### ON THE RANGE...

The **118th Annual NCAA Golf Championships** begin this week with 81 schools competing in six regionals around the country, with the **University of Colorado** one of 14 schools competing in the 27th Annual NCAA Regional Golf Championships (Central/Ball State) in Noblesville, Ind. (Ball State University is the host school) ... This will be the fifth time CU will play in a tournament in the state of Indiana, the second time in a regional: in 2004, the Buffs finished 18th (out of 27) in the Central Regional in West Lafayette. CU placed second in Purdue's Boilermaker Invitational earlier that same season, and finished fourth in 2004-05 and 11th in 2009-10 (both times out of 15 teams) in Notre Dame's Invitational ... It's CU's third straight berth in the NCAA Championships, with the Buffaloes now having been invited in 19 of the 27 years of the regional format ... CU is one of eight Pac-12 Conference schools that earned a trip to the postseason ... The top five teams out of 14 competing will advance to the NCAA Finals, set for May 29-June 3 in Bradenton, Fla. (South Florida will host at The Concessions Golf Club) ... Five teams will also advance to the finals out of five other regionals being held in Bremerton, Wash., Chapel Hill, N.C., Lubbock, Texas, New Haven, Conn. and San Diego ... The top individual not associated with the five teams that qualify will also advance to the Finals ... CU is the No. 9 seed, matching its third highest in 19 regional appearances, and will tee off at 6:55 a.m. (MDT) on Thursday off No. 1, with the Buffs paired with Virginia Tech (No. 7 seed) and Georgia Southern (No. 8) ... The field will be re-paired according to score after the first and second rounds, with all tee times between 6:00 and 8:34 a.m. for the second round (Friday) and between 5:30 and 8:04 a.m. for the final round (Saturday) ... The Buffs' practice round is set for 7:00 a.m. MDT Wednesday (off No. 1).



### THE SITE

The **Sagamore Club** in Noblesville, Ind., is located in central Indiana, approximately 20 miles northeast of Indianapolis and is the host course for the NCAA Central/Ball State Regional. The Sagamore Club has a 7,173-yard, par-72 layout and boasts a Jack Nicklaus design and opened in 2003. Course website: [www.thesagamoreclub.com](http://www.thesagamoreclub.com).

### THE EVENT & CU SUCCESS

This is the 27th year that the NCAA is holding regionals, the seventh where the format has six events (up from the previous three) in order to stock the 30-team field at the NCAA Championship Finals. There are 13 or 14 teams at each site, with the top five to advance out of each. Out of the regional format, the Buffaloes have advanced to the NCAA Finals on four occasions, all four times with some style. In **1989**, the inaugural year for regional activity, CU finished third at Stonebridge Country Club outside of Dallas. Oklahoma and Oklahoma State tied for team honors with an 880 score, followed by the Buffs at 902. In **1994**, the Buffs placed second with an 853 score, just two strokes back of regional champion Texas, at Oklahoma City Golf & Country Club. In **1999**, at Ohio State University's Scarlet Course, the Buffs rallied from 18th place and eight shots back after 36 holes to force a playoff with Kent State, winning the battle on the first extra hole and thus advancing to the national finals; it remains the second largest comeback in regional history. In **2002** in Little Rock, CU was 11th after day one and 13th after day two, but rallied to post the seventh best score in a final round despite tough winds, finishing in the 10th and final spot with an 886 team score, edging two teams by one stroke—now former Big 12 rivals Kansas and Oklahoma.

### THE CENTRAL/BALL STATE REGIONAL FIELD

The field is comprised of 75 golfers, 14 five-man teams, plus five individuals; Colorado will be joined by Pac-12 colleagues Oregon and UCLA, with New Mexico State, SMU and UNLV also in the field from west of the Mississippi River. Here is the field listed by seed, with CU's record against team in parenthesis—the Buffs are **3-13** overall against teams competing, having seen eight of the other 13 programs in the regional at least once in 2014-15:

### THE RANKINGS

There are three men's collegiate golf rankings: a coaches poll (conducted by the GCAA by select unknown head coaches), and two that are computer generated (*Golfweek* and *GolfStat*). The Central/Ball State Regional features five top 25 schools, nine top 50 teams, with just three outside the top 75; the Pac-12 has three schools and the American Athletic two in the event, otherwise it's a potpourri of conferences (11 in all). ## HEAD COACH ROY EDWARDS



**Roy Edwards** is completing his ninth season as head coach of the Colorado men's golf team, as he was named to the position on July 14, 2006, following in the footsteps of the only two coaches the program had ever known over a span of six decades.

Edwards, 38, is just the third full-time men's golf coach in Buffalo history. He came to CU with an impressive pedigree, joining the Buffaloes from his alma mater, the University of Kansas, where he had served as the men's and women's assistant for the previous four years (2002-06). He held the same position at Vanderbilt University for a year prior to returning to KU.

