.

In 2011-12, his sixth season, the Buffs stormed out of the gate to win its first two fall tournaments (CU and AFA invitationals); the victories propelled CU to an early No. 10 national ranking. The team successfully navigated its way through its first season in the ultra-competitive Pac-12 Conference, finishing eighth in a league championship that featured eight teams ranked in the top 30. The Buffs just missed qualifying for the NCAA championships but Derek Fribbs was selected to play as an individual.

The 2009-10 and 2010-11 teams, his fourth and fifth, respectively, had their moments but did not advance to the postseason, though Justin Bardgett qualified individually in 2010. The Buffs finished ninth and 10th in their last two appearances in the Big 12 Conference meet. The disappointments only created more resolve in the program and thus the turnaround in year six.

His third Buffalo team (2008-09) sported one of the nation's dynamic duos in Patrick Grady and Derek Tolan, as each won two tournaments and combined for 14 top 10 finishes. But the team was also balanced as a whole,

with 32 top 20 performances posted by seven different golfers, and recorded a 74.06 stroke average, second lowest in school history (topped only by 73.77 in 2003-04). The Buffs posted 11 top 10 finishes in major tournaments, the second-most in school history that included a record-tying seven in the top five, and highlighted by a 34-stroke win in the DU-Ron Moore and three runner-up finishes in the USF Olympic Club, Western Intercollegiate and its own CU-Stevinson Ranch Invitational.

In earning a fourth straight trip to the NCAA's, in the Big 12 Championships, the Buffs posted their best conference finish in 28 years when they took second place; it tied for the largest improvement from one season to another in Big 12 history after finishing 10th in 2008 (CU moved from 11th to 3rd from 1997 to 1998 as did Missouri on one occasion). The Buffs were in the hunt for the title until the back nine of the final round, when Oklahoma State finally was able to get some distance and eventually won by 14 shots.

His second team ('07-08), became just the third in school history to win two major tournaments in the same season, as CU won the Louisiana Classics and the Ohio State Kepler Intercollegiate. The Buffs finished 10th in the Big 12 meet, which moved to a 72-hole format for the first time, and was again invited to the NCAA's, placing 18th in the Central Regional. Junior Derek Tolan was one of two individuals to advance out of the regional into the finals, the first Buff to do so since 1993.

Edwards' first CU team (2006-07) had moderate success, and finished 11th in the Big 12 Championships; while that was disappointing, his team did something that neither Fowler's or Simpson's did, qualify for the NCAA Championships (though in fairness, more teams are invited today than when they coached, but it still was an impressive accomplishment). The team placed 20th in the NCAA Central Regional.

At Kansas, he was heavily involved in recruiting and the day-to-day functions for both the men's and women's teams, managed the Jayhawks' Birdie Club and was the main contact for both golf camps. A KU graduate, he returned to his alma mater in August 2002 as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs and further developed all the skills necessary to one day become a head coach. He started his coaching career as a volunteer/graduate assistant in 1998, working three years in that capacity before moving on to Vanderbilt for his first full-time assistant coaching position.

He was the assistant for both the men's and women's teams at Vanderbilt from May 2001 until returning to his alma mater the following year. At Vandy, he headed the Commodore Golf Day and the Mason Rudolph Intercollegiate Golf Championships, and was involved in Commodore recruiting as well as the day-to-day practice and traveling schedules. He was a part of history as both teams experienced two of the best seasons in the programs' existence the 2001-02 academic year, and had a hand in coaching a pair of first-team All-Southeastern Conference players, including Brandt Snedeker, a first-team All-American, the 2007 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year and third place finisher in the 2008 Masters.

A three-year member of the Jayhawk golf team, he lettered as a senior under legendary and long-time coach Ross Randall and earned his degree in business administration from Kansas in 2000. Simultaneously while finishing his degree, he worked as a volunteer assistant coach for the men's team. His career playing highlights include being named the PGA Midwest Section Player of the Year in 1995 and the Heart of America Four-Ball champion in 1997. As a student, he was also heavily involved on KU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and held several leadership roles on campus.

Born October 14, 1976 in Kansas City, Mo., but truly a native of Hutchinson, Kan., he was a four-year letterman in golf at Hutchinson (Kan.) High School and was an Eagle Scout. His hobbies include playing golf, cooking and traveling. Edwards is married to the former Shelly Bonfantine of Albuquerque, N.M., as they wed on July 7, 2007 (07-07-07); she is a former golfer at the University of New Mexico. They are the parents of two sons, Ashton Ross (5) and Luke Leo (2).

THE SCHEDULE & SEASON AT-A-GLANCE

Colorado has played in 11 tournaments this year, with *Golfweek* ranking CU's schedule the 84th toughest to date (out of 302 schools); while some fields didn't pan out as tough as planned, the Buffs still did play in in four of the top 50 ranked regular season tournaments, led by the Amer Ari Invitational coming as the 13th toughest this season, with the Pac-12 Championships ranking No. 19 on the list. All but the Pac-12 title meet were events where the usual format had four scorers out of five players counted toward the team score. Colorado was 121-42-7 against Division I competition this year, and for the first time in its history, was above .500 against fellow Pac-12 members (19-18-2).

FOUR BUFFS AMONG TOP PAC-12 FRESHMEN

Four Buffaloes, all true freshmen, are among the top freshmen in the Pac-12 Conference, led by team stroke average leader **Jeremy Paul** (72.35); he has the sixth best stroke average for newbies in the league. His twin brother, **Yannik**, is 10th (72.94), with **Ethan Freeman** 14th (74.56) and **Andrew Bonner** 17th (74.95; he has since decided to leave the program and seek out a school closer to his northern California home). In the Pac-12 Championships, Freeman tied for third, Jeremy Paul was fifth and Yannik Paul sixth among the 14 freshmen competing; Yannik also shot the lowest third round score (69, -3) in the entire field. Freeman tied for 16th overall (6-over 294), with Jeremy 30th (299) and Yannik tied for 31st (300).

THIS-N-THAT, 2013-14 ...

- The team's overall stroke average is 73.55, which is more than flirting with the team's all-time best of 73.77 in 2003-04; while the spring stroke mark of 72.94 is over three-fourths of a stroke better than the current spring best of 73.71 set that same season.
- Colorado has eight top five finishes (which have all been in the top four), a new school best, as the Buffaloes previously had seven top five finishes in four different seasons. Included in that count is one win and three runner-up efforts.
- The Buffs finished fourth at the Pac-12 Championships, 41 strokes behind No. 3 Stanford (1,438) and 26 behind runner-up and No. 10 Washington; No. 4 Cal was third, 12 ahead of the Buffs. But over the last two rounds, CU was second (718) to only Washington (716).
- Over the course of four tournaments, the Buffs set two school records: most consecutive rounds at or under par (12), and the most subpar in a row (6).
- The Buffaloes have 27 rounds in the 60s this season (and 65 subpar rounds overall), surpassing last year's totals of 25 and 50, respectively (and 20 and 45 from the 2011-12 season). Seven different players have shot scores in the 60s, while nine have subpar scores. **Jeremy Paul** has 17 subpar rounds, one shy of the team record, and he along with **Philip Juell-Berg** lead the team in par or better rounds with 18.
- According to GolfStat, CU has the nation's top performing freshman class, three of whom are competing in this NCAA Regional: **Jeremy** and **Yannik Paul** and **Ethan Freeman**. McNeese State, Texas, Auburn and Virginia round out the top five; Stanford at No. 8 joins CU on the list from the Pac-12.
- CU has not advanced to the NCAA Finals the last six times it qualified for regional play, the longest drought in school history; CU went four straight regionals (1990-93) without advancing.

U.S. OPEN LOCAL QUALIFYING

Several Buffaloes were schedule to participate in U.S. Open Local Qualifying this past Monday at various sites around Colorado, but everything was cancelled by the late spring snowstorm that dumped as many as 20 inches in the high country and anywhere from 4-8" along the Front Range. They will all be rescheduled, most like for his Monday, May 19.