Edwards replaced the late Mark Simpson, who passed away in December 2005. Simpson had held the post since 1977, when he followed in the footsteps of his college head coach, Les Fowler. Fowler took over as player-coach in 1948 and remained on board until Simpson, his assistant, replaced him. Thus, Edwards is only the program's third full-time head coach since 1948.

Edwards has embraced the most daunting task in CU golf history: when the Buffaloes joined the Pac-12 Conference on July 1, 2011, they became a member of the most prestigious men's golf conference in the nation. As many as seven schools have regularly occupied the top 25 over the last several seasons, but he has been up to the challenge and the program is poised to join the nation's elite.

It took less than three years for Edwards to put his stamp on the CU golf program, first by completing the dream of his two predecessors. One of the few major golf programs in the nation without its own true home golf course and facilities, Edwards played an integral part in working with alum Steve Kerr in the latter's acquisition of Vista Ridge Golf Club in Erie in early 2009. The club was renamed Colorado National Golf Club and now serves as the official home for the university's men's and women's golf teams. In 2012, a state-of-the-art practice facility at the course was completed (it matches any in the nation). He also initiated the Colorado Partners program, a group who contribute financially to augment the school's golf budget, and established Colorado Golf Day which is an annual celebration and fundraiser for CU golf.

On the course, under Edwards the Buffaloes have re-established themselves as a top 50 program (over 300 play Division I golf), and ended the 2014-15 fall season ranked No. 39, its highest in six years and second-best in the last dozen. His teams have won nine tournaments, the second-most under one coach in school history; Simpson's teams won 16 and Fowler's six.

The 2013-14 Buffaloes set school records for stroke average (73.76) and top five major tournament finishes (eight; all were actually in the top four), which included one win in CU's own Mark Simpson Invitational and three runner-up efforts. Over the course of four tournaments, the Buffs set two other impressive school marks: most consecutive rounds at or under par (12), and the most subpar in a row (6). According to GolfStat, CU had the nation's top performing freshman class, headlined by twin brothers Jeremy and Yannik Paul and Ethan Freeman.

The Buffs finished fourth at the Pac-12 Championships, 41 strokes behind No. 3 Stanford (1,438) and 26 behind runner-up and No. 10 Washington; No. 4 Cal was third, 12 ahead of the Buffs. But over the last two rounds, CU was second (718) to only Washington (716), making an impressive climb from 10th at the midway point into fourth place. The NCAA shipped the Buffaloes to Auburn for the regional, where CU finished 12th to end the season.

His 2012-13 team became the first in school history to win a tournament in both the fall and spring, had six top five finishes and returned to the NCAA Championships after a four-year absence, finishing eighth in the Central Regional.

In 2011-12, his sixth season, the Buffs stormed out of the gate to win its first two fall tournaments, their own Mark Simpson Invitational and Air Force's Miranda Invitational; the victories propelled CU to an early No. 10 national ranking. The team successfully navigated its way through its first season in the ultra-competitive Pac-12 Conference, finishing eighth in a league championship that featured eight teams ranked in the top 30. The Buffs just missed qualifying for the NCAA championships but Derek Fribbs was selected to play as an individual.

The 2009-10 and 2010-11 teams, his fourth and fifth, respectively, had their moments but did not advance to the postseason, though Justin Bardgett qualified individually in 2010. The Buffs finished ninth and 10th in their last two appearances in the Big 12 Conference meet. The disappointments only created more resolve in the program and thus the turnaround in year six.

His third Buffalo team (2008-09) sported one of the nation's dynamic duos in Patrick Grady and Derek Tolan, as each won two tournaments and combined for 14 top 10 finishes. But the team was also balanced as a whole, with 32 top 20 performances posted by seven different golfers, and recorded a 74.06 stroke average, second lowest in school history (topped only by 73.77 in 2003-04). The Buffs posted 11 top 10 finishes in major tournaments, the second-most in school history that included a record-tying seven in the top five, and highlighted by a 34-stroke win in the DU-Ron Moore and three runner-up finishes in the USF Olympic Club, Western Intercollegiate and its own CU-Stevinson Ranch Invitational.

In earning a fourth straight trip to the NCAA's, in the Big 12 Championships, the Buffs posted their best conference finish in 28 years when they took second place; it tied for the largest improvement from one season to another in Big 12 history after finishing 10th in 2008 (CU moved from 11th to 3rd from 1997 to 1998 as did Missouri on one occasion). The Buffs were in the hunt for the title until the back nine of the fourth and final round, when Oklahoma State was able to get some distance and eventually won by 14 shots.

His second team ('07-08), became just the third in school history to win two major tournaments in the same season, as CU won the Louisiana Classics and the Ohio State Kepler Intercollegiate. The Buffs finished 10th in the Big 12 meet, which moved to a 72-hole format for the first time, and was again invited to the NCAA's, placing 18th in the Central Regional. Junior Derek Tolan was one of two individuals to advance out of the regional into the finals, the first Buff to do so since 1993.

Edwards' first CU team (2006-07) had moderate success, and finished 11th in the Big 12 Championships; while that was disappointing, his team did something that neither Fowler's or Simpson's did, qualify for the NCAA Championships (though in fairness, more teams are invited today than when they coached, but it still was an impressive accomplishment). The team placed 20th in the NCAA Central Regional.

At Kansas, he was heavily involved in recruiting and the day-to-day functions for both the men's and women's teams, managed the Jayhawks' Birdie Club and was the main contact for both golf camps. A KU graduate, he returned to his alma mater in August 2002 as the assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs. He started his coaching career as a volunteer/graduate assistant in 1998, working three years in that capacity before moving on to Vanderbilt for his first full-time assistant coaching position.

He was the assistant for both the men's and women's teams at Vanderbilt from May 2001 until returning to his alma mater the following year. At Vandy, he headed the Commodore Golf Day and the Mason Rudolph Intercollegiate Golf Championships, and was involved in Commodore recruiting as well as the day-to-day practice and traveling schedules. He was a part of history as both teams experienced two of the best seasons in the programs' existence the 2001-02 academic year, and had a hand in coaching a pair of first-team All-Southeastern Conference players, including Brandt Snedeker, a first-team All-American, the 2007 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year and third place finisher in the 2008 Masters.

A three-year member of the Jayhawk golf team, he lettered as a senior under legendary and long-time coach Ross Randall and earned his bachelor's of science degree in business administration from Kansas in 2000. Simultaneously while finishing his degree, he worked as a volunteer assistant coach for the men's team. His career playing highlights include being named the PGA Midwest Section Player of the Year in 1995 and the Heart of America Four-Ball champion in 1997. As a student, he was also heavily involved on KU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and held several leadership roles on campus.

Born October 14, 1976 in Kansas City, Mo., but truly a native of Hutchinson, Kan., he was a four-year letterman in golf at Hutchinson (Kan.) High School and was an Eagle Scout. His hobbies include playing golf, cooking and traveling. Edwards is married to the former Shelly Bonfantine of Albuquerque, N.M., as they wed on July 7, 2007 (07-07-07); she is a former golfer at the University of New Mexico. They are the parents of two sons, Ashton Ross (6) and Luke Leo (3).

**THE COLORADO ROSTER**

The quintet representing Colorado in the NCAA's have earned 14 letters between them, and has gone from the youngest CU team that ever qualified for the NCAA's last year to one of the more experienced, as all but one has played in at least one NCAA regional. The last Colorado team to advance to the NCAA Finals, the 2002 squad, had a combined 17 letters with 12 previous NCAA regional or finals tournaments among them. The 2015 Buffalo five:

- Five CU players have played in four NCAA Championships: **Rick Cramer** (1979-82), **Bob Kalinowski** (1991-94), **Matt Zions** (1999-2002), **Kane Webber** (2000-04) and **Derek Tolan** (2006-09).
- Freshman: the Buffs took three in 2014 (**Ethan Freeman**, **Jeremy Paul** and **Yannik Paul**), and have taken to three times, twice with two true frosh: **Shawn Wills** and **Matt Zions** (1999) and **Kevin Kring** and **Johnny Widmer** (2009). **Stephen Carroll**, a redshirt frosh, and **Kane Webber** (true) played in 2000.

**PLAYER SUMMARY**

**Jeremy Paul** is in position to become just the fourth player in school history to record a season stroke average under 72, with his younger twin **Yannik** and **David Oraee** also within range to do so. In 2008-09, **Derek Tolan** (71.90) and **Patrick Grady** (71.98) both were sub-72, with **Kane Webber** setting the all-time season best of 71.46 in 2003-04. CU has never had three players average under 73 for a season, and has had two just the one time (2008-09), but is position for it to happen this year. The regionals are five-scoring-four formats; CU's first-round average this year in such is **288.9**, higher than its middle round (287.2) and final round (287.8) averages. CU has advanced out of regional play four times, twice after having to rally after high first round scores (312 in 1989, 300 in 1999).

## SEASON CAPSULE

The 2014-15 **University of Colorado** men's golf team has endured a bit of a rollercoaster ride, enjoying a fine fall in which it ended ranked No. 36 in the nation, but hasn't matched those results in the spring portion of the schedule. While CU had eight top five finishes last season (all top four at that), a school-record, it has just four to date this year, but that also is largely in part to an upgraded schedule that has seen the Buffs play in eight of the nation's top 50 tournaments (and in four of the top 16).