THE "DID YOU KNOW?" FACT

Colorado, Ohio State, Stanford and Wake Forest have produced the most U.S. Open champions with four. CU's **Hale Irwin** has won three (1974, 1979, 1990) and **Steve Jones** one (1996). Ohio State's **Jack Nicklaus** claimed four by himself, while Stanford has had **Tiger Woods** win three and **Tom Watson** one; Wake Forest has had three players do it.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS

Thirty teams will advance to the NCAA Championship Finals in Hutchinson, Kan., with the tournament to be played at the 6,759-yard, par-70 Prairie Dunes Country Club, a course the CU program was very familiar with as a member of both the Big 8 and Big 12; it is in the hometown of CU head coach **Roy Edwards**, who knows Prairie Dunes like the back of his hand. CU and Texas A&M held a dual match there on April 20 as a final tune-up ahead of each school's league championship (A&M won, 3-2; four CU players who are competing in this regional participated that day). There will be three rounds of stroke play May 23-25, with the top eight teams advancing to match play from May 26-28; the championship match is Wednesday, May 28.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A STROKE MAKES

History has shown time and time again that a single stroke can mean the difference between advancing to the NCAA Finals and having a season end early. The last eight Central regionals CU participated in that featured 27 teams all came down to a playoff or one stroke separating the 10 teams that qualified and the 11th that was left on the outside looking in. Overall, on six occasions, there was a tie for the last qualifying spot, with one stroke the difference seven times and two strokes three times. Only three years was the margin between qualifying and going home been more than two shots, in 1992 (7), in 1998 (3) and in 2000 (4). A closer look at the Central Regional history (1989-2008), where CU participated when it made it to the postseason:

QUOTING ROY EDWARDS**General**

"I know everyone is relieved to be done with finals, it's always a nice feeling to be able to compete once they're over and not have to worry about school. A couple of guys are getting over an illness that was going around, so come Thursday, we'll be raring to go. Our frame of mind is very good, we're excited to get out there and compete again following how we finished at the Pac-12 Championships."

On Adjusting To The Southern Bermuda Grasses

"I'm not concerned. We've played on it enough, played on it in tournaments in Phoenix and Hawaii, and the greens were Bermuda a couple of other places. Had we not seen it at all over the course of the season, it might be more of a challenge, but the guys are fairly used to it. And we'll have a couple of (practice) days to get used to it, so it won't be an issue."

On What Colorado Needs To Do This Week

"When we played our best, we have played with a lot confidence and we have had fun, and that is because we prepared well. If we can continue to do those things, we'll perform at the highest level we can. The team gained even more confidence from our last two rounds at the Pac-12's, but in order to shoot those kinds of rounds, the guys had to have confidence anyway. I feel like we'll play similar to that, they are motivated to go out play well, to show everyone what we are made of. The goal is obviously to advance, and we'll be disappointed with anything less than that."

On CU's Chances At Regionals And The Field At Auburn

"It's no different than at any of the six regional sites. I like our chances if we play well, and if we don't, we won't advance. There are too many good teams, and no one is going to move on to the Finals with a mediocre performance. I think it's exciting to play somewhere new, where we haven't been before, and your attention is a little bit better at a course you've never played. The five teams who make the least number of controllable mistakes will advance. As I've always said, this has more to do about us doing our job more than anything else."

On The Recent Play of David Oraee

"David's really blossomed into a top collegian. Over the course of the three years he's been here, he's really improved. Things have really come together for him the last three months, he's gained a lot of confidence and he's really comfortable with his game. It's no surprise that he's played well in his last three events, and he can and wants to play even better. It's going to be exciting to see how he keeps developing."

On Three Freshman Playing In A Regional

"It's certainly rare, but not unheard of, but I think it speaks to how the team developed as a group. Jeremy has been good all year, Yannik has been practically right there with him, and Ethan really showed something when he was pressed into action after not playing in a tournament all spring and gave us two solid outings. They're more excited to go out there and compete instead of being freshmen and worrying about playing in a regional for the first time."

On All Five Players In The Regional Returning Next Year And If Colorado Is Now On The "Golf" Map

"I've never been one to look to far into the future, we're just trying to be as good as we can right now. Those three are capable of playing really good this week, we're fortunate all three chose CU; they're great teammates and good people. There is no question that all five can perform at a high level. We're not out to make any statement, to say, 'Hey, look at Colorado.' We can control only what we have control over and not worry about what other people think about us. But I will say this, if we keep working hard and keep improving, there are going to be a lot of exciting times ahead."