Otherwise, it'd be hard to explain that the Buffs are on target to set a school record for overall team stroke average – currently at 73.23 – which would topple the mark set just last spring (73.76). The fourth- and fifth-man averages (in tournament play) also stand to be program bests; the fourth scorer in each tournament is averaging 74.5 (besting last year's 75.1, which topped 75.3 in '08-09), and the fifth-scorer is at 77.1, which would best the 77.8 mark last year, the first time that figure has ever dropped below 78 (it was 79.9 the year before **Roy Edwards** took over as coach).

This is the sixth time in nine years under Edwards that the Buffs have qualified for the NCAA Championships, and what could separate it from his other top two squads, the 2008-09 and 2013-14 teams, is if this group can advance to the NCAA Finals, something CU hasn't done since 2002.

Four of the five players representing the Buffs this year have played in all 11 tournaments this season, the third time as many as four players in a regional will have played in every meet prior to the postseason. CU has been consistent at the top of most tournaments, with three players, sophomores **Jeremy Paul** (71.72 stroke average) and **Yannik Paul** (72.13) and senior **David Oraee** (72.25) claiming the top three spots seven times by CU golfers in tourneys. Junior **Philip Juel-Berg** (74.13) has two less rounds than the others as he missed a pair at Stanford's The Goodwin due to illness; sophomore **Ethan Freeman** (74.63) has won the qualifying to be the No. 5 man most tournaments, while **Drew Trujillo** (75.44) has seen action in six tournaments, thus the Buffs are as deep as they've ever been.

Colorado is coming off a disappointing 11th place finish at the Pac-12 Championships, a poor first round dooming the Buffaloes to a second-division finish; CU did improve its team score each day and turned in the fifth-best score of the final round.

## THE SCHEDULE & SEASON AT-A-GLANCE

Colorado has played in 11 tournaments this year, with *Golfweek* ranking CU's schedule the 47th toughest to date (out of 302 schools); that is 37 spots higher than the Buffs' 2013-14 schedule ranked at this time last year as Edwards toughened up the slate. Colorado has played in seven of the top 50 ranked tournaments to date, including Olympia Fields/Illinois (No. 11), UHH's Amer Ari (No. 12) and UCLA's Gifford (No. 15); and the Pac-12 Championships (No. 16). All but the Gifford and Pac-12 title meets were events where the usual format had four scorers out of five players counted toward the team score (others were 6-score-5 formats). Colorado is 89-73-1 against Division I competition this year.

## THIS-N-THAT, 2014-15 ...

- The Buffaloes are in position to set a school record for team stroke average; currently at **73.23**, the record of 73.76 was set just last year after the previous mark of 73.77 had stood since it was set in the 2003-04 season. The **72.82** spring average is more than a half-stroke better than the current spring best of 73.39, also set last season.
- Three Buffs (**Jeremy Paul**, **David Oraee**, **Yannik Paul**) all currently have stroke averages under 73 (actually all lower than 72.3); there has never been a season in CU golf history where three players finished the year under 73.0. Jeremy Paul and Oraee are both sub-72; only three players have ever finished a year under 72: **Kane Webber** (71.46 in 2003-04), **Derek Tolan** (71.90 in 2008-09) and **Patrick Grady** (71.98 in 2008-09).
- The Buffaloes have **28** rounds in the 60s this season, surpassing last year's total of 27, but have fewer subpar rounds overall (49 as compared to 67). All five players competing in the regional have accounted for those sub-70 rounds.
- **Jeremy Paul** has 35 subpar rounds in his career, as he has tied **Kane Webber** (1999-2003) for the all-time school record.
- CU has not advanced to the NCAA Finals the last seven times it qualified for regional play, the longest drought in school history; CU went four straight regionals (1990-93) without advancing. The Buffs' last appearance in the Finals came in 2001-02, when CU finished 14th. CU's all-time best finish was a tie for 8th in the 1967-68 school year

## U.S. OPEN LOCAL QUALIFYING

Three Buffs, **David Oraee**, **Jeremy Paul** and **Drew Trujillo**, were scheduled to participate in U.S. Open Local Qualifying this past Monday at The Heritage Golf Club in Westminster, but for the second straight year, the qualifying round was delayed by a late spring snowstorm. This time around, it was delayed a day (one week last year), thus the trio were set to attempt to qualify on Tuesday and then join the remainder of the team late Tuesday in Indiana.

## THE "DID YOU KNOW?" FACT

Colorado, Ohio State, Stanford and Wake Forest have produced the most U.S. Open champions with four. CU's **Hale Irwin** has won three (1974, 1979, 1990) and **Steve Jones** one (1996). Ohio State's **Jack Nicklaus** claimed four by himself, while Stanford has had **Tiger Woods** win three and **Tom Watson** one; Wake Forest has had three players do it.

## NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS

Thirty teams will advance to the NCAA Championship Finals in Bradenton, Fla., with the tournament to be played at the 7,474-yard, par-72 Concession Golf Club. Also a Jack Nicklaus design (in association with Tony Jacklin), the course boasts about its spectacular views and peaceful surroundings but also a "challenge so unique that it is one of the only golf courses in the United States to have the highest possible slope rating from the championship tees." There will be three rounds of stroke play May 29-31, with the top eight teams advancing to match play from June 1-3, with the championship match on the final day.

**WHAT A DIFFERENCE A STROKE MAKES**

History has shown time and time again that a single stroke can mean the difference between advancing to the NCAA Finals and having a season end early. The last eight Central regionals CU participated in that featured 27 teams all came down to a playoff or one stroke separating the 10 teams that qualified and the 11th that was left on the outside looking in. Overall, on six occasions, there was a tie for the last qualifying spot, with one stroke the difference seven times and two strokes three times. Only three times was the margin between qualifying and going home been more than two shots, in 1992 (7), in 1998 (3) and in 2000 (4). A closer look at the Central Regional history (1989-2008), where CU participated when it made it to the postseason:

In 2009, the regionals expanded to six sites and thus were cut from 27 to either 13 or 14; it also marked the first year schools started to be shipped anywhere in the nation as opposed to its natural districting; still hasn't mattered, every stroke counts. CU participated in the West regional in 2009, the Central in 2013 and Southeast in 2014:

**QUOTING ROY EDWARDS**

**General**

"I know everyone is relieved yet excited to be done with finals, it's always a great feeling to be able to compete once they're over and not have to worry about school. I believe we have a real opportunity out of this region. We've been a little more inconsistent over the course of the year than we would have liked, but this group has a lot of firepower and that inconsistency does show that when we play well and manage our games, we can advance to the finals. Everyone is on equal footing, we're all starting anew. This presents a great opportunity for everyone competing."

**On Not Having To Adjust To The Southern Bermuda Grasses Like The Last Two Years**

"This is our first time for this group to play in a regional not in the south, so we won't have that period of adjustment it takes to get a little more used to Bermuda grass, so that's an advantage over previous years. Sagamore is the kind of course, from what I hear, that favors the long hitter and players who can manage their games, manage their misses."

**On What Colorado Needs To Do To Rebound From A Disappointing Pac-12 Championship**

"I believe we can take the negatives from the conference tournament and use those for motivation. We have a great group of competitors, and this is the best time of the year to be a college golfer. There's nothing like playing for your school in the NCAA Championships. When we play our best, we play with a lot confidence and we have fun, and that is the result of preparing well and staying focused. We can't be concerned with how we played in the Pac-12 Championship. We never gave up and threw in the towel. Only five teams advance here, so we can't afford any lapses, poor starts or poor finishes. One shot at a time, one shot is often the difference between advancing and staying home."

**On The Central/Ball State Regional Field**

"Every regional is a tough one, the tops teams are all spread out and the competition is such where you have to play your best to advance. We've seen a lot of these teams this year that are in our regional, so we know what to expect. Regardless, you have to go out and compete your best."

**On Drew Trujillo Replacing Ethan Freeman In The Lineup On Monday Night**

"We are hopeful that Ethan starts to feel better soon and it is unfortunate he won't be with us in Indiana. This provides an opportunity for Drew that historically he has capitalized on. He had some solid rounds in Washington (at the Pac-12s) and is a tremendous competitor. There is no question we expect him to play well."

**On Team Experience In The Regional Setting**

"For sure, that experience will help us, we shouldn't be surprised by anything, and that will help us. We know the importance of getting off to a good start, but you can't have any lapses, either. We were in good position a year ago, but had a poor final round and we shot ourselves out of it."

**On If The Weather (Rain/Snow) Hampered CU's Practice For The Regional**

"We were really just off the golf course for a day; we got some pretty good practice time in prior to the weather taking a turn for the worse. The guys will be ready."

**DID YOU KNOW? CU REGIONAL TRIVIA**

In 1999, the Buffaloes recorded the second largest final round comeback at the time in the 11 years of regional play, making up nine strokes in leaping from 18th place into a tie for 10th and then defeating Kent State on the first playoff hole to advance to the NCAA Finals; Arkansas still owns the biggest comeback, jumping from 20th into 10th in 1990. (The regionals doubled in 2009, with five advancing from six sites instead of 10 from three.)

**PAC-12 CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP: BUFFS FINISH DISAPPOINTING 11TH**

PULLMAN, Wash. (April 29) — The University of Colorado men’s golf team logged its best score of the four this week Wednesday, but remained stuck in the standings and finished in 11th place as the 56th annual Pac-12 Championships came to a close.