PAC-12 CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP: BUFFS RALLY TO FINISH FOURTH

MARANA, Ariz. (April 27) — The University of Colorado men’s golf team completed a meteoric rise in the standings in less than a 24-hour span, as the Buffaloes finished fourth in the 55th annual Pac-12 Championships.

No. 3 Stanford captured its first Pac-12 title since 1994, the year before Tiger Woods enrolled, as the Cardinal took a 21-stroke lead into the final round and cruised to a 15-shot victory with a 2-under par 1,438 team score. No. 10 Washington took runner-up honors after posting the tournament’s best round Sunday – a 14-under 346 – closing with a 1,453 total, while No. 4 California slipped into third with 1,467.

The No. 53 Buffaloes matched the second best single round of the meet, recording a 6-under 354 in Sunday’s final round, and completed their vault up the standings into fourth place with a 39-over par 1,479 total. Occasionally occupying 11th place at a few junctures in the second round which was completed Saturday morning, CU made its big move from 10th into sixth from the second to third rounds, and polished off its climb Sunday by joining Stanford and Washington as the only schools with four or more players to shoot par or better in the fourth and final round.

It was CU’s best finish in a conference championship since taking second in the 2009 Big 12 meet (and just its second upper division – top six – effort in its last 10 league title affairs). In the process, the Buffaloes defeated seven teams ahead of them in the rankings, including No. 17 UCLA, No. 20 USC and No. 25 Arizona State, the latter two of whom were paired with CU in the final round.

“We had two very good final rounds and a solid finish overall, so we’re definitely pleased with the team result,” CU head coach **Roy Edwards** said. “I am so proud of each and every one of these young men, and they all contributed. This team has just kept improving throughout the year, week-by-week, and I expect that to continue.

“This is probably one of the best moves up a leaderboard that I’ve ever been associated with,” he added. “The guys didn’t freak out a whole lot (after Friday’s disappointment), they came out Saturday motivated to play well and then came out today motivated again after how well we did in third round. It’s proof that confidence makes all the difference in the world.”

After just 23 holes worse than par in Saturday’s third round, a tournament best that included just one double bogey and nothing higher, the Buffaloes came back in the final round with just 19 – 16 bogeys and three doubles. Only Stanford and Washington had fewer Sunday and no one had fewer than the Buffs on the weekend. And Edwards knew why.

“Everyone did a great job of keeping the ball in the play,” he noted. “We took advantage when we could make birdie, but we didn’t try to press things. Otherwise, we just did what we could with what we had, and that was keeping the ball in front of us, being satisfied with par and moving on.”

Junior **David Orae** led the Buffaloes here, posting CU’s best individual finish in a conference meet in five years in tying for 12th place; he was a model of consistency all weekend, recording a 72-74-74-73—293 scorecard (5-over) on the 7,349-yard, par-72 Gallery Golf Club layout. He had 11 birdies, 47 pars, 12 bogeys and two doubles, and played both the 40 par-4 holes and the 16 par-5 holes even for the tournament (sixth and 21st, respectively, in the field). His par count was the second most by a Buff but the seventh most overall.

Freshman **Ethan Freeman** used a 3-under 69 Sunday to tie for 16th with a 6-over 294 total. He tied for the team lead with 13 birdies, which were also 16th-most in the field, and played the 16 combined challenging par-3 holes here the best of all the Buffaloes and the sixth-best in the field at 1-over par. He also played the par-5s at 1-over, 18th among all here.

Freeman’s finish is the highest by a CU freshman in a league championship since **Kevin Kring** tied for 12th in the 2009 Big 12 event, and the ninth all-time Buff frosh best. He also tied for third among the 14 freshmen competing here this weekend, behind UW’s Corey Pereira (291) and Stanford’s Maverick McNealy (292).

“Ethan coming out and playing well in Scottsdale (two weeks ago in the Wyoming Desert Intercollegiate) and then playing well in a championship event wasn’t easy since he hadn’t competed much this spring,” Edwards said. “We’ve really been pleased with him and how well he responded to the challenge.”