No. 9 Stanford ran away from the field, recording the best single round of the tournament on the last day, a 10-under 340, to finish at 4-under par (1,396). That was 14 strokes better than No. 8 Oregon, which had a 6-under 344 to rise from fourth into second (1,410). Third round leader, No. 3 Arizona State, fell into third, carding a 14-over 364 for a 1,411 total; No. 16 Southern California (1,417) and No. 12 Washington (1,435) rounded out the top five.

Colorado, ranked No. 48, posted a team score of 9-over 359 for a final score of 1,459, or 59-over par; CU flirted with 10th place much of the day but faltered late to slip back into 11th.

The Buffaloes were in position to shoot one of the top three scores in the final round, possibly under par, until the five players who wound up scoring toward the team total played the last four holes of the day at 12-over par. CU closed with its best round of the 72-hole meet, a 9-over 359, which was still the fifth best of the day. The struggles the Buffs endured down the stretch cost CU just one spot in the standings, as there was too much ground to make up after a tough opening day.

Sophomore **Yannik Paul** led CU from wire-to-wire here, as he turned in a 2-under 68, tied for the sixth best score in the final round. He tied for 19th overall with a 5-over 285 on the 7,257-yard, par-70 Palouse Ridge Golf Club course layout. He had an eagle on No. 2, a 379-yard, par-4, pitching in from 45 yards out; he also had five birdies, seven pars and five bogeys. His 12 birdies for the week tied for the 13th-most in the field, and he played the par-5s the 10th-best at 4-under. Paul’s 285 is the second best gross score for a 72-hole tournament in school history (tying for 12th best in relation to par), and CU’s best in the Pac-12 meet, the second best in relation to par.

“It was a better day, but still wasn’t a very good tournament,” CU head coach **Roy Edwards** said. “We had a good round going, but just weren’t able to finish it off.”

“Yannik played well overall, but in a six-count-five, there’s very small room for error,” he continued. “We definitely made too many big numbers in the overall scheme of things. The first two rounds, we didn’t execute or stick with our game plan, and had too many mistakes early on. Those shots count the same. Ultimately, we just need to keep improving in a few areas.”

Sophomore **Jeremy Paul**, the older identical twin and CU’s stroke average leader (71.7) fired a second straight 1-under 69 to finish with an 8-over 288, tying him for 29th. Both 69s were identical – three birdies, 13 pars, two bogeys – and his 48 pars were 12th-most for the tournament. He played the par-4 holes even for the week, tied for fourth best in the field. He was one of just 13 players under par in the final round.

Junior **Philip Juel-Berg** closed with an even-par 70 for a 10-over total of 290, which tied him for 34th; he was in position for an under par round until he scored bogeys on his last two holes of the day. He had four birdies Wednesday, giving him 10 for the week, the second-most by a Buff, along with 10 pars and four bogeys.

Both Paul brothers had just two holes worse than bogey for the week, with Juel-Berg just scoring three higher.

Senior **David Orae** never got untracked here, placing 61st with a 21-over 301 after a final round 74, which was his best of the four; he had two birdies, 12 pars, two bogeys and two doubles to close things out. He didn’t have any big numbers here, and just five double bogeys, but his birdie count for the week – five – was his lowest for the year in any tournament. Second on the squad in stroke average coming in (71.8), his 46 pars tied for the 25th most in the 72-man field, however.

Sophomore **Ethan Freeman** finished 65th as he wrapped things up with a 8-over 78, giving him 306 total for the tournament, or 26-over par. He had two birdies and seven pars against nine birdies in the final round, with nine birdies and 37 pars for the week; almost half of his overage can be traced to just four holes here, two doubles, a triple and a quintuple accounting for 12 of those extra strokes.

Junior **Drew Trujillo** rounded out the CU contingent here, but was unable to match the success he has in the middle rounds, closing with an 80 for a 27-over 307; after opening with an 85, he had bounced back with the best middle 36 holes by a Buffalo here (72-70—142, or 2-over). Just three over par through 12 holes Wednesday, he struggled down the stretch with three bogeys and two doubles. He did have an eagle, nine birdies and 33 pars overall in finishing 66th.

Stanford’s **Maverick McNealy** ran away with medalist honors, finishing up with a collegiate course record 9-under 61 that gave him an 18-under 262 total. That was good for a 10-stroke win as well as a Pac-12 championship record for the player ranked as the nation’s No. 1 player by Golfweek. Oregon’s **Aaron Wise** was second (67—272), with two tying for third four more strokes back at 276, UCLA’s **Jonathan Garrick** and Arizona’s **George Cunningham**.

Colorado is now 89-73-1 against Division I competition, so it more than exceeds the first requirement to be eligible for the NCAA Championships, which start with regional play May 14-16. The Buffs should be in good position, as they may drop into the low 50s in the national rankings, but also have played a top 50 schedule nationally (out of 302 schools).

“Hopefully we make it, and if so, we can have a chance to redeem ourselves in the regional,” Edwards said.

**NOTES:** The weather was the most challenging of the three days, with cooler temperatures (low 50s) but the winds constantly in the 15-20 mile per hour range ... The NCAA will announce the 81-team national championship field this coming Monday (May 4), between 8-9 a.m. MDT on the Golf Channel; the schools will be spread over six regional sites ... CU did lose to seven teams ahead of them in the national rankings, plus the host school (Washington State), which usually gets a boost playing its home course ... CU’s gross team score – 1,459 – was actually the lowest in the four years it has been a member of the Pac-12, as well as its lowest-ever in a 6-score-5 tournament; part of that is due to the par-70 configuration, with one less par-5 and additional par-3 ... Those par-5s uncharacteristically hurt CU here, as the Buffs usually feast on them but played the 60 combined at 6-over par this week; Oregon led the fields at 25-under ... The average score in the tournament was a 72.85 (Colorado’s was 74.04) ... CU, Stanford and Arizona were the only schools to improve their team score in each round.

**THE PLAYERS**

Some quick season and/or career notes on the five Buffaloes heading to Indiana to represent Colorado in the 118th NCAA Championship:

**#1 JEREMY PAUL****6-1, 175, Soph., 2L, Viernheim, Germany (Albertus-Magnus)**

No sophomore slump for Paul, who leads the team in stroke average again with a 71.72 figure, which includes a 71.47 average for the fall, the fourth-best in program history ... He has had 31 of his 32 rounds count toward team scoring (96.9 percent; his career count is 65 of 69, 94.2) ... He has turned in the team's top performance in five tournaments, with his best finish in the season opener at Air Force, where he placed fifth (6-under 210) ... He leads the team in top 10 (5) and top 20 finishes (7) and in subpar rounds (14) ... His 71.18 scoring average for second/middle rounds is a team-best ... Also owns a team-best 19.3 percent of his holes played under par (111 of 576) and leads in percentage of holes played at or under par (80.2 percent; 458 of 576) ... After a rough start at the Pac-12 Championships, he closed with a pair of 69s for an 8-over 288, tying for 29th overall ... If he keeps his current pace, he will threaten to become the first player in CU history to record at least half of his career rounds at par or better; with 31 subpar rounds and four even-par efforts, 35 of 69 rounds fit into that category (50.7 percent) ... His 72.14 career stroke average for those 69 rounds is currently well ahead of the all-time CU mark of 72.90 (set

by Kane Webber, 1999-2004) ... He has already tied Webber for the most subpar rounds in a CU career with 35 ... In 2014, he was one of four finalists for CU's Freshman Athlete of the Year at the CUSPY Awards (CU Sports Performers of the Year) as he rewrote most of the schools freshman records ... He set the stroke average mark by a freshman (72.51), with his 72.22 spring mark also a frosh best; he had 17 subpar rounds, one shy of the school mark, and in all, led (15) or was tied for the team lead in 20 statistical categories ... He was just the sixth freshman and the first since 1999-00 to lead the team in scoring ... He earned second-team All-Pac-12 and first-team All-Pac-12 freshman honors.

**#2 DAVID ORAAE****5-11, 165, Sr., 4L, Greeley, Colo. (Greeley West)**

The reigning Colorado State Stroke Play Champion (and the '13 Match Play titlist), Orae has been a participant for a record six CU wins in major tournaments; the most previous to him doing so was four ... He has appeared in 48 career tournaments, or every single one on the Colorado schedule in his career, and in 13 of those, he did not record a score worse than bogey ... Orae is tied for the fifth-most rounds played in school history – 144 – and owns this incredible stat: of those 2,592 holes, he has recorded only seven worse than double bogey (and has just 75 of those); that works to just 2.9 percent of holes higher than a bogey ... He is third on the team in stroke average (72.25), with a 72.13 for the spring; he has been CU's top performer three times this season, including the twice this spring, with his 64-67—131 effort that earned him medalist honors in CU's Mark Simpson Invitational last September set the school mark for the most strokes (-13) under par in a tournament (that was his first collegiate win) ... Second on the team in rounds in the 60s (8) and third in final round average (72.2); his 71.45 for the first round is a team best ... His career stroke average of 73.56 currently is the fourth-best ever by a Buff, with

either one or two tournaments remaining in his career ... He has had 35 subpar rounds (21 in the 60s) and 10 even-par efforts in his career ... He has three career top five finishes and 10 in the top 10, tying him for 10th on CU's all-time list (he has 14 in the top 20) ... He has had 122 of 139 rounds (87.8 percent) in his career count toward the team score (31 of 32 this year); he's played five rounds as an individual ... A two-time recipient of the team's Mr. Buffalo Award, given to the player who best exemplifies the dedication it means to be a Colorado Buffalo ... He was one of three finalists for CU's Male Career Athletic Achievement Award (across all CU varsity sports).