Freshman **Jeremy Paul** had three straight rounds over par to lead off his Pac-12 debut, just the second time this year CU’s stroke average leader had a run of that many. But he also came in with a Buff best 71.8 final round average – and he

would lower it after recording a 3-under 69, which enabled him to finish with an 11-over 299, placing him 30th in the final standings. He tied Freeman for the team lead in birdies with 13, and played the par-5 holes the best of all the Buffaloes at 3-under, 13th-best in the field. The 69 was officially his 17th subpar round of the year, and he is now one shy of the school record.

Freshman **Yannik Paul** wrapped things up with a 1-under 71, nicely following up his third round 69 for an overall score of 12-over 300, tying him for 31st; his 4-under 140 over the final 36 holes was the third best in the field as he reversed courses from his first two rounds when he had an abnormally high 12 holes worse than par. Over his last two rounds, he had just four – all bogeys – and he finished with a team-best 48 pars, which were third-best in the entire field.

Sophomore **Drew Trujillo** finished up with an 8-over 80, giving him a 23-over par 311 for the tournament which tied him for 56th. Even through seven holes, things started to get away from him when he scored a double bogey on No. 8; he was still hanging at 3-over through 12, but he played the next four holes at 5-over. He played the tough par-3 holes the second-best of all the Buffaloes and the 13th-best in the field, as he was 2-over for the 16 of those in the meet.

Sophomore **Philip Juel-Berg** closed with a second straight even-par 72, though did not post an official 72-hole score after withdrawing in Friday’s first round after nine holes due to illness. He did rally to return to action and play the second round that afternoon and shot a 76; his 4-over par 220 over the final 54 holes tied for the 12th best score in the field. He had three birdies and 13 pars Sunday and 10 and 32, respectively over his final three rounds.

“Philip doing what he did speaks volumes about him,” Edwards said. “He was not playing for him, he was just playing for the team, and it’s really easy to lose your focus. But each of his three rounds counted (toward CU’s team score). Overall, everyone was battling, and this is what can come of it.”

NOTES: It was Colorado’s fifth straight top four finish in a major tournament, and the eighth top five finish this season, a school record (all eight have been in the top four) ... Yannik Paul’s 69 in the third round and the windy, wet and cold conditions was the best in the field on Saturday, a round Edwards called one of the best he’s ever seen in his 15 years as a head or assistant coach ... The top three teams for the final 36 holes: 1. Washington 716; 2. **Colorado 718**; 3. Stanford 722 ... Jeremy Paul and Freeman joined Yannik in shooting 69s here, and thus matched **Kevin Kring** for CU’s previous best in a Pac-12 Championship, which he accomplished in 2012 at Corvallis (also 3-under par); all three of the 69s this year were by freshmen, tying for the second best score by a frosh in conference meet: the low remains a 68 by **Mike Mulhern** in the 72 Big 8 Championship at Boulder Country Club ... The first round scoring average was **75.91**, dropping to **74.72** for the second round; in the third round, it ballooned to **77.32**; all six CU players scored below that figure as the Buffs averaged 74.0; the fourth round average was the lowest at **73.67** with the overall average for the meet **75.40** ... The 354 was CU’s best gross score in a Pac-12 Championship and first subpar (6-under) round in relation to par in the 12 rounds it has posted in the league meet since joining the conference on July 1, 2011.

THE PLAYERS

The youngest Colorado team ready to hit the tees in an NCAA regional is basically the same unit that finished fourth in the Pac-12 Championships last month, minus a sophomore as the Pac-12 is a six-count-five format. Here are the bio capsules on CU's Alabama five:

#1 JEREMY PAUL**6-1, 175, Fr., 1L, Viernheim, Germany (Albertus-Magnus)**

Rewriting most of CU's freshman records, starting with his 72.35 stroke average and 71.89 spring mark; he is bidding to become the just the fifth frosh to lead the Buffaloes and the first since Kane Webber in 1999-2000 (73.03). His 72.93 fall stroke average was the second best on the team, and was the fourth-best by a freshman (true or redshirt) for the fall in school history. He has 17 subpar rounds on the year, one shy of the school mark, and either leads the team or is tied for the lead in 16 categories. He set a CU freshman record for the best score in a 54-hole tournament with an 8-under (71-67-70—208) effort at Cal's Alister Mackenzie Invitational, tying for seventh and breaking the old Buff frosh mark by three shots. However, it would last just one tournament as his brother Yannik broke it by a shot in UTEP's Give 'Em Five Invitational – but in that meet, Jeremy turned in a 65-73-71—209 scorecard to tie for sixth, thus he recorded two of the top three freshman performances in school history in back-to-back events. He then opened the spring with a 9-under 207 at the Amer Ari Invitational in Waikoloa, Hawai'i, becoming the first player in CU history to have three straight 7-under par or better efforts in tournament play and then tie his brother again for the record, and his next time out, he turned in a 4-under 212 at the Wyoming Desert Intercollegiate, setting a school record with four straight under par performances. In the fall, he did not have a score worse than a double bogey on a hole, and has just two in 612 holes enter the regional; he owns a team-best 19.4 percent figure for subpar holes (113 birdies and a team-high six eagles). He was one of four finalists for CU's Freshman Athlete of the Year at the CUSPY Awards (CU Sports Performers of the Year).

#2 DAVID ORAAE**5-11, 165, Jr., 3L, Greeley, Colo. (Greeley West)**

The reigning Colorado State Match Play Champion, Oraae has been a participant for a record five CU wins in major tournaments; the most previous to him doing so was four. He is fourth on the team in stroke average (73.03), but has a 72.37 figure for the spring (71.13 for his last eight rounds); he has been CU's top performer three times in this season, but two of those are the last two events, including the Pac-12 Championships where he tied for 12th (293, +5). That followed his career best collegiate finish, a tie for second in Wyoming's Desert Intercollegiate (205, -5), which included his best single round, a 4-under 66 in the first round. He is tied for the team lead with 79.4 percent of his holes played scored at par or better, as he does not have a hole worse than double bogey out of 612 to date (he is tied with a handful of others for the nation's lead in that category). He played in all five fall events with his 73.87 stroke average fourth on the team; all five of his 54-hole scores fell between 219 and 225 with 14 of his 15 rounds falling between 70 and 76. His best result was a tie for eighth in CU's Mark Simpson Invitational (219, +3), the exact same score tying him for 30th in UTEP's Give 'Em Five invite; he tied for 20th in the UNM Tucker Invitational when he finished with a 224 (+8).

► **2012-13 (Soph.):** He played in all 13 tournaments and was fourth on the team in stroke average (74.10), posting his best career major tournament finish in the spring, when he tied for sixth in the Bandon Dunes Championship (-1, 215); his 72-73-70 scorecard helped the Buffaloes win the event become the first team to do so with an under par team score. After an opening round 75, he bounced back with rounds of 69 and 67 for a 211 (+1) to tie for 22nd at the Stanford U.S. Intercollegiate. He tied for 42nd at the Pac-12 Championship (299, +19) and tied for 39th at the NCAA Central/Fayetteville Regional (229, +13). In the fall, he posted the first three top 10 finishes of his career, including ties for seventh in both Simpson Invitational (210, -6) and the New Mexico Tucker Invitational (217, +1). He was also tied for seventh after two rounds of the fall finale, the Alister Mackenzie Invitational, after carding his back-to-back best rounds in college (67, 69) before tying for 26th after a final round 78 (214, +1). A model of consistency, he tied for the team low in holes worse than double bogey with just three (out of 738).

► **2011-12 (Fr.):** As a true freshman, he played in all 11 regular season tournaments, with his 74.50 stroke average the fourth freshman best in school history. He led the team in eagles (5), with 79 birdies and 365 pars, meaning he shot par or better on 73.4 percent of his holes. He recorded a 74-70-76-73—293 (+5) scorecard in the Pac-12 Championships, tying him for 27th overall and for sixth among the 20-plus freshmen competing; it was CU's second best score in the event and his best effort of the spring. The 293 was the best 72-hole score ever recorded by a CU freshman in any tournament and tied for the fourth best by a golfer in any class for a conference championship. In the first round of the Alister Mackenzie Invitational to close the fall, he shot a 4-under 67, tying the school record for the low gross score by a freshman previously set by three others – and then matched it again in the spring with a 3-under 67 in the first round of the Wyoming Cowboy Classic in Scottsdale. After an auspicious start with an 81 in CU's Simpson, he came back with five straight rounds of par or better, eventually tying for 47th (81-70-72—223, +7); he then had a strong performance in the AFA Invitational, as his 71-71-72—214 scorecard tied him for 12th.

#3 YANNIK PAUL**6-1, 175, Fr., 1L, Viernheim, Germany (Albertus-Magnus)**

Currently third on the team in stroke average (72.94); he led the team for the fall with a 72.5 mark, which tied for the 12th lowest fall average in school history and the third lowest by a freshman (true or redshirt); he was the first freshman to do so since 1999. He has 11 subpar rounds and 15 of par or better. His best finish, a tie for second in UTEP's Give 'Em Five Invitational to end the fall (9-under, 66-72-69—207, three shots out of the lead), was the best in school history by a freshman for a 54-hole tournament on any course layout (and tied for the seventh best overall on a par-72 configuration); though his brother matched it in the spring. He tied for 16th in his first collegiate tourney, carding a 1-over 217 (75-71-71) scorecard at the Air Force Miranda Invitational. He has placed in the top 50 in eight of his 10 tournaments in the fall, seven in the top 31, including tying for 31st at the Pac-12 Championships where his third round score (69, -3) was the only score in the 60s in the field (and was a 13-stroke improvement over his second round score). He has only three scores worse than a double bogey on a hole (558 holes), and had none in the fall.

#4 PHILIP JUEL-BERG**5-8, 150, Soph., 2L, Vedbaek, Denmark (HHX Knord Lyngby)**

He played in all 11 tournaments, and is second on the team in stroke average (72.85); that figure is lower for the spring (72.33), thus no "sophomore slump" for him. He is tied for the team lead in par or better rounds (18; 11 subpar, seven even), with 30 of his 33 rounds counting toward CU's team score. He has four top 20 finishes, including a career best fourth in CU's Mark Simpson Invitational, which was also his first top five finish in a major tournament (he had an even par scorecard 73-71-72—216). He matched that score at the Alister Mackenzie invite, tying for 27th, and then closed the fall with his first under-par effort in a major tourney, finishing 3-under par (72-69-72—213) for a 13th place tie at the UTEP Give 'Em Five Invitational. He then opened the spring with two more subpar efforts (both 212, -4) in the Amer Ari Invitational and the Wyoming Desert Intercollegiate (where he tied for 10th).

► **2012-13 (Fr.):** He enjoyed one of the most outstanding seasons by a true freshman in CU history. He played in all 14 tournaments, his 41 rounds tying for the most by a freshman ever at Colorado, while his stroke average of 73.95 was the third best ever by a frosh. He led the team in even-par rounds with 11, and tied for the team lead in par or better rounds with 18. He had three top 10 finishes and four top 20 finishes on the year, which saw 33 of his 39 rounds count toward team scoring (tying for second; two rounds were played as an individual). Nationally, he tied for 21st in rounds played (41, the third freshman), 32nd in eagles (5, the 10th frosh), 35th in fairways hit (74.0 percent, the fifth freshman) and 37th in greens-in-regulation (68.0; sixth of all frosh ... he hit 65.5 percent of par-3 greens, 26th nationally).

#5 ETHAN FREEMAN**6-0, 195, Fr., 1L, Denver, Colo. (Kent Denver)**

Pressed into service late in the spring semester when two other fellow freshmen decided to leave the program, he responded and then some: he has posted two top 20 finishes, first tying for 10th in the Wyoming Cowboy Classic which included a first round 65 (5-under), and then tying for 16th in the Pac-12 Championships. In the latter, he posted the highest finish in a league meet by a CU freshman since 2009 and the ninth-best ever in addition to tying for third among the 14 freshmen in the meet. His 71.71 spring stroke average for seven rounds would lead the team if he had played in half of the spring tournaments. He played in three fall tournaments, starting his career in style by tying for 10th in the Air Force Miranda Invitational. He led all seven Buffaloes in the meet, though he competed as an individual; thanks to a 3-under par 69 in the final round which saw him score seven birdies, his 1-under 215 (73-73-69) total tied for the third-lowest score by a CU player in his first major tournament in school history. It was also the first time that a true freshman posted the best score to lead the Buffaloes in a season opening tournament since 1979 (Rick Cramer, 1-over 217 in the same AFA Falcon invite).