**#3 YANNIK PAUL****6-1, 175, Soph., 2L, Viernheim, Germany (Albertus-Magnus)**

Currently second on the team in stroke average (72.13), a number that most years would lead the team; his 71.60 figure for 15 spring rounds is the team best ... His best finish on the year came in the season opener, when his 69-71-67—207 (-9) performance tied him for second in Air Force's Gene Miranda invite ... Leads the team in rounds in the 60s (9) and final round scoring average (71.6), and is second in subpar rounds (13) and percentage of holes played at or under par (79.9 percent; 456 of 576) ... Has had 29 of his 32 rounds count toward team scoring (53 of 63 career), and has had recorded the team's top performance in a meet four times ... He has three top 10 finishes in this, his sophomore season, as in addition to runner-up effort at AFA, he tied for sixth in both CU's Mark Simpson Invitational (141, -3) and in Cal's Alister Mackenzie Invitational (210, -3) ... Turned in CU's top performance at the Pac-12 Championships, tying for 19th with a 285 (+5) total; that included a 2-under 68 in the final round ... Owns a career average of 72.85 for 66 career rounds; only his older twin brother (Jeremy, 72.14) and Kane Webber (72.90) have lower career marks for those Buffaloes who have played 50 or more rounds ... As a

freshman, he posted a 73.53 average, fourth on the team but the third best number ever recorded by a freshman ... He placed in the top 50 in eight of his 11 tournaments (seven in the top 31), including tying for 31st at the Pac-12 Championships where his third round score (69, -3) was the only score in the 60s in the field (and was a 13-stroke improvement over his second round score).

**#4 PHILIP JUEL-BERG****5-8, 150, Jr., 3L, Vedbaek, Denmark (HHX Knord Lyngby)**

He has played in all 37 tournaments that CU has competed in his career, owning a 73.79 career stroke average (which ranks sixth all-time for those players with 100 or more career rounds) ... His season mark for 2014-15 is a bit above that (74.13), though his spring average is 72.62 ... He is still searching for his first top 20 finish this season (he has eight in his career), but has six in the top 44, including two 29th-place ties, in Air Force's Miranda Invitational (219, +3) and in CU's Mark Simpson invite (147, +3) ... He tied for 34th in the Pac-12 Championships (290, +10), with his best round an even-par 70 in the final round ... Is one of two Buffaloes without a score higher than a double bogey this year (and just 20 of those) ... As a sophomore (when he had a team runner-up 73.00 stroke average for 36 rounds), two of his biggest efforts followed his coming down with flu-like symptoms that forced him to miss the first round of the Pac-12 Championships; he pushed through a 76 in the second round, but while still feeling the effects of the illness, scored a pair of par 72s in the final two rounds that helped the Buffs rise from 10th into a fourth place finish ... His 73.95 stroke average as a freshman was the third best at the time by a

frosh in CU annals ... Has had 48 of his 107 career rounds scored either under (26) or at (22) par, or 44.9 percent; while he has 11 rounds in the 60s, he's primed to bust through sometime: those break down into three 68s and eight 69s.

**#5 DREW TRUJILLO****5-10, 175, Jr., 3L, Montrose, Colo. (Montrose)**

A last-minute replacement for the CU regional roster, as he replaced Ethan Freeman, who fell ill the day before the team was set to leave for Indiana ... He has seen action in over half of CU's tournaments, so he has some preparedness as CU's No. 6 man, which he has been in two Pac-12 Championships and now plays the No. 5 position in his first regional ... Owns a 75.44 stroke average, with a 75.1 figure in the two spring tournaments he participated in: Wyoming's Cowboy Classic (219/+3) and the Pac-12 Championships (307, +27) ... He has played as an individual in 11 of his 18 rounds, the only time his score has counted toward the team total was in UCLA's Gifford Intercollegiate and at the Pac-12s' where he had similar starts. In the UCLA event, he struggled with a first-round 80 but came back with a 75-73 over the last 36 holes; at the Pac-12 meet, he opened with an 85 but came right back with a 2-over 72, the 13-stroke improvement tied for the third best in CU postseason history from one round to the next (he then had a third round even-par 70 before closing with an 80) ... He has played 63 career rounds (33 scoring for the team, 30 as an individual); 22 of the 33 have counted toward CU's team score ...

His best career finish was a tie for 11th place in the Wyoming Desert Classic the spring of his freshman year (217, +1); he closed that meet with a final round 69, his collegiate best which he matched the following year at Air Force.
